The prophet Isaiah, preaching to the people of Judah, warned them of God's judgment if they did not release their hold on their idols and godless lifestyle. "Woe to the obstinate people, declares the Lord, to those who carry out plans that are not mine, forming an alliance, but not by my spirit, heaping sin upon sin." Isaiah 30:1

I have paraphrased and personalized this verse as follows: (God says) hard times and shame will come to those who are stubborn, hard-headed, and strong willed. If you reject my plans, doing what you want to do, thinking you have a better idea, you are headed for trouble.

If you reject my counsel, thinking, "I don't need God," and join with those who think like that, you just heap up a mountain of sin which will only bring shame to your name. Then I reflect on this in prayer: "Lord, there are times when I don't listen to you, when I want to do my thing. Please forgive me and teach me that my greatest joy and satisfaction in life comes when I recognize your Lordship and seek to follow your counsel. Help me to always remember that to fear You is the beginning of wisdom. Amen."

I'm afraid there are times when I am like that monkey, refusing to turn loose of that which I prize and Satan captures me. It may be something as simple as an attitude. "I have a right to

It may be anything that keeps you from a life goal of knowing God in all His fullness. It can be lonely. Ann Graham Lotz describes it this way. "The journey of obedient faith has for me at times been a long walk in the same direction with nobody." But Michael Card says, "It's hard to imagine the freedom we find from the things we leave behind."

Isaiah had hard things to say to his people in warning them of judgment to come. Yet he could not leave them without hope. In Isa.30:30 he says, "Yet the Lord longs to be gracious to you; He rises to show you compassion. For the Lord is a God of justice. Blessed are all who wait for him!"

May we all learn to trust Him, turn loose of that which traps us, and run with patience the race set before us

Registration for Brad Fleetwood's Bulldog Golf Camp Now Open for Kids Ages 7 - 18

SWOSU is once again hosting its Junior Golf

Camp for kids ages 7-18. Register now for your children to learn the ropes of golf under the supervision of the SWOSU Golf coaching Staff along with Current BULLDOG Golfers.

There are two camps now accepting registration. Students age 7-11 who register online may attend from July 7th - 9th, and students age 12-18 may attend July 14th - 16th.

Both camps will be held at the Prairie West Golf Club on the northeast end of Rader Park in Weatherford. Students will attend three days from 8:30 AM - 11:00 AM.

CORN / DOLESE DONATION - Dolese has donated four retired concrete mixer trucks to four Oklahoma fire departments. One of those trucks, a 2017 Peterbilt, is going to the Corn Fire Department. "It's going to replace a hand-me-down tanker from Hydro," explained Fire Chief Jeff Jaronek "It's a 1983 model (that's) seen a lot of years of use and it's just time for us to have a replacement." Arlington, Guthrie, and Coleman received the other three trucks. The donation is part of the mission of Dolese to improve communities through their products, actions, and support.

BECKHAM CO / McGUIRE - An Elk City man has been ordered to serve 12 years of a 25-year prison term after entering a plea in Beckham County District Court to sex related charges involving a 12-year-old female. 64-year-old David Leon McGuire admitted to authorities to inappropriate touching between himself and the youth.

SWOSU / RELAY FOR LIFE - The "Relay for Life" event of Beckham and Custer counties recently held at Southwestern Oklahoma State University raised more than \$20,000 for the American Cancer Society. The event brought together student organizations, local businesses, and community members to support individuals and families affected by cancer. Relay for life is an annual fundraising event benefiting the American Cancer Society, with proceeds supporting cancer research, patient services and advocacy. The event gives communities an opportunity to celebrate cancer survivors, remember loved ones lost to cancer, and commit to fighting back against the disease.

CLINTON / HOSPITAL AMENDMENT - Clinton City Council approved a second amendment to the asset purchase agreement with Rural Hospital Solutions (RHS), allowing for an advance of previously approved funds to the hospital. City Attorney Ryan Meacham explained the need for the change: "The CT scanner had gone out and the hospital was having a difficult time providing efficient patient care. They found a CT scanner that was available and could be delivered relatively quickly. In order to accomplish that, we needed to go ahead and advance the last funds that have been approved by (the voting public)." Meacham says that the amendment also clarifies the terms of the agreement by officially adding the CT scanner expense to the list of liabilities that RHS will be required to pay.

The camp will focus on the fundamental aspects of both the full swing and short game. Campers will be grouped according to age and skill level and will receive instruction on the practice facilities as well as the golf course.

Campers will need to be dressed in weather appropriate attire. In addition, campers must have their own equipment, including golf clubs and golf bags.

CORDELL / ADAMS LAKE - The Cordell City Council has approved a soft opening of Adams Lake for one day only, on July 4th. Mayor Phil Kliewer explains what the public can expect that day, which will allow for fishing and swimming, but fireworks will be prohibited. He also noted that the bridge at the lake will remain closed.

CORDELL / CK ENERGY PURCHASE – The Cordell City Council recently made a major financial move involving a former CK Energy campus. This came after CK Energy's relocation to State Hwy 152. Following an executive session, Mayor Phil Kluwer called the purchase a transformational, generational opportunity for the city. The agreed upon price was \$650,000.

ELK CITY/FD GRANT - Elk City Fire Department officials say thanks to the generosity of donors from the department's annual Firefighters Golf Tournament, the department is launching a new grant program. "This year for our community program, we're funding an AED (Automatic External Defibrillator) grant program," says Fire Chief Kyle Chervenka. "We'll have two or three AEDs to give away to local nonprofits. To apply for that, go to our Facebook page (and scan the "AED Grant" QR code). The application due date is July 31." Officials say immediate defibrillation can more than double survival rates from sudden cardiac arrest.

SWOSU / PARKER HALL - Work is underway in Parker Hall on SWOSU's Weatherford Campus to hopefully combat the state's nurse shortage. "We've had (some) space in Parker Hall that's been sitting vacant for quite some time. We were able to... double the space allotted to the nursing program," outlined Provost Dr. Joel Kendall. The project will allow the in-person nursing program to eventually take on a maximum of 120 students instead of the current 60 students.

WEATHERFORD / WTC DEADLINE - The deadline is quickly approaching for the dental assistant training program at the Western Technology Center (WTC) in Weatherford. "It is a one-year adult-only program at our Weatherford campus," says Marketing and Communications Specialist Sarah Hirschman. "The enrollment deadline is June 27th. Classes will start August 12th." Hirschman says an application for the program can be found on the Western Technology website.
