He was a truck driver by trade, and he recently was driving a truck for a carnival company. He was driving between Oklahoma and Texas.


He enjoyed playing golf, spending time with his children and supporting them in their sporting activities, trying to never miss a game or activity.


Maria was raised and



As Mary and I watched and joined in the laughter as these big adults crumpled to the floor at the command of the child.

It was an event which had little meaning to the

world at large but one that will be etched in my

memory and cherished as one of the joys of family. I couldn't help but think of the contrast I would be seeing in a few weeks. I will be entering the homes of 10 or so families to deliver Christmas gifts to children who have a parent that is incarcerated.

This is part of the Angel Tree program developed by Prison Fellowship. Since I am no longer associated with the jail ministry, I will have fewer families to minister to. This will allow me to take more time and make sure the meaning of Christmas is understood by the whole family.

The gifts are purchased by church members and I get the privilege of delivering them. I recall an occasion a few years ago that still makes me sad. As I delivered the gift and explained that this was from their daddy, a young boy looked up and sed, "Have you seen my daddy?"

I could read into that question the sadness of a little boy who missed his daddy.

The incarcerated parent is given the opportunity to write a brief note to each child. Most all contain the same sentiment of missed relationships and eagerness to be home.

Jesus declared that "the thief (Satan) has come

to steal, kill, and destroy." The Apostle Peter wrote that the nature of Satan is like a "roaring lion seeking whom he may devour." We see that on every hand and more and more in our secular

But we as believers must not rest in our contentment and security of God's love without a Holy discontent of the sin that abounds.

Surely, we are to resist the devil, stand firm in our faith, and be the aroma of Christ in a world that reeks of decay. As the Apostle Paul said; "For the weapons we fight with are not the weapons of the world. On the contrary, they have divine power to demolish strongholds.

We demolish arguments and every pretension that sets itself up against the knowledge of God and we take captive every thought to make it obedient to Christ." (2 Cor. 10:4-5).

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

Oklahoma History: Clinton-Sherman Industrial Air & Spaceport

Port is a public use airport near Burns Flat, Oklahoma, and located about 15 miles southwest of the city of Clinton, also known as the Clinton-Sherman Industrial Airpark. The airport has had a colorful history of uses and, all the while, maintained its status as a premier airstrip for different operations. Today, it continues to serve as a strategic and one-of-akind port and base for testing, licensing, and training in use by branches of the Department of Defense, Boeing, and the Oklahoma Highway Patrol. It is one of the twelve spaceports active in the nation and the only one approved with an FAA-approved spaceflight corridor not in restricted airspace. It also features one of the longest and widest runways at 13,503 feet by 300 feet.

The port was originally established in October of 1943 during WWII as Naval Air Station Clinton and served as a "Strategic Air Command heavy bomber and refueling aircraft base during the Cold War" until December of 1969. During this period, the air station had multiple facilities and strips built, acted as a salvage site, underwent another name change to Clinton-Sherman AFB, and became a site for the Air Force to develop and train specialized air equipment. Before its inactivation in 1969, bombardment squadrons used the site to practice new strategic readiness and training and acted to support operations of the Air Force globally. The main group, the 70th Bombardment Wing, loaned several aircraft, crew, and maintenance personnel during 1968-1969 for combat operations in Asia.

After being labeled as inactive, the base's operation was put under the ownership of the city of Clinton. Later, in 1999, Oklahoma Senate Bill 720 created the Oklahoma Space Industry Development Authority (OSIDA), and shortly after, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) granted a license to them to use the port and designated it as a licensed orbital launch site. The reason: the port has access to "The Infinity One", the longest air strip (152 miles long and 50 miles wide) that is not in restricted

airspace and not in a Military Operations Area (MoA). It is one of only 12 licensed FAA launch sites in the U.S.

Soon, different aerospace companies like Armadillo Aerospace conducted tests for space prototypes like its lunar lander. Their tests ended in 2009.

Alongside suborbital testing, a rocket racing league was established in 2005 at the port with plans to race rocket-powered aircraft in a closed-circuit track. The rocket racers would be viewable by the public live and through virtually through handheld devices. 3 prototypes were created and tested, but funding failed during plans to host their 2008 inaugural race. Additional funding was picked up, and one exhibition race was held in 2010. Unfortunately, funding again ran out before another race could be held and by 2014, the league ended.

The company Boeing picked up use of the base to test their autonomous landing system for their jumbo jets. By 2015, they were also using the site for proficiency training, flight tests, and recertification flights. Other aircraft manufacturers and companies began to do the same and the Department of Defense is again using it for flight training crews.

The bunker facilities created prior are now used as the Law Enforcement Driver Training Center for the Oklahoma Highway Patrol and the Oklahoma Department of Safety. The annual Cadet Lawman Academy for high schoolers uses the site for their summer programs. According to the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center, the facility is recognized as one of the top law enforcement driving centers in the nation.

In a 12 month operation period ending in June of 2020, the port saw over 30,000 successful operations. Today, the north and west WWII runways, while unused, can still be seen from aerial photographs. As of 2021, Boeing uses the facilities large runway to test its 777-9 aircraft, the largest of its kind in the world at over 251 feet. The aircraft is powered by two GE9X engines which according to OSIDA, "are the biggest and most powerful turbine engines in operation".

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Weiberg Captures First Win as Head Coach, Bulldogs Win 75-74

SWOSU Men's Basketball trailed

Southeastern Oklahoma State by 16 at halftime and as many as 18 in the second half, but it didn't matter. The Bulldogs found a way to outscore the Savage Storm 48-31 after the intermission and finally overtook the visitors for good in the closing seconds thanks to a pair of clutch free throws in a 75-74 victory.

The win signifies SWOSU's first of the season after an 0-5 start and gives head coach Brett Weiberg his first win as leader of the program. SWOSU now sits an even 1-1 in GAC play after the opening week of conference competition.

The Bulldogs shot a steaming 65% from the field in the second half to rally back after just a 30% showing in the first half. Ben Smith, who finished with 28 points on 10-of-18 shooting which ties his career high, poured in 21 of those in the second half to help lead the charge.

Denali Alexander (6-of-9) finished with 18 points in the game, including 10 in the second half,

representing his new season high scoring total. His 10 rebounds allowed him to notch his first doubledouble as a Bulldog.

Southeastern watched an 18-point margin first get cut to single digits by the 13:22 mark of the second half courtesy of a Ben Smith three ball. Smith then tied the game at 66-66 with 4:24 to play with another three-point make. From there on, it was a Dawg fight.

The lead changed hands another five times down the stretch. The final occurrence came with five seconds to play and the Bulldogs trailing by a single point. Junior guard MJ Warrior, Jr. was fouled on a shot attempt and went to the free throw line with a chance to knot things back up or regain the lead. Warrior, with ice in his veins, knocked down both and SWOSU got one final stop required on the other end of the floor after Southeastern's shot attempt at the buzzer fell short.

Final, good guys, 75-74 – SWOSU's highest point total of the young season.

The Bulldogs shot 46% overall in the game and 26% from beyond the arc. Southeastern finished both at 48% overall and from deep with 11 threepoint makes.

SWOSU committed just two turnovers in the second half while forcing the Savage Storm into eight. The Bulldogs won the rebounding battle 36-26 which included 12 offensive rebounds which led to 17 second chance points.

The next game will come Saturday, December 9 at 7:30 p.m. against East Central in Ada. The Tigers are also 1-1 after the GAC's first week of conference play.

SWOSU Lady Dawgs Hold On Against Savage Storm, Move to 2-0 GAC

SWOSU women's basketball held the first home Great American Conference contest of the season on Saturday afternoon. After a back and forth affair,

SWOSU pulled away in the final minute to win 52-49. SWOSU improves to 4-3 and 2-0 in the GAC. They'll take a break from GAC play for their last non-conference

game next Monday when Science & Arts of Oklahoma (USAO) comes to Weatherford for a 5:30 pm contest.

Mason Jones and Averi Zinn had monster performances for the Lady Bulldogs on Saturday. Jones scored a career high 21 points on 7-for-7 from the floor which included a 6-of-6 from behind the arc. Zinn also scored 21 points on 8-of-14 shooting and hit a trio of three-pointers herself.

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They combined for 42 points -- a whopping 81% of SWOSU's points on the day.

Both defenses came to play early. The teams failed to get in rhythm in the first quarter and after 10 minutes of game time, the score was knotted at 10-10.

SWOSU began the second with newfound energy. Four long range shots sparked a run that gave the Lady Dawgs a 22-13 lead midway through the second quarter. Southeastern flipped that on SWOSU and closed the quarter on a 12-2 run to grab a one-point advantage during the halftime break.

The Lady Bulldogs grabbed another double-digit lead in the third quarter and looked to push the game out of reach. The Savage Storm refused to allow that, cutting the lead back down to two with nine minutes remaining in the game.

A jump shot at the 5:09 mark in the final period put Southeastern on top 49-48. This would be the last score for the visitors though as from there on the SWOSU defense put on a late game clinic. They limited SEOSU to 0-of-4 shooting and forced three turnovers. The most important play of the matchup came when Chloe Cantrell came away with a steal and threw it ahead to Mason Jones for a layup to give SWOSU a 50-49 lead with 1:14 left.

SWOSU shot 18-of-59 (30.5%) overall and 10-for-28 (35.7%) from behind the arc. Southeastern was 15-of-48 (31.3%) from the field and just 4-for-19 (21.1%) from

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
