


The Mother Road Turns 97: Weatherford Chamber Plans Festivities



The Mother Road is turning 97 this year and the Weatherford Chamber of Commerce is throwing a Birthday Bash on Main Street to celebrate, complete with music, food, vendors, games and free cupcakes! The first of only two Route 66 Nights events planned for this year, The Birthday Bash will take place from 5:30pm - 7:30pm on June 2 and will feature a cornhole tournament presented by the H₂O

baggers, musical performances by Tori Rae Music, as well as the second annual ice cream contest that's voted on by guests of the event.

In addition to the contests and live music, several local vendors offering products such as Mexican honey to woodwork will be in attendance for folks looking to see what local craftsman have to offer.

"We've got a lot of businesses behind us, so this will be a great time to hangout," said Elizabeth Amen, Executive Director of the Weatherford Chamber of Commerce.

Amen's efforts have brought in 21 sponsors for the event as well as 18 vendors and 19 entrants for the ice cream contest.

The Ice Cream Contest, which returns as a fan favorite, will feature 19 contestants and their homemade ice cream creations.

Interested guests can pay \$10 for a wristband that will allow them to taste test every ice cream at the event as well as give them a chance to vote for their favorite ice cream. The contest is broken into 2 categories, one for for-profit organizations and individuals and another for non-profit organizations. Winners in both categories will be awarded prizes, with the non-profit being awarded a \$2000 local advertising package.

Levitt Amp Clinton Music Series Kicks Off This Weekend

The Levitt Amp Clinton Music Series kicks off this Friday, June 2 at the historic amphitheater in McLain Rogers Park with musical performances by DuHost and Mariachi Orgullo De America as well as dance performances by the Vasquez Flamenco Dancers from the Classen School of Advanced Studies. The event will also bring in an assortment of food trucks, vendors, and kids art which will be open to the pubic beginning at 6pm. Musicians will begin performing at 7pm.

The June 2 performances will feature the electrofolk/world music duo DuHost, based out of Kentucky. DuHost is comprised of wife and husband duo Moksha Sommer and Jemal Wade Hines. Their latest album 'Anthems of Honor' reached #9 in the folk radio charts. "HuDost performs as either a duo or along with a band of fellow eclectic musicians—often engaging concertgoers through multiple mediums by weaving performance art and dance into their shows for an unforgettable experience that will leave audiences spellbound" according to a blog posted on the Levitt Foundation's website.

Oklahoma based Mariachi Orgullo De America will also be featured that evening. Mariachi Orgullo de America, translated to English as Mariachi Pride of America, has performed for Oklahoma governors, senators, and representatives and tours across the Southwest United States. They describe their band's mission as, "entertaining, educational, and authentic, Mariachi Orgullo de América strives everyday to spread the mariachi tradition to other cultures while, at the same time, keeping the art form alive and well within the Hispanic community," according to their agency representation's website.

Alongside the musical performances, the Vasquez Flamenco Dancers from Classen SAS will showcase various styles and techniques of the Flamenco dance art-form under the direction of Erika Vasquez.

The Levitt Amp Clinton Music Series will also give concertgoers a chance to win door prizes from various merchants through 'Key To The Arts' cards, coordinated by the Clinton Chamber of Commerce, Scissortail Productions, and Clinton merchants. Concertgoers can acquire 'Key to the Arts' cards at the event as well as through participating merchants. 

SWOSU Public Relations Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) Department of Biological Sciences is proud to announce that a team of SWOSU Biology students won the Most Innovative Experiment Award at the Plant the Moon Challenge for their study on "Mammal Scat vs. Worm Casting Viability in Simulated Mars-Regolith Soil in a Controlled Greenhouse Environment." The SWOSU MARS team competed in the Undergraduate/Professional Division during the Spring 2023 Season.

Led by Dr. Lisa Castle, Professor of Biology at SWOSU, the team consists of Payden Farnsley, Kade Flores, Ria Govind, Natalie Harris, Saraya Hunt, Courtney Johnson, Stevie Langstraat, Chloe Mellott, Macayla McIntyre, and Rachel Uhlig.

The Southwestern competition designed to challenge scientists to develop ways to grow food in lunar or Martian regolith while exploring solutions to sustaining space exploration.

The Most Innovative Experiment Award received by the SWOSU MARS team is one of four Best of Show awards given at the competition. The others are Plant Growth, Experimental Design, and Analysis of Results.

The participating students were provided with support in the form of a \$1,000 scholarship from the NASA Space Grant Program.

HIGHER GROUND The Battle is On



Many people struggle with their prayer life. They may find it easy to pray when they are desperate. "Help me I'm falling apart!"

We may call these parachute prayers. But God wants a relationship. Every loving parent loves to give his children things that will help them become the man or woman they can be. Our heavenly Father wants to meet

our needs as well. He said, "You have not because you ask not." Others limit their prayers to praise and thanksgiving. God desires our praise and gratitude but he also wants us to grow and mature in our faith. How long has it been since you heard your worship leader or small group leader plead with God to bring conviction of sin leading to repentance; or that God would move in a powerful way in the service to break down barriers, demolish strongholds and bring someone to Christ in the service. The best question to ask when beginning intercessory prayer is, "What does God want to see happen in this event, this situation, or this person's life?" If you are knowledgeable of scripture at all, several things would come to mind. As you prepare for prayer, you might consider the following:

• Thank God for the gift of His love and forgiveness.

• Ask Him to free your mind and heart from all those things that distract.

• Ask Him to sharpen your focus and help you visualize the great need for repentance among both the youth and adults of the community.

• Confess your pride, lack of love, and the sin of selfcentered living.

• Give him permission to search your heart and reveal to you those areas you have not yielded to Him.

I often pray a prayer from Wesley Duewel, found in his book Mighty Prevailing Prayer.

"O Lord, teach me to pray! Lord, teach me to pray! Fill my heart with your hunger, my eyes with your tears, my soul with your hatred of sin, my will with your strength to resist the Devil in prayer, my spirit with the mighty power of the Holy Spirit so I can prevail with you and for you with holy prevailing and mighty intercessions." Biblical passages that relate to prayer can be recited to prepare your heart to pray.

"In the morning, O Lord, you hear my voice; in the morning I lay my requests before you and wait in expectation." Psalm 5:3

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"The Coin Guy" Rare 1983 Bronze Penny Discovered





A copper cent collector from Oregon found a 1983 Lincoln cent in solid copper alloy bronze.

In 2012, a cent collector from Pennsylvania found a 1983 Lincoln cent by weighing every 1983 cent found in pocket change.

From 1909 to 1962 Lincoln cents were made of 95% copper and 5% zinc and tin known as "brass

cents". These cents are known by collectors as "brass cents".

From 1963 to 1982 Lincoln cents were made from solid brass composition which were 95% copper and 5% zinc and are known as "bronze cents".

The bronze and brass planchets both weigh 3.11 grams each. The above pictured cent is of bronze material.

The Oregon collector bought 50,000 bronze cents to search. At one point in his quest, he found a 1983-P bronze cent.

The cent, found in Oregon, will be auctioned in August 2023 at the American Numismatic Association (ANA) World's Fair of Money in Pittsburg, Pennsylvania.

Oklahoma History: Black Wall Street and the Tulsa Race Massacre

May 31st marks the 102nd anniversary of "the single

worst incident of racial violence in American History" (Encyclopedia of Oklahoma History and Culture). The Tulsa Race Massacre, also known as the Greenwood Massacre, took place over May 31st and June 1st, 1921, in the Greenwood District - a vibrant neighborhood with local newspapers, library, churches, and many small businesses. For the time, Tulsa was a full population city with over one hundred thousand people, but like many cities around the nation, most of their African American residents were living in a specified location, almost all of the ten thousand segregated residents were in Greenwood. The nightmarish eighteen hours began as the nationwide racial tensions began to culminate due to the rising growth of the second Ku Klux Klan and the increased resistance of African Americans to attacks on their communities.

At first glance, Tulsa was like any modern city growing, ambitious - however, underneath it was a deeply troubled town. Its crime rate was frighteningly high, and vandalism was coating the city. Additionally, racial violence was at an all-time high with incidents like the lynching of a white teenager accused of murder, by a white mob in August of 1920. Reports exposed that the Tulsa police had allowed the lynching victim to be taken from his jail cell at the county courthouse.

Tensions were strained over the next eight months until the breaking point on May 30th, 1921 involving a shoe shiner and an elevator operator. The common story is that Dick Rowland, an African American shoe shiner, entered an elevator in the Drexel Building with a white elevator operator named Sarah Page and stepped on her foot, causing her to scream; he was picked up by police. The following day, The Tulsa Tribune reported that Rowland had attempted to rape Page. Additionally, the Tribune is said to have released an editorial titled "To Lynch Negro Tonight" (but there is no known publication). Early that evening, talk of lynching filled the streets.

At 7:30 PM that night, hundreds of white locals gathered outside the courthouse and demanded they hand over Rowland; the sheriff refused. By 9:00 PM, reports of the unrest reached Greenwood where a group of armed African American men, many with experience in World War I, went to the courthouse to offer the authorities aid in protecting Rowland. They were sent home.

Upon seeing the armed men, many members of the white mob attempted to break into the National Guard armory but were turned back by the local guardsmen. At 10 PM, a rumor circulated in Greenwood that members of the white mob were storming the courthouse. So, a second group of African American men, around seventyfive, went back to the courthouse but were sent away again. While leaving, a white man dashed at one of the black veterans to disarm him and a shot was fired. The eighteen-hour riot began.

The first six hours were filled with chaos as angry white citizens began targeting African Americans in general. An unarmed African American man was murdered in a downtown movie theater, carloads of armed white mob members began performing "drive-by" shootings in African American residential neighborhoods, and a hatefilled fight broke out along the railroad tracks. The African American commercial district was in flames by midnight and there were talks of a dawn invasion into Greenwood.

Local authorities did nothing to stop the crisis, with many eyewitnesses from both sides reporting that many police officers began deputizing members of the lynch mob with instructions to "get a gun and get a..." The National Guard was mobilized but was stationed in white neighborhoods for the night to protect them from a, nonexistent, "black counterattack".

When light began to break on June 1st, thousands of armed whites were gathered outside Greenwood and poured into the district. They began looting homes and businesses and setting them on fire. They were responsible for the murder of A.C. Jackson, a renowned surgeon, who surrendered to the mob. but was shot. Reports list many personal weapons used by the lynch mob, including a machine gun. Several eyewitnesses reported airplanes with white assailants who fired rifles and dropped firebombs on buildings and families. While there were several confirmed planes present, there has been no concrete evidence shown to back this claim. Archives picked up by the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture describe the planes dipping low and the "sounds of hail" on rooftops. By the time the National Guard arrived at 9:15 AM, most of Greenwood was on fire. Martial law was called, and when the fighting stopped, more than 800 people were in the hospital and 6,000 African American residents were interned at large facilities for the day.



10,000 residents of the Greenwood District were left homeless and were forced to spend the next winters in tents. Greenwood began the process of rebuilding, but the city tried to keep silent about the tragedy. It was omitted from local, state, and national histories until a commission formed in 1996 to study the event.

Their final report published in 2001 was only able to confirm "39 dead, 26 Black and 13 white...[but an] estimated range of 75 to 300 dead". The report also stated that" the city had conspired with the mob of White citizens against Black citizens". Oklahoma passed legislation to establish scholarships for descendants of the survivors and encourage the continued development of Greenwood. In 2010, a park was dedicated to the memory of the victims of the massacre, and in 2020 it was officially added to the Oklahoma school curriculum.

CBA sent 11 high school students who competed in 42 tests.


CBA won two firsts, two seconds, and had an additional 25 finishes in the top ten.
