






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Custer County Fair Kicks Off September 4th

and baked goods because the Custer County Free Fair is coming back for its 99th year at the Custer County Fairgrounds (located south of Clinton on Highway 183). The three-day event will run from Thursday, September 4th through Saturday, September 6th.

Chock full of livestock shows, farming exhibits, and a ton of creative competitions the Custer County Free Fair is a fantastic way to show off the talent brimming in Western Oklahoma, especially its

On Wednesday, the Free Fair begins registration at 3 p.m. for all open and 4H exhibits. Entries for rabbits, poultry, vegetables, and farm produce will also be accepted. Registration will run until 7 p.m.

On Thursday, the exhibitions begin in earnest, with the exhibition building opening at 8 a.m. That's also the deadline for the 4H and FFA farm equipment operators contest, which will begin a plate containing some BBQ, a side, and a drink shortly following the deadline at 8:30 a.m.

Thursday's schedule of events will be capped first responders around Custer County. off that evening, with the Farm Hand Olympics beginning at 6:30 p.m. This event will showcase various farm hands' feats of strength and agility

in demonstrations such as hay hauling, calf roping, water hauling, a wheelbarrow race, and a sack race, and will be split into two divisions; one for 4H members and another for FFA members.

Friday's schedule of events will include a petting zoo that will run from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., livestock shows for cattle, swine, goats, and sheep.

Saturday will be the final day of the Custer County Free Fair and will begin with a farmer's market that will run from 8 a.m. to noon. At 9 a.m., there will be a stick horse race for children 5 years and younger, followed by the horse show at 9:30 a.m. At 10 a.m., the Best of Wheat baking contest will be held in the new show barn classroom.

From 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., 95.5 the Coyote will be broadcasting live from the fair and will be supervising the tremendous BBQ abilities of Custer County's finest first responders at the First Responder's BBQ, which is slated to begin at 4 p.m. and winners awarded around 6 p.m. You can grab for \$10. Teacher Prayer Support



Last week I began a series of articles about great spiritual revivals of the past. This week I am pausing that series to share something that I believe to be more immediately pertinent and needful.

At the beginning of the schoolyear we often mention the need to pray for our teachers and school

officials. In this day this is vitally important. But often this is so generalized that few really take it seriously as a matter of personal responsibility. The saying, "What is everybody's business becomes nobody's business," comes into play. Or, it is watered down to simplistic prayers such as "Bless Mrs. Jones today. Give her a good day and thank you for her."

What I am proposing in our church is a Teacher Prayer Support plan that would involve regular interaction between a teacher and a prayer partner who would be focused on a single teacher. This prayer support person would "adopt" one teacher or administrator and commit to pray for that person daily. The teacher would be in communication with his/her prayer partner, sharing concerns, needs and personal feelings. There would be common requests such as patience, wisdom in discipline issues, a love for the student who is difficult to love, preparation, etc. But the teacher would also feel free to share heart concerns, discouragement, doubt, concern for a troubled child relationship issues, etc.

This will call for some work in seeking information about teachers in our church, explaining the program and asking for their permission. I can't imagine a teacher saying, "No, I don't want someone praying for me!" In fact, the few I have shared the idea with were elated. Call me if you would like to volunteer.

Then I will have to secure prayer partners who are willing to commit to the program. This may be a little harder but not impossible. Too often we look at a new idea and think of the difficulties involved instead of asking, "Would this be something that would please God, serve to advance the kingdom and encourage and bless someone." Then let the Holy Spirit work out the problems. I believe it was Thomas Edison who said, "Many opportunities are missed because they come dressed in overalls and look like work."

Most every church has public school teachers in their congregations. All it would take is for someone to take the initiative, step out on faith and do the work to make it happen. Don't feel that it is the Pastor's job or another staff member—they have their plates full already. I can provide prayer guides or prayer prompters if requested. I'm not sure how this will work but there is nothing to lose. Why not try it in your church.

Let us claim his promise that "...he is able to do immeasurable more than all we can ask or imagine according the power (Holy Spirit) that is at work within us." Eph. 3:20

The program of events will feature a trick roping performance as well as several award presentations by the Clinton Chamber of Commerce as well as civic organizations recognizing Clinton citizens that have left a mark on the town over the past year.

Awards will be be presented by organizations such as Clinton's Rotary Club and the Clinton Public School Foundation. Some of the awards to be presented at the event include Volunteer of the Year, Top Ambassador of the Year, Citizen of the Year, and a Community Impact Award.

"It's a good night of community connection and bringing everybody together to celebrate the great citizens of our city," said Julie Caldwell, President of the Clinton Chamber of Commerce. "And most of the small businesses are here so we talk about programs that we have as far as the chamber is concerned."

HINTON / SB BOND - A no-tax increase bond will be on the ballot for voters this fall in the Hinton school district. The bond has been valued at \$5,975,000. Superintendent Marci Derryberry recently gave the board an update on the specifics of the bond. With this money, the district will receive: three new middle school classrooms that double as safe rooms; a re-roofing for the district's multi-purpose building; and an overhaul of the old cafeteria. The next election day for Hinton is October 14th.

SWOSU / HODGE CENTER - Southwestern Oklahoma State University President Dr. Diana Lovell has announced that a grand opening ceremony has officially been set for November 13th for the Jerry and Margeret Hodge Center for ribbon cutting will mark the building's completion, the facility will not be ready for classes until next

WEATHERFORD / NEW HIGH SCHOOL -Weatherford Public Schools Superintendent Mark Harmon shared details from some recent brainstorming sessions on a new high school project. "We want [our new school] to be able to fit 1000 students. We need 25 classrooms. We need all the different things that go into a high school: courtyard, cafeteria, gymnasiums, and practice fields," Harmon explained. "From academics, to athletics, to all of the extracurricular thing [like] choir and band. Where's it going to sit on the land? A lot of planning goes into [this]." Once decisions are finalized, architects will design the building and determine square footage, followed by cost estimates, as well as the review of the tax impact on Weatherford.

WEATHERFORD / ROUTE 66 SIGNAGE - The city of Weatherford is continuing work on the Route 66 Signage projects, according to Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown. "We've got the Route 66 signs, [and] the big monument sign out by the Heartland Museum. Bud Seltzer and his bunch are working on all those and doing a great job," expressed Brown. "We'll [also] have a new "Welcome to Weatherford" Sign that will promote Southwestern Weatherford on Route 66. We're hopeful to have enough money leftover to do one on the west side of town [near] Exit 80." The projects are being funded through a \$1 million grant to the city.

BECKHAM COUNTY / FATALITY - A 17-yearold juvenile from Elk City died in a one vehicle accident in rural Beckham County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol (OHP) says the driver was driving on a County Road where they went airborne, departed the road, and rolled the vehicle about five times. Troopers said a passenger in the vehicle was also injured in the crash. Both the driver and passenger were ejected from the vehicle. Names of the occupants in the vehicle were not released.

ROGER MILLS / RABIES – Officials with the Roger Mills County OSU Extension have reported at least one confirmed case of rabies in the western Oklahoma county this year, and cases across Oklahoma have been higher than usual this year. Officials say if you own or regularly encounter Pharmacy and Rural Health. Lovell says while the animals (pets, livestock, or working animals), it's important to make sure they are properly vaccinated against rabies.

> CLINTON / CRH ACTIONS - The Clinton Hospital Authority filed a breach of contract in Custer County District Court against 3rd Avenue West, citing that 3rd Avenue West had failed to hire competent people to manage and operate the hospital's revenue management system. As a result, billing and collections of revenue have greatly suffered. The city council met in executive session. Following this session, council member Stormie Hill made a motion to authorize Clinton's city attorney to draft and file a petition against Rural Hospital Solution and 3rd Avenue West. Far West Health Systems has been hired as the new revenue cycle management company to assist with billing for Clinton Regional Hospital. Additionally, the Clinton City Council acting as the public works authority recently approved a \$200,000 funding request from the hospital authority for payroll and other specifically designated expenses.

SWOSU / LOOMIS - Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) recently presented a special recognition to Jim Loomis of Weatherford. Loomis was presented with one of the university's highest honors, the SWOSU "Presidential Order of Merit." Former SWOSU president, the late Dr. John Hays, established the order back in 2004. Loomis was a member of the SWOSU football team. He spent six years coaching at SWOSU. Afterwards, he served as director of the physical plant for nearly 15 years.

Summer Feeding Program: Provides free meals and snacks to children up to the age of 18 throughout the summer months when school is not in session.



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SWOSU Mourns the Loss of Coach John Loftin

Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU)

and the SWOSU Athletic Department are mourning the loss of SWOSU Athletic Hall of Fame women's basketball coach John Loftin, who recently passed away.

John David Loftin was born on January 5, 1943, in Tulia, Texas, to the loving parents of Vernon and Mildred (Hardy) Loftin. A proud graduate of Tulia High School, completing his studies in 1961, John laid the foundation for a remarkable journey of learning and growth.

He went on to pursue higher education playing basketball at Texas Tech University, later graduating from West Texas State college, where he earned his bachelor's degree, followed by a master's degree from SWOSU.

Loftin served as head coach of the Lady Bulldogs from 1981-2000, concluding his 19-year career at SWOSU with an impressive record of 499-99 (.834), highlighted by five National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) national championships in 1982, 1983, 1985, 1987, and 1990. In his first season, he guided the team to a perfect 34-0 record and the program's first national title.

That season was one of two undefeated championship runs under his leadership. During his tenure, SWOSU made 14 NAIA Tournament appearances, including 10 trips to the Final Four and a national runner-up finish in 1992.

Across his remarkable 38-year coaching career, Loftin amassed 861 total wins. His legacy was recognized with induction into the SWOSU Athletic Hall of Fame in 2011 and the NAIA Hall of Fame in 2012, cementing his status as one of Oklahoma's greatest coaching legends.

During the 2022-23 season, the Coach John Loftin Endowment for Women's Basketball was established at SWOSU to provide ongoing scholarship and program support for the Lady Bulldogs. Later that season, the Coach John Loftin Legacy Wall was unveiled in the lobby of the Pioneer Event Center, honoring his lasting impact on the program and the countless lives he influenced.

Funeral services were held on Monday, August 25, at the First Baptist Church in Tulia, Texas. Arrangements were under the care of Kornerstone Funeral Directors. Visitation took place the day before on Sunday, August 24, at Kornerstone Funeral Directors and Crematory in Tulia.










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Alex Baxter Named SWOSU's Head Strength & Conditioning Coach

Baxter is married to his wife, Carli, and they recently welcomed their first child, Colson, in 2025.

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
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
