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Emma Rose Moore

Anyone who ever shook hands with Emma Rose Moore can take pleasure in knowing that her lovely right hand also shook the hand of Will Rogers. That priceless childhood moment foretold the delightful experiences that marked the long and



productive life of Emma Rose Dupree Moore who died November 9th, just a week before her 99th birthday.

Born in the family home on her father's Cherokee allotment to Wright and Rosa Dupree, Emma Rose mirrored her parents' faith and integrity. Emma Rose accepted Christ as her Savior when she was very young and that decision guided her in everything she did.

As a student, she excelled in all her classes and pleased every teacher from Dupree Elementary School (named after her grandfather) to those of Oklahoma Baptist University to her journalism professors at the University of Oklahoma. But the Emma Rose Moore known locally to hundreds of friends, co-workers is the one who represented the best aspects of Vinita, Oklahoma; the town she loved. Publisher O.B. Campbell chose her to be city editor of the Vinita Daily Journal when she was only 17 years old. Thus began a lifetime career in journalism that spanned several decades with numerous publications.

Emma Rose was an award-winning civic leader. News clippings of all her honors would fill a large scrapbook to overflowing. The Vinita Chamber of Commerce Hall of Fame and recognition from the Association for Women in Communications were just two of her many awards. Her distinctive writing style appeared in several newspapers including the Daily Oklahoman. In addition to her writing career, she donated time and writing skills to civic organizations such as the Vinita Day Center, the literacy program at the Vinita Public Library, and 4-H, all the while helping in numerous capacities at the First Baptist Church.

She married Dan Kirk Moore in 1949. Their first child, Mary Gail, was born in 1950, David Keith, who lived only one day, in 1951; Curtis Wayne in 1954, and Glen King in 1962. In the 1960s Emma Rose completed university studies at Northeastern State, Tahlequah to augment her B.A. in journalism with a teaching certificate.

She taught English and journalism at Vinita High School, the same school from which she graduated as valedictorian in 1944. Hundreds of VHS graduates were launched into adulthood well-equipped with the fundamentals of clear, concise, and accurate writing thanks to Mrs. Moore's stringent but compassionate instruction

Emma Rose paid special attention to proper grammar in all circumstances, including conversational speech. Once in a while, she gently corrected people when she heard a subject-verb disagreement or a double negative. It was not meant as a criticism; but a kindly warning as if a shoelace were untied.

Her devotion to the First Baptist Church began in 1936 when she was baptized. Because her grandparents were charter members, she was inspired to write a history of the church. She taught Sunday School and assisted with Falls Creek Church Camp.

In her later years, to the consternation of many, Emma Rose moved to Cordell, Oklahoma, to be closer to her daughter. Many of her friends were incredulous that she could ever leave the town where she had devoted so much of her life.

She was heartened by a hometown send-off which included the mayoral proclamation of "Emma Rose Moore Day" as she went on down the road, keeping in touch with occasional visits, Facebook, and articles published in the Journal.

She packed up necessities, donated valuable collectables, and went on down the road. She kept in touch with occasional visits, phone calls, and upbeat articles published in her beloved Journal.

Eventually communications diminished as her world became smaller with the inevitable downside of advancing old age. As she approached her 99th birthday, she often told her children, "I don't know why the Lord is keeping me here." She knew the glory that was ahead in the presence of Jesus.

One of the last people who ever met Will Rogers face to face has left this earth. But those of us who held her hand, even momentarily, are making that connection between small town girl and world-famous man, and the bridge between them is not that far. Both were well-loved and gave so much of themselves to us.

Survivors include: three children, Mary Gail Brown and husband Ray, Bessie, Okla., Curtis Moore and wife Kay, Edmond, Glen Moore and wife Jeri, Owasso; nine grandchildren, Melanie Denton and husband Brandon, Steve Brown and wife Jessica, Ryan Brown and wife Tara, Grant Brown and wife Jeree, Jessica Moore and husband Will Rice, Dennis Moore and wife Elizabeth Weaver, Derek Moore, Robert Moore and wife Betsy, Jillian Moore; 23 great-grandchildren, one nephew, and four nieces.


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
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














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Mrs. Blair's Pre-K Class Explains How to Cook a Thanksgiving Turkey

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
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35th Annual Stew Dinner Returns November 22

HYDRO EAKLY / SCHOOL RANKINGS - U.S. News and World Report recently released their best elementary and middle school rankings. Hydro-Eakly Elementary was ranked #7 among over 800 Oklahoma elementary schools, and Hydro-Eakly

middle school was ranked 16th among all of Oklahoma's middle schools. "[We're] just glad to get that recognition," Superintendent Jeremy Bussey said when he learned the good news. "The teachers can see that they're doing a great job, [and] the students can see that they're doing a great job." Bussey attributed the rankings towards student performance on state assessments.

WEATHERFORD / AMMONIA LEAK -

Hundreds of Weatherford residents returned to their homes after being evacuated in the early hours of Thirsday, November 13, due to an anhydrous ammonia leak from a tanker in the parking lot of the Holiday Inn Express. "We do believe it was a failure of a piece of equipment on the trailer, nothing intentional," explained Weatherford Emergency Management Director Mike Karlin. "We do largescale event training exercises normally every year... for the events that we don't want to happen. It seemed like a very chaotic operation for the first little while, but looking back, it was a very, very well-operated incident." Two patients remain in critical condition. 11 people were transported to metro area hospitals. 34 patients were transported to Weatherford Regional Hospital, 19 were treated and released from the scene. Some first responders who suffered exposure also had to be checked out.

WEATHERFORD / FIRE - The Weatherford Fire Department recently worked on a structure fire in the 400 block of Tom Stafford. "We were able to contain the fire...to a single room. Fire crews were able to go in, put it out, extinguish the fire fairly quickly," said Chief Kory Selman. "All occupants made it out. However, there was one dog that could not make it out. Everything in that room was a loss." Some electrical damage was also sustained during the fire.

CUSTER CO / BELL - A Cordell woman has been charged in Custer County District Court with embezzlement and a pattern of criminal offenses. 49-year-old Brandy Nicole Bell worked for a Clinton business and allegedly made checks out to herself and her son and, among other things, allegedly charged items at ACE Hardware and O'Reilly Auto Parts. Court records show that transactions from checks cashed at a bank, and transactions from Amazon, ACE Hardware, and O'Reilly Auto Parts total \$10,000.

SWOSU / LEWIS - A SWOSU student who was arrested in connection with another student's death recently appeared in Chickasaw Nation District Court. SWOSU student, 18-year-old Logan Musil was found dead near veterans lake on October 8th after being reported missing nearly a month earlier. That same week, classmate Cameron Lewis was arrested on a complaint of abusing a corpse by knowingly and willfully disposing of a body, following an initial investigation by the OSBI. Lewis is currently out on bond and is required to wear an ankle monitor. He is expected to appear in court again on February 4th.

WEATHERFORD / FOOD DRIVE - Red Rock Behavioral Health Services is hosting a community food drive through November 30th. They are collecting non-perishable food items, bottled drinks, baby food, ready-to-eat meals, on-the-go-snacks, and personal care items to help local families in need.

WEATHERFORD / NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Weatherford Schools Superintendent Mark Harmon gave an update to the school board regarding a future bond issue for construction of a new high school. "[Once] we get the renderings on the new gymnasium, which is what we're waiting on from the architect, we'll be able to send that to the construction management team, and they can get us a final number." Harmon added that he is hopeful to have that estimate in the next few weeks.





Malcolm Murphy and Mackenzie Sims have been selected as the latest


Bulldogs of the Week by SWOSU Athletic.

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SWOSU Completes OK Sweep, Crushes NWOSU in Season Finale



SWOSU Football Jon Chidester closed the 2025 season in dominant fashion, rolling past Northwestern 45-3 in the regular-season finale on Saturday.

With the win, SWOSU finishes the season 6-5, earning the program's first winning record since 2015.

The Bulldogs also completed a perfect 5-0 mark against teams from Oklahoma, their first undefeated in-state run since 2016.

The Bulldogs piled up 531 yards of offense — their highest total since 2018 — and came within a long, GAC-tying 53-yard Ranger field goal of securing a second straight shutout.

SWOSU scored on all four of its first-half drives to build a 24-3 halftime lead. After a fumble on their opening possession of the third quarter and a punt on the next, the Bulldogs slammed the door by scoring touchdowns on their next three drives to break the game wide open.

Baylor Nash sparked the scoring with a 30-yard touchdown grab on SWOSU's opening drive and later added a second score on a double-pass trick play — a 49-yard strike from Isaac Norris that left him wide open downfield. Nash needed only three receptions to record his third 100-yard game of the season, finishing with 127 yards.

Quarterback MJ Rivers turned in another efficient performance, going 18-for-22 for 277 yards and three touchdowns — just five yards shy of matching his season high in passing yardage.

On the ground, Malik Roberson led the way with 89 yards on only five carries, highlighted by a 67yard burst.

Red Martel added 44 yards on 10 attempts, scoring his sixth rushing touchdown of the season and later his first receiving touchdown on a 29yard catch.

Defensively, the Bulldogs held an opponent under 300 yards for the fifth time this season. Northwestern managed just 280 yards and committed three turnovers — all produced by Malcolm Murphy, who intercepted two passes (including one in the end zone) and both forced and recovered a fumble.

Malcom Gooden anchored the defense with a team-high six tackles.

Offensively, SWOSU finished 5-of-10 on third down, 2-of-3 on fourth down, and piled up 26 first downs—their second-highest total this season. The Bulldogs' 326 passing yards also marked a new season high.





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
