



Larry fully enjoyed his work, as well as spending time with family and friends.







"The Insanity of GOD" by Nik Ripkin

1. Pray that their faith will remain firm.

- 2. Pray that those left behind will have their physical, emotional, and spiritual needs met.
- **3.** Pray for emotional and physical healing from the trauma and wounds of torture. Pray for the release of those held without cause.
- **4.** Pray that they will be courageously bold witnesses
- to those holding them captive.
- 5. Pray for the salvation of guards and officials bringing the persecution.
- **6.** Pray for greater freedom for those exercising their rights to religious freedom.
- 7. Do not necessarily pray for the persecution to cease. In most cases that would indicate that they had stopped sharing their faith.



Ripkin was speaking to a group of house church leaders in a remote area of China. One local pastor asked, "Do the people in other countries also know about Jesus—or is He only known in

Ripkin told them that millions of people all around the world knew about Jesus and about the Chinese

Christians as well.

The people were astounded, "Wait, wait!" they could hardly believe what they heard. One man responded this way, "Do you mean that people in your country know that we believe in Jesus? Do you mean that they know that we are suffering for our faith? Do you mean they haven't forgotten us and that they are praying for us?' Another young woman asked. "Are believers in other countries persecuted like we are?"

Ripkin told them about the experience of believers in two very oppressive Islamic countries. The crowd became strangely quiet. A few minutes before they had been clapping and shouting and asking questions.

Now they were completely silent and still. At 6:00 a.m. the next morning, He was awakened by screaming and shouting outside in the compound. His first thought was that the secret police had come. But what he saw was Chinese house-church leaders and evangelists either lying or sitting on the ground, crying, screaming and yelling hysterically. Many were pulling their hair or clutching at their clothes. He spotted his interpreter and rushed over to him asking, "What in the world is going on?" He told me to just be quiet and listen. He actually began to recognize the names of the two countries being repeated again

and again in passionate and anguished prayer. His interpreter, David, turned and looked at him, and with tears streaming down his face said, "They were so moved by what you shared last night about believers who were truly persecuted, that they have vowed before God that they will get up an hour earlier every morning to pray for those Muslim-background believers that you told them about, until Jesus is known throughout their countries.

Ripkin said, "In that instant I could see why the number of Chinese believers had gone from a few hundred thousand to perhaps hundreds of millions."

There will be a reception following the concert for everyone to visit with Susan and take pictures.



CORRECTION - 11/18 RECYCLE - Last week, the WestOK Weekly covered the Weatherford Environment Group's November 18 recycling event. The Weatherford Environment Group would like to emphasize to our readers that the event's paper shredding services will cost a \$5 donation.

WASHITA CO / FATALITY – One person is dead after a collision between a vehicle and a pedestrian on East 1160 Rd, approximately a tenth of a mile south of Burns Flat in Washita County. A vehicle driven by 57-year-old Rhonda Ferrell of Oklahoma City struck 44-year-old Jeffrey George of Kingston. He was pronounced dead at the scene. OHP says the collision is still under investigation.

CLINTON/HOSPITAL-A resolution was approved by Custer County Commissioners to use up to \$45,000 of ARPA funds for a project at the recently reopened Clinton Regional Hospital. Commissioners also approved ARPA funds to replace water fountains inside the Custer County Courthouse.

WEST OK / SALES TAX - The latest sales tax numbers for September sales show increases in Weatherford, Clinton, and Elk City. Weatherford had a nearly 8% sales tax hike in receipts, collecting just over \$1.094 million dollars. Clinton was up 7.5% at more than \$550,000, and Elk City had a 12% increase, collecting \$1.261 million.

BECKHAM CO / FATALITY - One teen is dead, and another is hospitalized following an ATV accident 1.5 miles north of Erick in Beckham County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says a 12-year-old male from Calumet was treated and released, and a 14-year-old male from Erick died at Great Plains Regional Medical Center in Elk City. The cause of the accident is under investigation.

CLINTON/DEVELOPMENT SALE - Clinton City Council, acting as the industrial authority, ratified a purchase and sale agreement between the Clinton Industrial Authority and 42 LLC. Clinton Economic Development Director Roland Mower says the authority is selling just under 3 acres in the industrial park at a price of \$15,000 an acre.

CLINTON / POLICE LODGE - Clinton City Council ratified the collective bargaining agreement between the City of Clinton and the Fraternal Order of Police Lodge 233 for the 2023-24 fiscal year. City Manager Robert Johnston says the contract is retroactive to July 1st of this year.



Oklahoma History: The Rise of Colonel D. Inez Haynes in WWII

In honor of Veterans Day, we'll take a quick look back at one of the early inductees into Oklahoma's Military Hall of Fame, Colonel Inez Haynes.

Colonel D'Lorz Inez Haynes was born June 3rd, 1909, in Paint Rock, Texas. After graduating, she joined the Army Nurse Corps with active duty in 1933.

During World War II, Haynes served as chief nurse of several general hospitals in Europe and in the Pacific before eventually serving as the director of nursing operations in Occupied Japan.

In 1949, she began a four-year tenure in the Surgeon General's Office. Haynes then went on to serve as the deputy chief of the Army Nurse Corps. In 1955, she served her four-year term as the 10th Chief of the Army Nurse Corps.

Colonel Haynes grew up hearing stories from her family friends about the exploitation of nurses in the military during World War I. This inspired her to lead and develop formal education programs to both improve the capabilities and nursing knowledge of professional and secondary personnel.

When she retired from the Army Nurse Corps on August 31st, 1959, she worked as the General Director and Secretary of the National League for Nursing until 1969.

Once she was satisfied there, she transferred to the University of Texas at the College of Nursing.

One year later, she moved to El Reno, Oklahoma and began serving at Oklahoma University. While there, helped set up funding and grants to eventually found the current School of Nursing at OU.

She passed away on May 29th, 1997 in El Reno, OK and was posthumously inducted into "Who's Who Among Oklahoma Military Men and Women," which is an event sponsored by the Oklahoma Military Hall of Fame. She was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2001.

Colonel Inez Haynes exemplified leadership and a pursuit of knowledge. According to the Oklahoma Historical Society, some of her accolades (and the institutions to award them) include: The Legion of Merit (US Army); The Outstanding Achievement Award (University of Minnesota); The Recognition and Achievement Award (National League of Nursing); and the Honorary Recognition and Achievement Award (Oklahoma Nurses Association).

She was also selected and recognized as a Distinguished Member of the Army Medical Department Regiment in 1986.



2023 SWOSU Football Season Ends in Alva

SWOSU Football had the 2023 season end in

a 41-0 loss to Northwestern on Saturday evening. The Bulldogs finished 1-of-15 on third downs and 0-of-3 on fourth down in the shutout loss. It's the third time this season SWOSU was held without points. Trailing 7-0 in the first quarter, Diondre Scott came away with an interception in the end zone to deter a Ranger score. It was SWOSU's lone turnover of the game.

Northwestern led 13-0 at halftime and used a 21-point third quarter to pull away.

SWOSU threw four interceptions, three in the second half including a pick-six, and totaled just 176 yards on offense.

Meanwhile, the Rangers narrowly missed throwing for a season high with 315 yards through the air. They added 159 yards on the ground for 474 yards of total offense.

Bodie Boydstun and Sean Shelby combined for 19-of-37 passing at quarterback for 145 yards. Both were responsible for two interceptions. Ethane Hyche ran nine times for 52 yards. Taylor Tosches hauled in five passes for 47 yards.

SWOSU Basketball Season Begins at Conference

After falling to Fort Hays State 66-70 on day one of the conference, SWOSU Men's Basketball went toe-to-toe with Emporia State through the game's first half. Sadly, that margin stretched wider in the second half. SWOSU went on to fall 63-83 in the final game of the weekend.

The Dawgs will be back in action a week from today, Saturday, November 18, against Dallas Baptist in Texas. The home opener comes Nov. 21 against Cameron.

The Hornets finished at over 50% shooting from the field in the game and knocked down 10 three-point shots. Three Bulldogs finished in double figures. Mark Berry posted 14 points on 7-for-11 shooting and led the team with seven rebounds.

Meanwhile, while the women had a strong opening game against Washburn 63-58, Pittsburg State took down the Lady Bulldogs 47-67.


The third quarter was where Pittsburg State truly separated from SWOSU. The Lady Dawgs' offense fizzled out and shot just 1-15 (6.7%) in the quarter. The Gorillas extended their lead to 22 by the end of the quarter. SWOSU went on a 15-6 run to start the fourth quarter, but couldn't close the gap enough to have a chance at the end.

SWOSU shot just 15-71 (21.1%) from the field and 5-19 (26.3%) from deep. Pittsburg State shot 24-59 (40.7%) and 5-19 (26.3%) from three. SWOSU was outrebounded 59-34 in the game. Their defense caused 21 turnovers, but they couldn't capitalize on them, as they scored 13 points off of those turnovers.

The ladies will group up back home and host Oklahoma City University at 6 pm on November 14.

SWOSU Women's Basketball currently stand at 1-1 for the 2023-24 season. Meanwhile, the SWOSU men are starting the season winless.
