Weatherford was one of just three districts in the state to be participating in this program for the Spring 2024 semester.

Chicago-based aviation education 501 (c)3. At its December 2023 meeting, the Commission approved a partnership with the Bessie Coleman Aviation All-Star Program to implement an after-school aviation program for 6th and 7th-grade students enrolled in the Weatherford Public Schools, Pryor Public Schools, and Springdale Elementary of the Tulsa Public Schools. The first of its kind in Oklahoma, students enrolled in the aeronautical program will learn about aerospace careers and will participate in hands-on aviation projects that have been designed to create interest in aerospace and aeronautics while celebrating the heritage of Bessie Coleman.

"Aerospace is Oklahoma's fastest growing industry, and it's important we provide as many educational opportunities as possible, so our students can learn about the incredible career opportunities available in the various aviation fields right here in our state. The earlier young people are exposed to the world of aeronautics, the more likely they are to take STEM-related classes and gain the tools and knowledge needed to successfully pursue a career in this exciting industry," Pugh said. "As a former aviator, I'm thrilled this unique after-school aviation program will now be offered in Oklahoma and look forward to hearing how it opens students' minds to the endless world of possibilities in the aerospace industry."

During the first week, students will be introduced digitally to Gigi Coleman, Bessie Coleman's greatniece, an actor-historian of the Bessie Coleman aviation story, where she will reenact her great aunt's early life telling the story of how she became America's first black, female pilot in 1921.

During the following weeks, students will meet pilot professionals, build airplanes, interact with military aviation professionals, and learn about commercial flight, space travel, advanced air mobility, and drone operations. During the afterschool program, Oklahoma educators will follow a curriculum developed by the Bessie Coleman Aviation All-Star Program and the Oklahoma Department of Aerospace and Aeronautics. "We have enjoyed an amazing relationship with the Bessie Coleman Aviation All-Stars Program. Gigi accepted the 2022 Oklahoma Women in Aviation and Aerospace Day Woman of the Year award, and our partnership has created this unique aero-education opportunity that will benefit Oklahoma students in communities across the state," said Ardies.

April 30, 2026, marks the 100th anniversary of Bessie Coleman's death and in keeping her legacy alive, their goal is to expand aviation programs throughout the United States, reaching as many students as possible. The curriculum is designed to promote STEM (science, technology engineering, and math), teach the theory of flight (aeronautics) and introduce various careers, pioneers and inventors in aviation. They are a national 501(c)(3) non-profit organization where their work is primarily funded by grants and individual donations.

"Aunt Bessie would be proud of the work we are doing in her honor and legacy. Speaking at schools and churches, she encouraged African Americans' interest in aviation. She also raised money to found a school to train black aviators. One hundred years later, we are continuing her mission and we are excited to bring the state of Oklahoma into our aeronautical family," said Coleman-Brooms.

the family farm 7 miles NW of Arapaho, OK. His mother died before he turned 3 years old. Bill was both a mother, father, and breadwinner for his family. Frances, as the oldest child, had a lot of responsibility for her two younger siblings. As a result, Ralph gave her the name "Boss."

The Kids had a lot of unsupervised time and loved to remember the things they got by with. Dinner table talk time in later years resulted in lots of memories recalled with hilarious laughter. He attended Arapaho schools and enlisted in the U.S. Air Force on July 7, 1954, and served a 2-year stint. He was honorably discharged in 1956 after his father was severely burned in a farm accident and Ralph was needed at home. He married Lettie J. Brown on September 22, 1957. They farmed until 1992. He was also a rural mail carrier for 15 years, retiring in 1997. After retirement, they enjoyed several years of traveling and spending time on their property in South Fork, Colorado. 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## A Tribute to Willie Murray (1908 - 1963)

Willie Emerson Murray was born in Weatherford

in 1908. Early in life, she began piano lessons and progressed to the title of concert pianist. With blazing red hair that "sparkled in the sun," she was praised for her intelligence and charm.

Willie was the first woman to run for Governor of Oklahoma. As the wife of Governor Johnston Murray, she opened the Governor's Mansion to visitors for the first time.

Their marriage ended in one of the bitterest and most public divorces in state history. She died at age 54 of cancer. She always made her hometown of Weatherford proud.

Willie married Johnston Murray, the son of Governor and Oklahoma Constitutional Convention Chairman William H. "Alfalfa Bill" Murray in 1933. The younger Murray was elected Governor in 1950 by only 1,000 votes. Some credited Willie's charm and public speaking ability to be the difference in the election. Johnston was quiet and was an introvert.

To the public, Johnston and Willie were a perfect partnership. But behind the scenes, the marriage soured. As First Lady, Willie opened the Governor's Mansion to visitors each week. As many as 3,000 people would wait

Willie filed as one of 16 Democratic gubernatorial contenders in 1954. She was the first candidate in the state to campaign in a helicopter. Willie ran 7th in the primary field of 16. Raymond Gary of Madill was elected Governor that year.

After the Murrays left the mansion, Johnston filed for divorce. Willie fought the divorce and publicly named the lady with whom she accused her husband of having an illicit affair. State newspapers covered the trial and reported that Willie wanted to reconcile, but Johnston did not. After a trial with bitter accusations from both parties, which were front-page news in newspapers, Willie was granted a divorce in 1956. She received the family home and a sizeable amount of cash. She returned to Weatherford to be near family. She taught girls' Sunday school and conducted the children's choir. Penniless, Johnston remarried and moved to Fort Worth where he was a cab driver.

Willie died of cancer at age 54 in 1963. At her memorial service at Crown Heights Methodist Church in Oklahoma City, Rev. Wayne Coffin said, "Perhaps no other woman has ever influenced the state of Oklahoma as much as she was able to do." Willie is buried in her hometown of Weatherford.

After Willie's death, some noted her tremendous

The Apostle Paul wrote letters to the churches he started. The church at Colosse was not directly planted by Paul but by one of his followers. It was likely started by Epaphras who was converted in another one of Paul's travels.

Epaphras visited Paul in prison to share some concerns about doctrinal

issues that were threatening the young church. In his first two chapters Paul addresses these issues which are pertinent even to us today. But in Chapters 3 and 4, he tells them about how they are to live out their faith in a way that would draw people from the pagan society because of its stark contrast to the darkness of the society of that day.

But the teachings are still relevant today. Human nature has not changed that much since the 2000 plus years in which the letter was written. Today, let us look at two verses that deal with the conduct and attitudes we struggle with in relationships today.

Col. 3:12,13 "And so, as those who have been chosen of God, holy and beloved, put on a heart of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience; bearing with one another, and forgiving each other, whoever has a complaint against anyone; forgive as the Lord forgave you."

As we begin this new year, it would do us well to meditate on these verses. I find myself so lacking in most of these areas. We are to strive for growth in becoming like Christ. The contrast between these character traits and the rhetoric and actions that which we see and hear every day, even among Christians is sad. We can't change other people but we can start with ourselves; first by repenting and asking God to reveal those areas in which we fall short. Conviction of sin should not make you sad or left with a feeling of guilt. We should rejoice that the Spirit has revealed to us those areas in which we fall short. Now we can seek God's guidance and power to deal with those areas that have weakened our witness In Hebrews 12:1 the writer says we are to"...throw off everything that hinders..."so we can run with patience the race that is set before us."

It is hard for us to imagine how significant these virtues were in the Roman world. There was no room for mercy or compassion in the society of that day. The sickly or maimed were cast out. There was no feeling for the simple-minded or mentally sick. There was no provision for old people. Barclay in his commentary on Colossians says, "Christianity brought mercy into the world. It is not too much to say that everything that has been done for the aged, the sick, the weak in body and in mind, the animal, the child, the woman has been done under the inspiration of Christianity."

How do we grow in fullness of these virtues? It is not found in human effort, although discipline or effort is involved. Only the cleansing power of the Holy Spirit can complete the project. We must humbly confess to Father- God our weakness in a particular area. Ask him to provide circumstance that he can use to grow you in this area. Plead for his Spirit to create a will or desire in your heart to seek that virtue to become a natural part of your lifestyle. It is surely a marathon, not a sprint. As you seek the Higher Ground of Obedience and Submission, the way becomes clearer and the joy more real even with the trials that will come.

## **A Stout Defensive Propels SWOSU over Tech**

SWOSU Women's Basketball forced 27

turnovers in a 55-48 road victory over Arkansas Tech on Saturday inside Tucker Coliseum.

It's the most turnovers SWOSU has come away with in a conference game since December 4, 2021 when they had that same number against Oklahoma Baptist.

The visiting Bulldogs led by six points entering the fourth quarter against Tech before using an 11-2 run to grab complete control of the game and put all pressure on the Golden Suns who were unable to eliminate the 15-point fourth quarter deficit.

Hailey Grant had a career high 18 points on Thursday night against Harding and one-upped that mark two days later with 19 against Tech. Her layup with 12 seconds remaining in the game allowed the milestone to be achieved.

It wasn't the prettiest offensive game for either side. SWOSU shot 13% to start the game in the opening quarter and had just six points to show for it after the end of one. The sides were tied 6-6 entering quarter two.

In the second, SWOSU knocked down 5-of-8 from the three-point line including two deep balls from Rees Berkey and went on to outscore the Golden Suns by five to lead 25-20 at halftime.

SWOSU shot sub 40% in the third quarter before posting a game best 50% mark in the fourth.

In the game, the Lady Dawgs finished with a 33% shooting mark and 32% (7-22) from beyond the arc. ATU was marginally better at 37% from the field but was just 4-for-14 (30%) from deep. Thanks to tough defense, SWOSU took 14 more shots than the home side after racking up the 27 forced turnovers.

27 turnovers led to 30 points for SWOSU, a key difference maker on the day. The Lady Bulldogs turned it over just 11 times themselves.

SWOSU (9-7, 6-4 GAC) returns home and will prepare to host rival Northwestern (1/25) and Oklahoma Baptist (1/27) next week on Thursday and Saturday. The matchup against the Rangers will conclude the first half of conference play. Currently, SWOSU sits tied for fourth in the GAC standings with their six wins in 10 games.

## Late Wonder Boy Run Upends Hot-Shot Dawgs

Men's Hoops dropped an offensive battle to

Arkansas Tech on Saturday, 82-74. Two days removed from the coldest shooting night of the season, SWOSU responded by shooting a blistering 54% from the field but got one-upped by the Wonder Boys who finished at 57% as a team.

It's the highest shooting percentage an opponent has shot against the Dawgs this season. Tech also knocked down 12-of-23 shots from the three-point line – tied for the most three-point makes a SWOSU opponent has had this season.

A pair of Ben Smith free throws with 5:38 to play had SWOSU leading 72-67 before Tech closed the game on a 15-2 run to earn the win. The Dawgs shot just 1-of-8 down the stretch when an answer to the home team's run was needed.

Arkansas Tech led by as many as 10 points in the first half, but SWOSU answered with a run before halftime to tie things up.

The sides went into the break tied at 37-37.

After halftime, SWOSU led by as many as nine themselves in the early going before ATU's big run late.

Tech was able to force turnovers in the second half after SWOSU committed just one in the first half. After halftime, the Dawgs turned the ball over seven times that got turned into 13 points the other way by the opportunistic Wonder Boys.

Five Bulldogs finished in double figures led by 15 apiece from Mark Berry (7-10) and Ben Smith (4-13). It was almost six, after Mason Hart had a season high nine points on a perfect 3-for-3 shooting from the three-point line.

The loss makes SWOSU's record 5-10 overall and an even 5-5 in league play.

The Bulldogs will host Northwestern to close out the first half of conference play on Thursday, Jan. 25. They'll turn around and welcome Oklahoma Baptist on Saturday.
