# **Spend Time With Us:** The Loneliness of Long-Term Care Facilities

When asked the question what could be done to address loneliness many residents and consumers stated simply "spend time with us."

In Western Oklahoma, we currently have 24 longterm care facilities full of people who would love to spend a little time with you. Even if you don't have friends or relatives in these facilities but you have some time to spare, a visit would be great for you and for them! Do you have hobbies you can share or talents? Residents love to listen to music. Dust off your song books and your ukelele and make a visit to your local long-term care facility today!

Chronic loneliness is associated with multiple adverse medical and mental health conditions. It can increase the risk of developing dementia by nearly 50% in older adults and is a risk factor for deaths from all causes.

Loneliness and isolation are a public health crisis with profound consequences. Twenty five percent of Americans over the age of 65 are socially isolated. Additionally, 43% of Americans over the age of 65 report feeling lonely. This problem can be even worse in a long-term care setting. One study found that more than half of all residents in nursing homes suffer from loneliness. Scientists are emphasizing the need to prioritize social connections to promote both individual health and community wellness outcomes.

Social isolation can be a choice that people make. There are people who choose to be socially isolated and remain content and happy. When it's not a choice it can lead to loneliness and have negative psychosocial and physical effects. It can also lead to neglect and abuse, including for individuals living in long-term care settings.

#### There are three dimensions to loneliness:

#### "Personal loneliness"

- when a person loses a significant other like a spouse, partner, or close friend.

#### "Absence of sympathy group"

- when a person loses a part of the small group that they're used to connecting with regularly, such as a book club, bridge club, or quilting group.

#### "Lack of an active network group"

- when a person loses a large community that offers support through inclusion, like a religious group.

For me it was more like getting to wear new clothes, checking out any cute girls who had moved in, and hoping we had some reinforcements for our

needy baseball team. Next week the doors will open to new experiences—a fresh start, the beginning of a new dream for some. But for many it will only be repeating a cycle of failure, of disappointment, and a reinforcement of feelings that somehow they don't quite measure up.

These are our young people, the treasures of moms and dads, the hope of the future, and the leaders of tomorrow.

We are all involved in a partnership of nurture, of maturation, and hopefully of love. Yes, our taxes help to make the system happen, but far more than that we are involved in the community of raising our children to become responsible adults. We will be there to cheer on the teams, but by our example at those games we are modeling character traits that are not lost on impressionable young minds.

What else can we do? Let's talk about prayer. You knew I would come to that eventually. There are those who develop prayer support groups who meet regularly either in person or by phone to pray for particular schools. Others simply meet with another person as a prayer mate to pray specifically for students or teachers. Again, most things work best if planned intentionally. Think specifically of a particular school or class, picturing in your minds those children and the issues they face. Visually a teacher trying to maintain control, help a slow student, and at the same time trying to challenge the brighter student to strive to achieve his highest potential.

There are forces out there who are working diligently to steal a dream, to destroy a future, and kill ambition.

The family of believers, who above all should be concerned, should be praying for walls of protection against the evils of the world. Too often, I have listened to inmates at the county jail share how they dropped out of school, laying themselves open to the temptations of easy money, and now face a tragic future.

Here are some areas you can pray about. There are strongholds of rebellion against authority.

There are the persistent problems of drugs, alcohol, and peer pressure. Many come from broken and troubled homes. Pray for every home, that the parents will themselves be teachable and involve themselves in the lives of their kids. Pray against the rising tide of sexual immorality.

Pray for teachers and administrators. Ask the Father to give them wisdom as they deal with problem students. Ask that God would grant them the selfdiscipline to be prepared and the ability to train and encourage students. Pray that they will seek patience and wisdom as they deal with parents of students.

Don't pass a school without offering up a prayer that God would bless and guide each life and home involved.

People wanted the dollar to be produced with silver, but the price of silver was

on the rise. The Eisenhower dollars produced from 1971 to 1976 had a copper core encased in nickel.

By 1977, all Eisenhower dollars minted were clad. The dollars minted in silver were too expensive to make. The giant size was not popular with the general populace.

In 1979, a new coin would replace the Eisenhower dollar with a smaller one-dollar coin. Susan B. Anthony (1820-1906) was an impressive suffragette leader, who led the movement for abolition, temperance, equal pay for both men and women, and the rights of labor.

CORDELL/STORM DAMAGE - Weatherford and Clinton were not the only communities affected by tree damage from severe storms over the summer. Cordell Mayor Phil Kliewer says the street department has been busy picking up storm debris. Mayor Kliewer says the debris was transported to the old landfill site.

**CLINTON CC / GRANT -** Clinton City Council recently accepted a grant agreement with the midwestern Oklahoma development authority for a \$25,000 matching grant, says City Manager Robert Johnston. MODA recently approved awarding the grant to Clinton.

HYDRO / RODEO - The Hydro Free Fair will begin on August 17th at the Hydro Fairground. Spokesperson Charlie Wheelen talks about one part of the fair's livestock show, which will include a 3-in-1 event. In this show, three individuals must rope, pen, and mug (forcefully milk) three cattle. All performers are confirmed to be locals who live within a 60-mile radius of Hydro.

WEATHERFORD / VOTER DEADLINE - Friday, August 18th, is the deadline to apply for voter registration to be eligible to vote in the September 12th municipal election in Weatherford. Those who are not registered or need to change their registration may apply by filling out and mailing an Oklahoma Voter Registration Application form in time for it to be postmarked no later than midnight Friday, August 18th. Applications postmarked after that time will be accepted and processed, but not until after September 12th.

WEST OK / SALES TAX - It was an up-and-down month for sales tax collections in the month of June for western Oklahoma municipalities. The City of Weatherford was up just under 4% at 1.103 million dollars. Elk City also had an up month by 3.15% at 1.246 million dollars. The City of Clinton was down by 4.5% collecting just over \$542,000 and the City of Cordell was down 10.5%, collecting more than \$93,000.

BURNS FLAT / FAA - The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) recently awarded the Premium Aerospace Center in Burns Flat a certificate that authorizes the company to approve aircraft to return to service after receiving required maintenance. Spokesperson Jose Gonzalez says the Premium Aerospace Center will hire 450 employees for the Burns Flat-based aerospace business in the next four years. In July 2022, the Premium Aerospace Center signed a 20-year lease for Hangar 233 at Clinton-Sherman Airport. Three months later, the company signed a lease for Hangar 234.

WEATHERFORD / JECH - Senator Darcy Jech was recently a guest speaker at an economic development meeting in Weatherford. Senator Jech says he will conduct three interim studies this fall. Senator Jech says the other two interim studies will deal with common education school insurance and various rules surrounding the Oklahoma Tax Commission.

The Bulldogs have been crowned regular season conference champions in three of the last four years and have won the postseason tournament twice in that same span.


Last season, SWOSU made it a clean sweep of both titles after finishing 7-0-5 and without a loss against a league foe.

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






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# Oklahoma History: Earthquakes and the New Madrid Seismic Zone

Oklahoma is right on the inside edge of a seismic zone, known as the New Madrid Seismic Zone. This zone has produced the "most powerful earthquakes to hit the contiguous United States east of the Rocky Mountains in recorded history" according to the USGS.

Named after a series of earthquakes that hit in 1811-1812, the seismic zone could be the site of an earthquake that would result in "the highest economic losses due to a natural disaster in the U.S." (Federal Emergency Management Agency, 2008).

Beginning on December 16, 1811, a series of earthquakes and seismic aftershocks, measuring between 7.2-8.2 began. Two additional earthquakes with the same level of intensity were felt on January and February of 1812. Right on the Mississippi River line, northeast of Arkansas, the earthquakes were believed to have been felt strongly over an area of 50,000 sq miles and passively felt over an area of 1 million sq miles.


Compared to the famous 1906 San Francisco earthquake, which reached a magnitude of 7.9 and had an moderate degree of feeling over an area of 6,000 sq miles, the earthquakes of 1811-1812 were on a whole new level.

Each earthquake emanated from an epicenter near New Madrid, Missouri, and ultimately in February 1812, the town of New Madrid was destroyed. Researchers believe the series of fault lines centered around New Madrid is part of an ancient geologic feature buried underneath the Mississippi River. These ancient and reactivated faults are believed to be full of igneous rock and magma that has shifted and failed leaving a "scar of weakness" deep below the surface.

Since 1974, the USGS has recorded 4000 earthquakes and has attributed them to the zone. In 2008, estimates were published that believe within the next 50 years, "a repeat of a major earthquake like those that occurred in 1811-1812, which likely had a magnitude between 7.6-8.0 is possible." Other reports have state that an earthquake of 7.7 or higher in that region could cause damage to tens of thousands of structures and infrastructure.









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
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
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# **SWOSU Offering Classes for Elk City Students**

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
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
