#### **SWOSU Launches COVID \$\$\$ Incentives for Students & Employees**



Southwestern Oklahoma State University is encouraging students, staff and faculty at all locations to get fully COVID-19 vaccinated. Not only will you be keeping yourself and those around you healthy, you will receive an award and be entered in a drawing to win a \$5,000 grand prize.

Vaccines are available for free at several vaccination clinics on the SWOSU campus, including one in the Pioneer Cellular Event Center on August 20. Here are other options: https://share.swosu.edu/VaccinationsInWArea

Currently enrolled students at SWOSU who provide proof of vaccination by October 8 will each receive a \$100 award and be entered to win one of four \$5,000 grand prizes. Additionally, employees who provide proof of vaccination by October 8 will each receive a \$125 award and employees will be entered to win one of two \$5,000 grand prizes.

To be eligible, you must be fully vaccinated. To meet the October 8 deadline means starting the vaccination process at the latest by September 10 for Moderna and September 17 for Pfizer, which require a four-week and three-week waiting period between doses, respectively.

The student incentive applies to all students currently enrolled. Look for your Canvas course named: Vaccination \$\$\$ Incentives—Students. Student \$100 awards will be processed weekly.

For employees, look for your Canvas course named: Vaccination \$\$\$ Incentives—Employees. Employee \$125 awards will be processed monthly.

Incentives are being funded by the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF).



Rep. Ford is a 25-year veteran of the Tulsa Police Department where he worked as a patrol officer and as a DARE and community relations officer. Ford is the chair of the House Appropriations & Budget Subcommittee for Public Safety and also a member of the House Criminal Justice & Corrections and the Judiciary -Criminal committees.

Since 1921, the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier has provided a final resting place for one of America's unidentified World War I service members, Unknowns from later wars were added in 1958 and 1984. The tomb also serves as a place of mourning and a site for reflection on military service, according to information

STAFFORD AIR & SPACE/GRANT- Fifty organizations were awarded aerospace and aviation education program grants totaling over \$365,000 at the Oklahoma Aeronautics Commission August meeting. The commission approved a \$20,000 education grant for the Stafford Air & Space Museum Flight Simulation lab. The requested funds will allow for new computer units and a software update. The lab gives members of the public the ability to fly the simulator and is used as a training tool for student pilots working on their licenses through the Stafford airport or at Southwestern Oklahoma State University.

PSO/FFA GRANTS- FFA chapters across Oklahoma are receiving a share of more than \$38,000 after being named recipients of this year's American Electric Power Foundation FFA STEM after-school grants. This year, grants ranging from \$1000 to \$2500 were awarded to 16 FFA chapters, including Burns Flat.

OJA/DELANEY- Board members of the Oklahoma Board of Juvenile Affairs have affirmed Greg Delaney as the office of juvenile affairs deputy director of the agency's division of juvenile and treatment services. Delaney has served the past 23 years in supervisory positions with OJA and has been OJA juvenile services division district 6 supervisor since January 2010. District 6 covers 15 Southwestern Oklahoma counties, including Beckham, Washita and Caddo. Delaney succeeds Shelley Waller who retired June 30th as deputy director.

**CUSTER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS/USE** TAX- Custer County Commissioners approved a resolution to increase the amount of use tax to be utilized by county rural fire departments. Commissioner Lyle

Miller said it increases the amount of use tax dollars to be utilized from \$110,000 to \$120,000, as long as funds are available.

CLINTON/ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT- Clinton Mayor David Berrong says the city has two proposals for the Glancy Motel and Pop Hicks properties. Berrong says tentatively city officials will meet with the prospective developers next week.

BECKHAM COUNTY DIST COURT/NIDEY- An Elk City man has been bound over in Beckham County District Court on charges of first degree rape, kidnapping and bringing contraband into a penal institution. Twenty-eight year old Schyler Jordan Nidey allegedly held a woman against her will, choked and raped the

victim inside an Elk City apartment. Formal arraign-

ment for Nidey will be held August 25th.

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

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## ady Bulldogs to Play in Division II Tip-Off Classic

SWOSU Women's Basketball will participate in one of the premiere NCAA Division II events to open the 2021-22 season as they head to Canyon, Texas, to compete at the D2CCA Tip-Off Classic hosted by West Texas A&M.

The Lady Bulldogs will be challenged by a trio of Division II powerhouse programs, each of which has played for a National Championship since 2014. SWOSU will open up against Drury on Friday, October 29th, before meeting Central Missouri on October 30th and closing out against tournament-host West Texas A&M on Halloween.

"We are excited for the opportunity to be invited to the Tip-Off Classic and have the opportunity to play against some of the best teams in NCAA Division II," Musick said. "With these games, we will be able to learn and grow which will hopefully help us on our climb to the top!"

SWOSU will open the season against Drury in just the second all-time meeting between the programs, with the Panthers holding a 1-0 advantage after claiming an 80-67 victory in Springfield early in the 2002-03 season. The matchup will also be a meeting of the last two programs to finish as NCAA Division II's National Runner-Up, with Drury currently holding that claim after falling to Lubbock Christian 69-59 in the 2021 championship game. The Panthers are 91-3 over the past three seasons and they've been to backto-back Elite Eights. They were also undefeated at 32-0 heading into the 2020 NCAA Tournament, which was cancelled due to COVID-19.

On the second day of the event, SWOSU will be 2018 NCAA Division II National Champion Central Missouri in a matchup of two programs who have combined to win the last three Central Region Championships. The Lady Bulldogs are 2-0 against Lady Dawgs have won two of the past three meetings.



UCM all-time, with both victories coming in the Central Regional, including a 75-72 win in the 2019 regional semifinals on their run to the championship game. The two teams were supposed to play in the 2020 regional quarterfinals before that tournament was cancelled due to COVID-19. This past season, UCM won the Central Region crown and advanced to the national semifinals, where they lost 63-61 to eventual national champion Lubbock Christian.

The Lady Bulldogs will close out the event against West Texas A&M, a former Lone Star Conference foe who they will be meeting for the first time since the 2012-13 season. As an NCAA Division II school, SWOSU is just 3-14 against the Lady Buffs, but the

WT has qualified for the NCAA Tournament in seven of the past eight seasons, with three Elite Eight appearances and a national runner-up finish in 2014 to their credit.

SWOSU Women's Basketball has qualified for four consecutive NCAA Division II National Tournaments and won at least a share of the Great American Conference crown in each of the past four seasons. The Lady Bulldogs return all five starters from this past season, in which they finished 18-4 and advanced to the South Central Regional Championship game, where they fell 78-65 to eventual National Champion Lubbock Christian.

Musick said the rest of the 2021-22 SWOSU Women's Basketball schedule will be announced soon.

### SWOSU Cross Country Ranked No. 8 in GAC Preseason Poll

The Great American Conference has released the preseason cross country coaches' poll for the 2021 season with SWOSU picked to finish eighth.

Head Coach Jennifer Johnson, who will be going into her third season at the helm, brings back all five of the girls who competed in last season's GAC Conference Spring Cross Country Championships.

Among those five are this team's two seniors, Bailey Richardson and Josilyn Schenk. Schenk hopes to build on a great performance at the conference championships, where she posted a personal record time of 19:55. The team will go from eight runners last year to twelve rostered members for 2021, which includes two seniors, one junior, six sophomores, and three freshmen.

Oklahoma Baptist was picked by the league to retain their title after receiving six first-place votes and 115 total points. Harding follows in second place with one first-place vote and 103 total points while Arkansas Tech received four first-place votes but fell one point short of Harding with 102 total points. Southern Arkansas (84 points), East Central (one first-place vote and 82 points), Ouachita Baptist (79 points), and Southeastern (64) fill out the rest of the spots above SWOSU, who received 49 points.

The Bulldogs have four meets on their schedule before the conference championships in October. The season starts on September 4 at the OBU Invitational in Shawnee, Okla.

### Oklahoma History: Hinton Fair established in 1905

Another timeless fair is being held in Oklahoma. From August 26th – 28th, the Hinton Free Fair will be held at the fairgrounds each evening at 7pm. The fair is also one of Oklahoma's oldest and most popular community fairs. Locally owned and operated, the fair is believed to have begun in 1905 as an event to showcase the locals and their farm produce & animals. As the fair grew, a permanent location was established for future fairs, and it was moved to its new fairgrounds in the 1950's. New facilities and rides like the train, Ferris Wheel, swings, the dunking board, and "The Worm" were built over the next few years. With each fair being bigger than the last, new games, rides, and prizes were added. Today, the Hinton Fair boasts an impressive list of challenging and engaging games, thrilling rides, delicious food, and great entertainment.

Tickets for rides are only 50 cents each with all but the large rides requiring just one ticket. For fun to affordability, it can't be beat. The fair hosts a variety of entertainment from livestock shows, exhibits, musical acts each night, and the main event: the famous Hinton Kiwanis Rodeo.

The rodeo celebrates its 89th consecutive year this

year, putting it as Oklahoma's oldest continuous rodeo. Beginning in 1931, when Kiwanis first sponsored a rodeo in Hinton, the rodeo began as the town's growth hit new heights. By 1930, 28 years after the city's founding, its population had risen to over a thousand. Its prosperity came from its bustling agricultural community and its location on a rail line which provided the town with access to various markets. Unfortunately, the '30s weren't full of glamour. Hinton could not escape the tough economic woes of the nation during this period, and the population dropped back down to 842 by 1940. However, the town's spirit was not diminished. Each year, the rodeo puts on a star-studded show with talented riders coming in from all over the country to compete, and by 1950, the population had shot back over a thousand.

Over the next several decades, the population rose and fell but continued an overall upward trend reaching a population of over three thousand today; and the rodeo and fair were with the town every step of the way. Rodeo events showcase the city's legacy with steer wrestling, barrel racing, bull riding, bareback riding, saddle riding, and more. There is even a participation event for the kids.

A town parade will begin on Saturday, August 28th, at 5pm in downtown Hinton. The Fair's Horse Show will be held earlier that day at 9 am. The Horse Show has a variety of categories and age groups participating and the show will be open for all.

Through all the good times and the bad, you can count on the ones hard at work to bring the Hinton Free Fair and Kiwanis Rodeo to life each year. For some great end of summer fun, be sure to swing by, grab some food and some tickets, and catch a little glimpse of history as Hinton puts on another year of entertainment.

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
