
She is preceded in death by her parents, grandson Alfonzo Daniel Reynaga and a sister Virginia Castro.

Tom will be deeply missed by family and friends.



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
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
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Oklahoma Senators Weigh in on Russian Invasion of Ukraine

This past week tensions in Ukraine escalated as Russian forces invaded after months of sabre rattling and diplomatic efforts failed to prevent conflict. Oklahoma's two State senators gave their thoughts on Russia's incursion into another sovereign state's territory.

U.S. Sen. Jim Inhofe (R-OK.), ranking member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, made the following statement on Russia's escalation of their invasion into Ukraine:

"My prayers are with the brave men, women, and children of Ukraine, who are suffering an unprecedented, unwarranted and unprovoked attack ordered by Russian President Vladimir Putin

"For months, we've seen this coming - but Putin's massive, shameful breach of international protocol is shocking and devastating nonetheless.

"While I am continuing to monitor the situation as events unfold, I believe it is in our country's best interest to respond strongly - by providing additional defensive aid to continue to help our Ukrainian friends defend themselves and by sending additional resources to our troops in Eastern Europe who are working alongside our NATO allies to deter this aggression from spreading further; and by imposing the most severe economic costs on Putin and his inner circle for this grave misstep. To be clear: Putin's ambitions won't stop with Ukraine unless America and our allies stop Putin.

"After Putin invaded Crimea in 2014, it became clear that the Obama-Biden administration's tepid response was ineffectual at deterring Russian aggression. Since then, I have supported the Senate Armed Services Committee-led effort to bolster Ukraine's ability to defend itself through what is now the Ukraine Security Assistance Initiative. I now call upon the Biden administration and my colleagues to work together quickly to deter Putin from continuing down this path, to continue military support to Ukraine under these new dire circumstances, and to further bolster European security in the face of what will amount to the biggest threat to democracy since the Soviet Union fell.'

Senator James Lankford (R-OK) also issued a statement on Russia's invasion of the sovereign nation of Ukraine:

"Cindy and I pray for the people of Ukraine. Today

they face the unfathomable: an unprovoked attack on their families, homes, and communities—simply for who they are and what they stand for: a free people living in a free country living next door to a murderous dictator.

'America and our allies must respond quickly and decisively with crippling sanctions on Putin, Russia, and anyone who seeks to aid their actions. We will absolutely impose trade restrictions and enforce sanctions on countries who continue to work with Russia.

"Europe is dependent on Russian oil and natural gas. Sanctions on Russian energy are meaningless unless the world responds by producing more energy to replace Russian oil and gas. During this moment of crisis, the United States should work to dramatically ramp up energy production to strengthen our allies and to cut off the flow of money into Putin's war machine. Every dollar paid for Russian energy is a dollar they will use to murder their Ukrainian neighbors. America must lead the world by increasing our production of energy to decrease reliance on Russian exports. Russia's economy is heavily dependent on energy sales, we should make sure that immediately dries up."

The clinics will be held at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center, 900 N. Seventh Street.

Services available at the RAM clinic include dental cleanings, dental fillings, dental extractions, dental x-rays, comprehensive eye exams, eyeglass prescriptions, eyeglasses made on-site, diabetic eye exams, glaucoma evaluations and general medical exams.

All RAM services are free, and no ID is required. RAM is a volunteer organization so organizers rely heavily on local providers and schools to provide services to those in need through the donation of their time. For those that would like to volunteer their services, registration is available at volunteer.ramusa.org.

RAM was founded in 1985 by Stan Brock of Mutual Omaha's Wild Kingdom. The event was held at SWOSU in 2019 and had a large attendance from around the state of Oklahoma.

The clinic parking lot is currently scheduled to open no later than 12:01 a.m. on Saturday, July 16. Doors will open at 6 a.m. daily.



CLINTON CITY COUNCIL/TORNADO DAMAGE UPDATE- Clinton City Manager Robert Johnston gave the City Council an update on repair work at the Clinton Airport with a contract in place to repair the T hangers. The airport was damaged during a tornado back in October of last year.

BECKHAM CO DIST COURT/LEAL- An Elk City man has entered a plea in Beckham County District court to five counts of sexual offenses. 56 year old David Dean Leal Sr., pleaded guilty to lewd or indecent acts to a child under 16. Leal also pleaded no contest to four other charges, including two counts of first degree rape, one count of rape by instrumentation and one count of performing lewd acts in the presence of a minor. Prosecutors say Leal sexually molested a female youth on several separate occasions. Leal will be sentenced May 18th after the completion of a pre-sentence investigation.

CLINTON ROUTE 66 MUSEUM- The Executive Director of the Oklahoma Historical Society Trait Thompson says that some improvements could be coming to the Route 66 Museum in Clinton, thanks to some bills making their way through the house and senate during this legislative session. Thompson says the project includes replacing the h-vac units, replacing the roof, adding a theater room and there's also plans to add electric car chargers to the museum, the total price of the project would be about three hundred thousand dollars.

visit to Weatherford Public Schools next month. Superintendent Jill Henderson says Hofmeister will tour the new elementary buildings that are under construction. Hofmeister is seeking the office of Governor, running as a Democrat.

CLINTON/WEATHERFORD WATER LINE PROJ-ECT- The Cities of Clinton and Weatherford agreed to fund a feasibility study on a pipeline that would make it possible to share water throughout Custer County. Clinton Mayor David Berrong says that the cities could hear back from engineers in late spring or early summer. Berrong says the projected amount of pipeline would be about 14 miles between Clinton and Weatherford.

SWOSU/LAWSUIT RULING- A Custer County District court judge has ruled that Southwestern Oklahoma State University is exempt from any liability in a lawsuit filed in 2020 on behalf of former football player Skye Singleton. Court records show it was claimed that in February 2018, Singleton became ill with cold and flu-like symptoms as a result of the loss of heat in his dormitory. It's alleged that Singleton was made to participate in a mandatory team workout session, and during the session experienced cardiac distress and lost consciousness, resulting in permanent brain injury due to a lack of oxygen. It was claimed that the workout facility was either not equipped with a portable defibrillator or one was not used and additionally

SWOSU Men's Basketball made sure the longest road trip of the season was worth it after battling Arkansas Monticello in a makeup game for a previously postponed contest. The Bulldogs defeated UAM 55-51 in a physical matchup to secure their spot in the Great American Conference Tournament coming up March 3-6.

SWOSU's seed for the postseason tournament is still undecided, with potential standing implications still in play around the league with one week left of the regular season. The only thing the Dawgs know, is that they'll be in Shawnee that week where the tournament is hosted.

Tonight's matchup saw a physical, defensive game by both teams.

"When it's all said and done, our guys were tough

enough to get another road win tonight in a physical game where we faced adversity," Head Coach Terry Evans said in his post-game interview. "That's 5-of-6 we've won in the state of Arkansas and I'm definitely proud of the guys for staying focused and getting the job done."

Though a low scoring affair, SWOSU got up by as many as 21 points around the 15:00 mark of the second half before UAM made their run.

The run was to be expected, as the Boll Weevils are also on the bubble for playoff contention and are playing must-win basketball from here on out. UAM immediately responded with an 11-0 run and continued to chip away

"We had a chance to really blow it open in the second half, but we could not make any shots or free throws and that really hurt us. Thankfully though, we held up

on defense. We gave up 71 (points) to them at our place, and 51 tonight and that was definitely the key that helped us get through our shooting trouble."

UAM had the game within a single possession with 1:30 remaining, but the Bulldogs proceeded to get two stops on defense to keep the lead intact. After Chris Braggs, Jr. missed a pair of free throws that would have pushed the lead back to four and kept things interesting, Mason Hart stepped up to the foul line with 14 seconds after another stop on defense to finally put the Boll Weevils away.

For the game, SWOSU shot 34% as a team and 32% from beyond the arc. This compared to 36% and 31%respectively from UAM. The Dawgs also edged out UAM in rebounding 32-28 and won the turnover battle 15-12.

The SWOSU Men's Golf team took the course for the first time this spring at the Rattler Invitational and finished 12th overall for the event.

Cameron won the event by a single stroke (874 overall) and the top-four teams all finished within one stroke of each other. SWOSU finished at 920. Fellow GAC schools Arkansas Tech and Henderson State placed fifth and sixth respectively.

SWOSU will return to action closer to home March 14-15 at the Oak Tree Invitational in Edmond.

Crimson Storm Shooting Too Much for Bulldogs

Men's Hoops fell to Southern Nazarene by an 82-63 final score to close out the regular season. SWOSU trailed by 20 at the break which proved to be too large to overcome.

Our Eyes are Fixed on God



As we hear the sounds of war in a David Vs Goliath type of battle, we cannot help but admire the Ukrainians fighting for their country against insurmountable forces.

I am reminded of another battle of similar odds. It is described in the twentieth chapter of 2nd Chronicles, in the Old Testament. Jehoshaphat,

one of the few Godly kings of Judah, was informed that a vast army from three people groups was arrayed against their small country. The King was alarmed. His army didn't stand a chance against such a vast army. But as a believer in a mighty God, his first act was to seek help from his only source of help. "Alarmed, Jehoshaphat resolved to inquire of the Lord, and he proclaimed a fast for all Judah...they came from every town in Judah to seek Him." They had a big-time prayer meeting. Following are some

excerpts from his prayer. He begins with recognition of the mighty God he served. "Oh Lord, God of our fathers, are you not the God who is in heaven? You rule over all the kingdoms of the nations. Power and might are in your hands and no one can withstand you...we have no power to withstand this vast army that is attacking us. We do not know what to do but our eyes are upon

The situation appeared to be hopeless. But a prophet was among them to give a word of hope. The Spirit of the Lord came upon Jahaziel who said, "Listen King Jehoshaphat, do not be afraid or discouraged because of this vast army; for the battle is not yours, but God's." Space does not permit me to share the details (read it for yourselves), but the end result was, after a period of praise, he sent out the choir to lead the men into battle; probably the only time in history that such a battle tactic was used.

Somehow two of the nations started fighting each other and the third group began fighting amongst themselves. The end result was that when the men of Judah came over the hill, they only saw dead bodies lying around. They took so much plunder that it took three days to carry it home.


That is probably not a strategy that the army of Ukraine will use, but there is a principle that we can

follow. We all fight battles that seem insurmountable at times. When the storms come and we don't know what to do, let us praise the God of all circumstances and fix our eyes on Him. "Do not be afraid or discouraged because

of this vast army. For the battle is not yours, but God's." Fast forward a few years in the history of Israel and we find Daniel, now an old man, having served three kings over 50 years while the Israelites are in exile in Babylon, praying as the people look towards a return to their homeland.

First, there is a prayer of confession, "We have sinned and done wrong. We have been wicked and have rebelled; we have turned away from your commands."(Dan. 9:5) He concludes by pleading, "We do not make requests of you because we are righteous, but because of your great mercy. O Lord, listen! O Lord, forgive! O Lord, hear and act! For your sake, O my God, do not delay, because your city and your people bear your Name."(Dan. 18b,19) How appropriate this would be for us to pray in these troubled times.

Pray for the people of Ukraine, and especially for the Christians who will be facing persecution. The Professional Coin Grading Service (PCGS) is ready to debut the first encapsulation and grading for a pack of 100-\$500 notes dated 1934. All 100-\$500 notes are sequentially numbered. It is believed to be the only pack of \$500 notes known to exist and quite possibly the rarest

bank note pack as well.

PCGS will provide grading and encapsulation for packs of currency of 50 notes or 100 notes in consecutive order. Depending on the condition of an entire pack will determine a single grade. The above pictured notes were submitted by U.S. Coins and Jewelry out of Houston, Texas.

The combined face value of the pack of \$500 notes is \$50,000 and is incredulous it survived since the Great Depression.
