#### Oklahoma's Oldest Free Fair Returns to Hydro on August 17

Grab your friends and family and get ready for a great time as The Hydro Free Fair, Oklahoma's longest running free fair, is scheduled to return to the Hydro Fairgrounds August 17, 18 and 19th for the 116th time.

The Hydro Free Fair began in 1907 when "started up on Main Street as a mule show and then it moved down to the park," said Charlie Wieland, Hydro Free Fair President. The fair has only been canceled once since WWII during the COVID pandemic in 2020.

The Hydro Free Fair which features a mix of livestock shows, community exhibitions, as well as fair entertainment is most certainly highly regarded in Western Oklahoma for it's iconic fair rides and games which the fair has independently owned and operated since the 1960's. "Now in 1960, they got tired of messing with carnivals coming into town, so they began collecting their own rides. They've been owning and operating their own rides since 1963," said Wieland. Names such as the Green Machine and the Octopus hold a special place in many Western Oklahomans' hearts, but the recently renovated carousel has also helped cement the legacy of the fair as a Western Oklahoma classic and brought enthusiasts from all over the country.

This year the fun starts Thursday, August 17th at 7:30am as the livestock judging books open with the other community building competition registrations beginning at 8am. Registration for the community building exhibitions end at 5pm and livestock entries are due by 6pm. The Opening Ceremony for the Free Fair begins at 6:30pm with the rides and midway opening at 7pm and the free entertainment program beginning at 7:30pm with local entertainment featuring Blue Grass and Gospel music.







Is our culture becoming Biblically illiterate? Most observers would say so. While we may have a general knowledge of well-known Bible stories, we are often confused about the major themes of Scripture and the significance of its major figure, Jesus Christ.

If you asked the questions "who is Jesus, why did he come, and is he coming back," you might be surprised at the answers. Christmas has been relegated to a consumer and party time in secular circles, with little attention given to the miracle of the incarnation—God coming in human flesh. We prefer to leave Him in a manger so he won't disturb us or make demands on our plans or pleasures.

We tend to customize Jesus to fit him into our culture and lifestyle. We forget that "he rescued us from the dominion of darkness." He said "I am come that you might have life and to have it to the full" (John 10:10)

The cross was not just to set us free from sin's captivity but to give us an abundant life with constant fellowship with God through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. He said, "Come to me all you who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest." (Matt.11:28) He told us to "cast all our anxieties on him because he cares for us." (I Peter 5:7) But the cross is not without its demands and challenges. He told us that in this world we will have tribulation; that following him will likely involve persecution. He warned his disciples that if they wanted to follow him they must be prepared to die to themselves, take up their cross and follow him.

To follow Christ is not just to stop doing bad things and start doing good. It is not just about changing our behavior; it is more about reorienting and centering the entire heart and life for God. (Keller)

Timothy Keller in his book, The Reason for God said, "...if you don't live for Jesus you will live for something else.

If you live for career and you don't do well it may punish you all of your life, and you will feel like a failure. If you live for your children and they don't turn out all right you could be absolutely in torment because you feel worthless as a person. If Jesus is the center and Lord and you fail him, he will forgive you. Your career can't die for your sins. Jesus is the one Lord you can live for who died for you."

And yes, He is coming back. He told his disciples the day before he died, "Do not let your heart be troubled. Trust in God; trust also in me. In my Father's house are many rooms; if it were not so, I would have told you. I am going there to prepare a place for you, and if go and prepare a place for you I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am."(John 14:1-4).



**CLINTON / FIRE -** A Clinton home suffered fire and smoke damage following a structure fire in the 1300 block of Goldston. **CORDELL / GRANT -** The City of Cordell has received a \$25,000 matching grant from the Midwestern Oklahoma Development Authority for "beautification." According to Mayor Phil Kliewer, Kliewer believes that costs may end up reaching over \$100,000, commenting that "there's a lot to do. [Our downtown] looks tired and worn out." #### GAC Releases Pre-Season Polls for SWOSU, Volleyball Team Nabs Third Place by League

SWOSU Volleyball was picked to finish third in the

annual Great American Conference Preseason Coaches Poll. The results of the poll, voted on by the league's head coaches, were announced Thursday afternoon by the GAC office.

Harding, last year's regular season and conference tournament champion, was the resounding favorite with nine first-place votes. Oklahoma Baptist was next, earning two top nods, followed by the Bulldogs nearby in third. The latest 2023 preseason pick matches the 2022 finish. #### Oklahoma History: The Rise and Fall of Dugout Shelters in Oklahoma

When picturing the first **Chase Wright** homes and settlers in the

west, one might conjure images of farm homes, barns, and cabins - sturdy staples of life on the plains and in the wild.

However, if you were to travel through Oklahoma and the like back then, you would not see ranchstyle buildings scattered throughout. You may not see much at all that would have you believe people were living out there. But direct your eye down to the soil and you may begin to notice seemingly out of place materials: wooden poles and logs poking out of the ground and small roofs jutting out of hills - Dugouts.

These homes, cleverly named, were truly dug out of the ground with rooftops supported by a series of logs or poles.

Rectangular in shape with a "front" comprised of sod and wood, these homes were affordable and easy to construct in the Great Plains where the availability of forests and trees was scarce. They could also be dug out quickly which led them to be the first choice of many settlers as they struck their land claims.

Dugouts are the unsung homes of the past. They could be found on the eastern part of the U.S., in the Salt Plains of Utah, and, for Oklahoma, in the central and western sections of the state. Not only were they affordable, they were practical and safe. They protected their occupants from the blistering wind in the winter, from tornadoes in the spring, and with walls of cool soil, from the heat during the summer. They were so effective as an early home that, according to the Oklahoma Historical Society,

"in numerous instances, dugout schools and dugout churches were also built".

What made Dugout homes so useful to combat the elements also contributed to their status as 'temporary' homes. The lack of ventilation kept them warm in the winter but oppressive for long periods.

There was also a problem with flooding, insects, lighting, and the feeling of living like an animal in a hole in the ground. There was a sort of expectation to live in a crafted frame home, and with access to better materials with trade routes, their popularity began to decline.

For Oklahoma, few were made going into the start of the 1900s, and those that were had their status as a primary home replaced by the title of cellar or storm shelter.










# Dr. Ed Klein is Named SWOSU Dean of the College of Education and Behavioral Sciences

Dr. Klein has a bachelor's and master's degree from SWOSU and a doctorate from Concordia University in Illinois.


Dr. Klein has been serving as chair for the Department of Education since 2014. He was director of the department's Education Administration program from 2014 to 2016.


