



SWOSU Biology Faculty Join Bean Beetle Microbiome Project

Biological Sciences faculty Drs. Eric Paul and Gina McGrane recently joined a project with collaborations between Emory University and Morehouse College to implement a curricular-based undergraduate research experience (CURE) in their General Microbiology Laboratory.

The principal investigators for this National Science Foundation-funded project, Drs. Chris Beck and Larry Blumer of Emory University and Morehouse College, respectively, intend to implement this CURE at universities and colleges across the country. The aims of their project include increasing student engagement, persistence, and performance in science classes and increasing the understanding of the importance of microbes that live in association with bean beetles.

Bean beetles are agriculturally important pests of stored beans; an infestation can reduce the overall mass of beans by approximately 11%. The microbiome of bean beetles likely supplies essential nutrients for insect survival. Increased understanding of the specific microbes involved in supporting the survival of the bean beetle may lead to novel control

The CURE will be implemented in General Microbiology at SWOSU in spring 2023. Students participating in the CURE will learn the classical skills that are always a part of microbiology courses

and will also answer novel scientific questions using techniques for microbiome community analysis. Participating students will contribute to the societal understanding of both microbiomes in general and the bean beetle microbiome.


As participants in the CURE project, SWOSU will receive supplies and access to Sanger and next-generation sequencing and software for bioinformatics analysis. Additionally, the project will fund travel for faculty and student to present their findings at scientific meetings. These resources and travel support are worth thousands of dollars. The travel for faculty attendance at the workshop was also funded by the project.

on the throne) the Royal Mint produced a very large coin for her. It is a gold coin weighing 15 kilograms (33.069 pounds).

For Queen Elizabeth II

It is made from .999 fine gold and weighs 15,030 grams and its measurement is 220 mm (8.66 inches) in diameter. It is valued at £15,000 (\$18,836.70).

The artist John Bergdahl designed the gold coin and Queen Elizabeth approved it. The reverse shows a crown with EIIR (Elizabeth II Regina {Regina is Latin for Queen}). It also sports a privy mark of St. Edward's crown the number of 70. The obverse has the Queen's signature.

The workers of the Royal Mint spent 400 hours making the gold coin using special engraving and lasers.



BECKHAM CO DIST COURT – Charges of first-degree arson and attempted first degree murder have been filed against an Elk City man in Beckham County District Court. Court records show 24-yearold Alexander Michael Albright allegedly set fire to the outside of a home in Elk City that was occupied at the time of the fire by his ex-girlfriend and three

others.

CUSTER CO DIST COURT/PHILLIPS - A Weatherford man who is serving 20 years of a 50 year prison term for first degree manslaughter has filed for judicial review for a modification of his sentence. Twenty-three-year-old Cole Isaac Phillips was sentenced last July in connection with the April 2020 shooting death of 20-year old Josh Price.

CUSTER CO DIST COURT/GAUTHIER - An Edgewood, NM, woman charged with trafficking in illegal drugs will have a preliminary hearing in Custer County district court next month. Forty-year-old Theresa Marie Gauthier is scheduled for a preliminary hearing on July 21st. Gauthier and 55-year-old Dwayne Henry Shaw, also of Edgewood, New Mexico, were apprehended by Weatherford Police earlier this year during a traffic stop after authorities discovered heroin, meth and fentanyl inside the vehicle. Shaw is scheduled for a preliminary hearing conference on July 22nd.

MUNICIPAL FILINGS/DAY 3 – The three day filing period ended at 5 for municipal seats in the cities of Weatherford and Clinton. No races formed as a result of the filing period. Jimmy Ingram will keep his Ward 2 commission seat in the city of Weatherford. Garrett Smith is returning to the City Commission in Weatherford after filing unopposed. Incumbent Mark Shadid did not seek re-election. Ernie Dowdell and Arthur Lloyd are returning to Clinton City Council without opposition, as is mayor David Berrong.

EARLY VOTING - Early voting begins June 23rd at county boards of election sites for the June 28th election. Early voting will be held Thursday, June 23rd and Friday, June 24th, from 8-6, and on Saturday June 25th from 8am-2pm. Polling sites will be open on election day from 7am-7pm.

WEATHERFORD SCHOOL BOARD - In a meeting of the Weatherford School Board of Education Superintendent Jill Henderson said Tom Stafford Elementary is almost completed and flooring should be completed in June. Henderson said the district should have full access to the school in early August and discussed possibly having an open house for the community.

Wolaver Wins Gold Buckle, Women's Team Claims Reserve Championship

Senior barrel racer Sadie Wolaver took home a gold buckle and a new title - "National Champion" - following the completion of the College National Finals Rodeo (CNFR) on Saturday. She and the rest of the SWOSU Women's Rodeo team went on to finish as the national runner-up for the second consecutive year.

The Women's Team, made up of of Abby Hepper, Alli Masters, Winter Williams & Sadie Wolaver, compiled 530.0 points over the four-round event to finish as the national runner-up behind Weatherford College. The Dawgs were edged by just 8.3 total points.

SWOSU's 530 team points in 2022 were nearly 100 more points than they scored in 2021.

The second-place finish is now the fifth top-10 national placing for SWOSU Women's Rodeo team under head coach Mike Visnieski.

Wolaver's first three rounds of the CNFR were consistent and solid. She posted times of 14.26, 14.24. and 14.22 to enter the short round on Saturday with the lead. The senior left nothing to chance in front of a packed house in the final round when she continued her trend of shaving off time on her runs and finished with a 14.14 to seal the deal.



the CNFR and is the first to do it since 1979. Wolaver's horse, Princess, was also recognized as the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA) Women's Horse of the Year.

Abby Hepper also had a strong showing in barrels and finished eighth overall in the average. She helped account for 60.0 team points for the Dawgs. Her fastest round came in the third when she posted a 14.23.

In the breakaway, Alli Masters entered the short She becomes the second SWOSU barrel racer to win round in second overall and in serious contention but

was unable to get a score in the final round and finished eighth overall with 145 points for her team. Winter Williams began her campaign in round one with a 3.3 but did not get a score in rounds two or three to be able to qualify for the short round.

SWOSU's lone cowboy, Marley Berger, represented well in tie down roping. He entered the final round in ninth place and shaved three seconds off his previous CNFR best with an 8.5 second run on Saturday that jumped him to sixth overall.

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Heather Davis Joins Lady Bulldog Basketball as Assistant Coach

SWOSU Women's Basketball head coach Jeff Zinn has announced the addition of Heather Davis who will join his staff as an assistant.

Davis comes from the University of Central Oklahoma (UCO) where she has been the assistant coach for the past eight years under former Bronchos head coach Guy Hardaker, who retired following the 2021-22 season. She has over 12 collective years of experience at the Division II level, as a player, graduate assistant, and full-time assistant.

Davis helped lead the Bronchos to more than 100 wins in her first five seasons at UCO and was 151-83 overall in eighth seasons as an assistant.

Prior to being upgraded to full-time assistant, she spent two seasons as a graduate assistant at UCO from 2012 to 2014.

Aside from UCO, Davis also had the opportunity to coach for the USA Sports Division II women's team on two separate tours – in 2019 as an assistant and 2021 as head coach. Team USA consists of 10 Division II players who travel to South America to compete in exhibitions against local competition.

As a player, Davis spent her first two years at Division



I Missouri-Kansas City before transferring to UCO to play under Coach Hardaker and close out her career.

At Muskogee High School, Davis was a prep standout. She earned All-District and All-State honors as a senior while also garnering All-Conference accolades in soccer.

A native of Muskogee, Oklahoma, Davis earned her bachelor's degree in criminal justice in May 2012 and her master's in criminal justice management and administration in May 2014.

It is Vacation Bible School time again. church, in unchurched areas of town. I have generally been involved in knocking on doors of trailer houses and apartments seeking those children often neglected from any church outreach effort. I seek those areas where there are toys or some evidence of the presence of children and pass those where no children are present.

However, this year I am planning to try something a little more challenging. I'm going to every door in the area. I've found that when a stranger knocks on their door most people have two questions: "Who are you?" And, "What do you want?" So I say, (with a big smile) I'm Jim Morrison from First Baptist Church and we are having Vacation Bible School in few weeks and I am looking for kids that might be interested. That breaks down a few walls, because most people don't feel threatened by VBS. Many have had good experiences in VBS and this gives me a valid reason to be there. They see that you are not out to get something from them. If there are no children present I plan to continue with something like this: "Okay, That's fine. How are things going with you folks. Have you lived in Weatherford long? Do you folks have a church home here in town?" Depending on the response I may feel comfortable about going deeper into a spiritual conversation. Then I give them a copy of a Billy Graham DVD, "Heaven" as a gift. I may say something like this; "I believe everyone wants to go to heaven when they die. But a lot of folks really don't know for sure that they will go there. This DVD will give you an assurance about that question." You know, eternity is a long time and it is a good thing to know for sure.

"Now I would like to pray for you. What are some things that you would like me to pray for


you about." They may mention a few things, but I have never had anyone refuse to let me pray for them. This allows me to pray that God will protect them, give them wisdom in making decisions, and for God to show them how much he loves them by dying on the cross for them. If there are children or grandchildren I will pray for them. I am comfortable doing this because I do it all the time at the truck stop and in the jail. I realize this might be difficult for some. Just understand that the Holy Spirit will help you and make the words clear.

This is a seed-sowing plan. In the parable of the sower, Jesus indicates that some seed will fall on fertile soil. We have no way of knowing where the Spirit of God is at work. The Bible says that he who sows generously will reap a generous harvest. Obviously, he who sows not at all will have a crop failure.

Being old has some advantages. I have passed the point of worrying about impressing anybody or fearing rejection; "if the General loves me, who cares about the Sergeant." If this pleases God, it doesn't matter what people think. I hope this gives you something to think about. You might just give

Dr. David Ralph Announces Retirement After 47 Years at SWOSU



Dr. David Ralph, who has served as the Dean of Pharmacy at Southwestern Oklahoma State University since 2016, has announced his retirement after 47 years on the Weatherford campus.

Ralph received his Ph.D. from the University of Oklahoma and MBA and BS in Pharmacy from SWOSU.

Dr. David Ralph photoRalph began employment as an instructor in Pharmacy Administration and Director of Continuing Education in 1975, immediately after graduating with a pharmacy degree. He took on the position of Assistant Dean for Student and Alumni Affairs within the College of Pharmacy from 1985 to 2000. He served as Associate Dean of the college from 2000 to 2016 before being named Dean in 2016. Ralph is the first SWOSU pharmacy graduate to become the college's dean.

Under Ralph's guidance, the College has met state and regional workforce needs for pharmacists while also providing critical research and services for the area. Ralph has been instrumental in the creation and expansion of the Center for Rural Health within the college. Ralph also led the program through a successful reaccreditation process in June 2022 with the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education.

Ralph has had leadership positions in the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy, Southwestern Pharmacy Alumni Foundation, Southwestern Pharmacy Alumni Association, and Oklahoma Pharmaceutical Association. He has professional licenses as Registered Pharmacist and Registered Preceptor.

A come-and-go retirement reception for Ralph will be held Monday, July 11, from 1 to 3 p.m. on the 3rd floor of the Chemistry/Pharmacy/Physics building.

An interim dean for the College will be announced soon, and a search for Ralph's replacement will begin this summer and continue through the fall.

New Data Released Shows Positive Impact from School Climate Grant

A five-year, \$3.7 million School Climate Transformation grant is making a significant impact, according to new data released by the Oklahoma State Department of Education (OSDE). The grant was awarded in 2018 through the U.S. Department of Education and is administered through OSDE.

"The results from this data show an incredible turnaround at schools that have received the most comprehensive supports," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction Joy Hofmeister. "The impact of improving school climate is twofold – a more positive overall school environment and additional high-quality instructional time for students and teachers to work toward academic success in the classroom. More than halfway through the grant, we are seeing outcomes that touch on all that we know about child development and learning – students' basic needs for safety, trust and security must be met before learning can occur."

School climate can be defined as the quality and character of a given school that reflects the shared norms, behaviors, priorities and expectations of its staff and students.

To date, the grant has funded statewide training and technical assistance on how schools and districts can implement integrated, multi-tiered systems of support (MTSS) to improve school climate, including Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports and Pyramid Model frameworks, trauma-informed practices, mental health awareness and prevention curriculum. Additionally, 50 individual schools are receiving intensive coaching and training.

Office Discipline Referrals

Schools participating in the School Climate Transformation Grant reported an average 56% reduction in office discipline referrals and behavior incident reports.

Between the early stages of the grant's implementation in 2018 and the end of the 2020-21 school year, the intensive-intervention school sites saw a 56% reduction in discipline referrals and a 31% decrease in suspensions from school. In the same time period, 19,627 educators and support staff received targeted training in integrated multi-tiered systems of support to improve student

behavior and school climate.

Julie Bloss, principal at the Grove Early Childhood Center, has seen the grant's impact with her school's prekindergarten and first-grade students.

"Because we transition the youngest learners into school for the first time, we don't just teach academics," Bloss said. "We teach students how to do school – how to keep your hands to yourself, how to problem-solve, how to resolve a conflict and more.

"The grant helped us put in place a systematic approach to having schoolwide expectations for all students. Every day we are celebrating and recognizing positive things occurring in our classrooms with our students when they meet those expectations. This has helped us provide an exceptional academic atmosphere because we have the behavior under control. It really has been a game-changer for us – this school year, we are implementing what we have learned from the School Climate Transformation grant across every site in the district."

The grant has enabled the OSDE to develop a myriad of tools all schools in Oklahoma can utilize to improve school climate, including:

- School Climate Framework
- School Implementation Templates
- Behavior Coaching Resource Guides
- Universal Program Planning Guide
- Fidelity Tools

The OSDE and School Climate Transformation team are hosting a free two-day conference for educators, Supporting the Whole Child: 2022 MTSS Summer Conference, on June 21-22, at the Edmond Conference Center. There is no cost to attend, but registration is required.



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This program is funded by Oklahoma Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention, SWODA, and local coalitions.
