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

CC/ARMKO JAIL ROOF- The Custer County Commissioners agreed to sign a contract with Armko to oversee the construction of a new jail roof. Commission chairman Lyle Miller said Armko will supply an engineer and oversee the entire project. There currently is no timeline on when the project will be complete.

CLINTON SCHOOLS/CAPITAL PROJECTS- Clinton Schools Superintendent Tyler Bridges said the district has an initial set of plans for a capital improvement project for the district. Bridges said the plans are similar to the construction projects currently underway for Weatherford Public Schools.

CLINTON/OSBI INVESTIGATES IN-CUSTODY DEATH- The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation is looking into an in-custody death that occurred August 31st in Clinton. The Clinton Police Department requested a full OSBI investigation after the death of 37-year old Butch Thomas Herndon. Authorities said just after noon on August 31st, Clinton Police arrested Herndon in the 1200 block of Modelle Avenue in Clinton for public intoxication. Herndon was taken to the Clinton City jail and placed in a cell by himself. A few minutes later when staff checked on him, Herndon was found unconscious in the cell. He was transported to Alliance Health Clinton where he died. The state medical examiner will determine the cause and manner of death.

Sechrist was booked into the Dewey County Jail Monday on two counts of first degree murder.

WASHITA COUNTY ACCIDENT- A Yukon man is hospitalized in critcal condition at OU medical center following a two vehicle accident on U.S. 152, 7 miles west of Dill City in Washita County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol said 33-year old Nicholas Harshberger is hospitalized after the vehicle he was driving was

You don't have to take down drywall to install.

Some of the common concerns with insulation upgrades deal with the notion that new installations will require full wall replacements, too – costly and messy, or that packing the wall that tightly will make electrical repair/upgrade work a nightmare in the future. However, Crusader RetroFoam creates holes from the outside of the house (usually through brick) and can inject the foam

with little hassle. Then, there's just the matter of covering the holes with a special mortar. Martin explained, "You can hardly tell any work was done physically, but it'll start paying back quickly: 10%, 15%, you'll see money back fast." And as far as upgrades go, the RetroFoam is extremely pliable to work with. Cabling and wire-running can be done through the foam very easily.

So, when considering ways to "weather ready" your home, consider looking into upgrading the insulation. With a simple installation system, customers of Crusader often tailor their orders to their needs. For example, some customers have had specific sections filled, like the south wall, a bedroom, or just had an addition finished. Then, they'll order another section later down the line. Clean and repair your gutters.

• To clean your gutters you must first remove all debris that is preventing the water from draining properly. In the process of cleaning the debris, check all the joints and brackets to see if they are loose and tighten them. Then get your garden hose and flush the gutters out with water until they drain properly. Seal or install new windows.



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

WEATHERFORD, Okla. - The SWOSU Bulldogs took down the #13 Oklahoma Baptist Bison 3-2 in an absolute thriller on Thursday night.

In front of a record crowd at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center, the Bulldogs fed off the electric atmosphere to notch their first ever victory over a ranked opponent when they took down the Bison. After sweeping the Texas Woman's Pioneer Classic last weekend, the Dawgs stayed hot and earned an upset victory in their first game in front of Dawg Nation in over two years.

The 1,474 in attendance watched these two teams put on a show, as the back and forth affair kept you on the edge of your seat from start to finish. The score was tied 17 times with seven lead changes in the first set alone. The match would finish with 39 total ties and 16 lead changes.

Oklahoma Baptist came out strong, converting 22 kills in the first set that wound up being tied at 21-21 late, but the Bison would take four of the next five points to take the set.

It would be all Bulldogs for the next two sets, however. The second set was defined by runs and momentum. OBU appeared to have control early, taking 7-4, 12-10, and 16-13 leads at various points, but SWOSU fought back with two separate five-point scoring runs of their own to take the set and even up the score after two.

Dominant is the only word that can describe the work done by Head Coach Josh Collin's team in the third set. Despite the strong start offensively, things would not


