Phillip Yancy tells a story about an experience he had while visiting a rehabilitation center for victims of leprosy in Nepal.

As they were taking a tour of the hospital, he noticed one of the ugliest human being he had ever seen. Her hands were bandaged in gauze, she had deformed stumps where most people have feet, and

her face showed the worst ravages of that cruel disease. Her eyes, mottled and covered with callus, let in no light; she was totally blind. Scars covered patches of skin on her arms.

He said, "We toured a unit of the hospital and returned along the same corridor. In the meantime this creature had crawled across the courtyard to the very edge of the walkway, pulling herself along the ground by planting her elbows and dragging her body like a wounded animal. I'm ashamed to say that my first thought was, She's a beggar. She wants money. My wife, who has worked among the down-and-out, had a much more holy reaction. Without hesitation she bent down to the woman and put her arm around her. The old woman rested her head against Janet's shoulder and began singing a song in the Nepali dialect, a tune that we all instantly recognized: 'Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so for the Bible tells me so."

The physical therapist told Yancy, "Danmaya is one of our most devoted church members," "Most of our patients are Hindus, but we have a little Christian chapel here, and Danmaya comes every time the door opens. She's a prayer warrior. She loves to greet and welcome every visitor who comes to the hospital."

A few months later Yancey heard that Damaya had died. He said, "Close to my desk I keep a photo that I snapped just as she was singing to Janet. Whenever I feel polluted by this beautyobsessed celebrity culture I live in-a culture in which people pay exorbitant sums to shorten their

noses or plump up their breast to achieve some impossible of beauty while nine thousand people die daily from AIDS from lack of treatment and leprosarium's scrape by on charity crumbs—I pull out that photo. I see two beautiful women: my wife, smiling sweetly, wearing a brightly colored Nepali outfit she had bought the day before, holding in her arms an old crone who would flunk any beauty test ever except the one that matters most. Out of that deformed, hollow shell of a body, the light of God's presence shines out. The Holy Spirit found a home."

In 2022 God wants to make himself fully at home in your life. He wants to finish the construction. He may want to put in some windows so that the light of his love and grace can shine through. He may want to clean up the library so that you will be able to spend some quality time, studying his word and other helpful books that will enrich your soul. He may want to build a prayer closet so you can get alone with Him and pray with a broken, repentant heart.

Somewhere in Kentucky, in a cornfield, a gold strike happened (sort-of). Over 800 gold coins were found by a metal detectorist.

The treasure included 741 gold \$1 coins dated 1850 to 1862; the finest known 1863 \$20 gold double eagle; a small quantity of \$10 gold eagles and Seated Liberty silver coins.

Kentucky was neutral during the War of Yankee Aggression. It is believed the coins were hidden during the immense upheaval because of the war.

Last week, the tale of the Dalton gang led up to the

ambitious double bank heist in Coffeyville, Kansas. Coming from their successful train robbery near Adair, Oklahoma, the Dalton gang found themselves riding downtown in Coffeyville on October 5th, 1892, with two banks looming ahead. The gang had decided to split into two groups: Bob and Emmett would hit the First National Bank, and Grat, Broadwell, and Powers would hold up the Condon Bank across the street. The plan had the gang tie their horses up on a familiar hitch post behind the Condon Bank offering them a speedy escape route. However, the city had undergone many changes since their last visit and the hitch post had been removed for more construction. The gang decided to hitch their horses in a nearby alley behind the city jail and proceeded toward the banks.

Now, previous visits to Coffeyville had been uneventful due to the brother's incognito lifestyle, but their recent exploit of the KT train a few months prior – the one that led to \$4,000 bounties on each member's head – had gained the group a vast amount of notoriety. This fame led to locals recognizing a couple of the brothers and members of the gang. As the 5 bandits entered their respective banks, Winchester rifles in hand, dozens of plaza workers and store owners began spreading the news that the Daltons were robbing the bank. The townsfolk quickly gathered their own guns and took up positions around the banks.

Inside, the robberies seemed to be going off without a hitch. In the Condon Bank, Grat Dalton had walked one of the cashiers to the vault and ordered it opened as Powers and Broadwell covered the other occupants and the door. The cashier told Grat that the vault was on a timer and could not be opened for another 10 minutes – a lie, but Grat's greed for the gold inside prompted him to believe the cashier and wait for it to open. Meanwhile, across the street at the First National Bank, Emmet and Bob were busy stuffing gold bars into sacks and began heading toward the exit. Emmet and Bob grabbed a nearby cashier who they planned to use as cover on their way to the meetup. All according to plan.

As Emmet and Bob took their first step out the front door of the First National Bank, a shot rang out. The plaza's businessmen, posted up around the building, quickly got into a fierce firefight with the bandits. The pair left their hostage on the front porch and headed back through the bank hoping to make their getaway through its rear exit. They grabbed two more employees as hostages.

Across the street, Grat and his accomplices heard the shots ring out. Grat decided that the additional weight of the gold was too much and was busy dumping bags when a bullet shot through the glass of the Condon Bank hitting Broadwell in the arm. Scooping what loose cash they could, the trio fled through the back alley.

Things were not faring well for Emmet and Bob who were huddled in the First National Bank. As they burst out of the rear exit, they came face to face with citizen, Lucius Baldwin, who had been watching the door. Bob ordered Lucius to drop the gun, he refused, and Bob shot him with this rifle. Now in the open, a bloody fight began. Bob noticed a pair outside a drug store across from the bank, George Cubine and Charles Brown, they had a rifle aimed at his head. Bob quickly dispatched George and shot Charles as he went for the gun. In all of the hecticness, Bob and Emmett failed to notice that their first hostage, Thomas Ayres (the one they dumped outside the bank when the shooting began), had circled back around the outside of the bank, stopping by a hardware store to grab a rifle. Ayres came around just as Bob executed Charles and took aim. At the last second, Bob saw Ayres and from roughly 200 ft away shot him in the head. Ayres survived but was paralyzed for life. Bob and Emmett had made it to the horses. Bob signaled to Grat and the boys in the Condon bank to hurry out.

The gang met up with sacks full of money, and as they began to unload onto their horses, two town marshals came around the corner. Grat shot and killed the first marshal, but before he could turn on the second, the marshal shot him in the throat. The townsfolk closed in on the bandits, Bob went down in a hail of gunfire from the hardware store, and Powers was shot trying to mount his horse. Broadwell managed to mount his horse, but was quickly hit again and rode off; he was found dead two miles away. Powers fell in a sea of bullets near Grat, leaving only Emmett Dalton alive; he held up his hands in surrender. Emmett was treated for near 20 gunshot wounds and lived. After standing trial and being sentenced to life in prison, Emmett was surprisingly pardoned in 1907.

Now outside of prison, Emmett moved to California and would go on to write about the exploits of the Dalton Gang. The book was instantly popular, and Emmett and his wife returned to Coffeyville and they were treated like celebrities. After his death in 1937, his book was adapted into a western movie When the Dalton's Rode. Many other films about the brothers and their exploits have been made, including the 2020 release of The Dalton Gang.

Following the almost complete wipeout of the Dalton Gang in Coffeyville, Bill Dalton and Bill Doolin (who had been waiting outside the town to backup the robbers as they fled) found themselves riding under the outlaw Henry Starr outside of Kingfisher. When they rose to take over the gang as leaders, they became known as the Wild Bunch and would incur the wrath of U.S. Marshal Evett "E.D." Nix, who would appoint one hundred marshals under his command to bring down the outlaws. Over the next five years, Nix and his marshals would hunt down each member of the Wild Bunch. One of the last members to get taken down, was George "Red Buck" Waightman, who was killed on March 4th, 1896 by a Custer County posse near Arapaho, Oklahoma. Bill Doolin and the marshals would play cat and mouse for a couple more years, but that's a tale for another time.







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
