




She was preceded in death by her parents, brother, Richard Carr, and a niece, Kimyahta Carr-Nabors.



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

HIGHER GROUND

A New Affection



Now that the Super Bowl and all its hype is over, we can get into the important happenings; that is the reporting of the pitchers and catchers to Spring Training. Baseball is back! Just kidding to all you football fans. We all have our favorites and find it hard to escape the emotions they bring.

On a more significant thought we all struggle with our loyalties and affections. In the 19th century a highly respected minister and professor coined the phrase, "The Expulsive Power of a New Affection." Thomas Chalmers, a Scottish minister and professor was so highly respected that at his death, it was reported that half of Edinburgh turned out for his funeral.

John Piper, a writer, apologist and former pastor has written in his book, Desiring God, that "the root power of sin is severed by the power of a superior pleasure or more compelling joy. . . The bondage to sin is broken by a stronger affection—a more compelling joy."

The parable that Jesus taught in Matt. 13:44 illustrates this point. "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field. When a man finds it, he hid it again, and then in his joy went and sold all he had and bought that field." All that he had accumulated in this world suddenly seemed unimportant when compared with the newfound treasure.

The sudden turn-about of Saul of Tarsus pictures so clearly the expulsive power of a new affection. This young zealous Jew was a member of the religious ruling class and on his upward way. In his testimony in Gal.1:14 he said of himself; "I was intensely persecuting the church of God and seeking to destroy it.

I was advancing in Judaism beyond many jews of my own age and was extremely zealous for the traditions of the fathers." Then on his way to Damascus to round up and persecute more people of the Way, he was struck down and saw the risen Jesus himself. His whole life and direction was turned around. In 2 Corinthians 5:14ff he says, "for the love of Christ compels us for we are convinced that one died for all and therefore all died. And he died for all that those who live should no longer live for themselves but for him who died for them and was raised again." He was so struck with the fact that Christ had died for him that he was compelled by that love to absorb beatings, his new affection.

Believers in countries controlled by radical Islamic groups often suffer beatings, persecution and imprisonment. They have learned to suffer for the sake of Christ. Coming to that point brings Christ close and the relationship more precious. Their commitment to their faith, to witness at even the cost of their lives brings with it a certain kind of intimacy and joy that we with our freedoms seldom experience.

This brings us to the heart of the matter. We in our comfort and casual commitment seldom realize the power that roots out the things of this world that tend to consumes us and our attention. The only way that we are going to dislodge the affections of this world is to experience a new and deeper love for God and a grasp of His love for us. We need to recapture the cross in all its glory and realize the love of God that led to that event. "God so loved..." is often quoted but seldom contemplated in its fullness. I need to pray, "Lord, let me, help me fall in love with you all over again." Love is not just an emotion but an expression of life that drives out all lesser rivals. "Lord, reveal yourself to me so clearly that I will be drawn to your Lordship."

Bessie Fire Department's Annual Pancake Supper Returns March 4, 2024

It started with half a hog in the basement of the Bessie Public School nearly 75 years ago as a fundraiser for the March of Dimes, but as the decades passed and the community changed the Bessie Fire Department assumed the annual Pancake Supper fundraiser which has become a community tradition and an integral source of funding for the fully volunteer fire department.

This year the Pancake Supper will take place on Monday, March 4 at the west side of the Bessie gym located at 712 Main Street in Bessie from 4pm to 8pm. As the name suggest there will be pancakes, but many people look forward to the whole hog sausages that the fire department prepares themselves.

These days half a hog won't suffice and the Bessie fire fighters raise around 30-40 hogs themselves to provide roughly 10000 pounds of meat which they use for their signature whole hog sausages with a special seasoning recipe that's a century old. However, this is more than just a fundraiser this is a cherished community event.

"We do most of [the butchering] within the fire department with help from the community there at the fire station in Bessie to process all of our sausage," said Craig Kliewer, Chief of the Bessie Volunteer Fire Department.

A modern fire fighter requires about \$10,000 worth of equipment in order to do their job effectively and while the Bessie Fire Department receives a portion of their funding from sales tax revenue in Washita County, fundraisers like this Pancake Supper are how they fund the majority of their operations.

These operations range from medical calls and wellness checks for community members to mutual aid agreements with surrounding communities like Clinton and Cordell to battle grass fires and house fires. These services are critical for the well-being of the community and the annual pancake supper serves a critical role in making sure volunteers can properly serve their community.

Folks from as far as Maryland and California make the trip to join the festivities which occur the first Monday in March every year.

This year the Bessie Fire Department will also have a raffle for two firearms; a Glock 19X 9mm 4.02 and a Christensem Arms Mesa 6.5 Creedmoor 22" boltaction rifle. Raffle tickets for the firearms are set at \$20 for the handgun and \$30 for the bolt-action rifle. People interested in purchasing tickets for the raffle can buy them at the event or from a member of the Bessie Fire Department.

Tickets for the Pancake supper are \$13 for adults and \$7 for children under 12 years of age. A to-go line will also be available in the alleyway west of the Bessie gym for \$13 a plate.

A variety of sausages and pork will also be available for purchase at they event:

- 2 lbs smoked/unsmoked link sausage \$12
- 2 lbs bulk sausage \$12
- 1 lb liver sausage \$6
- 4 lbs liver sausage \$20
- Pork Ribs \$15 per package

KARLIN / RETIREMENT - Weatherford Fire Chief Mike Karlin has announced his plans to retire. Karlin made the announcement earlier this month, stressing the amount of thought that has gone into this decision. "For quite some time, (I've) been trying to figure out when that time was. After 35 years of doing the job of a Firefighter and almost 10 years as the Chief, (I) just kind of came to the conclusion that this is a good time." Karlin's planned retirement date is August 30th. "The Department and I will be looking forward to moving on to the next stage in leadership. With change comes good things."

provided an update on the Lawter Road project. A portion of the work will result in the widening of Lawter Road, but the construction has limited it to one narrow lane. "People will need to allow for an extra 15 minutes in their commute (before the road's completion)," said Walker, "because there's a lot of traffic in that area." Additionally, to alleviate some confusion, Walker explained that when the "ROAD CLOSED" signs are set in the ditches rather than on Lawter Road, then it's open for traffic to pass by.

WEATHERFORD / YMCA PLAN - The City of Weatherford will plan and build a new Community Center owned by the city and to be run by the YMCA. The "Yes Weatherford" campaign, which looked to renew a half-cent sales tax, passed with 55% support on February 13. Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown discussed the next step now that the renewal has passed. Currently, the leading candidate for the location of the facility is most likely Rader Park.

WEATHERFORD SB / CALENDAR - The Weatherford School Board of Education approved the calendar for the 2024-25 school year. The first day of school is set for August 8th. Thanksgiving Break will be November 25-29, with Christmas Break scheduled from December 19-January 5. Meanwhile, Spring Break for 2025 year will be March 14-23.

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

Let's embark on a journey through the pages of

Oklahoma's history in the great blue sky with a small series we'll be calling The Wings of Time. We'll be recounting the transformative accomplishments of early aviators and impactors on the state.

In this inaugural section, we'll look through specific moments in the beginning of the aviation panorama with legendary figures, like the historic flight of Charles F. Willard, Clyde Cessna's unwavering pursuit of excellence, and Joseph Bartle's impactful wartime contributions.

The series will ultimately lead us through these moments in time and introduce the many faces that shaped over a century of aviation in Oklahoma. Our thread commences in the spring of 1910 with Charles F. Willard's groundbreaking flight, a pivotal moment that marked Oklahoma's initiation into the world of powered flight.

Among being the fourth American to pilot an airplane, Willard also was the first pilot to fly over downtown Los Angeles and the first pilot ever to ever be shot down – fortunately it was just by a squirrel gun of an upset farmer.

The pilots before him were none other than the Wright brothers and his mentor and teacher Glenn Curtiss.

On March 18, 1910, Willard's biplane gracefully ascended to 15 feet on the first day and a daring 25 feet on the second, setting the stage for the evolution of human flight. A replica of Willard's pioneering biplane is thoughtfully preserved at the Stafford Air & Space Museum in Weatherford, serving as a tangible link to this transformative moment. Transitioning to 1911, we explore Clyde Cessna's meticulous experimentation near the Salt Plains National Wildlife Refuge near Alfalfa County, Oklahoma. Cessna left his career as a car dealer in Enid to pursue aviation when he saw an early air exhibition back home in Kansas.

He immediately began building a plane he called "Silverwing." Prior to his first successful flight, he had many prior attempts with him famously exclaiming, "I'm going to fly this thing, then I'm going to set it afire and never have another thing to do with aeroplanes!" And fly he did. In June, he had his first historic 5-mile flight at an altitude of 200 feet in front of a crowd of onlookers that had heard of and seen his plane earlier in OKC.


His subsequent exhibition flights in Enid and Cherokee solidified Cessna's status as a trailblazer earning him the nickname "The Birdman of Enid." Cessna went on to become one of the leading US aircraft manufacturers and has exhibits at the Cherokee Strip Regional Heritage Center and Alva Regional Airport Museum commemorating his enduring legacy.

Aviation progress shot up tremendously when the first World War began, where Joseph Bartles emerges as a pivotal figure in aircraft manufacturing. Joseph was the son of Jacob Bartles, where the city of Bartlesville, Oklahoma is named. Joseph contributed significantly to the war effort by crafting planes, most notably the Curtiss JN-4 "Jenny."

The "jennies" played a crucial role during this period, serving as primary trainers for U.S. Army Air Service pilots. Their reliability, simplicity, and adaptability made them instrumental in honing the skills of countless aviators, becoming synonymous with the era's aviation advancements. The planes were the first massive quantity production of aircraft in Oklahoma.

As we navigate this chronological tapestry, the narrative unfolds with courage, innovation, and unwavering determination. In the next installment, we will further explore the boom in airspace innovation, delve into the stories of additional aviation trailblazers like Dorothy Pressler Morgan, Charles Lindbergh, John "Lee" Atwood, and Bessie Coleman, and gain insights into how Oklahoma's skies became a platform for dreams.

Stay tuned for the unfolding chapters of our exploration into the captivating history of early aviation in Oklahoma!



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


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Rebeca Fajardo, Jackson Phillips Earn Bulldogs of the Week Award


