Extension Director and 4-H Educator Jordan Nel says changes are coming to this year's annual Custer County Free Fair in order to diversify the event lineup.

The Free Fair will be held on September 6-9 from 8 am-9 pm at the Custer County Fairgrounds, located south of Clinton on Highway 183.

Like with any county fair, you can expect to see livestock, art exhibits, a nightly rodeo, and more than enough food to go around. This year, however, will feature a much more diverse scene for entertainment and competition.



One such addition is the Farm Hand Olympics. Teams of three from local 4-H and FFA Chapters in Western Oklahoma will compete in events like Sack Racing, Wheelbarrow Racing, Calf Roping, Water Hauling, and more. The Farm Hand Olympics kick off on September 7 at 6:30 p.m.

There will also be an event to crown an Outstanding FFA and 4-H Chapter. Nel explains this fair-long event, saying that a winning faction will be determined by "a combination of how many showpieces a chapter's members enter throughout the fair." Nel hopes this event will significantly increase fair participation and attendance.



Live entertainment will be provided courtesy of the Adventure Family touring circus show. Since April 2021, the McCandless family has been actively posting their stunt work on Instagram and Facebook, with an emphasis on aerial acts. The family of six will perform on Friday and Saturday.

She decided to stay home and take care of her children for a few years before returning to work at the Morrison Public Schools where she could be close to her children.








Leaving a Legacy



Look at the end from the beginning. This is the major theme of Stephen Covey's work entitled, The Seven habits of Highly Effective People. In this present day of living for the moment, the thrill of a game or a concert, it is hard to convince young people or even those of us who are more mature to take the long look.

Jim Morrison "What is the end result of this action or expenditure?" What will this mean five or even fifty years from now? Will it have any positive effect for things of an eternal nature?

The writer of Hebrews was quick to point out that for a growing Christian, it is necessary to " throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles." (Heb. 12:1a) This is an ongoing action because Satan is continually tempting us with worldly things that offer so much temporary excitement and pleasure.

In the Apostle Peter's second letter to the scattered church he offers guidance to growing Christians. Far too many "converts" see the Christian life as an event rather than a journey of faith. Someone has called it an "initial spasm followed by a chronic inertia."

Becoming a Christian is not intended to just build a crowd at Church, it is rather like joining an army to do battle against an enemy who is out to destroy as many as possible. The Church is a valid marker on the journey, but the real work is done outside the walls of the building.

Peter points out some character qualities that should be the hallmark of every growing Christian. In 1st Peter 1:5-9, he challenges his readers to grow up in the faith. He reminds them that since they have been given "great and precious promises" and that they are now "participants in the divine nature", they should make every effort to add to their faith. He then goes on to list those virtues that they should strive for.

To grow in their faith they were to add "goodness, knowledge, self-control, perseverance, godliness, brotherly kindness, and love. Space does not permit a discussion of each of these virtues, but they were not intended to be optional. It is not that they were to be ascended like a ladder, "one step at a time," but the Christian must see them all as an essential

part of their growth; to be a simultaneous work of progress to be sought after on a regular basis. To be sure it is a cooperative effort with the indwelling Holy Spirit urging us on, making His power available. But Peter says "make every effort." We are to be willing and cooperative partners in the growth process. We must be obedient to do our part. Many would spend heavy cash to attend a concert but not give a thought to attend a missions conference or read a challenging book that might change their life. "Faith is not only commitment to the promises of Christ; faith is also commitment to the demands of Christ." (Barclay)

We are more likely to grow when we are actively ministering to God's people than attending a conference, although both are helpful. Active involvement, risking being thought foolish, doing the impossible; are ways that our faith and trust grows. God works through our availability, even in our weaknesses.

A conscious and careful look at the legacy we want to leave should drive us to make a "make every effort" to add to our faith. There is greater and more lasting joy in obedience than living for the momentary pleasures of this present world.

Lucas: Farm Bill 2023 Payout is Starting Late

District 3 Congressman Frank Lucas says the fifth

year of funding for the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018, colloquially referred to as the "Farm Bill," is running behind schedule.

"We're starting late because, within the Republican conference, we spent about 90 days at the beginning of this session trying to figure out who the (House) Speaker was going to be (...), we spent a couple of months working through the sum of (our state's) budget issues—my very fiscally conservative Republican colleagues focused on how much in cuts they can make everywhere—but we are now underway," explained Lucas. The current Farm Bill provides funding and authorizes key programs addressing various issues for Oklahoma agricultural programs, from 2019 to 2023.

"The good part is that we don't have to rewrite the Farm Bill; We'll be taking the 2018 bill and making improvements, trying to strengthen the safety net,

legislation to create a commemorative threecoin set to celebrate the 250th anniversary of the U.S. Marine Corps in 2025. The bill was introduced on Echryary 17, 2023

Both Congress and the Senate have passed

on February 17, 2023. On July 12, 2023, it was passed by the House and sent to the Senate for

consideration which passed as well.

The U.S. Mint will be tasked with the design and production of Proof and Uncirculated collector coins.

The Mint will strike 50,000 gold \$5 coins, 400,000 silver dollars, and 750,000 clad half-dollars.

ELK CITY / AIRPORT - Elk City Mayor Cory Speiker says the city is getting state dollars to upgrade its Regional Business Airport. While no definitive plans have been made, Spieker believes that a decision will be made by the city council to "move west of our current terminal (across Norman Martin Blvd.) to build a new airport. When it's finished, we will demolish the old terminal and use that apron space to tie more airplanes. (...) We may (also) extend the taxiway into a new hangar for jets." Mayor Speiker says construction could begin as early as next spring.

CUSTER CO / COMMUTE - As road construction around Custer County ramps up, District 2 County Commissioner Bruce Walker says commute times for area residents may increase for travelers on Highway 54, Lyle Road, Airport Road, and Lawter Road, which will begin its reconstruction next month

DRUMMOND/MARIJUANA-Oklahoma Attorney General Gentner Drummond visited Weatherford to discuss illegal marijuana grow operations. Many of these sites are abandoned and overgrown. Describing these as "eyesores for our community," Drummond suggests enacting civil forfeiture. and moving forward with some certainty for the next five years."

Lucas also says that the challenging part will come down to how much money will be available to write the Farm Bill and that he would not be surprised if there were a short-term extension to the bill's current iteration heading into early 2024.

CUSTER CO / DISASTER - Custer County Commissioners approved a Disaster Emergency Proclamation for storm damage sustained July 7th-16th. However, County Emergency Management Director Mike Galloway says the county likely won't qualify for any federal funds. Galloway says the declaration could result in getting state assistance if the necessary threshold of damage is met within 30 days of the incident.

WEATHERFORD / HOMICIDE – Weatherford Police Chief Angela Orefice gives an update on the search for 20-year-old Rodolpho Sotelo, who is wanted on a charge of first-degree murder in connection with the death of 33-year-old Giddel Sotelo on June 25th in Weatherford. The Weatherford Police Department has recruited federal agents and the U.S. Marshall Service to help in the case. Authorities believe the suspect has fled the country to Mexico.

WEATHERFORD / ENROLLMENT - Weatherford Assistant Superintendent Steve Callen says he would not be surprised if the district has an enrollment increase for the coming school year. The Weatherford school district will begin the 2023-24 school year on August 10th.



Helton continued. "Thank you to Dr. Lovell for her leadership and the search committee for their time and effort in the review of an outstanding pool of candidates."

Weiberg has accrued 25 years of coaching experience spanning across the collegiate and high school landscapes. 20 of those years have come at the college level including 12 as a head coach. He had most recently moved on to a new challenge as an athletic director and head basketball coach at Madill High School in southern Oklahoma, his home for the past five years.

"This is an opportunity I have been waiting for," said Weiberg. "I am grateful to Coach Helton and the entire hiring committee for choosing me to lead the Bulldog Basketball Program. Southwestern Oklahoma State is an elite university and truly a special place.

"SWOSU Men's Basketball has a rich tradition and I look forward to embracing that tradition and connecting with former Bulldogs from all across the country. We'll compete at a championship level and I'm eager to start the process. My family and I are He led the Griffons for five seasons from 2013-2018, qualifying for the postseason in four of those campaigns while having the program synonymous with community involvement and community service. During the 2016 postseason, his team snapped a six-year program drought by collecting a postseason win and advancing to the quarterfinals of the MIAA Tournament.

Weiberg began his head coaching tenure in 2006 with seven seasons at Northern Oklahoma College in Tonkawa after spending the previous five years as an assistant under his father, Mick Weiberg, who is a now a member of the Oklahoma Basketball Association Hall of Fame.

In seven years at the helm of the program, he posted a 129-87 (.597) record and had 10 players earn All-Conference accolades. His final year at NOC culminated with a 27-4 record, an Oklahoma Collegiate Athletic Conference (OCAC) Championship, and a national junior college ranking.

His coaching career originated in 1998 immediately following a successful four-year career as a student-athlete.

Weiberg spent single seasons as an assistant at Blinn College, Wayland Baptist, and finally the University of Texas at San Antonio before joining forces with his father at NOC-Tonkawa.

During his playing days, he was a First Team All-Conference and All-Region selection at NOC-Tonkawa in junior college before transferring to Division I Sam Houston State to finish out his career. Weiberg was a team captain at both schools he played for and a two-time Southland Academic All-Conference winner while at SHSU.

Oklahoma Voters Are Asked to Confirm Registration Address

Misha Mohr OK State Election Board Voters who have received an Address Confirmation Notice in the mail from the State Election Board are

asked to respond as soon as possible to avoid having their registration become "inactive." Notices were sent to some voters as part of the voter list maintenance process required by both state and federal law.

According to State Election Board Secretary Paul Ziriax (pronounced ZEER-icks), Address Confirmation Notices are just one part of the voter list maintenance process. "The State Election Board relies on multiple sources to keep its voter rolls accurate, but the address confirmation process allows us to contact and receive updated information directly from the voter. Confirming your address helps ensure you are ready to vote when the next election comes around," Ziriax said.

There are two ways to respond – online using the OK Voter Portal or by completing the Address Confirmation Notice return card and returning it by mail. Voters who don't respond within 60 days will be designated as "inactive," and are required by law to be removed from the voter rolls after the 2026 General Election. However, "inactive" voters can reverse their status and avoid removal by updating their voter registration or by voting in an election on or before the 2026 General Election.

State law requires Address Confirmation Notices be sent to some voters, such as those that have had a first-class mailing returned as "undeliverable," those with a possible duplicate registration in Oklahoma or another state, or those that have not updated their registration or voted since the second previous general election.

Voters who did not receive a notice, but need to update their registration can do so using the OK Voter Portal or by completing a new Voter Registration Application and submitting it to their County Election Board. A directory of county election boards is available on the State Election Board website.
