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Grand Can Sculpture Competition a Big Success for **Connections Food and Resource Center**

Community members from around Western Oklahoma gathered together on Friday, April 1, at the Connections Food and Resource Center to help fight hunger and feed hope as part of the Grand Can Sculpture Competition.

The competition, which is both a sculpture conpetition as well as a community fundraising event for the Connections Food and Resource Center, helped raise \$11,871.21 in monetary contributions as well as 14,890 pounds of food. Connections estimates that these donations will supply hungry Western Oklahomans with 63,352 meals.

11 teams competed in the 3 day long event which began on Wednesday, March 30, and wrapped up on Friday, April 1. The Et Cetera Shop and Hope is Alive Ministries Team won top honors by winning both the Grand Champion award as well as the Audience's Choice award.

4-H Club of Weatherford and Bluth Medical Associate won the award for Most Pounds of Food donated. The Kiwanis Club of Weatherford took home the award for Best Use of Labels, the Lookeba-Sickles Leadership Class won the award for the Best Meal and Weatherford East and West Elemenmtary won the award for Structural Ingenuity.

Weatherford Environment Group to Host April Recycling Events for Earth Day

Weatherford Environment Group (WEG) has scheduled several special recycling events for April in recognition of Earth Day, and they're requesting that citizens of Weatherford and neighboring communities save these dates.

WEG will be hosting a Special Recycling day on April, 23, 2022, from 9am to 3 pm at the Materials Processing Building, located at 602 East Clark Street for special items, including: large metal items and appliances with 75% metal or more; non-working electronics such as computer equipment and printers; flourescent light bulbs that are eight feet, 4 feet, or spiral forms; incandescent light bulbs; LED light bulbs; household batteries such as AA, AAA, C, D, or rechargeable batteries; lead acid batteries; phone books; as well as televisions and computer monitors.

WEG is requesting that people who recycle televisions or computer monitors donate \$10 per item to help with recylcing fees from a licensed recycler in Tulsa.

WEG will also be sponsoring a Tire Recycling event from April 1 to April 30, 2022. WEG has made arrangements with the Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality (OKDEQ) to provide this service to citizens of Weatherford and neighboring communities free of charge. WEG requests that citizens deposit tires in the trailer, located at 602 East Clark Street, at the intersection of South Illinois and Clark Street during daylight hours.

Tires that will be accepted during the month long event include, tires from cars and light trucks, tires from motorcycles and mopeds, tires from school buses and automobiles owned by schools, tires sold to government agencies, tires sold for farm tagged motor vehicles, tires sold for commercial trucks, truck-tractors and trailers, the first registration in Oklahoma of automobiles, motorcycles, mopeds, or trucks, including farm tagged motor vehicles and commercial motor vechicles which are not registered under the International Registration

Plan (prorated tires), Used tires if no documentation that a fee has been previously been paid (includes retreaded or recapped tires for resale), as well as tires used on implements of husbandry and agricultural equipement that are no more than 14 inches wide and 44 inches in diameter.

WEG will not accept the following tires for recycling: all-terrain vehicle tires, off-raod motorcycle tires, airplane tires, bicycle tires, riding mower tires, wheelbarrow tires, puch mower tires, forklift tires, tires from vehicles where the first registration in Oklahoma was registered under the International Registration Plan (prorated vehicles), tires sold by a a tire wholesaler to a retail dealer for resale; tires sold by vendors who do not have business or inventory inside Oklahoma, where the tires are delivered by common carriers; tires that have an overall width greater than 14 inches or an overall diameter greater than 44 inches and used on devices designed and adapted to be used exclusively for agricultural, horticultural or livestockraising purposes, including farm tank-type wagons

of less than 1,200 gallon capacity, trailers and semi trailers used exclusively to and from the farm to market, utility, all-terrain vehicles of less than 1,500 pounds which are equipped and used for farm or ranch operations, tires sold for backhoe, grader and other construction machinery; as well as tires with rims.




Linda Kay Allen

Lawrence Homer Hart

Lawrence Homer Hart, He'amavehonevėstse (Sky Chief) was born at home on the banks of Quartermaster Creek north of Hammon to Jennie Howling Water and Homer Hart on February 24, 1933. He was delivered by his grandmother Corn Stalk—Anna Reynolds-



who was a midwife and delivered numerous Cheyenne babies. His grandfather John Peak Heart (later John P. Hart) was a Cheyenne Sundance Priest, Native American Church leader and Cheyenne Chief. Lawrence had two older brothers: Alvin and Sam; three older sisters: Lucy, Lenore, and Kris who preceded him in death. He has one younger sister Ramona who resides in Weatherford.

Lawrence was raised by Cornstalk and John P, speaking only Cheyenne the first years of his life. His early formal education was at the Quartermaster School in Moorewood. English was a challenging subject, because of his "language problem," he was held back in first grade. Lawrence remained close to his grandfather, traveling with him during the summers. John P. Hart







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often led Native American Church services with the Ute Mountain Utes in Colorado and around the Four Corners region in Colorado. Lawrence attended Hammon High School, playing basketball, running track, and graduating in 1952.

Lawrence attended Bethel College in North Newton, Kansas, where he lettered in track. He met a Kansas girl named Betty Bartel and the two were married October 4, 1957. Betty and Lawrence had three children: Connie Hart Yellowman, Nathan Hart, and Cris Hart Wolfe. Lawrence is survived by four grandchildren: Micah C. Hart, Cristina Hart "Cricket" Yellowman, Lily D. Hart, Sydney S. Hart, and Lexus L. Wolfe; and two great grandchildren: Nolan Ortiz and Stevanna "Sister" Ortiz. Lawrence is also survived by numerous nieces and nephews, their children, and grandchildren.

In 1955, Lawrence left Bethel to realize his dream of flying jet fighter planes in the Navy and the Marines. First Lieutenant Lawrence Homer Hart was the first American Indian to become a U.S. military jet pilot and instructor. He was a commissioned Marine, but flew his wartime missions off a U.S. Navy Aircraft carrier. He was one MIG kill short of qualifying as an ACE when a truce with North Korea was declared. While in the Marine Corps, he was selected to appear on the then popular "What's My Line" television show. He signed in using his Cheyenne name Black Beaver and his occupation was a jet fighter pilot.

His grandfather John Peak Heart selected Lawrence to take his place as a Cheyenne Chief. When the initiation was scheduled to occur in Hammon, Oklahoma, Lawrence's commanding officer authorized him to fly to Clinton-Sherman so he could be in attendance. Following the ceremony, Lawrence told the people he would fly over the location. Numerous descendants of those in attendance spoke of the time they waved their tea towels in the sky when Lawrence conducted the fly-over. On that day he also broke the sound-barrier, flying over the Gulf Coast before returning to his station at Chase Field, Beeville, Texas.

After he became a Cheyenne Chief, Lawrence left military service and attended Southwestern Oklahoma State University before returning to Bethel to graduate in 1961 with a degree in History. Lawrence then attended the Associated Mennonite Biblical Seminary in Elkhart, Indiana, and became an ordained Mennonite pastor. Lawrence and Betty moved to Clinton in 1963 where he served as pastor to the Koinonia Mennonite Church until October 2021. Throughout his career, Lawrence served on numerous local, state and National Indian Education boards and Committees. He also served on several Mennonite Committees as well as a board member to his alma mater Bethel College. In 1992 he was selected by the U.S. Senate as a Delegate to the White House Conference on Indian Education. That same year, he was named "Indian Elder of the Year" by the National Indian Education Association. Lawrence served as a board member of the Clinton Public Schools as well as leadership positions from 1993 to 1998. He was the first Native American elected to serve that position.

He received many awards, including "Distinguished Citizen Award" by the Oklahoma Heritage Association in 1993. In 1995 he was the recipient of the ""Distinguished Service Award" from Bethel College. In 1997, the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes recognized him as a "Distinguished Honorary Citizen" for Cheyenne language preservation. In September 1996, Secretary Bruce Babbit appointed Mr. Hart to the Review Committee of the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act of 1990.

The family would like to extend thanks to the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes programs and Cheyenne District 3 for the assistance provided to their elder tribal member Lawrence H. Hart. The family also thanks Shepherd Hospice for the care provided to their husband, father, and uncle during the last year of his life.

Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma Seeking Partners for Summer Feeding Program



The Regional Food Bank of Oklahoma is seeking sites to provide meals to children 18 and under for its Summer Feeding Program. The organization expects to see a large decrease in both the number of sites participating in its Summer Feeding Program as well as the number of children served during summer 2022 due to renewed USDA requirements.

The Summer Feeding Program is partially funded through federal dollars managed by the USDA and distributed through the Oklahoma State Department of Education. These programs have federal requirements that must be met to receive funding. When the pandemic began in 2020, the USDA implemented waivers that allowed the Regional Food Bank's Summer Feeding sites to offer alternative models of feeding children, such as grab-and-go meals and didn't require the meals to be consumed on-site. Those waivers will expire in late May, at the end of the 2021-22 school year.

"Many sites who have participated over the past two years are not equipped to host congregate feeding due to lack of space, staff or funds," said Stacy Dykstra, chief executive officer of the Regional Food Bank. "The relaxed USDA requirements allowed the Regional Food Bank to reach so many more children who are in need of healthy meals during the summer months."

Through the Summer Feeding Program, children up to the age of 18 years can receive a free, nutritious meal and snack during the summer months when school is not in session. Last year, the Regional Food Bank provided 229,000 meals and snacks to children at 127 sites across central and western Oklahoma.

"We strongly urge organizations interested in making a huge impact in their community to apply to become a Summer Feeding Program site," Dykstra said.

Interested sites must be in an area where the assigned school attendance area has at least 50 percent of children receiving free or reduced-price lunches. Sites may be at schools, nonprofits, churches, community centers, libraries or parks and recreation locations.

All sites must have appropriate places for children to eat and have established mealtimes throughout the summer. Visit rfbo.org/summer-meals to apply.



SWOSU and East Central played a pair of extra inning games on Saturday to conclude the conference series, with the Bulldogs winning the first game 5-3 and dropping the finale 7-6.

Despite the split, SWOSU earns the series win 2-1 thanks to a win on Friday in the series opener. They have now won three of their last four GAC series and will return home next weekend to host Southeastern in more league action.

GAME ONE – SWOSU 5, ECU 3 (11 innings)

Nate Postlethwait gave the Dawgs a competitive start on the mound to begin the day, allowing three runs in 6.2 innings of work. Grant Ewy and Ernesto Hidrogo did not allow a run in relief for the remaining 4.1 innings, with Ewy picking up the decision victory and Hidrogo the save.

Both sides had opportunities in the form of baserunners throughout the game but left a combined 17 on-base in the contest.

ECU starting pitcher Bryan Terry threw 10.0 innings and managed to keep the SWOSU scoring offense in check for most of the game. The Dawgs notched 11 hits

against Terry but could never get the timely hit(s) needed to get him removed from the game.

Tied 3-3 in the 11th, Terry was finally pulled after walking the first two batters of the inning. Tylor Richey, pinch running for Enzo Bonventre, eventually scored the go-ahead run following a wild pitch. Alex Rice then added a run with a sacrifice fly.

GAME TWO - ECU 7, SWOSU 6 (8 innings)

Alex Rice had a strong game hitting in the finale, finishing 3-4 with four RBI. In extra innings, he put the Dawgs ahead with an RBI single and SWOSU then needed just three outs on defense to close out the game.

The final out never came though as ECU took advantage of a Bulldog defensive error and added three hits, including the walk-off game winner, in the bottom half.

Five pitchers saw action, including Grant Ewy who got the start. He pitched in all three games of the series and gave SWOSU one inning to begin game three. Ewy gave way to Dakota Jones who threw the next three innings, followed by Philip Sanders and Rafael Perez-Guzman who split the fifth and finally Ernesto Hidrogo who pitched the remaining 2.1 innings.

Lee, Simmons, Barkley, and Jordyn Wadley represented SWOSU's hits on the afternoon – all singles.

The Bulldogs are 6-5 at home this year, compared to 1-10 on the road.

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






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Rice & Friesen Earn Bulldogs of the Week

These \$4 gold coins rarely come up for sale. On February 24, 2022, an auction was held in Dallas, Texas. On this day two \$4 gold coins were the stars of the auction.

An 1879 \$4 Stella certified by the Numismatic Guaranty Corporation as a Proof 65 Cameo set a record price of \$184,500. The other 1879 \$4 Stella was certified by the Numismatic Guaranty Corporation as a Proof 65 which brought \$174,000.

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Goerend Wins Grand Prize at Oklahoma Research Day

For the second straight year, a Southwestern Oklahoma State University student in Weatherford has won the overall grand prize at the 27th annual Oklahoma Research Day at the Capitol.

Camille Goerend of Weatherford took top honors at the event held March 29 in Oklahoma City. Goerend becomes SWOSU's fourth grand prize winner since the inception of the Oklahoma Research Day at the Capitol event.

Goerend won a \$5,000 stipend to continue research during the upcoming summer. Her research topic is "Antibacterial Target." Her faculty mentor is Dr. Vijay Somalinga, assistant professor in the SWOSU Department of Biological Sciences. The complete title of the project is: b-Carbonic Anhydrase – A potential novel antibacterial target against Rhodococcus equi, the causative agent of pneumonia in foals.

As a component of the event, students presented their work to an independent panel of judges. The panel selected the top seven researchers in three categories one overall winner, three regional university winners, and three research-intensive institution winners.

"This competition involved the top 21 undergraduate

student researchers in the state, and we are extremely pleased for Camille and SWOSU, said Dr. Lori Gwyn, director of the SWOSU Office of Sponsored Programs. Previous SWOSU grand prize winners are Courtney

Garcia in 2011, Madison Duckwall in 2017 and Emily Bedea in 2021.

It immediately became a best seller. In fact it is reported to be the bestselling non-fiction hardback in history. It has sold between 35 and 40 million copies. Time Magazine said this about the book, "Millions of people—from NBA and LPGA players to corporate executives to high school students to prison inmates—meet regularly to discuss the Purpose Driven Life.

A gracious Oklahoma City business man has made the paperback version available, free to every inmate in Oklahoma. I have given away over a thousand copies to inmates and truck drivers. You would do well to read or reread it for yourself.

One of the chapters in the book is entitled, "Becoming

a World-Class Christian." For your consideration I am sharing a portion of that chapter that is most

"The Great Commission is Your Commission. You have a choice to make. You will be either a worldclass or a worldly Christian. Worldly Christians look to God primarily for personal fulfillment. They are saved, but self-centered. They love to attend concerts and enrichment seminars, but you wouldn't find them at a missions conference because they aren't interested. It's a "me-first" faith: How can God make my life more comfortable? They want to use God for their purposes instead of being used for his purposes. In contrast, world-class Christians know they were saved to serve and made for a mission. They are eager to receive a personal assignment and excited about the privilege of being used by God. Worldclass Christians are the only fully alive people on the planet. Their joy, confidence, and enthusiasm are contagious because they know they are making a difference. They wake up in the morning expecting God to work through them in fresh ways. Which type of Christian do you want to be?"
