
He was a member of the Indian Baptist Church in El Reno, OK, he enjoyed traveling, watching basketball and was always available to help somebody out.

Dr. Brooke Gildon Wins Bernhardt Academic Excellence Award at SWOSU

Dr. Brooke Gildon, professor in the College of Pharmacy at Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU), is the winner of the Bernhardt Academic Excellence Award for 2022 at SWOSU.

Gildon was presented the prestigious award at the annual Bernhardt Award banquet held March 10 on the Weatherford campus. She received a \$5,000 cash award, clock, pen and medallion.

SWOSU alumni Theta Juan Bernhardt and the late Dr. William Bernhardt of Midwest City are sponsors of the annual award that goes to an outstanding faculty member who exhibits exceptional achievement in teaching, scholarship and service.

Gildon is a faculty member in the Department of Pharmacy Practice, specializing in clinical pediatrics and based at The Children's Center Rehabilitation Hospital in Bethany. She received her Pharm.D. from SWOSU in 2007 and later completed a residency in pediatrics with the University of Oklahoma College of Pharmacy in Oklahoma City.

Gildon, who joined the SWOSU College of Pharmacy faculty in 2016, is a certified asthma educator, boardcertified pharmacotherapy specialist and board-certified pediatric pharmacy specialist. She is an active member of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy, Christian Pharmacists Fellowship International and Pediatric Pharmacy Advocacy Group.

Her practice areas include pediatric ambulatory care, general pediatrics, pediatric asthma and drug research of drug pediatric complex care.

indicted by a multicounty grand jury in Oklahoma City, charged with embezzlement and conspiracy surrounding Circuit Engineering District 7. Monte Goucher, Jerry Lynn Dean, Joe Don Dickey and Tim Binghom allegedly without authorization appropriated money in excess of \$2 million from C-E-D 7 and the State of Oklahoma when the money was legally obtained and entrusted to the defendants for specific purposes. Additionally, it's alleged the four men embezzled state funds and did orchestrate the management, construction and operation of 7 oil joint ventures with C-E-D 7, contrary to the provisions of Oklahoma statutes. The four defendants were arrested and have been released on bond.

GEARY/GROUNDBREAKING-A groundbreaking ceremony was held this week by the Cheyenne-Arapaho tribes for a new emergency response center in Geary. Governor Reggie Wassana says the emergency response center will have a conference room, full kitchen and showers, and an open area for emergency personnel.

SWOSU/CAREER FAIR- The Career Exploration Office at Southwestern Oklahoma State University is hosting the business and technology career fair for 2022 in the Memorial Student Center, March 23rd from 10am-1pm. Coordinator Heather Hummel says it's a great opportunity to talk to prospective employers about their company and possible employment opportunities. Employers in attendance will be looking to fill full time, part time and internship positions.

CED 7/INDICTMENTS- Four people have been CLINTON PD/ALBA ARREST- an investigation by Clinton Police has led to the arrest of a man on complaints of felony possession of child pornography, distribution of child pornography and violation of the Oklahoma Computer Crimes Act. 20 year old Nathan Alba was arrested after a Clinton Police investigator reviewed a cyber tip, generated by the national center for missing and exploited children. In November 2020, a social media platform had notified the national center of a user who had uploaded and distributed child exploitation material. Police say Alba was interviewed and admitted to possessing and distributing child pornography.

> CLINTON SCHOOLS/WATER DAMAGE UP-**DATE-** Clinton Public Schools Superintendent Tyler Bridges says work continues on the clean up of the high school after a fire suppression line froze and busted, causing water damage to a number of areas of the high school, including 14 classrooms. Bridges says the high school has been virtual since the incident. However, he says portable units have been secured to allow students to return to in-person, learning after spring break. Bridges says the restoration work inside the high school will take about 3 months to complete.

Lady Bulldogs Ousted from NCAA Tournament

SWOSU Women's Basketball fell victim to a scorching hot Missouri Western team that shot a season best 64% and knocked down 15 three pointers and the Lady Dawgs went on to fall 111-77 to the Griffons in the NCAA Central Region Quarterfinals on Friday.

The Lady Bulldogs finish the season ranked No. 10 in the WBCA national poll, their highest ranking of the season, and with a 29-5 record. The 29 wins represents the second highest win total the program has seen in its division II history.

11 different MWSU players scored in the game, including six who finished in double figures. Nearly half of the points scored for the Griffons (53) came from players off the bench.

SWOSU fell behind early and stayed behind. The Lady Dawgs trailed 20-12 after the first quarter and 50-28 at halftime.

The game was tied up at 10-10 early, but Missouri Western finished the first quarter on a 10-2 run to build their lead and did not look back. From that point on, it was all Griffons.

Trailing by 22 at the break, and in need of a quick start in the third quarter, SWOSU instead had to endure a third

quarter that featured the Griffons scoring a game best 36 points in the 10-minute window on 14-of-17 shooting which included 6-of-7 from deep. The Lady Bulldogs scored 28 points in the quarter, their highest scoring total of the game, but it was overshadowed by MWSU who continued to extend their lead.

Entering the final quarter, SWOSU trailed 86-56 and was again outscored in the fourth.

Makyra Tramble was the bright spot on offense. She finished with a career high 34 points on 12-for-25 shooting and added five steals on defense.

SWOSU's defense forced 25 turnovers in the game and only committed 12, but got severely outrebounded 49-28 on the glass.

Karly Gore was the other doubledigit scorer and finished with 12 points.

The program says goodbye to senior and five-year starter Bethany Franks who entered the game needing 12 rebounds to surpass program great Kelli Litsch on the all-time rebounding list. She finished with four and will end with 1,206 career rebounds and 1,467 career points. She and Litsch are the only two players in school history to notch 1,000-plus points and rebounds.

Bulldogs End Historic Season Against Augustana

SWOSU Men's Basketball had their historic postseason run come to an end on Saturday in the NCAA Central Region Quarterfinals after falling to No. 6/8 Augustana 83-64. Though the Vikings pulled away in the second half, the Bulldogs took a lead into the halftime locker room.

The Bulldogs end the season with a 14-17 record, but also with the title of Great American Conference Champions after becoming the lowest seeded team ever

to win the GAC Tournament.

By winning the conference tournament, SWOSU earned an automatic bid into the NCAA Tournament and the opportunity to battle Augustana on Saturday night. It was just the second time in program history SWOSU qualified for the NCAA Tournament.

In the game on Thursday, Kamden Gipson also became the third player in program history to notch 1,000 career points. He needed two points to get it done and knocked down a three-point shot late in the first half to reach his milestone. Those would be his only points on the night. At 54% shooting in the first half which included 7-of-15 from beyond the arc, the Dawgs in good shape to start the game and did not trail through the first 20 minutes. SWOSU led Augie 33-21 nearing the five-minute mark of the first half after a Mason Hart three ball, before the

Vikings closed on a 19-8 run to tighten the game back up at the break. The Dawgs took a one-point lead into the break.

Though the offense were clicking, Augie also quietly finished at 50% shooting in the first half which allowed them to weather SWOSU's hot start.

Out of the halftime locker room, Augustana continued to build off the way they closed the half while SWOSU went cold. The Bulldogs faded, shooting just 7-of-35 overall (20%) in the final 20 minutes. Slowly, but surely, Augustana pulled away.

With SWOSU trailing 65-55 with 7:33 to play and in need of a final push, it was Augie who busted off a 13-2 run to seal it.

Tyler Riemersma, the NSIC South Division Player of the Year, led all scorers with 28 points.

Chris Braggs, Jr. finished as SWOSU's high scorer with 13 points. Ben Smith added 12, and Mason Hart 11. Though Gipson was held in check scoring, he did lead all players with nine assists. Damion Thornton led SWOSU on the glass with six rebounds.

Senior Jaylan Williams plays his last game in a Bulldog uniform. He finishes fourth on the school's division II list for three-point makes with 161.

Women's Golf Captures First Top-Five Finish and Lau Wins GAC Golfer of the Week

The SWOSU Women's Golf team competed in Oklahoma City this week at the Diffee Ford-Lincoln Invite, where they finished at 5th place as a team. This competition was a two-day event hosted by Southern Nazarene University. It was also the Bulldogs best team finish of the 2021-22 season so far.

Central Oklahoma would win the tournament, collectively shooting a +19. Oklahoma Christian would finish second, with a +21. Oklahoma City finishes the top three teams, coming in at +25 as a team.

Rebecca Lau was the top finisher for the Dawgs, shooting a +8 for the tournament and finishing 15th. This is her second best tournament performance for the season.

Not far down was Megan Brown, who ended play at +11 and placed 17th over the two days. Anna Marksa and Mikaela Rindermann completed the event with identical positions and scores, +14 and T-25th. Rounding out the SWOSU lineup is Zoe Morton, who finished +19 and T-40th.

Following the tournament SWOSU Women's Golfer Rebecca Lau was announced as the Great American Conference Golfer of the Week following her finish at the Diffee Ford/Lincoln Invitational.

Lau becomes the second women's golfer from SWOSU to earn the honor this season and makes it back-to-back weeks the Lady Bulldogs have had a golfer of the week after Megan Brown received the recognition last week.

Teeing off in Oklahoma City this week, Lau rebounded from a challenging first round to shoot a one-over 72 in her final round that placed her 15th overall in the field. She finished seven strokes off the lead to pace SWOSU.


Lau and the rest of the team will be back on the course March 21-22 at the Lion Invitational, hosted by Texas A&M Commerce.

The coin pictured above is an engraved half dollar from 1843. It honors Earl McMahan who died 1901 in Lansing, Iowa at the tender age of 14.

A token collector found it at a coin show on February 20, 2022. The collector researched and found the descendants of Earl

McMahan by using online genealogical sources. The engraving states, "EARL MCMAHAN BORN SEPT. 21, 1886, DIED MAY 16, 1901, LANSING IOWA". Earl was accidently shot by his brother.
