The festivities will start at 6pm, featuring live music from Thomas, OK, native Jaxen Mannering and his band, the Road Dawgs.

Her family also wish to thank Russell Murray Hospice and Maple Lawn Rehabilitation & Nursing Center for the love, care, and attention they showed her





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




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SWOSU Men's Basketball Welcomes Four New Additions to the Team for 2025-2026 Season

four new signings who have joined the team for the 2025-26 season.



Suffering



When I was a kid, one of my heroes was, The Durango Kid. Dressed in black, he would ride out of the hills on a beautiful white stallion ready to conquer the forces of evil. Somehow, the bad guys always got their dues and justice prevailed.

As I grew older I found that not to be so. I was a lot better kid than that self-centered, no-good classmate, but he always got the attention of the cute girls, while they never gave me a second look. It wasn't fair! As my world expanded, new heroes arrested my attention. Usually they prevailed not because they brought justice into the world but because of the life they lived in spite of the injustices they suffered.

One of my present-day heroes is Joni Eareckson Tada. After a tragic diving accident left her a quadriplegic at age seventeen, she recovered from the initial shock, worked through a period of despair and came forth as a radiant example of the power of God to transform even the darkest of circumstances into a powerful force to advance the Kingdom.

Today, Joni is known world-wide as an advocate for the disabled. Working through her ministry called Joni and Friends, she has brought hope and new life to hundreds of thousands who had felt nobody cared; resigning themselves to a secondclass existence of despair and hopelessness.

About ten years ago, Joni, who has been likened to a modern-day Job, was assaulted with chronic pain with which she lives today. As if that were not enough, recently she was diagnosed with breast cancer. In an interview with the editors of Christianity Today, she was asked if her perspective on suffering and healing had changed since her diagnosis of breast cancer. She replied, "No, I have examined the Scripture passages I looked at with my quadriplegia and God's words do not change." She cited I Peter 2:21: "To these hardships you were called because Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example that you should follow in his steps." She said, "Those steps most often lead Christians not to miraculous, divine interventions but directly into the fellowship of suffering. In a way, I've been drawn closer to the Savior, even with this breast cancer." She also mentioned that many associated with her cancer-from secretaries and clinicians to doctors and nurse, have been given the opportunity to display

their hunger and thirst for Christ. She is praying not so much for healing, but for the advancement of the gospel through her suffering. She stresses the importance of focusing on living while we pray for healing. She added, "None of us, in our culture of comfort, know how to prepare ourselves for dying. We go through the valley of the shadow of death every time we say no to our selfish desires. When we say yes to the grace of God, we are learning how to die." She does not deny God's interest in the physical body but in her words, "In God's priority, the health of the soul trumps the health of the body every time." She stated, "I'm less interested in the physical and more interested in healing in my heart. Pray that I get rid of my lazy attitude about God's Word and prayer, of brute pride—set me free from selfcenteredness. These are more important because Jesus thought they were more important.

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Arapaho-Butler Reveals 2025 Bond Proposal

Voters in the Arapaho-Butler school district will

decide September 9th on a proposed \$5.475 million bond to construct a new agriculture education building. On Wednesday, August 27th, a community meeting will be held at the school gym to discuss the proposal in more detail.

The new Ag building will feature:

- Entrance Lobby
- Two classrooms
- Agriculture Lab
- Shop Workspace
- Restroom Area

- Storage / Janitor's Closet

Superintendent Jay Edelen outlined the details of the proposed facility, with its estimated size being a focal point. "The [size] of the entire facility is just a touch under 8,000 square feet (sqft), with the shop itself [comprising] 3,000 sqft of that," Edelen explained. "It also includes 35,000 sqft of asphalt paving in and around the building, which is going to double as a parking lot for our elementary school, and then about 10,000 sqft of gravel paving."

Currently, focus on the project has shifted to discussing the facility's interiors. This includes "upgrading some of the [technology] in the classrooms," as Edelen described it. This includes new welders for the shop.

WEATHERFORD/SCHOOL MAINTENANCE

Weatherford Public Schools are working to address some maintenance concerns at Stafford Elementary School. Superintendent Mark Harmon recently told the Board of Education that roof leaks have been reported at the school. "[Stafford Elementary] is a relatively new building, so it's been a little bit frustrating to have some leaks over there, expressed Harmon. "But I've been in contact with some roofers and they're going to see if they can fix it." Along with repairing the roof, Harmon says the district will also be doing work on the FFA greenhouse.

CORDELL / SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

Cordell Public Schools Superintendent Sam Belcher recently told the Board of Education that elementary student enrollment for 2025 is down from 2024 by twelve students. "We have 338 students in the elementary, but we were at 350 last year at this time to start the year," outlined Belcher. "This is mainly because our Pre-K enrollment is only at 22. Hopefully, that [number] will pick up when some of those kids will come to school next year when [they reach] Kindergarten." Meanwhile, Cordell's junior high and high school class sizes have increased by 10 students, from 245 to 255 7th-12th grade students. Belcher expressed that the Cordell school district will begin keeping track of enrollment numbers as the year gets underway.

CLINTON / CRH PAYMENT At the request of the Clinton Hospital Authority, the Clinton city council has approved \$200,000 for Clinton Regional Hospital to meet payroll and other expenses. Board Chairman Ken Baker stated the hospital is still operating at a deficit over more than \$300,000. "Our cash burn was \$750,000 a month for the last several months," said Baker. "Hopefully, we can do better than that for this month." Baker added that the authority is working on an application for a rural emergency hospital designation, which aims to enhance access to emergency and outpatient services in rural areas facing healthcare challenges. It allows facilities to provide emergency outpatient services but cannot provide inpatient services.

CANUTE / BOND ELECTION - Voters in the Canute school district recently gave overwhelming support to two bond propositions. Proposition 1 received 71.5% support, which includes: upgrades to the Ag barn; installation of turf on the playground; and the purchase of two suburban vehicles. Proposition 2 received just under 70%, which proposed the purchase of two activity buses and a minibus for activities support. Superintendent Jamey Cook said that no tax increase is projected following the propositions' passage.

SWOSU / ASAP PARTNERSHIP - Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) and ASAP Energy have launched a new philanthropic partnership that will provide valuable financial assistance to the students, faculty, and programs. ASAP Energy owner Rick Koch also shared how this may provide opportunities for other businesses in western Oklahoma. "When we agreed [to be] official partners, it was not to be the only [ones. Rather, we aim] to be the first of many," Koch explained. "That's my plug for other people; this opportunity is there for lots of folks." The new multi-year cooperative effort will see an investment of over \$200,000 in charitable support over the next four years in a wide variety of areas including but not limited to SWOSU convocation, homecoming, rodeo, and the all-sports banquet. "Weatherford wouldn't be Weatherford without SWOSU, and we all know that," Koch expressed. "If you stop and... see how much SWOSU benefits all of us, whether it be Weatherford, Custer County, or western Oklahoma, [you'll see] it's worth reinvesting your money into.'

CLINTON/ APPRENTICE SCHOLARSHIP Clinton Public Schools has partnered with Southwestern Oklahoma State University

(SWOSU) and the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education (CareerTech) to grow the teaching workforce. Six Clinton school employees have been chosen for the teaching to teach apprentice scholarship program, which helps staff earn their teaching credentials while working in the classroom. The program can cover up to \$10,000 a semester in tuition and expenses.

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



"Run For Hope" to Help Addicts and Families

Hope can seem to be a luxury when a loved one

is battling with addiction, but an organization in Western Oklahoma is here to support and guide families through troubling times. "Hope Is Alive," a non-profit organization who's mission is to "radically change the lives of drug addicts, alcoholics, and those that love them." has scheduled their fifth annual 'Run For Hope' in Weatherford for Saturday, September 6th to raise funds for Finding Hope and Hope After Loss, a ministry of free support groups that seeks to counsel the families of drug and alcohol addicts.

Run For Hope will feature a 5k run/walk and a 1 Mile run/walk to "remember, honor, and celebrate those who lost their lives to addiction." The 5k run/ walk will begin at 9am and the 1 mile run/walk will begin at 9:30am with registrations fees for races being \$35 and \$20, respectively. Runners are encouraged to show up early to make sure they're registered and signed up for the race. There will also be kid friendly entertainment including various inflatable attractions as well as a face-painting booth and an assortment of local food trucks.

"We usually call it the Sobriety Sprint and we've kind of transitioned," said Jacy Burrows, the Community Outreach Coordinator for Hope Is Alive in Weatherford.

The founder, Lance Lang, noticed that the families of drug and alcohol addicts were hurting as much as the addicts themselves. Hope Is Alive sought to address this issue by offering free support groups in several communities across the United States. And so, Finding Hope was born.

"We've seen a very big inflow in Finding Hope and the need for it, and so the funds we raised for this race...will go support those groups," expressed

In Western Oklahoma, Finding Hope has groups that meet regularly in Weatherford as well as Elk City. In Weatherford the group meets the first and third Thursday of every month at 6:30pm at the First Baptist Church. In Elk City the group meets the second and fourth Monday of every month at 6:30pm at the First Baptist Church.

"Mothers, sons, daughters, aunts, uncles, cousins... Whoever is struggling with a loved one in addiction, they come to an environment of people that get what is going on and understand how hard it is to love an addict," said Burrows.
