


Chris treasured spending time with his family and friends, he will be deeply missed and greatly remembered by all who knew and loved him.

CLINTON / REI DESIGNATION - Clinton Regional Hospital CEO Lyn Lacefield says the hospital has officially received its Rural Emergency Hospital (REI) designation. "[This designation] allows for the subsidy from the government to the hospital, allowing us to continue to provide great care to our community and county," explained Lacefield. "The rural health challenges have been not just reimbursement, but volume in an inpatient setting. Most hospitals in rural Oklahoma simply don't carry enough inpatient admissions since it's difficult and expensive to recruit specialists out to rural communities." Lacefield added that the REH licensure means there won't be in-patient admissions, but the hospital will continue to offer many outpatient services.

CLINTON / MOWER RETIREMENT - The director of Clinton Economic Development Authority, Roland Mower, will be retiring at the end of the year. Mayor David Berrong says the development authority will be very intentional in choosing the right candidate to fill the open position. "We've learned a lot--what works, what doesn't work--we just know that being serious about economic development in Clinton during this period of time that we're living is critical mass," expressed Berrong, "and you can't take it lightly, and it's not a whack-a-mole situation where you just [hope for the best]."

CUSTER CO / BRIDGES - A Weatherford man made a court appearance on Monday, November 17, in Custer County District Court on a charge of first degree manslaughter in commission of a misdemeanor. 24-year-old Jonathan bridges is charged in connection with the shooting death of Landon Whitley. Court records show Bridges and Whitley were consuming alcohol and dry firing their weapons when Bridges forgot he put the magazine back in his weapon and later cocked the firearm, pointed the weapon at Whitley and fired the pistol which resulted in the death of Whitley. Bridges is due back in court next month.

CLINTON / COACHING CHANGE - Officials with Clinton Public Schools say a leadership change is coming for the high school football program. Head Coach John Higbee has been relieved of his duties effective immediately. Superintendent Nathan Meget stated that the district is grateful for coach Higbee's leadership, success, time, and effort over the past 8 seasons. However, he says it's time for the Clinton High School football program to move forward in a new direction. The process of selecting the next head football coach will begin immediately.

WEATHERFORD / ROTARY - During the most recent Weatherford Rotary meeting, Colonel Kale Rogers, Commander of the Oklahoma Army National Guard's 45th Field Artillery brigade says a big event is coming up soon at the Weatherford regional training facility on Airport Road. "On December 3rd at 10am, we're going to hold a ribbon cutting...and bring the guard back to Weatherford," Rogers explained. "Hopefully, state funds can help provide that \$30 million so we can actually put a company of infantry here in Weatherford for domestic operations for when the sons and daughters need us most in Oklahoma." Additionally, in 2013, the city of Weatherford donated more than 30 acres of real estate in the industrial park to the Oklahoma National Guard for a new readiness center. City officials are hoping that project can move forward

ELK CITY / STRUCTURE FIRE - Fire crews in Elk City recently worked to put out a residential structure fire in the 900 block of North Randall. Firefighters arrived to find heavy smoke coming from the roof of the residence. Crews made entry into the structure. The majority of the fire was located in the attic and was quickly extinguished. The homeowner was not home at the time of the incident. Most of the damage was confined to the area of origin in the attic. Firefighters are investigating the cause of the blaze.







#### SWOSU Bulldogs Fall at Oklahoma Christian in Third Game of 2025

A late surge by Oklahoma Christian proved to be the

difference on Saturday, as SWOSU fell 68-60 on the road. The Bulldogs held a 57-55 lead with just over four minutes remaining, but the Eagles responded with a decisive 9-1 run that flipped the game and pushed them across the finish line.

SWOSU led 26-25 at halftime before cooling off in the second half, shooting 35% from the field and 3-of-19 from three over the final 20 minutes. OCU countered with 58% shooting after the break, including six made threes, to outscore the Dawgs 43-34 down the stretch. Three Bulldogs finished in double figures, led by Kayden Carter's 18 points. Ty Frierson added 15 points and a team-high seven assists, while Tobias Roland posted his first doubledouble of the season with 12 points and 11 rebounds.

The loss drops SWOSU to 1-3 on the young season. The Bulldogs now turn their attention to Tuesday's home opener against Science & Arts of Oklahoma (USAO) on November 25 before Thanksgiving Break.

#### **SWOSU Volleyball Ends in Champions Match**

SWOSU Volleyball fell short in the GAC

Championship game to Oklahoma Baptist in straight sets on Saturday afternoon.

The Dawgs finish the year 16-15 overall and 12-4 in conference play. This was their first appearance in the GAC Tournament final since 2015 where they took home their lone tournament championship.

The first set was a back-and-forth affair with neither team having more than a three-point lead until the game sat at 16 on each side. OBU then caught fire and went untouchable, scoring the final 10 points to take a 1–0 lead in the match. Oklahoma Baptist hit a blistering .429 to the Bulldogs' .114, and each team had two blocks.

The second set opened on a similar track with the Bison taking the opening three points. The Dawgs narrowed the margin to two but could never get over the hump. The middle part of the set featured a 7-0 run by Oklahoma Baptist that broke it open, and a late push by the Dawgs ended the set 25-20 in favor of OBU.

In the third and final set, the Dawgs couldn't string together enough points to build momentum, but they stayed close enough to keep it competitive. It was a two-point game with OBU up 22–20 before the Bison earned their first match point at 24–21. The Bulldogs had to fight off three match points to stay alive, just as they did in their semifinal match yesterday. They managed to do it again, winning the next three points to tie the set. However, the magic ran out, and the Bison took the final two points to close the match.

The Bison finished with 55 kills to the Bulldogs' 39, while SWOSU hit .205 compared to Oklahoma Baptist's .294. The Dawgs recorded five service errors and four service aces.

Hailey Smith led SWOSU with 17 kills and no errors, finishing just one shy of her career high set in the quarterfinal win over East Central. Mackenzie Sims handed out 33 assists alongside three kills and six digs, and Jada Permenter collected a team-high 16 digs. Smith and Permenter were named to the All-Great American Conference Tournament Team at the conclusion of the match.
