# Deer Creek Conservation District Hosting Chicken Workshop

This past summer the City of Weatherford changed their city ordinances to allow permitted residents within city limits to raise chickens and the Deer Creek Conservation District is committed to educating interested residents on how to get properly certified in accordance with the new city ordinance.

The Deer Creek Conservation District will be hosting the Chicken Workshop, led by Wyatt Lohman, Saturday, October 28th from 9am to 11am at their offices located at 300 S. Broadway Street in Weatherford. The workshop will go over the requirements to gain and maintain your city permit as well as other topics such as predator prevention, how to lower feed costs, as well as the many benefits of raising chickens. Refreshments will be provided at the workshop and reigistration is not be required to attend.

Lohman is enthusiastic about the new ordinance and the multitude of benefits raising chickens can do for the environment as well as residents pocketbooks.

During his interview with the WestOk Weekly Lohman referenced the viral story of a homesteading experiment in the Province of Limburg, Belgium. The Province of Limburg offered 2000 families three chickens for each family and the effort helped reduce tons of food waste from entering landfills.

"In one month, 200,000 pounds of food waste that people would put on the dumpster and then put on a city truck and haul it to a dump site. Yeah, it was actually converted into eggs," said Lohman. "So chickens are just awesome."

Lohman's excitement is most definitely merited as chickens can offer a sustainable way to manage food waste, potentially limiting fuel costs for waste services around the city, while also providing a staple food for family's diets.

In order to receive a permit to raise chickens within Weatherford City limits, a resident must prove they've attended a 2 hour educational course regarding chickens, that they live in an area not under the management of a Home Owners Association, and then they must pay a \$25 fee. The Chicken Workshop will count towards the 2 hour education mandate required to obtain proper permitting.

# Oklahoma History: Our Legacy in the World of Softball

China vs USA (1996) - Nearly 9,000 fans filled the Columbus' Golden Park Stadium in 1996 to witness the Olympic Softball final, one of the most historic softball games of all times.

day when resolutions are set and dreams of the new year are at their highest. It also happens to be the day when Oklahoma and Softball became inseparable. On January 1st, 1966, the Amateur Softball Association moved its headquarters from Newark, NJ to OKC, OK.

Part of the decision to move likely came from the desire to get softball included as an Olympic sport in the early '60s. Shortly after the move, softball teams, who had been pushing for Olympic inclusion, began to promote new events, encourage new players, and compete in nationwide and international games.

However, despite the sport reaching its Olympic

January 1st is always requirement in 1965, Olympic organisers did not include softball in the Olympics until 1996. Although, by this time, the USA Softball Hall of Fame Complex (built in 1987) had been raking in publicity and fans from around the world.

The Complex had been hosting worldwide games and is regarded as one of the finest softball facilities in the nation.

Softball was an Olympic sport from 1996 to 2008, and during this time, its popularity skyrocketed. Team USA dominated during these 4 Olympic periods with 3 Gold Medals and 1 Silver Medal. In the 1996 season, the United States won gold with only one loss due to a base error which resulted in a run not scoring (they lost by one run).

American Hall of Famer Lori Hannigan pitched

the first solo no-hitter at the Olympics in a game against Canada in the Summer Olympics of 2000. The 2000 season ignited USA's dominance of the summer league. They would go on to a 22-game winning streak at the Olympics between 2000 and 2008. Their only loss came from Japan in the gold

Things looked promising for softball and the Olympics until the decision to drop baseball and softball for the 2012 Olympic program "failed to be overturned by a 52-52 vote with one abstention" (ESPN). It seemed to be the end for international competition as countries began reducing their budgets for the sport following the announcement.

Even though worldwide competition was beginning to see a rocky future, the collegiate and national future for softball was on the rise.

The OKC Complex began hosting the NCAA Women's College World Series, the World Cup, the Slow Pitch Championship Series, and the 18U Gold National Championship.

A Softball Hall of Fame museum was established to honor many of the great athletes that helped drive the sport. By the mid-2000s, The 5-star facility and museum were booking 150,000 fans and had events slated for up to 30 weekends a year.

Then, in 2016, the International Olympic Commission voted to include baseball and softball in the 2020 Summer Olympics. At the Olympics, the US team won a silver medal, with Japan winning Gold and Canada placing silver.

Today, the USAS (USA Softball) organization fields over 120,000 teams and over 1 million members! So, the next time you get a chance to visit the USA Softball Hall of Fame Complex, don't hesitate. 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
















# HIGHER GROUND

WESTERN OK / SALES TAX – It was another good month for sales tax in the city of Weatherford Director Yolanda Creswell. The City of Weatherford collected \$1.185 million for August sales. Other sales tax figures in western Oklahoma found the City of Clinton up by 2.3% with a collection of more than \$543,000. Elk City was up 2.6% at more than \$1.27 million and the city of Cordell had a 12% drop, collecting just over \$94,000.

CLINTON/ FD DRONE - The Clinton Fire Department has a new drone that assists the department in various ways. "We received a lot of phone calls for our drone to be launched, whether it's for the status of our water tower or to help the schools out with some different pictures and stuff," says Fire Chief Brett Russell. "The Soccer State Championship Ring has a picture from our drone that we went and flew up for them." Chief Russell mentioned that every operator of the drone in the department must be licensed through the FAA.

BADGETT / VIRAL EXPOSURES - A Weatherford physician says to take proper precautions as we move into the winter months that brings about more viral exposures. Dr. Blake Badgett provides tips for preparing for those winter months, saying that following the basics of good health--wash your hands, cover your coughs, eat healthy, and excercise regularly--can go a long way. Badgett also says it's a good idea for those over 50 and with underlying health conditions to get both the

COVID and influenza vaccines.

OKC SUICIDE / TRONCOSO - A Clinton man who was involved in a standoff in Oklahoma City and died by suicide has been identified by investigators. for August sales says Economic Development Police say 61-year-old Ivan Troncoso was the man who barricaded himself inside a motel near South Meridian Avenue and Interstate 40. Before Troncoso took his life, officers were able to talk to him, and Troncoso told them he was not going back to jail. Police say it all started as a pursuit Saturday and that Troncoso had a felony warrant out of Custer County for unauthorized use of a vehicle. Early Monday, officers spotted the suspect's car again at a hotel on Meridian, and this time officers spoke with the suspect, who took his own life after a standoff that lasted several hours.

HINTON / BOND - A \$32.3 million bond will be on the ballot next month for voters in the Hinton School District. Superintendent Marci Derryberry says one project includes upgrades to the multi-purpose building. Derryberry says that some of the other projects in the district will include the construction of a fieldhouse with a wrestling room and adding safe rooms that will serve as classrooms at the middle school. Derryberry says the bond's passage will not result in a tax increase for property owners. Election day for the proposed bond is November 14th.

FOSS LAKE / HALLOWEEN - Park Manager Barry Hardaway says Foss Lake State Park is gearing up for Halloween this month. "Halloween in the Park" will be held on October 20th and feature a campsite decorating contest. The Haunted Trail and parkwide Trick-or-Treating will open at dusk on October 21st.

After a surgical oncology position in his hometown of Fort Worth came to a natural end, he looked for his next steps. After being introduced to GPRMC he knew this was his next move.

"I liked the pace, I liked the folks that worked here, and looking around, I thought there was certainly a need for someone that had some expertise and some ability to take care of things," said Dr. in spades.

Dr. Lesslie, whose responsibilities at GPRMC run the gamut from general surgical procedures like gallbladder surgery and appendectomies to more complex oncological surgeries, always considers what will best serve his patients on a case-bycase basis and whether they'll be best served at GPRMC's facilities, but Dr. Lesslie assured me that he can perform the same complex procedures at GPRMC that he performed at other facilities such as the Texas Medical Center. After, the team goes through the medical records of







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# **Bulldogs Overcome in Fourth Quarter**

battled in a one-possession game throughout, but the Bison outscored the Bulldogs 10-0 in the fourth quarter and went on to win the afternoon contest 20-13.

The Bulldogs led 13-10 heading into the fourth after a go-ahead field goal in the closing minutes of the third quarter. It's the second straight week a fourth quarter lead could not get cashed in for a win.

SWOSU tallied 229 yards of offense through three quarters in a solid showing but gained just 12 yards in the fourth quarter which squandered any chances of pulling out the victory.

The go-ahead third quarter kick came from Brandon McCary - his second made field goal of the day.

He entered Saturday with just one field goal attempt on the year and finished 2-for-2 from 34 and 29 yards out. He also put the first points up on the scoreboard from either team with his first-quarter

After the lead changed hands, OBU regained it on their ensuing drive. A back-breaking third down touchdown pass of 61 yards had the Bison back on top 17-13 with 14:03 left in the game.

SWOSU had just scored on back-to-back drives and had OBU on third and long but could not get the necessary stop to avoid points.

OBU added a field goal with under a minute to play for insurance.

SWOSU's lone touchdown came on the third quarter drive just before McCary's second field goal. At the time, it tied things up at 10-10.

The Bulldogs went on an eight-play, 64-yard drive that was capped off by a Dexter Brown touchdown run on the goal line.

SWOSU got chunk yardage on a trio of plays to move the ball down the field after Brown began things with a 17-yard run, followed later by backto-back catches later on from Elijah Reed and Zion Mercer for 37 yards combined.

The Bulldogs trailed 10-3 at halftime. After the Bisons notched 198 yards of offense in the first half, the Bulldogs defense limited the visitors to just 107 in the second half in what was another solid showing.

Final numbers showed SWOSU with 241 yards of offense, compared to OBU's 305. It's SWOSU's second highest offensive output of the season.


On defense, Freddie Mango led all tacklers with 12. RJ Powell, the Reigning GAC Defender of the Week, came away with 3.5 tackles for loss and finished with eight tackles. Richard Silva had one sack, two tackles for loss, and seven total tackles.

Quarterback Sean Shelby finished 9-of-25 for 166 yards and fumbled once after being sacked late in the fourth quarter. Shelby also ran 16 times for 52 yards, but six sacks in the passing game deflated his final mark.

Dexter Brown rushed 11 times for 52 yards and his score.

Taylor Tosches led the receiving core with four catches for 100 yards – his first 100-yard game as a Bulldog.

The Bulldogs remain winless at 0-7 for this year's football season and will face Southeastern at 2:00 pm in Durant next Saturday.




