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Chatham Rabbits Have Magical Connection with Clinton Residents

This Friday evening the Levitt AMP Clinton Music Series presents their 4th night of musical performances at the McLain Rogers Amphitheater in Clinton, but this is definitely not the first time that headliners Chatham Rabbits have played for the residents of Clinton.

"They love our community and our community loves them," said Clinton resident Jenn Mosburg about Chatham Rabbits, who she befriended on social media over 3 years ago in a story that is reminiscent of a Hollywood movie. "I just kind of joke that were some kind of modern social media soul connection."

Jenn is a fan of the types of music that ring throughout the wooded hill country and coastal plains of North Carolina, so she was pleased to discover Chatham Rabbits and their music which can be described as modern "old-time" music that blends folk, country, and bluegrass with lyrical story-telling.

But it was an instagram photo that Jenn posted of her husband Daniel harvesting asparagus in their garden with chickens at his feet that seemingly sparked the friendship between the Mosburgs and the McCombies of Chatham Rabbits. Sarah McCombie, Chatham Rabbits lead vocalist and banjo player, commented on Jenn's photo and then Jenn extended an invitation for the band to perform in Clinton. Sarah and her husband Austin, the other half of Chatham Rabbits, happily accepted her invitation while they were traveling to the West Coast right at the start of the 2020 pandemic. The Mosburgs and the McCombies hit it off which led to Chatham Rabbits performing two more times in Clinton at concerts held in the Mosburg's backyard, as well as the Mosburg family traveling to North Carolina to visit the McCombie's family farm.

When word hit the streets of Clinton that the Levitt AMP Clinton Music Series was going to take place at the McLain Rogers Amphitheater, Jenn was excited. "I just used to drive around the Amphitheater and imagine having a musical festival there. That was kind of my dream," said Jenn Mosburg. She immediately tried to figure out ways to get Chatham Rabbits back in Clinton to perform at the Levitt AMP Clinton Music Series.

While Jenn wasn't directly involved in the selection committee, devoted to finding the bands to perform at the Levitt AMP Clinton Music Series, there were folks on the inside who remembered the Mosburg's backyard concerts with Chatham Rabbits. Chatham Rabbit's name was eventually given to the selection committee, who agreed that they were a great fit for the concert series and the rest is history.

Opening Friday night's festivities will be the Oklahoma Opry, featuring long-time members Darlin' Darla, Cindy Scarberry and Dustin Jones along with the Oklahoma Opry band. The Oklahoma Opry started "as a backyard gathering of family and friends who loved to play and sing

Corn Bible Academy is gearing up for the 2023-24 school year and while the school has offered an exceptional education built upon a biblical worldview to families of all income levels for over a century, the passing of Oklahoma House Bill 1934 promises to allow more Western Oklahoma families an opportunity to have their children educated at CBA.

Boasting "ACT scores three points higher than the Oklahoma state average," according to the schools website, as well as a school academic team that has won 4 state championships in the past decade, CBA does not slouch when it comes to preparing students academically.

"Academics and the faith foundation are our top priority," said April Javorsky, Admissions Director for CBA. "We teach from a Christian worldview... and really every subject can be taught from a Christian worldview."

"People assume that since we're a private school that it's just wealthy kids, but I would say that is a very small percentage of the [children] that attend our school. We are not like the big city schools," said Javorsky.

Javorsky and CBA regularly work with low to mid income families to provide financial assistance based upon each family's individual needs.

Upon completing an application to attend CBA, and after meeting with Javorksy, CBA performs an unbiased independent financial assessment through FACTS, a company that specializes in aid assessment, for each family. Based upon that financial assessment CBA then tailors scholarship packages, funded through donors around the globe, for every prospective CBA student.

And with the passing of Oklahoma HB 1934 this spring, which plans to offer tax credits beginning January 1 of 2024 of up to \$7500 each year for families paying tuition at Oklahoma private schools, CBA is prepared to assist more Western Oklahoma families than ever before. But Javorsky encourages interested families apply as soon as possible if they would like to take advantage of those tax credits in 2024. CBA's faculty and schedule can only accommodate a limited amount of students, so "If [we] reach capacity, [we'll] have to put folks on a waiting list," said Javorsky. CBA's student to teacher ratio sits at 8:1 and they credit those small class sizes in maintaining their outstanding academic culture.

the proud parent of 3 CBA graduates, the most recent graduating this past spring. Because of the academic preparation CBA provided, her two oldest children were able to receive full ride scholarships to SWOSU and test out of 20 to 30 college credits at the university.

"My three children have learned how to become leaders; both in school, but also in their community and they've carried that into their adult lives." said Javorsky. "They've grown spiritually and they've built a strong foundation to weather the storms of life."

Certainly, most people have faced those storms of life at some point and without a doubt family finances are often at the root of those storms, but CBA doesn't want Western Oklahoma families to feel that their finances exclude them from offering their children a world class education at CBA.

The Mission Continues



The time was 7:49. A.M. Dec. 7, 1941. Mitsuo Fuchida was leading a squadron of 360 Japanese fighters over the island of Oahu, Hawaii. Seeing the American fleet peacefully at anchor below his plane, he smiled as he ordered "All squadrons, attack!" "Tora, Tora, Tora," the attack had begun. On that day that lives in

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infamy, 5 battleships were destroyed and 14 more were sunk or damaged. More than 2,300 Americans lay dead or dying. Fuchida later described the day as the most "thrilling exploit of my career."

At the same time, Sgt Jacob Deshazer was on K.P. duty at his base in Oregon. When he heard the news over the radio he threw a potato against the wall, screaming, "The Japs are going to have to pay for this."

Some months later, Deshazer volunteered to join a special squadron being formed by Jimmy Dolittle to take the war to the Japanese in a daring bombing raid over Tokyo.

While it had little military success it was a morale booster to the U.S. But Deshazer's bomber ran out of fuel before it could reach a safe area in China, and he and his crew were forced to bail out over Japanese held territory. Deshazer would spend the next 40 months as a prisoner of Japan, 34 in solitary confinement, during which time he was routinely tortured. And his already burning hatred of the Japanese was fanned into an inferno. Fellow prisoners were executed or died of starvation, disease, or torture.

Fuchido went on to fight other battles for Japan. Three years later, after Nagasaki and Hiroshima, Japan would be forced to surrender.

Meanwhile, solitary confinement gave DeShazer time to ponder the human condition. He wondered what could cause such hatred among fellow human beings. He remembered some Sunday School lessons from childhood and asked his guards for a Bible. Two years after his capture he finally received one and he eagerly devoured it, gulping down lessons on mercy, forgiveness, and redemption. He later wrote, "I discovered that God had given me new spiritual eyes and that when I looked at the enemy officers and guards who had starved and beaten my companion so cruelly, I found my bitter hatred had changed to loving pity...I prayed for God to forgive my torturers and I determined by the aid of Christ to do my best to acquaint these people with the message of salvation."

On Aug. 20, 1945, a smiling Japanese guard opened the door and said, "War over, you go home now."

DeShazer wrote a book called "I was a Prisoner of Japan" and after studying at Seattle Pacific College, returned to Japan, this time as a missionary to his former enemies.

In the meantime, Fuchida, tried to return to a life of farming. He was deeply shamed by Japan's loss. He was married but had a mistress in Tokyo where he traveled frequently. He led a very unsatisfying life. In October 1948, while getting off the train in Tokyo, he saw an American handing out leaflets in Japanese. The title caught his eye. "I Was a Prisoner of Japan." He was taken with Deshazer's Christian testimony. A friend told him to get a Bible. He bought one for 40 yen. He was struck by Jesus' words in Luke 23:34, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." He later wrote, "I was impressed that I was certainly one of those for whom Jesus had prayed. The many men I had killed had been slaughtered in the name of patriotism, for I did not understand the love of Christ..." He went on to become an evangelist throughout Japan and Asia, and he and Deshazer eventually became close friends.

Seventy-five years ago the two men were bitter enemies. Yet they became brothers in Christ, a testimony to the power of God's grace.

CLINTON / GARVER – Clinton City Council has tabled agreements with Garver Engineering for professional engineering services and waterline and sewer line relocation for the Exit 65 construction project. City Manager Robert Johnston says the reason for tabling the agreements was with the engineers' payment, as their payment would need to be re-calculated at an hourly rate. The council will consider the arrangements at a future meeting.

ELK CITY / BUSES - The Elk City School Board of Education approved the purchase of five new route buses. District Superintendent Mike Sparks says the district can also replace its activity buses through a transportation bond allocated by voters. Sparks will oversee the replacement of nine buses, six transportation buses, and three activity buses with the bond money.

Much of Custer County and a small area of Beckham and Roger Mills counties are now in the moderate drought category. However, Dewey and much of Washita, Beckham, and Roger Mills counties remain in severe drought. Additionally, southwestern Roger Mills County and northwestern Beckham County have been classified as abnormally dry. **CLINTON / BUDGET WORKSHOP -** A budget workshop was held by Clinton City Council last night. City Manager Robert Johnston says one item in the fiscal year 2024 budget is purchasing the transfer station from the republic. The city council is scheduled to act on the new spending plan during its meeting next Tuesday evening.

WEATHERFORD / CONTRACT - After a fivehour executive session that ended after 1 A.M., the Weatherford School Board of Education decided to table the 2023-24 contract for Superintendent Dr. Jill Henderson with Board Member Chris Gregston making the motion. The board also decided to hire Roland High School Girls' Basketball Coach Greg Pratt to take over the girls' basketball program at Weatherford, taking over for Grant Givins.

WEATHERFORD / NEW FIRE TRUCK - A push-in ceremony was held last night at the Weatherford Fire Department for the newest fire engine that will serve the community—an old tradition for fire departments. The new Quint 1 Fire Engine will "be a huge benefit to the city," according to Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown. Fire Chief Mike Karlin says he is hopeful the new unit will be in service in early July.

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

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



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Oklahoma History: The Dalton Gang Train Robberies

star writer infamous band of brothers that operated in Oklahoma and Kansas in the early 1890's, specialized in bank and train robberies throughout the territory. Also known as the Dalton Brothers, four of the gang's founding members were brothers with most of them coming from federal lawmen backgrounds.

Initially, the brothers began stealing horses for extra cash with brother "Bill" Dalton acting as spy and informant; Bill never actively participated in any heists. They quickly graduated to stagecoach robberies, and from there, to banks and trains.

Their spree was unmatched and led them to their biggest score on July 14, 1892, the most daring deed to date: the high stakes robbery of the "Katy" train near Adair, Oklahoma, (which was Indian Territory at the time). The Katy train referred to one of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas, MKT, trains that connected the frontier military bases and delivered supplies between them. At the time, MKT's Kansas-Texas train was simplified to "KT" for timetables and the stock exchange. The Katy's valuables were a highly sought after market for the gang, and on that historic Thursday, their target approached.

Four members of the gang captured the night operator at its incoming station and had him signal the train to halt. When it reached a stand-still, two members took control of the conductor and train men. The operator was then taken to an express car where he was to order the messenger to open up. The messenger refused. So, the train's fireman was brought and forced to break down the door. Finally inside, the gang quickly began looting the safe's contents.

country music" and has been proclaimed as "Oklahoma's

Official Country Music Show," according to their website.

Following the Oklahoma Opry will be SWOSU classical instrumentalists Carey Morrow, playing classical guitar, and Dr. Shelley Martinson, playing classical flute.

The nights festivities will also feature the Key to the Arts giveaway, organized by the Clinton Chamber of Commerce, participating Clinton businesses, and Scissortail Productions that offers prizes for concert-goers who attend performances of the Levitt AMP Clinton Music Series as well as visit 5 participating vendors affiliated with the Clinton Chamber of Commerce. Unbeknownst to the gang, a special detachment of railroad guards was aboard the train, and after noticing the commotion, exited the train opposite the depot. There, the eight guards encountered members of the gang and a fierce firefight began.

Done inside, the gang onboard quickly sprung out and through the town dodging bullets and firing their own. Stray bullets fatally wounded Dr. W.L. Goff and injured Dr. Youngblood, who were chatting outside a nearby drugstore. Others injured included the two captains: J.J. Kinney, Chief of railroad detectives and commander of the guards onboard, and J.H. LaFlore, Chief of Cherokee Nation Police. They both recovered.

The gang escaped unscathed, and the railroad company promptly posted a bounty of \$5,000 per bandit of the robbery. Stories of their daring deed spread throughout the country and a sensation of embellished publishings and myths began. Their success led many members of the gang to seek bigger and better robberies, and none more-so than Dalton brother Bob, quoted with the claim that he could "beat anything Jesse James ever did — rob two banks at once, in broad daylight." A comment made from a braggart which then turned to a serious possibility.

On October 5th, 1892, the Dalton gang attempted this insane feat in Coffeyville, Kansas. They had their eyes on the C.M. Condon & Company's Bank and the First National Bank, located on opposite sides of the street. This fateful day would lead the gang to its meeting of famous outlaw Henry Star, to their biggest tragedy, and to their ultimate transformation into the most notorious gang in the west: The Wild Bunch (an inspiration to Butch Cassidy's Wild Bunch).

The Key to the Arts giveaway rules stipulate that concert-goers must obtain a Key to the Arts card at either a Levitt AMP Clinton Music Series Concert or from a participating vendor and then concert-goers must obtain 5 stamps from participating vendors.
