

# **Danna Watson**




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# Dr. Kalie Kerth Named Director of SWOSU College of Pharmacy Rural Health Center



Dr. Kalie Kerth has been named director of the SWOSU College of Pharmacy Rural Health Center. A SWOSU alumna and longtime member of the College of Pharmacy faculty, Kerth brings years of experience in clinical pharmacy, rural healthcare, and community-based programming across western Oklahoma. Her appointment became effective July 1, 2025.

Kerth earned her Doctor of Pharmacy degree from SWOSU in 2011, graduating summa cum laude. After working in retail pharmacy throughout rural parts of the state, she returned to SWOSU in 2014 to help establish and lead the Remote Medication Order Processing (RMOP) Pharmacy. The program provides medication order review for critical access hospitals and helps fill pharmacy care gaps in small communities. Through a partnership with the OSU Center for Rural Health, the RMOP Pharmacy has also become a training space for student pharmacists preparing to serve in rural areas.

In addition to her clinical work, Kerth has helped lead numerous grant-funded efforts tied to health education, family support, and workforce development. She co-authored the USDA School-Based Telehealth grant, which expanded medical access for thousands of students in rural school districts, and serves as co-principal investigator for SWOSU Work Ready Weatherford, a multi-million dollar program focused on job preparedness and

long-term economic stability in western Oklahoma. Other recent grant work has supported maternal and child health services, food insecurity programs, and early childhood resources for families in need.

The Rural Health Center is part of SWOSU's continued effort to expand access to healthcare across the state through pharmacy education and collaborative partnerships. The center works closely with rural hospitals and clinics to serve medically underserved populations while also providing hands-on training to student pharmacists in areas like diabetes education, medication therapy management, and transitional care.

Kerth grew up in Forgan and has remained involved in a wide range of community initiatives throughout her career. She is the founder and executive director of Harley's House Crisis Nursery Association, a nonprofit that offers diapers, formula, childcare supplies, and other essentials to families at no cost. She currently serves as Vice-Chair of the Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth, where she was first appointed by the Governor in 2019. She also sits on the Custer Country Board of Health and participates in several local and regional efforts related to child welfare, family support, and opioid prevention.

I'm sure there were some poor decisions made along the way but that is true of all of us. He was part of the marginal people among us that we do not see because we are too consumed with ourselves. Pray that God will open the eyes of our heart that we may "rescue the perishing, care for the (lonely) dying" and be Jesus in the flesh to people in need.

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# **Levitt AMP to Feature Cruz Brothers on Friday**



There are only two more Friday evening performances scheduled for the 2025 season of the Levitt AMP Clinton Music Series and this Friday night's concert will showcase the musical talents of brothers Mark and Edgar Cruz, two of the most accomplished and skilled guitarists in the region. Beginning at 7:30pm on Friday, July 18th in McLain Rogers Park, The Cruz Brothers will perform a selection of music blending classical guitar with rock, Latin, and other contemporary influences.

This performance will mark Edgar Cruz's third performance at the Concert series in as many years and will be the first time the brothers have performed together at the amphitheater in McLain Rogers Park.

Edgar Cruz has been a staple in the Oklahoma music scene since the 70's and his musical repertoire certainly shows that as Edgar regularly performs original arrangements of popular classic rock songs such as Queen's "Bohemian Rhapsody" or The Eagles "Hotel California" but also draws from a deep collection of original and Latin Spanish

Favorites as well as "the largest Beatles selection available" according to Edgar's website. Edgar has also been frequently named Oklahoma's Top Performing Artist/ Acoustic Guitarist by the Oklahoma Gazette. Edgar performs performs more than 300 times a year and traveled the globe sharing his love of the guitar.

Mark Anthony Cruz is as accomplished as his brother having performed solo and in conjunction with bands since the late 90's. Currently, Mark works as a professor at the School of Music at Texas State University in San Marcos, TX. Mark has won several awards for his original compositions, including five first place awards in the Austin Classical Guitar Society's composition competition. He has also garnered awards for his performance ability including a first place prize in the 2013 Winfield International Fingerstyle Competition.

CUSTER CO / DOG THERAPY - Custer County Sheriff Dan Day recently informed Custer County Commissioners that the jail is rolling out a new project called Dog Therapy. "In the very short time that we've had this [center], it's really made [a] difference," Day shared. "There are inmates that don't ever smile--they don't ever do anything--and then they see that dog. They can come up to the front and they smile like they have never smiled before." Sheriff Day believes the program will help assist with inmate anxiety.

WEATHERFORD / PARKING - Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown says the city is working on expanding public parking in the downtown area. A portion of BancFirst's Broadway parking lot will be used for public parking, which Mayor Brown says has already been discussed. Public parking will also be made available "across the street from BancFirst to the north," explained Brown. "There's a parking lot and we're in the process of making a deal on that so we can expand public parking as people come to town, maybe our employees. Residents can park back there which leaves more spots for [travelers who can] stop at the [nearby] restaurants." Brown also mentioned another big project downtown, the resurfacing of Kansas Street between Davis and Main Street.

SWOSU/COLLEGE TOWN RANKING Weatherford has been named one of the most beautiful college towns in Oklahoma by WorldAtlas. The article mentions the town's charm, walkability, and local landmarks like the Stafford Air & Space Museum, but it's the people and partnerships that truly set Weatherford apart. SWOSU officials are proud to be part of a town that feels like home to students, families, and the entire university community.

CLINTON / AFTER SCHOOL FUNDS - Federal funding for the REDS 365 After School Program in Clinton is currently on hold. Superintendent Nathan Meget says the program is made possible through the Federal 21st Century Community Learning Centers Grant. Meget says it has had a positive impact on district students and families since its introduction. "We've been grateful for the time we've had it, but like everything else right now, some of that stuff is getting reviewed on the national level," explained Meget. "But that's OK. We'll figure out what [needs] adjustments. But for the moment, we're going to have to kind of pause that program." Meget says there is not a clear answer on when or if the funds will be released.

WEATHERFORD / STARBASE - A memorandum of understanding has been approved by the Weatherford City Commission that will relocate the STARBASE program from Burns Flat to Weatherford. The program will be located at the Stafford Air & Space Museum. Museum Director Colton Parkinson explained the program as more than 30 schools "touring the facility as part of the STARBASE program. We will collaborate with...faculty members that are part of the STARBASE program...in their off time." The program will transition to the Stafford Air & Space Museum later this year after construction of the new STEM classroom is complete.

WEATHERFORD/NEW GYM FLOOR Weatherford schools Superintendent Mark Harmon says there's been a delay in the repair of the high school gym floor. Harmon says he recently visited with the project contractor regarding the work. "The work has been delayed because they're having trouble with the logo in the center of the floor," explained Harmon. "They're going to be back on it July 22nd through the 24th, and we anticipate the gym to be ready and operational by August 4th or August 5th." The floor is in the process of being repaired after water got in the gym from the outside and caused damage to a portion of the floor.

OSDE / SCHOOL MEALS - The Oklahoma State Department of Education (OSDE) will mandate that every school district in the state fully fund student meals starting this school year. State Superintendent Ryan Walters made the announcement on June 7th, saying districts must use existing state and federal operational funding to pay for the student meals. Walters also claims funding has been grossly mismanaged and used to pay administrators rather than support children. Weatherford Schools Superintendent Mark Harmon shared his thoughts on the announcement. "We feel like [Walters] tried to do that last year with the Bible mandate, and the Ten Commandments mandate...I'm not sure that he's able to make such a mandate," expressed Mark. "We'll just sit back and digest it for a bit. We'll see what [other school districts] will do."

WEATHERFORD / 7 BREW - A building permit has been issued by the city of Weatherford for a new commercial business. The permit shows that 7 Brew coffee shop will be located on Main Street between the former Carl's Jr. restaurant and O'Reilly's Auto Parts. It will be 895 square feet with a Drive-Thru canopy.

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





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# 2024-25 All-Sports Awards Recap: SWOSU Names Athletes of the Year

The SWOSU Athletic Department has named Bodi Wallar (Baseball) and Lacy Mott (Volleyball) the 2024-25 Athletes of the Year, marking the official conclusion of the 2024-25 athletic season.

It was announced at this year's end of year awards ceremony that SWOSU's Athletes of the Year would be published following the completion of the final athletic event of the 2024-25 season. Last weekend, SWOSU Rodeo officially closed out the athletic calendar at the College National Finals, finally drawing the year of competition to a close.

In late April, the SWOSU Athletic Department hosted the 2024-25 All-Sports Awards Ceremony at the Pioneer Event Center. Presented by Lucille's Hotel & Restaurant and ASAP General Stores, the event celebrated Bulldog Athletics' past year. At the ceremony's conclusion, SWOSU honored Isaac Foster as the Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year and Anna Bager as the Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year. SWOSU Athletic Director Todd Helton and ASAP Energy Inc. Chief Operating Officer Ray Harris also presented the Cecil Perkins Service Award to Valerie Fariss, recognizing her longstanding support of Bulldog athletics.

Bodi Wallar (Papillion, Neb.) transferred to SWOSU for one final year of eligibility this season and made an immediate impact on the field. He earned unanimous First Team All-Great American Conference honors as a designated hitter and was named a Second Team All-Central Region selection by the Division II Conference Commissioners Association (D2CCA). Wallar started the year strong, earning the GAC's first Player of the Week honor of the 2025 season. He finished the season with a .392 batting average, ranked fourth in the

During the 2024-25 season, Wallar accumulated 65 hits, including 12 doubles and eight home runs. Wallar drove in 46 runs, scored 30 times, and posted a .608 slugging percentage, closing out his senior season on a 17-game hitting streak and reaching base safely in 29 consecutive games.

Lacy Mott (Waxahachie, Texas) concluded her fifth and final year as a Great American Conference Champion, helping lead the Bulldogs to a 21-8 record and their first regular season championship in program history. She became SWOSU's first GAC Player of the Year by unanimous vote, first three-time All-GAC selection, and first player to receive AVCA recognitions as a Player of the Week, All-Region selection, and All-American. Mott also earned First Team All-Region honors from the D2CCA and was a three-time GAC Player of the Week. She was named to three all-tournament teams, including the GAC Tournament, and led the league in kills per set (4.08) and points per set (4.59). Her 449 kills ranked second in the Central Region, and she set a career high with 30 kills against Oklahoma Baptist on November 4, the most kills by any player in the conference this season. Mott had 20 or more kills six times, hit .400 or better eight times, and finished with double-digit kills and digs in 18 contests, highlighted by a 24kill, 25-dig performance against Southeastern on OBager (Juelsminde, Denmark) is a four-year SWOSU Soccer member, appearing in 66 games with 43 starts. She was recently named a GAC Elite Scholar, awarded to student-athletes with the highest GPA in their sport and at least 70 hours of completed classwork. Bager is a two-time Academic All-GAC selection and D2 ADA Academic Achievement Award winner, and she's on track for a third recognition later this summer.

Mott is also a three-time College Sports Communicators Academic All-District selection. Bager graduated with a perfect 4.0 GPA in Health & Physical Education.

Foster (Jones, Okla.) is a four-year SWOSU Football member and the Bulldogs' first allconference offensive lineman since 2018, earning Second Team All-GAC honors this season. A consistent presence on the line for three seasons, Foster is a three-time College Sports Communicators Academic All-District selection. He'll be recognized later this summer as a threetime D2 ADA Academic Achievement Award winner and Academic All-Conference selection.
