
of 87 years, 3 months and 20 days.








When Jesus made the simple statement, thy Kingdom Come...the pictured the very Spirit of the living God coming into the human heart to live there in control. He saw a human being as a temple or residence of the most high God. This relationship is a privileged position. The King of Kings and Lord of Lords is living in our very being. I Peter 2: 9 calls us a "chosen people, a holy priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession..."

When a person becomes aware of this awesome fact it can revolutionize his whole life. It can change his entire outlook, his attitude, and redirect all his activities.

I remember, while on a mission trip to the Philippines with 12 college students in 1986, hearing a group of Philippine young people singing, "There's a flag flying high in the castle of my heart, cause the King is in residence there."

In fact, the difference between a defeated Christian and a victorious, vibrant Christian lies in direct proportion to the degree that Christ is in control of his life. When you recognize God's royal presence it becomes a delight to do God's will. It's an honor to become His subject.

If indeed the Kingdom of God is within me, I will make sure that nothing will enter there that would offend or harm the Spirit of the living God. What I eat and what I drink is of concern to me. What I take into my mind and emotions needs to be monitored. The material I read and things I watch on the screen can cause me to lose my focus and direction.

I will see to it that no attitudes, suggestions, or human philosophies contrary to the teachings of Christ will infiltrate my mind.

The Government of God in my life establishes an inner state in which righteousness, peace, and joy in a spiritual dimension dominates my life.

He holds an advanced certification in law enforcement with the state of Oklahoma and is a Law Enforcement Instructor with training in several specialty areas.

Earl Plumlee is a Congressional Medal of Honor recipient for heroic action in a confrontation in Afghanistan in 2013. Plumlee is among 36 individuals who will be recognized.

WEATHERFORD CC / MAYOR'S SEAT - The Weatherford City Commission recently approved a resolution, calling for an election for the office of mayor for a three-year term. The filing period is June 24-26th. The election will be held on August 27. Any runoff election would be held in November.

GREG TREAT / TAX CUTS - The Oklahoma State Legislature, recently, passed a bill, eliminating the state's portion of the grocery tax that was signed into law by Governor Kevin Stitt and takes effect in August. Senate President Pro Tem Greg Treat says that one of the complexities legislators face when considering tax cuts for state residents is the ability to make sure that basic state services continue to be funded. The current regular session adjourns on May 31.

BECKHAM CO / HOWELL - A Sayre man has been found not guilty after a two-day jury trial in Beckham County District Court. Fifty-three year-old Michael Scott Howell had been charged with threatening an act of violence after he allegedly sent threatening messages by e-mail to a Sweetwater school official. The jury deliberated 38 minutes before returning the not guilty verdict.

BECKHAM CO / ACCIDENT - A Michigan man was last listed in critical condition at OU Medical Center in Oklahoma City, following an accident involving a scooter Thursday on a Beckham County road, 4 miles south and 1 mile west of Elk City. 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
