A New World and the Real World



Two periods stand out in my mind; 1955 and 1959. Yes, those are the dates that I graduated from Sweetwater High School and Southwestern Oklahoma State University. (as it is now known) I remember the feelings of both excitement and anticipation, coupled with not a little fear and

trembling. I was about to enter two new worlds, and I felt unprepared. Thousands of young people are about to experience much of the same feelings.

For high school seniors, many if not most will be leaving home, away from the watchcare of parents who have nurtured them since birth. Many will be furthering their education, preparing for a vocation and perhaps meeting someone special to enrich their lives. Having spent a lifetime watching new freshmen enter the new halls of learning, I venture to say that these 4-5 years will shape their lives in ways that they had never dreamed. Others will be entering the work force, and still others the military. In all these cases they will be faced with challenges, financially, morally, emotionally, spiritually, etc.

While they may think they are grown-up, time will reveal that they have need of guidance, patience, and courage. College graduates will face a different level of concerns. Although they may not have recognized it, they have been protected from a lot of adult responsibilities. While, in most cases mom and dad will still be around, they will be expected to make most decisions on their own. For parents of High School students there will be that period of launching and letting them go. That is never easy but so necessary.

A word for H.S. youth workers: you have a major role to play. I was always impressed when a youth pastor brought some of his seniors to the campus for Campus ministry event. They need special attention and guidance. While many will not listen, some will and for those it could make all the difference. Those first three weeks on the campus could set the course for the next four years; the friends they make, the decisions they face, and the values they form.

Now for a word to the churches that they have been a part of. You have a great opportunity and responsibility. Recognize them when they come home. Perhaps, have them in for a personal chat. But most importantly develop a prayer ministry in their behalf. (I'm speaking here mostly of those who are graduating High School) Ask them about prayer requests. Every High School graduate deserves to have someone besides their parents praying for them. Think about the new challenges they will face, the temptations they will encounter, the decisions they will make. If they are Christ-followers pray that their lives will reflect Christ, seizing their mission on campus to grow into the image of Christ. I found that while there were abundant opportunities for Satan to do damage in a student's life, there were more opportunities to grow spiritually, and become mature disciples then in any other period of their lives. I was always looking for FAT freshmen; not physically so, but Faithfull, Available and teachable.

For pastors or youth workers reading this, encourage a small group, praying people, or the church at large to specifically and intentionally pray by name for those entering college or the military. Let these students know that a certain group is praying for them.

WEST OK / SALES TAX - The city of Weatherford is back on the positive side when it comes to sales tax receipts for the month of March. The city was up less than 1%, collecting \$1,043,000. Elk City was up by 7.7%, collecting \$1.269 million. Meanwhile, the city of Clinton was down 5.7%, collecting just over \$542,000.

HINTON / PRISON LAWSUIT - A lawsuit over conditions at the Great Plains Correction Center in Hinton can move forward following a federal judge's ruling. It's alleged that inmates were housed for days in small showers, and did not have bathroom breaks and failed to be provided with sufficient food or water.

WEATHERFORD / BOZARTH - The Weatherford School Board of Education has accepted the resignation of Middle School Principal Gayla Bozarth. "Thank you for your support through my journey here in Weatherford," expressed Bozarth at the end of her speech to the board. "Starting as a teacher, I've been so blessed with the people that I have working alongside me and [the school board] supporting me. I'm going to miss it here." The board approved the hire of Mark Whalen as Middle School Principal to succeed Bozarth. Additionally, the board also hired Grant Williams as Head Wrestling Coach.

CLINTON / MIDDLE SCHOOL UPDATE - Clinton Public Schools Superintendent Tyler Bridges shared an update on the new middle school during a recent school board meeting. According to Bridges, the middle school's brickwork and exterior glasswork have been completed. Bridges estimated that the decorative millwork, cabinetry, and other furnishing work is "approximately 30% complete." Currently, construction is focused on interior glass, sheetrock, and ceiling installation. Bridges' goal for completion is still set for November 2025.

WEATHERFORD / YMCA PRICE REVEAL -

Details were released during a recent economic development meeting in Weatherford surrounding construction of the future community center in Rader Park. President and Chief Executive Officer of the YMCA of Greater Oklahoma City, Kelly Kay, revealed the current budget for the project, which sits at around \$46 million. already working really hard on some federal [grant] opportunities, but we will be launching a capital campaign soon," said Kay. Kay showed off the detailed floor plan which includes, among other things: an indoor/outdoor aquatics space, a childcare facility, a youth wing, a full gymnasium, and an outside playground. "Once we get to about 80% of our funding, then we will start hiring our local architects that will take the schematics," explained Kay. "Then, we'll turn those [schematics] over to the architects to build the construction document."

WPLS / NEW APP - A new app is on the way for Western Plains Library System (WPLS), one that Director of Customer Experience Conner Kirk says will bring multiple features offered by the library together on a single, easy-to-use platform. The app, titled "WPLS Connect," will be completely free and is expected to launch in early June. "This is the one Western Plains app where you can borrow from Libby, Hoopla, Canopy, or our physical collection," expressed Kirk. "You can access Beanstack, check the events calendar, get reading recommendations, [and] book a meeting room at your local libraries."

WEATHERFORD / CUSTER ST BRIDGE - Weatherford Economic Development Director Yolanda Creswell says the Custer Street Bridge will close for repairs beginning June 9th. According to Creswell, the city's economic department was "waiting on a federal permit" that was finally approved. Remaining ARPA monies are helping fund the repair of the bridge.

Parental Consent Requirement Raised to Age 16



A new law strengthening parental involvement in insurance decisions will take effect later this year.

Rep. Chris Banning, R-Bixby, authored House Bill 1516, which requires signed parental or guardian consent before a minor can enter into a life, accident or health insurance contract. The bill also raises the minimum age from 15 to 16 for minors to contract for such insurance and provides legal protections for insurance agents acting in good faith.

"The Oklahoma legislative branch encompasses numerous intricate components, and it is concerning that minors have been able to enter into legally binding agreements with insurance companies," Banning said. "I would like to express my gratitude to my fellow legislators for their support in advancing HB1516 which is a sensible adjustment to current law no longer allowing minors to enter into such agreements."

Previously, Oklahoma law allowed 15-yearolds to enter into certain insurance agreements on their own. HB1516 revises that by requiring parental or guardian consent and ensuring that unemancipated minors cannot be held to premium payment agreements such as promissory notes, without oversight.

Additionally, the law expands regulation to include other forms of insurance contracts beyond life, accident and health, ensuring a broader layer of protection for minors and their families. The intent is to prevent minors from entering into legally and financially binding agreements without the maturity, understanding or supervision necessary for such commitments.

HB1516 passed both chambers and became law without the governor's signature. It takes effect November 1.



Oklahoma History: A Millionaire Oilman's Tribute to Pioneer Women

Oklahoma oilman and future governor E.W. Marland envisioned a monument to honor the frontier women who helped shape the state. Inspired by his mother and grandmother, Marland launched a nationwide search for a sculpture that would capture the grit and

In the late 1920s,

In October 1926, Marland invited twelve prominent sculptors to submit models for a proposed statue. Each was given a written brief, a small advance, and a piece of historical inspiration: a real 19th-century sunbonnet.

resolve of those who settled the Oklahoma prairie.

The artists included Bryant Baker, A. Stirling Calder, James Earle Fraser, Hermon Atkins MacNeil, and Jo Davidson. Each created a small model, or maquette, of their vision of a "Pioneer Woman."

The twelve entries went on a national tour in 1927, stopping in major cities where the public was invited to vote for their favorite. Around 750,000

The winner, by a wide margin, was Bryant Baker's design, titled "Confidence." His sculpture depicted a pioneer mother striding forward with her son at her side, her face calm and resolute, her posture

Baker, an English-born sculptor, received a \$100,000 commission and began work on the fullscale statue. Over the next two years, the figure was cast in bronze and mounted on a stone base in Ponca City. Standing 17 feet tall and weighing over six tons, the finished work became known simply as the Pioneer Woman. In one arm, she carries a bundle of belongings; in the other, a Bible. Every detail reflects the challenges and hope of frontier life—faith, burden, and perseverance.

Baker described her as "the abstract, ideal woman of the spirit of great faith and hope." Her name, Confidence, was no accident. It reflected the optimism and forward motion Marland wanted to immortalize. The statue was unveiled on April 22, 1930, the 41st anniversary of the Oklahoma Land

Over 40,000 people gathered for the event—one of the largest public celebrations in state history at the time. Will Rogers, beloved humorist and Oklahoma's favorite son, delivered the keynote address. In his speech, he praised the women who, "had to endure more than anyone" on the frontier.

President Herbert Hoover couldn't attend, but he spoke to the crowd live via radio from Washington, D.C.—a technological novelty in 1930. NBC Radio broadcast the dedication nationwide. Hoover called the statue "a tribute to the pioneer woman's place in American history." Secretary of War Patrick Hurley, an Oklahoman himself, also delivered remarks by radio.

As the bronze figure was unveiled, applause rippled through the crowd. Some cried. Marland gifted the statue and its land to the State of Oklahoma. A plaque at the base read: "In appreciation of the heroic character of the women who braved the dangers and endured the hardships incident to the daily life of the pioneer and homesteader in this country."


