Vendors were added, several special events were incorporate, beginning with a special program on Friday evening where the Veterans and current military people are honored.



BECKHAM CO DIST COURT- Two people charged in Beckham county district court with the murder of a North Fork Correctional inmate in May of 2020, are scheduled for preliminary hearings September 14th. Court records show Jerrad Pointer and Tre Lane are charged in the murder of Vincent Worley. Pointer allegedly used a makeshift sharpened instrument to attack Worley, resulting in his death. Lane told investigators he helped inmate Pointer attack Worley, but that he stayed in the cell after the initial attack while inmate Pointer chased Worley out into the pod.

CORDELL SCHOOLS/OPEN BOARD SEATS- Cordell schools superintendent Brad Overton says the district has two open seats on the board of education. Overton says board appointment applications are due July 8th. He says in the meantime, the district has three board members and can continue to conduct business. Overton says anyone who resides in the school district and is a registered voter for the past six months can apply to serve on the board of education.

ELK CITY TEACHER ARRESTED- A Merritt middle school teacher was jailed last week after being charged with selling steriods out of her house. Authorities raided the Elk City home of Heather Porter last week and discovered more than 1000 bottles of steroids. Porter faces 10 felony charges. Porter's husband Travis is facing three felony charges. Meanwhile, charges are pending against 20 year old Klaudia Porter. All three were arrested by authorities last week.

OKLAHOMA COLLEGES/TUITION- Students at the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma State will feel the affects of tuition and fee increases when they return to college in the fall. The University of Oklahoma Board of Regents have voted to implement a 2.75% increase in tuition and fees for undergraduate and graduate rates. The Oklahoma A&M board of regents, which governs Oklahoma State University, voted to raise tuition and fees by 2.5%. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education approved the increases

last week. Officials at Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford say they did not seek a raise in tuition and fees this year, saying students have been through a stressful and trying time during the last year. SWOSU is returning to normal operations in the fall.

RUSS/STATE TREASURER CANDIDATE- Term limited state lawmaker Todd Russ of Cordell has announced he will seek the seat of state treasurer. Russ is in his 6th two-year term in the Oklahoma house and will term limit out of office next year. Russ made the announcement yesterday. Current treasurer Randy Mcdaniel previously announced he would not seek re-election in 2022. Russ is the second candidate to announce his intention of seeking the seat. Oklahoma county clerk David Hooten announced plans to run for treasurer earlier this month.


WEATHERFORD/MEAL SITES- The community action development corporation is making recommendations surrounding its meal programs for the next year. Judy Smith with C-A-D-C says unless the city of Weatheford can provide extra funding it would impact the number of days meals would be served at the Pioneer Center in Weatherford and Meals on Wheels. The other 13 nutrition sites in the state, run by community action development corporation, have already decided to go to a four day week. The Weatherford City Commission will likely discuss the extra funding request at its July meeting to remain serving meals at the Weatherford site five days a week.

WRH/RETENTION BONUSES- After much discussion, the board of trustees of the Weatherford Hospital Authority approved retention bonuses last night to be paid from COVID funding. The board approved the bonuses by a 4-2 vote. Eligible full time employees will receive \$2500, part time employees will receive half that amount and P-R-N employees, who are as needed personnel, will receive a pro-rated amount with a minimum of \$100. The total cost of the bonuses is between \$330,000 to \$350,000.

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Lady Bulldog Standout Bethany Franks to Return for Fifth Season

SWOSU Women's Basketball standout Bethany Franks has announced her intention to return to the Lady Bulldogs in 2021-22 for a fifth season, taking advantage of an NCAA waiver to extend eligibility following the COVID-19 pandemic.

Franks is a three-time All-Great American Conference selection and she's appeared in 114 games for the Lady Bulldogs over the past four seasons. She is ranked second in school history with 969 career rebounds and 12th on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,165 points to her credit. In addition, Franks is the active leader in NCAA Division II with 299 career steals, which far exceeds the school record she broke at the beginning of her junior season.

"There are a lot of reasons why I chose to come back, but the biggest is because one of the last conversations I got to have with my Dad before he passed was about school and the opportunity to play a fifth year," Franks said. "During that talk, I told him that I wanted to end my career a little differently because this past season didn't feel like a good note to end on. He agreed and couldn't wait to watch me play one last season. So I'm coming back for my Dad."

By returning for an extra season, Franks will extend her decorated career that includes four regular season Great American Conference Championships and one GAC Tournament Championship. The Lady Bulldogs are a combined 100-19 during that time and they've qualified for four NCAA Division II National



Tournaments, highlighted by a winning the Central Regional Championship on the way to a National Runner-up finish in 2019. During the 2019 postseason run, Franks was named the Most Valuable Player of the GAC Tournament and earned a spot on the All-Tournament Team at the Elite Eight.

"Bethany has been a vital part of our team and growth over the past four years," SWOSU Head Coach Kelsi Musick said. "We are so excited to have her return to finish her goals for our team. She will be able to help teach our young players as well, which is great for the future of Lady Bulldog Basketball!"

With the return of Franks, SWOSU will bring back all five starters from their 2021 team which finished 18-4 and won the regular season championship for the GAC's Western Division.

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SWOSU and OSU-CHS Sign MOU to Explore Expansion of Rural Healthcare Education

Southwestern Oklahoma State University's (SWOSU) College of Pharmacy in Weatherford and Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences (OSU-CHS) in Tulsa have signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) to cooperate to serve students and the citizens of Oklahoma through expansion of rural healthcare education.

The MOU was signed by SWOSU President Dr. Randy L. Beutler and OSU-CHS President Dr. Kayse Shrum, who will take over as president of Oklahoma State University in Stillwater on July 1.

SWOSU and OSU-CHS will explore options for a dual-degree partnership involving SWOSU's Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm.D.) program and the OSU-CHS Physician Assistant (P.A.) program.

"We greatly appreciate the opportunity to begin a closer relationship with Oklahoma State University Center for Health Sciences that will lead to future enhancement of health-related programs at both institutions," Beutler said. "This is a partnership with great potential."

SWOSU recently received the largest single donation in the history of the university (\$5 million) from longtime SWOSU benefactors Jerry and Margaret Hodge of Amarillo (TX). That gift is enabling SWOSU to take the next steps toward construction of a state-of-the-art

facility dedicated to healthcare education and pharmacy.

SWOSU and OSU-CHS will cooperate on intraprofessional education opportunities through electronic or physical means at the earliest possible opportunity. The two higher education institutions will be looking at possibilities and planning methods to utilize selected clinical rotations from one institution's program to meet requirements for clinical rotations of the other institution's program.

In addition, discussion will take place about the guaranteed admission slots into the OSU-CHS P.A. program for SWOSU Pharm.D. graduates, once the probationary accreditation class size cap on the OSU-CHS P.A. program is lifted, provided pre-requisites are met. And discussion will take place on the logistics of guaranteed admission slots into the SWOSU Pharm.D. program for OSU-CHS P.A. graduates, provided prerequisites are met.

Beutler said the two entities will explore other methods in which SWOSU can collaborate with OSU-CHS to expand rural healthcare opportunities for students and citizens, including the physical expansion of the OSU-CHS P.A. program into western Oklahoma at a site on SWOSU's Weatherford campus, when OSU-CHS' P.A. accreditation and funding levels allow consideration of such an expansion.

Oklahoma History: Boise City Bombing

With numerous text, film, and news coverages, ranging from romanticized stories to professional documentaries, most of the major events of WWII have been told from all sides. However, there is one WWII story that textbooks and film crews forget to mention; the bombing of Boise City, OK, the only United States city to be bombed during WWII. At the time of Honolulu's Pearl Harbor bombing by Japan in 1941, Hawaii was a territory not a state.

On July 5th, 1943, while the Allies and Axis Powers were clashing on the other side of the world, pilots at Dalhart Army Air Base in Texas were preparing B-17 "Flying Fortress" bombers for a midnight raid. Their target: a small square area lit up in each corner. The raid would begin after dark.

As the last rays of sunlight dipped past the horizon, the four B-17's took off with the young navigator's directions. Expectations of the bombing run were high. But instead of heading towards their target: a nearby practice range in Conlen, Texas, the crew were flying to Boise City, which sat 30 miles to the north.

Much of the bustling small town were in bed with most of the city's lights turned off, except for the city courthouse square. The only activity in the city was centered around a little cafe and movie theater with truckers and young couples chatting and enjoying the

At almost 12:30 AM, the first bomb dropped. It crashed through the roof of a garage, leaving a fourfoot deep hole in the ground. While the bomb was just a practice bomb, the sound of its explosion and impact was still loud enough to wake the whole town. The next bomb exploded beside the Baptist church, blowing out its windows. People were scrambling for cover.

The third bomb landed near a gasoline tanker as the driver attempted to flee the city. The fourth bomb struck outside the McGowan Boarding House almost striking a fuel truck.

Frank Garrett, Boise City's light man, rushed for the Public Service building and pulled on the master switch sending the town into complete darkness. The only light came from the next two bombs' explosions.

After the first bomb hit, John Adkins with the town's air warning office wired Oklahoma's FBI with "Boise City bombed one A.M. Baptist Church, garage hit."

Finally, after a radio message or the sudden blackout, the navigator realized their near fatal mistake and the 30 minute air raid ended. Luckily, no one was injured. The hundred pound practice bombs, full of sand and a couple of pounds of dynamite, left a grand total of \$25 in property damage.

A year later, the same bombing crew responsible for the embarrassing mishap went on to lead an 800-plane raid on Berlin and became one of the most decorated crews of WWII. On the 50th year anniversary of the surprise raid. Boise City threw a party commemorating one of the craziest nights in its history. The bombing crew declined the invite, but the navigator for the crew sent an audio tape for the event.

Sharing the Truth



I have been reading the best book on evangelism, other than the Bible, that I have read.

In1977 Becky Pippert wrote, Out of the Saltshaker into the World. She was amazed that it received such wide readership that she was asked to lead conferences across

the world in Protestant as well as Catholic churches. Twenty years later she was asked to do an update, adding new experiences since the first book and revising the language to speak to the present culture. I read the first edition twenty years ago and have found the revision even more helpful.

In conferences she found that about 98 percent of the problems that people face dealt with communication problems—how to bring up the subject of God without seeming awkward or being offensive. One chapter was very helpful in dealing with that concern. The most logical suggestion was as much as possible be yourself;

as natural as possible. Learn to listen to people and ask questions about common interests, and attempt to discern how knowing Christ would meet some of their deepest needs.

She related one conversation that she had with a woman she met in a doctor's office. They had both read an article about a woman who seemed to have spiritual insight that allowed her to diagnose diseases that even baffled doctors. Becky felt it bore occulted similarities, which led to a discussion about truth. Becky said, "Let's just suppose for a minute that the Christian story is true, that God created us in love, that God created us in love. But we rebelled and chose to do it our way. And the effect, or results of that rebellion produced a state of separation from God, from each other, even within ourselves. In our brokenness we couldn't come to God, so God came to us. God didn't stand apart. He didn't abandon us. He sent his Son, Jesus, who became a man and entered fully into the human crisis and died on the cross for our sins in order to solve it, and to seek and save us."

In a few sentences she brought out the essence of the Christian story: God's creation in love, the fall of man, his condition of separation, and God's rescue plan in Jesus. You don't have to know a lot of theology, have all the answers to their questions, or have your points in perfect order. After all, conversion is the business of the Holy Spirit, not a result of our great presentation.

Another point she made is that when we come to realize the depth of God's love for us, our sin becomes more real to us. When I pray for a truck driver, I try to make sure to ask God to reveal the depth of his love for the person. As Rick Warren says; we were created for God's pleasure and we find our greatest pleasure or fulfillment in loving him back. Too often we think of love only in an affectionate way like we love a dear friend or our spouse. In God's language we spell love by obedience. "If you love me keep my commandments." Love is not an emotional feeling we might experience in singing a praise song. It is an action word.

Every act of meeting the physical needs of a person ought to have as its basis, putting God's on display, which should serve as a platform for a conversation about the source of your love. "The love of God has been poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, whom he has given us." Romans 5:5.
