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
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

Norma was raised in Alliance, Nebraska.



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

## HIGHER GROUND

#### **Freedom Behind Bars**

Late Monday evening I received a call from the wife of an inmate in the county jail. We had provided gifts for her daughter through the Angel Tree program and she had my number. She needed a ride to OKC the next day so she could be admitted into a drug rehab program. I would

be going to the jail that afternoon so I didn't relish driving another 150 miles. I told her I would call back. As I thought through the situation I realized that rather then it being an interruption it could be an opportunity. It was an occasion where the flesh said no but the Spirit wouldn't let me go. The problem was compounded by the fact that she was 9 months pregnant and I pictured the possibility of having to deliver a baby by the side of the road. So my wife agreed to go with me, although being a midwife is not on her resume'. As it turned out, it was a positive time as I was able to share with her, learn a little of her very hard background of no dad, foster home care, shuttled about between relatives, etc.

We got back in time to make my jail visit with no problems. The jail is made up of 5 pods for men, with each pod housing 15-18 men in various cells. The afternoon proved to be one of the most meaningful and productive times that I have had. The first hour, 10 of the 15 men in the pod came for the services and the second hour brought 13 of 16 Native Americans, mostly from Montana. So I was able to meet with 23 men who were in need of a Savior (some had already received Christ) I happened to be showing, by DVD, a service at Saddleback Community Church. Lou Strobel shared the story of his pilgrimage of faith from a pleasure driven, atheistic lifestyle to surrendering his life to Christ. He spent two years investigating the claims of Christianity; Christ's death and resurrection, his claims of being one with the Father, and the credibility of the Scriptures. It was a beautiful story of redemption, forgiveness of sin, and the challenge to make his story, their story.

I have been doing this for 19 years and I have never felt the presence of the Holy Spirit so profoundly. At least 10 of the men professed faith in Christ. I know all about "jailhouse conversions," the tendency to want God on their side, etc. I can't judge their heart. I only know that the gospel was presented as clearly as possible with no pressure or sad stories. Their circumstances do not allow me to do one-on-one follow up. I can only send materials and challenge them to seek growth through the Scriptures, prayer and fellowship within the group. I do ask that you pray for their hearts to be softened to seek understanding, their wills to be surrendered, and the eyes of their heart to be enlightened by the Holy Spirit. 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# Ewy & Fortier of SWOSU Baseball Named Bulldogs of the Week

SWOSU Baseball got their season underway last week and had a pair of standout performances that have allowed Grant Ewy and Samuel Fortier to earn Bulldogs of the Week. The award is brought to you by Wright Wradio, the home of SWOSU Athletics on both 95.5 'The Coyote' and 100.3 'Coyote Classic.'

Ewy (Moore, Okla.) picked up the win on the mound in SWOSU's 13-6 victory over Missouri Southern in the season opener. Coming on in relief, he threw 3.1 innings of scoreless baseball – finishing with four strikeouts and allowing just two hits. On Sunday

against Pittsburg State, Ewy again did not allow a run in relief, this time throwing 2.2 innings for the Bulldog pitching staff.

Fortier (Quebec, Ontario) started the season strong at the plate for SWOSU. Through the first two games, he is 3-for-7 with a triple and a double. Against Missouri Southern, he went 2-for-4 with a bases clearing three RBI triple and scored two runs himself. On Sunday, he added another extra-base hit and finished 1-for-3 against Pitt State. SWOSU fell to the Gorillas in extra innings 6-4 to start the season 1-1.

WEATHERFORD/DEPARTMENT OF COM-MERCE GRANT- The City of Weatherford is one of 28 communities selected across the state to receive funding to support the development of new industrial sites to market. Weatherford Economic Development director Yolanda Creswell said the amount of the grant is \$24,000.

BECKHAM CO DIST COURT/ERNST- A Clinton man has been bound over on multiple charges, including conjoint robbery and robbery with a weapon after waving a preliminary hearing in Beckham County district court. Twenty-one-year-old William Carl Ernst allegedly held three employees at gunpoint while getting away with approximately \$1,200 from the McDonald's restaurant in Sayre in January 2020. Formal arraignment is planned.

SMARTASSET/MORTGAGE STUDY- A study by Smartasset ranks Custer County among the best places in Oklahoma to get a mortgage. Smartasset ranks Custer County as number seven in the state with a loan funding rate of just over 66%. The study analyzed data on mortgage approval rates, interest rates, average five-year borrowing costs and property taxes.

CUSTER COUNTY BURN BAN- Custer county commissioners took no action on the current burn ban in Custer County. District one commissioner Wade Anders says that the dry conditions, including low humidity, can quickly lead to a fire. The commissioners will discuss the ban again next week.

**DEWEY CO DIST COURT/SECHRIST-** An Apache man has been bound over in Dewey County district court on first degree murder charges in connection with the death of a Leedey EMT and her sister-in-law. Thirty-four-year-old Tye Sechrist is accused in the shooting deaths of 44-year-old Angel Boyd and 31-year-old Stacy Boyd. Sechrist is due back in court for formal arraignment on February 7th.

CLINTON SCHOOLS FINALIZES PLAN- Clinton schools superintendent Tyler Bridges said after months of community meetings and input, Clinton Public Schools has finalized a capital investment plan to provide students with safer schools, updated facilities and more academic opportunities. Members of the board of education have voted to call an April 5th bond election for Clinton residents to consider the proposal. Bridges said as part of the plan, the district plans to realign grades.











# **Bulldog Bats Start Hot on Opening Day**

It was a great day at the plate for SWOSU Baseball, especially in the bottom of the fifth inning, as SWOSU scored eight runs in that inning and went on to defeat Missouri Southern 13-6.

The Bulldogs also recorded 16 hits in the game – six of those for extra bases including two triples and a home run.

The bottom of the first featured a 2-run home run hit by Jean Ortiz and four hits. Miguel Soto got the party started for SWOSU in the bottom of the first, as he hit a triple, which gave the Bulldogs the momentum they needed to score four runs.


Missouri Southern fired right back at the Bulldogs and scored three runs in the top of the second inning.

SWOSU added a run to their lead in the bottom of the third inning, when Marc Gonzales hit a double to left field and Taylan Mullins-Ohm scored.

An inning later, Missouri Southern took the lead in the top of the fifth inning when they scored three runs. This was the first time SWOSU trailed all game and it would not last long.

The Bulldogs answered in the bottom of the fifth inning, by scoring eight runs and recording seven hits to reclaim the lead. They would not trail again, and never looked back.

In this inning, SWOSU really got the sticks going as the lineup batted around. It featured two bunts to move runners into scoring position and to load the bases. SWOSU also recorded a double and triple in this inning, along with some singles to give the Bulldogs a 13-6



advantage.

In the game, Soto and Gonzales recorded three hits and Mullins-Ohm scored three runs. Each team recorded eight strikeouts, but SWOSU recorded zero errors.

SWOSU used five pitchers in today's matchup. Ernesto Hidrogo got the start and went 3.0 innings, recording three strikeouts and giving up five hits. Noah Chapman (1.1), Grant Ewy (3.1), Chase Hamilton (.1), and Nate Postlethwait (1.0) all saw innings in relief.

SWOSU starts the season 1-0 and will play their next game, 3 p.m. Saturday against Pitt State in the Edmond First Pitch Classic at the University of Central Oklahoma. This game day and time has already been altered once due to impending weather, and is subject to be changed again.

## Kirkland Adds Karson Green as Offensive Line Coach

Head Coach Josh Kirkland has announced the addition of Karson Green to his staff for the 2022 football season. He will be responsible for coaching the offensive line for the Bulldogs.

"Green is an intelligent coach with time spent playing

at the highest junior college and NCAA levels that will provide tremendous experience for us," said Kirkland. "His ties within the Oklahoma landscape are a huge asset to us for recruiting and I'm excited to have him join the staff.'

Green comes from the University of Central Oklahoma (UCO) where he spent the past two seasons as the Offensive Line Coach for the Bronchos. It was his second stint in Edmond, having also served as a graduate assistant for UCO from 2018-19.

In between coaching jobs at UCO, Green spent a year at NCAA Division I University of Massachusetts where he coached offensive line and was the offensive quality control coach. While at UMass, Green coached Larnell Coleman, who was selected in the seventh round of the 2021 NFL Draft.

During his playing days, Green spent two seasons at Northeastern Oklahoma A&M (NEO) College before transferring to Iowa State in 2016.

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
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

# Oklahoma History: A Wild Western Amazon

Many of the infamous Wild West outlaws are intimately familiar with Oklahoma. From Jesse James's gold, to Bonnie and Clyde's shootout, to the Wild Bunch's high profile bank & train robberies, Oklahoma was an attractive location for laying low and dastardly deeds. Another \*Starr\* of the South, who met their end in Oklahoma "Indian Territory" was one of the most notorious women of the period – the "Bandit Queen" Belle Starr.

Belle, born Myra Belle Shirley, grew up in Missouri in the early 1850's. According to sources who knew her family at the time, she was well educated and had already become adept as a pianist. Her family life was typical; her father was an innkeeper, and they were respected as a middle-class family. Life for Starr was organized, calm, and a little boring. However, tragedy struck when the Civil War outbreak took the life of her brother Edwin and forced her father to close his business. Her family gathered their things and headed to Texas, where they would hopefully be able to leave all those painful memories in Missouri.

While in Texas, she met Cole Younger, a member of the James-Younger gang. The gang centralized around Jesse James and his brother Frank. The History channel described Belle's attitude towards her new running mates as "untroubled" and even listed her as a "partner in crime by 1869." Some of her crimes involved stealing horses, cattle, and money around the Dallas area. Always atop her mare named "Venus," Belle was romanticized in the public's eye for her high-fashion outfits like velvet skirts and plumed hats. She gained the nickname "Bandit Oueen."

In 1874, Belle found herself alone and betrayed when her recent partner Jim Reed was killed, presumably by his own gang. On the run from the law, Belle found shelter in Oklahoma Indian Territory. While in Oklahoma, Belle began leading her own band of thieves. Shortly thereafter, she met her future criminal partner and namesake Sam Starr. They became "married" under common-law and



went on a successful crime run for almost a decade. In 1883, the couple was arrested and spent five months in a federal prison in Detroit.

Upon release, they dove straight back into their criminal activities, but Belle once again experienced loss when Sam was killed in a gunfight 3 years later. By this time, Belle's notoriety was at its peak and she found another companion named Jim July. But a violent life leads to violent ends, and in 1889, July was arrested and set to appear in Fort Smith, Arkansas, for sentencing. Belle went with him until they reached Fort Smith where she turned back home. While on the way back, she was ambushed

and fatally wounded near Eufaula, Oklahoma, with two shotgun shots in her back. July believed the murder was done by a neighbor that they had been fighting with. However, charges were never brought up on anyone for

Following her death, Belle's story was published by Richard K. Fox in a novel titled Belle Starr, the Bandit Queen, or the Female Jesse James. Belle became one of the most prominent figures of the Great Southwest and her death became one of the most high-profile "unsolved murders" stories. A statue of Belle Starr can be visited at Woolaroc museum in Oklahoma.


