## **Elk City Centennial Carousel Temporarily Closes**



A popular Ackley Park attraction in Elk City is closed until further notice. Due to mechanical problems, the Centennial Carousel is out of commission until repairs can be made.

"There are only a handful of people, nationally, who work on carousels," City Manager Tom Ivester explained, "and we're at the mercy of one man's availability,"

The regular repairman who maintains the Centennial Carousel lives in Ohio. According to the Elk City Chamber of Commerce Facebook page, he initially told city officials that it would be a matter of weeks before he could travel to Elk City to work on the carousel. He has since informed city officials that it could be longer. As a result, the city is considering other repair options. Ivester hopes to have the carousel running and available for riders during Christmas in the Park activities.

The Centennial Carousel was first opened to the public in 2001 as a monument to celebrate 100 years since Elk City's founding. It, along with the Choctaw Rocket Express Train and the Old Town Miniature Golf Course, has made it a very popular destination for locals and tourists alike.

The Centennial Carousel also remains popular during the city's annual "Christmas in the Park" festivities and lights display.


He was Honorably discharged in 1973. He returned to Clinton and was able to return to Kellwood and served them 25 years until they closed.

He was an avid football fan and watched Championship Wrestling.


He was preceded in death by his parents, brother Johnny Steffes, by two nephews Mitchell Steffes and Michael Palmer.



## **Oklahoma Human Services Announces New Text Notifications for SNAP, TANF, and Other Benefits**



Oklahoma Human Services is excited to announce new text notifications for customers who receive benefits through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and other assistance programs offered through the agency.

The notifications lauched as of August 18, 2023. these text messages will come from 405-522-1672 or 405-521-1671. This new service will let customers know where they are in the application process for benefits and the next steps they need to take.

Possible process notifications customers could receive via text messages include:


#### Renewal Due Application/Renewal Received Mid-Certification Verification Needed Mid-Certification Verification Received Mid-Certification Renewal Completed Benefit Approval

Customers will receive one text message as they move to each application status and have the choice to "opt out" of the service at any time by texting "We know the majority of our customers use their cell phones to apply for benefits or check the status of their cases, and these text messages will give them a snapshot into what step they are in the process," said Deb Smith, Director of Adult and Family Services. "We're excited for this additional opportunity to meet our customers where they are and increase critical communication about the status of their cases. Our hope is that this feature also allows them to receive information without waiting to talk to a specialist on the phone."

Customers are still able to check the status of their cases online at https://okdhslive.org/ or by calling 405-522-5050. The web option at okdhslive.org/ is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Oklahoma Human Services texts will never ask for personal information, such as social security numbers or bank account numbers. Additionally, the agency will never text or call you to notify you that your card has been "locked" or "placed on hold."

If customers receive a call or text from a number they don't recognize asking for personal information, they should hang up and call 405-522-5050 to ask Oklahoma Human Services to verify the request. Do not to click on any links that may be included in suspicious text messages.





STOP to 405-522-1672 or 405-521-1671. Similarly, customers can choose to opt back in by texting START to the same numbers.

HIGHER GROUND School Days



Sometimes I run across some material in my files that I feel are too significant to just lay there. So today I share a couple of articles from the Christian Counseling Newsletter in their 1993 issue. They are relevant to any era but certainly for today.

"A few years ago, in an address to three-thousand Roman Catholic

lay persons in San Francisco, Pope John Paul 11 gave an insightful challenge that is worth pondering.

"We face a growing secularism that tries to exclude God and religious truth from human affairs," the pontiff began." "We face an insidious relativism that undermines the absolute truth of Christ and the truths of faith, and tempts believers to think of them as merely one set of beliefs or opinions among others."

"We face a materialistic consumerism that offers superficially attractive but empty promises conferring material comfort at the price of inner emptiness."

"We face an alluring hedonism that offers a whole series of pleasures that will never satisfy the human heart. All these attitudes can influence our sense of good and evil at the very moment when social and scientific progress require strong ethical guidance. Once alienated from Christian faith and practice by these and other deceptions, people often commit themselves to passing fads or to bizarre beliefs that are either shallow or fanatical. Christ's message must live in the way you live and in the way you refuse to live."

That address was given over 25 years ago. Little did he know how prophetic his words would be. I wonder what he would say today.

That issue also contained some choice words from David Watson, an Anglican pastor who was suffering terminal cancer. In his diary he published the following words. "Life is not always very funny, and my own situation was far from humorous, but laughter can save us from the early snares of self-pity and self-importance. It can also act as a powerful antidote to disease by turning negatives into positives."

"I found God's word to be a wonderful protection from all dreadful imaginings. Even on a human level the existence of anxieties and fears can accelerate the disease and hinder the healing process. . . As I read or prayed through the Psalms, I was conscious of my tensions unwinding, my fears disappearing, and once again I was aware of the Lord's love surrounding me."

I close with the Apostle Paul's prayer to the churches of his day. "Ephesians 3:16-19 (NLB)

"I pray that from his glorious, unlimited riches he will give you mighty inner strength through his Holy Spirit. And I pray that Christ will be more and more at home in your hearts as you trust in him. May your roots go down deep into the soil of God's marvelous love. And may you experience the love of Christ, though it is so great you will never fully understand it. Then you will be filed with the fullness of life and power that comes from God."



Lori Boyd of Yukon spoke at Lucille's Roadhouse, expressing excitement over directing departments that, as she described them, "don't ever stop." Boyd succeeds Brenda Burgess who will retire effective December 21st.

WEST OK / STORM DAMAGE – Storms, packing high winds and heavy rain, came blowing through western Oklahoma over the span of three nights. Storms on Friday, August 11, left some structural damage through its path in Elk City says Fire Chief Kyle Chervenka. Pictures on the Burns Flat-Dill City school's Facebook page show damage also occurred at their football stadium.

**CLINTON / HOSPITAL -** Officials are working to reopen Clinton Regional Hospital. City Manager Robert Johnston provided an update to the council this week, saying that the city has received the license to reopen the facility. He says everything won't reopen all in one day. It will happen over several days. Additionally, a feasibility study is being considered that would determine the types of service the hospital will provide beyond basic emergency room and inpatient services.

**CUSTER CO / FATALITY -** The Oklahoma Highway Patrol has identified the person killed in a motorcycle/ vehicle accident on Interstate-40, about 5 miles west of Weatherford. OHP says 47-year-old Perry Lee Luna of Hobart died at the scene of the accident when a pickup driven by Jimmy Alamilla of Rockford, Illinois, ran into the back of the motor-cycle. **BECKHAM CO / HERNDON -** An Elk City man is charged in Beckham County District Court with 4thdegree arson. Fifty year-old Jerry Herndon allegedly set fire to a shed in the 500 block of Patton Circle on August 10th.

**BECKHAM / HOWELL** – A Sayre man has been bound over in Beckham County District Court on a charge of an act of terrorism. Fifty-three year-old Michael Scott Howell allegedly sent threatening messages by email to a Sweetwater school official. One of the messages had a link to a news article in reference to the Nashville, Tennessee, school shooting that occurred in late March. School officials felt the email was a threat to Sweetwater schools, staff, and students.

**WEATHERFORD / GRANT -** The Director of Curriculum at Weatherford Public Schools Doug Gunselman says Weatherford recently received the 3rd highest grant in the state from the Oklahoma Aeronautics Commission at \$12,500 for its aviation program. Gunselman says Weatherford has the second biggest aviation program in the state behind Norman. He says the Stafford Air & Space Museum will donate its wind tunnel to the Weatherford Aviation Program.

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
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## **Oklahoma History: The Monumental Rise of the Hydro Free Fair**



#### The Hydro Free Fair has many events, rides,

and games for people of all ages. Beginning in September 1904, the Hydro Free Fair is Oklahoma's oldest community fair. Back then, and known as the "Hydro Harvest Festival," the fair featured exhibits and shows from local farmers and ranchers. A few years later, the official start of the Free Fair began in 1907. The most popular attractions, according to the Hydro Historical Society, were "giant smoke balloons, a greased pole, and shooting matches with neighboring gun clubs participating." At the time, Hydro's agricultural exhibits commonly went on to win first prizes at the state fair.

People came from all over the state by trains to compete in roping contests, livestock shows, and to grab a slice of watermelon, usually provided by local farmers. Community ball games were held in the evenings and an outdoor auditorium was erected for music and entertainment. The Blue Ribbon Bakery dazzled audiences with its tantalizing 270-pound cake, and as time went on and the fair grew, more shows, games, and contests were added. When WWI broke out and the country had other

things on its mind, the fair was canceled. When the war ended, Hydro's Free Fair bounced back in full swing and quickly resumed its exponential growth. By WWII, the fair was bigger than ever and never took a break or looked back.

During the early fair days, live entertainment featured many surprise weddings at the fair. The couples would be kept secret from the crowd and part of the local fun was trying to guess who it could be. Local businesses would present the couple with gifts and good wishes. The first couple to marry at the fair was Claude Bixler and Adella Fields on September 6th, 1935. Adella taught in schools around Hinton, Hydro, Corn, Yukon, Bethany, and Putnam City, and greatly enjoyed helping Claude with his bee and honey exhibits at the fairs.


By 1925, the fair raised enough money to build an exhibit hall, and the fair was moved to the city park. The new change of scenery was a major success, boasting more room and more fun. Following its success, the town constructed pens and sheds for the livestock and a community building for additional programs and exhibits; completed in 1935, the new sanctioned location and amenities bolstered the fair's numbers to become the largest in Caddo county and its neighbors.

In 1955, the Hydro Amusement Company was formed to handle all entertainment aspects of the fair. With this step, the fair was now completely and officially run by Hydro residents – citizens and local businesses built and worked stands, ran food vendors, constructed rides, and hosted games.

With each passing year, the fair brought in more and more visitors, and during the 1980's added the famous Green Machine, Octopus, and various kiddie rides. Concessions and token games were added, and the fair quickly required year-round attention.

Weeks of planning and hard work go into making sure the 3-day fair is the best it can be. In 1997 with the addition of the Hustler, the fair became the must-stop spot for many Oklahomans as they get ready for the Fall season.

Today, the Hydro Free Fair features prominently on travel guides and destination polls and is one of the biggest and best fairs to attend in Oklahoma. Attendance remains free for all and tickets for the rides/games are available at the fairgrounds.
