

She is preceded in death by her parents, and husband, and grandson, Daniel.



She is also survived by two brothers, Willaims Chester "Blackie" Charles and Lester "Red" Charles.







WOCS is a non-denominational Christian school, founded in 1987. Initially holding classes in Bessie, two years later it moved to the current location in Clinton. The Weatherford campus was added in 2007 and the Elk City Campus in 2011. WOCS provides Bible-based academic instruction for students, beginning with pre-kindergarten and continuing through sixth grade. The school offers computer, art, music, physical education, and Bible classes in addition to the standard curriculum. WOCS is accredited through the Association of Christian Schools International (ACSI) and the State of Oklahoma.

Superintendent Tyler Bridges says the district has good news surrounding bid packages for constructing a new middle school. Bridges says the groundbreaking is planned for mid-November.

CUSTER CO / LAWTER RD - The Lawter Road widening project near Weatherford has officially begun, according to Custer County District Commissioner Bruce Walker. Walker says it's about a 270-300 day project.

CUSTER CO / ILLEGAL DUMPING – Illegal dumping has become a concern around Custer County. Sheriff Dan Day recently spoke about the negatives from the county's perspective when residents illegally dump, mentioning that illegally dumped materials also become a fire hazard.

BURNS FLAT / PREMIUM AEROSPACE - The Premium Aerospace Center (PAC) in Burns Flat and Western Technology Center (WTC) are partnering to offer an aviation maintenance course. PAC and WTC are providing a general familiarization aviation course for new industry employees that will last through October 31st. PAC will provide the students with the equipment, tooling, materials, and aircraft required for the hands-on training of the course. Meanwhile, WTC is providing the facility, technology, and support for course delivery. The course gives students exposure to real-world commercial aviation aircraft and their required maintenance.

CLINTON SB / MS BIDS - Clinton Schools WEATHERFORD PD / BUILDING - Weatherford Economic Development Director Yolanda Creswell says the new building that will house the Weatherford Police Department and 911 center is about 90-95% complete. Creswell says once the department moves into the new building, a ribbon cutting will be held at a date and time yet to be determined.

> TFC / BUS BARN – Thomas-Fay-Custer Schools Superintendent Rob Friesen says the district is currently taking bids to build a bus barn. Additionally, Superintendent Friesen says district enrollment is down about 10 students from last year, with about 455 students districtwide.

> **CLINTON / GLANCY PROPERTY - Clinton** Mayor David Berrong says city officials are hoping for some quick movement surrounding the state of Oklahoma to utilize the Glancy Property for a new law enforcement center that will house the Oklahoma Highway Patrol. Mayor Berrong says the Glancy sign from the property will be retained.

> CLINTON / KOONS - Former Clinton Football Coach, now Ringling head coach Phil Koons has been charged in Jefferson County District Court on a misdemeanor charge of outraging public decency after a lengthy investigation. Koons is accused of injuring public morals by using profane, degrading, and derogatory language towards student-athletes under his supervision.

Oklahoma has had no shortage of world changing people in its history. People who have shaped different aspects of life from media, entertainment, aviation, law, pioneering, business, and sports. People like Will Rogers, Wiley Post, Thomas Stafford, Troy Aikman, Boone Pickens, and Sam Walton. Folks whose impact on life was great and widely recognized during their time. But this game-changer never got to truly experience their success. Passing penniless and with their achievements stripped away, James Francis Thorpe (Jim Thorpe) has quite the story to tell.

Jim Thorpe, now an American hero, was a professional baseball, football, and basketball player who had won two Olympic gold medals at the 1912 Summer Olympics in Stockholm. He was the first Native American to win a Gold medal for the United States. Thorpe was stripped of his Olympic titles in 1913 after months of controversy regarding his status as a competitor. At the time, Olympic games were strictly for amateurs only. Any competitor that had played for money, professionally taught, or had competed against other pros were not allowed to compete. Early in 1913, a story was released announcing Thorpe had indeed played professional baseball prior to his Olympic debut. After months of deliberation, the Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) withdrew his amateur status and the International Olympic Committee (IOC) "unanimously decided to strip Thorpe of his Olympic titles, medals and awards and declared him a professional."

Major public backlash rang out over the decision for a few reasons. First, the AAU and IOC did not follow their own rules for disqualification. The 1912 Olympic rulebook stated that any protest to the results would need to be made within 30 days of closing ceremonies. The initial report against Thorpe was not released until January 1913, nearly six months after the games concluded. Second, Thorpe was not the first Olympian to compete in paid sports. Many of the recent Olympic athletes had competed in paid sports before. However, they all used pseudonyms whereas Thorpe competed under his real name. Athletes competing under false names were well-known and overlooked until Thorpe. Lastly, Thorpe was Native American, and in a time where most Native Americans were denied citizenship and accomplishments were disregarded because they were made by an "Indian". Although race was not officially designated as a reason for his medals to be stripped, public opinion over why the IOC fought so hard against him was not convinced otherwise. For example, one of Thorpe's first articles in The New York Times headlined with "Redskin from Carlisle Will Strive for Place on American Team".

After he was stripped of his medals, Thorpe began playing baseball for the New York Giants. They would end their 1913 season as repeat National League champions. During his time with the Giants, Thorpe's fame grew as his presence increased ticket sales and publicity. Thorpe even got to meet Pope Pius X and got to play in London for King George V. But he did not stop there.

Also in 1913, he joined an Indian-based professional football team where he had several winning seasons. Then, he signed with the Canton Bulldogs in 1915 and brought their 1,200-fan average to 8,000 for his debut game. They won titles in 1916, '17, and '19. In 1920, the Bulldogs joined with 13 other teams to form the American Professional Football Association. The association would go on to become the National Football League (NFL) two years later. Thorpe was the first president of the APFA.

Thorpe retired from professional sports when he was 41 and spent a lot of his time working small jobs and visiting his hometown roots of Oklahoma. Thorpe was a member of the Sac and Fox Nation and helped coach/develop multiple all-Native American sport teams. He set records in each sport he played, including his Gold medal performance in the decathlon (which stood for 2 decades). Thorpe won the hearts of anyone who watched him compete, and in a speech in 1961 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower, the President, who had played against Jim in college, stated "he could do anything better than any other football player I ever saw."

Thorpe's physical prowess was unmatched, but despite his success, his demeanor and personality always remained humble and reserved. While he lived out the rest of his life, multiple articles and petitions were pushed to get his medals reinstated. For 30 years, they were declined until the IOC declared they would approve his reinstatement. On January 18, 1983, posthumously, they presented two of his children with commemorative medals. His original medals were stored in a museum and had previously been stolen (they were never recovered). The IOC listed Thorpe as a co-gold medalist with Ferdinand Bie and Hugo Wieslander. However, the two athletes had both previously deferred the honor to Thorpe citing him as "the real champion". Additionally, in a poll by ABC sports in 2000, Thorpe was voted Greatest Athlete of the Twentieth Century out of a roster including Muhammad Ali, Michael Jordan, Babe Ruth, and others.

In July 2020, a petition by the team making a film about Thorpe was released to get the IOC to reinstate Thorpe as the sole winner. A move that has been supported by other athletes including Olympian Billy Mills [The Oklahoman]. Officially, on July 15th, 2022, the International Olympic Committee fully restored Jim Thorpe as the sole winner in the 1912 decathlon and pentathlon events.

To echo the wise words of King Gustav V of Sweden, who presented Jim Thorpe with his original gold medals in the July 1912 Olympics, "You sir, are the greatest athlete in the world".


Elvira Gunnarsson (soccer) and Braylee

Bulldogs Fall to Southeastern in Durant



SWOSU Football dropped a 32-13 road affair with Southeastern Oklahoma State on Saturday afternoon.

SWOSU's first score came in the second quarter on an 85-yard rush from Dexter Brown, representing the second longest run from scrimmage in the program's Division II history dating back to 1997. (record is 93 yards set in 2015 by Kenneth Martey)

Brown finished with 91 yards on seven touches. He's now scored in back-to-back games.

Prior to Brown's house call, Southeastern led 17-0. The Savage Storm led 23-7 at halftime and added a touchdown and a field goal in the second half to extend the lead. The final score displayed awkwardly after Southeastern could not convert on a pair of extra-point kicks, and SWOSU tried and failed on a two-point conversion late in the game.

Trailing 32-7 late in the fourth quarter, Diondre Scott intercepted a pass in Southeastern territory and returned it 23 yards back inside the red zone. Shortly thereafter, Calvin Cloud connected on a 16-yard touchdown pass to Zion Mercer which concluded the game's scoring.

Cloud replaced Sean Shelby for the final two drives of the game at quarterback. The defense grabbed two interceptions on the day.

The other came from Donovan Jemerson just before halftime to deter a Southeastern scoring threat. Scott and Jemerson become the fifth and sixth Bulldogs to record an INT this season.

Similar to last week's Oklahoma Baptist performance, the defense put the clamps down in the second half after allowing just nine points and holding Southeastern to 140 yards of total offense. It came in response to a first half which saw the Savage Storm put up 23 points and 269 yards of offense.

RJ Powell led the defense with 10 tackles and one of those for loss. Richard Silva had two tackles for loss and six overall. Final offensive numbers showed SWOSU with 286 yards – a season high – compared to 409 from Southeastern.

Despite SWOSU's two interceptions, they did not win the turnover battle after Shelby was picked off on backto-back drives in the second half.

The Bulldogs will remain away from Weatherford next Saturday when they travel to face Southern Arkansas, who has been receiving votes in the national poll. Kickoff will come at 2pm in Magnolia, Arkansas for that one. SWOSU's final home, and senior day, game will come November 4 against Henderson State.
