The General Tommy Franks Leadership Institute and Museum is holding a Virtual & Silent Auction as part of their 14th annual Celebration of Freedom event in Hobart, OK. The 2022 Celebration of Freedom will be held on May 20th and 21st in Hobart's downtown. The auction features many special items, including exclusive event tickets, vacation getaways, gift baskets, jewelry, art, memorabilia, and more. All proceeds from the virtual auction will benefit the museum and its educational programs: Inspired Leadership Challenge, Four Star Leadership with General Tommy Franks, Inspired Leadership Experience, the Mobile Classroom & Roadshow, the Lattimore Collection, and the newest program - Understanding Community Understanding.

The Celebration of Freedom is a fun mashup of events put on by the Hobart community. Events scheduled for this year include: a Lil Mr. & Miss Pageant, Golf Scramble, Blood Drive, Veteran Spotlight, Show-n-Shine & Car Show, Poker Run, and parade. Throughout the celebration, there will be all kinds of vendors available, family-fun games & activities, and live entertainment by the Hi-Fi Hillbillies at 6:30pm on Saturday.

Come join the festivities as they honor our armed forces and remember those who gave it all for the freedom we enjoy today. And make sure to swing by the world-class museum, open both days, to see items from around the world that focus on telling the story of the United States military. The museum has one of the only two Medal of Honor awards given in the state of Oklahoma and a huge collection of challenge coins. They also have one-of-a-kind historical photographs, videos, and military equipment.

Their notable exhibits include the special "9/11: Never Forget" exhibit. Opened on September 11, 2016, the exhibit features a chronological timeline that guests can walk through that detail the impact of the attack, bravery of the first responders, and reaction to the dedications and presidential address after. The exhibit also houses a 14-foot long, 3000-lb steel I-beam from the World Trade Center. The beam, part of the flooring system and crushed in the debris, is one of a select few pieces that were released by the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey.

Their newest special exhibit is called "Letters From Home" and "features private correspondence from

almost every major conflict in US history". Guests will be able to get a glimpse into the emotion and inner thoughts of veterans as they spent time away in conflict and when they faced the challenge of adapting after coming home.

If you're interested in learning about the leadership and outreach programs the museum offers, they have detailed information on their website and on location. The programs and museum were started by General Tommy Franks and his wife Cathryn as a way to never forget the sacrifices made by the families and members of the United States military and to offer future generations support as they pursue leadership roles.

They provide several educational and outreach programs like: The Mobile Classroom + Road Show, a mobile museum that travels directly to schools; The Inspired Leadership Challenge, a workshop that teach the Four Stars of Leadership shown in the life of







PBS Documentary to feature work by SWOSU Assistant Professor and associates

A two-part Nova TV special on Public Broadcasting Service (PBS)—Dinosaur Apocalypse—will have work featured by Dr. Jeremy Klingler, assistant professor of biological sciences at Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford, and other team members.

The program was aired Wednesday, May 11 on PBS channels.

Klingler and his associates will discuss paleontological discoveries he and his colleagues have made at the Tanis site in North Dakota. The program aired earlier in England. Both programs are hosted by Sir David Attenborough.

Klingler said the extinction of the dinosaurs has always been a subject of tremendous interest both to the professional paleontological community and the lay public. Since the 1980s, the "Alvarez-Smit Hypothesis" has postulated that a massive meteorite slammed into the Earth about 66 million years ago, throwing an enormous amount of ash, dust and soot into the atmosphere that blocked out sunlight for over a year which led to a total ecological collapse. Overall, approximately 75% of all life went extinct including, most famously, of course, the dinosaurs and pterosaurs.

Many devastating events occurred in the first moments of the meteorite impact including a mega-tsunami, magnitude Mw 10-12 earthquake, a rainfall of molten glass ejecta, and a super-heated atmosphere.

For the first time, the new fossil site in North Dakota called Tanis captures the events of the early hours of the extinction event in extraordinary and vivid detail. Klingler

and his associates have been excavating the site for nearly a decade. Numerous exciting fossils have been found at Tanis which tell an incredible story of what happened on that fateful day of the impact.

During the Gold Rush of 1849 people used gold dust to purchase items. As such there was a scarcity of small coins for merchants to use when making change.

Small-denomination gold coins were minted at the newly built the San Francisco Mint. These gold 'fractional' coins were in amounts of 25 cents, 50 cents, and one dollar.

The same small gold coins were in different shapes from round to octagonal and each coin had its own design. It could be argued the Mint was not only making gold coins but, the making coins with beautiful appearances.

It was a huge hit with the miners as they voted which design was the best. Many of these small gold coins were used in jewelry as well.

The above picture shows a round half-dollar fractional gold coin. It was certified by the Professional Coin Grading Service as a Mint State 63. It sold at auction for \$9,000.



WEATHERFORD SB/DRUG TESTING- The Weatherford School Board of Education has approved a proposal from Schoonmaker Drug and Alcohol testing to again provide student drug testing for the fiscal year 2022-23 school year. Superintendent Jill Henderson said one extra test will be added, beginning with the upcoming school year. Henderson said the extra test for fentanyl will add a \$5 expense per test.

CUSTER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS/ZONE-

Custer County Commissioners approved a resolution, regulating the use of county property for an expressive activity zone. Commissioner Bruce Walker said the resolution specifically outlines areas for expressive activity for celebrations or demonstrations. Walker says some of the criteria includes no amplified sound, participants cannot be disruptive nor walk the sidewalks for demonstration purposes.

WESTERN OK SALES TAX- Sales tax was up again for the city of Weatherford in the recently released figures from the Oklahoma Tax Commission for March sales. The city of Weatherford brought in just over \$1 million, thirty-seven thousand dollars for March sales. Meanwhile, the City of Clinton finished up 14.3% at just over \$545,000, Elk City was up nearly 1.3% at \$1.19 million and the City of Cordell dropped 2.7% at just over \$95,500.

WEATHERFORD SB/VIRTUAL-Despite COVID numbers on the decline over the past several months, the offering of virtual learning still is being utilized at Weatherford Public Schools. Jeanne Minton heads up Eagle virtual academy for the district. Minton told the school board of education that 10 students are planning to return for virtual learning next school year and at least four others have inquired about the program.

BECKHAM CO DIST COURT/ERNST- A Clinton man has been sentenced in Beckham County District Court to serve 10 years of a 20-year prison term after pleading guilty to a charge of robbery with a weapon. Twenty-one-year-old William Carl Ernst pleaded guilty to using a .38 caliber handgun to threaten employees during the hold-up of the McDonalds restaurant in Sayre in January 2020. Ernst told the court during his plea that he got about \$1200 during the robbery.

Election officials said the St. Eugene site had previously asked to no longer be utilized as a polling location. Meanwhile, new voting cards have been mailed to those voters who are affected by a change in their voting precinct.

WEATHERFORD/LYLE ROAD-HL- The beginning of road work to Lyle Road in Weatherford is coming closer. Economic development director Yolanda Creswell said bids will go out May 19th, awarded in June with actual work beginning in July.

SWOSU Football Announces New Turf Project for Flex-Chem Field

A new turf project has begun inside the confines of Milam Stadium that will give Flex-Chem Field a new look.

The current playing surface of Flex-Chem Field is being removed and replaced by sports construction company Mammoth over the next six weeks in preparation for the 2022 season.

"We cannot thank our supporters enough," said SWOSU Athletic Director Todd Helton. "We're so excited to be getting the new turf that will give studentathletes an improved surface for both safety and performance, and hope everyone is as proud of the final product as we are." The new field will feature updated logos at midfield and in both endzones and will alternate every five yards with lighter and darker green turf. In the center of the field, SWOSU's bulldog head spans over 10 yards and sits inside the state of Oklahoma colored blue and outlined in white. Installation of the new turf is estimated to be complete by mid-June.

The Bulldogs will get to play on their new turf in the second game of the season on September 10 at the Flex-Chem Football Classic when they host Southern Arkansas.


