SWOSU Trio Earns Reach Higher Scholarships





Karen was a well known traditional dancer



Karen was the 1974 Cheyenne Tribal Princess. She later served as the Cheyenne Tribal Director at the American Indian Exposition. During her tenure, she gave many young ladies the honor of being the Cheyenne Tribal Princess, representing the Cheyenne people during the Indian Fair in Anadarko, Oklahoma. She was on the Cheyenne and Arapaho Labor Day Pow Wow Committee. Karen was also a member of the Thomas Service Club and the Native American Church. She practiced the Cheyenne Sundance ceremonies and was a team member with the Challengers Handgame Team.

Karen made the most beautiful dresses, shawls, and regalia that reflected our Cheyenne and Arapaho people. She would set up her arts and crafts booth, selling her goods all throughout the United States. She was a certified gemologist, expert in identifying gemstones. She was a contemporary Native American Clothing Designer which allowed her to be an accomplished buyer for major wholesale and retail companies in the western United States. She also made men's regalia, blankets, sashes and bandoleros. Karen earned many awards through her career in creating and designing Native American and Cultural regalia. Through Karen's special talents of making tradition regalia and at the request of Commander Tugger Palmer, she was blessed with the honor to make Kiowa Black Leggings attire which consist of the traditional red cape and men's breast plate that is on permanent display at the Kensington Palace at the Royal Residence in London England.

never felt I would be able to complete that goal. This program has helped me to become more confident in myself and has given me the motivation to be able to complete my degree."

McDaniel said that her long-term goal was to become a certified high school teacher.

"The Reach Higher program is allowing me to work full-time while working towards a bachelor's degree that will help me progress in my current company and open up other opportunities in the future," Morgan said. "I have had nothing but positive experiences with all the professors teaching the courses in this program. Without this program, I may not have been able to finish my degree."

Morgan believes that his success in completing this degree will inspire his brothers to attend college. Following graduation, Morgan plans to move into the field of project management.

Bennett echoed Morgan's sentiments about inspiring family members.

"I am completing my degree for the satisfaction of knowing I finished what I started. I also want to set an example for my daughters," Bennett said. "As a working adult, wife, mom, grandma and wearer of many hats, it was a difficult decision to return to school. Dr. Wiggen (Todd) reached out with a letter of support through the Reach Higher program, which was just the encouragement that I needed. A person can feel insecure in returning. Dr. Wiggen was encouraging and reassuring."

Bennett is hoping to open a new business that will provide a positive, encouraging workplace for people in the community.

Dr. Todd Wiggen, the coordinator of SWOSU's Organizational Leadership program (Reach Higher Flex Finish), said the Reach Higher adult-friendly degree completion options through the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education encourage adults who have earned some college credit to successfully complete their degrees.

"The program is really geared to working adults by offering flexible enrollment and online options. Students can go as fast or as slow as they want and are able," Wiggen said. "I have students who only take a class or two a semester due to their other obligations, and others that will take five to six classes to finish as rapidly as possible. It is truly up to the individual to set a pace they are comfortable with.

Kinder holds undergraduate and master's degrees in Education (SWOSU) and a Doctor of Education (Oklahoma State University).





SWOSU Volleyball claimed three out of a possible six superlative awards at the 2021 Great American Conference Awards Banquet on Wednesday evening after Allie Hoang was named Setter of the Year, Markenzie Benoit was named GAC Newcomer of the Year, and Josh Collins was named Coach of the Year.

In addition to the specialty awards, Benoit and Hoang were both named First Team All-GAC selections while MacKenzie Harless earned an Honorable Mention nod.

Collins' coach of the year title is the second of his career. SWOSU's winningest coach was also named coach of the year back in 2018.

Hoang (Plano, Texas) averaged 9.75 assists per set which puts her third in the conference and just half an assist away from the top spot. The senior also ranks third in service aces on the year with 35. Hoang broke SWOSU's all-time assists record earlier this season. She has now been named to the first team all-conference list in back-to-back seasons and has made the allconference team each year since her sophomore season.

Benoit (Bedford, Texas) led the conference in hitting percentage (.357) and finished top-10 in the league in blocks and points. The senior is SWOSU's top offensive threat, totaling 275 kills on the season.

Harless (Brownsburg, Ind.) finished in the top

and was second on the team in blocks with 36. SWOSU also had four individuals chosen as Distinguished Scholar Athletes. The scholar athlete awards recognize those that excel in the classroom as well as on the field. To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be competing in the championship and have a cumulative grade point average of 3.70 or higher and at least 70 hours of credits. Hoang and Harless picked up this academic distinction, alongside Maicee Morgan and Sophia DeSantiago.

In the 10-year history of the Great American Conference, SWOSU has now had 31 individuals garner All-GAC awards and 13 earn the Distinguished Scholar Athlete distinction.

SWOSU Soccer Season Ends in NCAA Regional Quarterfinals

SWOSU Soccer fell to the No. 11-ranked Central Missouri Jennies on Friday in the opening round of the national tournament following a low-scoring 1-0 contest.

The Bulldogs finish the season 13-7-1 and still claim pride as the 2021 Great American Conference Regular Season Champions for the fifth time in school history. Excluding the 2020 shortened Covid season, SWOSU has won at least 12 games every year since 2015.

In Friday's match, the Dawgs had opportunities for an equalizer goal – but not many. SWOSU put three shots on goal, but all three were saved by the UCM goalkeeper. Micaela Swain got two kicks off on goal and Brenna McGuirk added another.

The Jennies were on the attack for much of the match and finished with 14 total shots, though only six of those managed to be on target. Goalkeeper Ashley Hughes finished with five saves in the match.

UCM's lone goal came in the 8th minute of the match following a well-placed corner kick that found the foot of a crashing Jennie attacker. From there, the Bulldog defense tightened up and did not allow another score all afternoon. This kept the match close and gave SWOSU continued hope to tie things up – but ultimately that tying goal never came.

About two years later at the printing facility in Fort Worth, Texas the same star serial numbers (listed above), used at Washington, D.C., were used at Ft. Worth, Texas for 2013 \$1 star notes.

This was an accounting and administrative error by both U.S. Mints. This mistake created a boon for those collecting star notes. The challenge now is trying find matching star serial numbers from Washington, D.C. and from Ft. Worth, Texas.

Oklahoma History: Wiley Post

On November 22nd, 1898, Wiley Post was born in Corinth, Texas, a modern-day ghost town, located near Canton, Texas. When he was five years old, Post's family moved to Oklahoma and settled on a farm in Maysville, Oklahoma by early 1920. Post grew up fascinated by airplanes and wished to serve as a pilot in WWI, but the war ended before he completed his training. After the war, he did a variety of oilfield work in Oklahoma until he was severely injured in an oilrig accident when a metal shard pierced his left eye, permanently blinding it; he usually concealed it with his famous eyepatch.

As a side gig during his oilfield days, Post performed a parachute act with the flying circus Burrell Tibbs and His Texas Topnotch Fliers as part of the daredevil tricks performed by stunt pilots during the "Roaring Twenties." After his metal shard accident, Post bought his first aircraft with the settlement money and became the personal pilot of two wealthy Oklahoman oilmen, Powell Briscoe and F.C. Hall. In 1930, Hall bought a high-performance single-engine craft he dubbed the Winnie Mae, after his daughter. The Winnie Mae would go on to become one of the most famous recordbreaking aircraft of the 1930's. Hall let Post use the plane in several competition derbies, and Post gained national notoriety when he won the National Air Race Derby – from Lost Angeles to Chicago. Around this time, Post met Will Rogers, and the two became fast friends.

Post's fame and confidence grew over the year, and on June 23rd, 1931, Hall let Post and Gatty take the Winnie Mae on their signature voyage around the world. Their flight plan would take them through Harbour Grace in Canada, Flintshire in England, various cities in Germany and Russia, to Alaska, back into Canada, and finally through Cleveland, Ohio, to the finish back on Roosevelt Field in Long Island, New York. After multiple stops, involving propeller repairs, the pair arrived back on July 1st, having traveled 15,474 miles in a spectacular 8 days, 15 hours, and 51 minutes. Alongside their awe-inspiring speed, they also managed to be the first to successfully circumnavigation in a single-engine monoplane; a feat thought near impossible at the time. On July 7th, they were invited to the White House for lunch, had a parade in their honor in New York City the next day, and were honored by the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce of America at a banquet at the famous Hotel Astor. Following the flight, Hall struck a deal with Post, giving him the Winnie Mae. Later, Post and Gatty published accounts of their journey in a work titled "Around the World in Eight Days," Will Rogers gave an introduction in the piece.

out to open his own aviation school but could not build up enough financial support. Many of the would-be backers doubted his ability for education, citing his rural background and limited formal education as problematic. To prove himself again, Post announced he would attempt a solo flight around the world and that he would also break his previous speed record. Over the next year, Post assisted on an autopilot device in development and radio detection finder that would allow him to find bearings to precise locations. In 1933, he took off with the autopilot, and a compass, and finished the world circuit to a crowd of 50,000 people. His time: 7 days, 18 hours, 49 minutes. He did it again, and he set another record as the first to pull off the world flight alone.

Filled with the desire to push the limits of aviation again, Post spent the next years researching and developing a way to perform high-altitude longdistance flights. The Winnie Mae lacked a cabin capable of being pressurized. So, Post had to find another way to maintain body pressure at high altitudes. Working with the B.F. Goodrich Company, he developed what would be the world's first pressure suit. During testing, the first suit ruptured. The second suit passed but the helmet became so tight they had to cut Post out of it, destroying the suit in the process. Their last redesign was successful on all fronts and could even fit earphones and a microphone.

On his first flight with the suit on September 5th, 1934, Post flew up to 40,000 feet above Chicago, then up to 50,000 feet. As he reached his peak, he reported a substantial shift in airflow, describing fast flowing currents that put his ground speed substantially faster than his air speed. During other pressurized test flights, he reported similar experiences. Unbeknown to him, he had partially discovered the jet stream. Likewise, some meteorologists around the world were reporting unusual reactions to their weather balloons at high levels of the atmosphere. The official understanding of the jet stream did not come around until multiple pilots in WWII reported high tailwind speed when traveling certain directions. Post is often credited as one of the few to discover its existence.

Post's last flight would be with his good friend Will Rogers during their testing for mail-and-passenger air routes. Post was interested in the potential investment of two-part air routes between the U.S. and Russia. Rogers, who was looking for new material for some of his radio shows and books, was eager to join him. The pair made several stops in Alaska in a modified floatplane until the engine failed on takeoff at low altitude. The low speed caused the nose-heavy plane to lose control and plunge into the lake; it quickly became inverted. Both men died instantly. Post and Rogers received a well-deserved host of honors and tributes. Post was buried in Memorial Park Cemetery
