





#### Town of Hinton Makes Proclamation to Become Purple Heart Town

On Tuesday, November 18th, 2025, the Town of Hinton took formal steps to recognize the armed service members of their community who were willing to pay the ultimate price to protect America's freedom by issuing a town proclamation honoring their service. This town proclamation was one step in becoming a Purple Heart Town, an honor shared with over 60 other communities in Oklahoma.

"This proclamation is recognizing that your community supports and honors veterans and active service members," said Josh Brookshire, Public Works Director for the Town of Hinton. Brookshire as well as other town officials worked with the Oklahoma City chapter of the Order of Purple Heart in order to gain the recognition. The Town of Hinton is home to 28 service members who valiantly gave their lives protecting America in wars during the last century.

Hinton has made great strides in recent years to ensure those veterans legacy is never forgotten.

"At a point in the future we'll do another presentation. They'll actually present a plaque. Then, when you come into town, we'll have some designations on our town limit signs," added Brookshire. That presentation is expected to take place in the new year sometime around January or February.

Below is "Resolution 2025-10," the Proclamation issued by the Town of Hinton in order to receive its Purple Heart Town status:

Whereas, the citizens of Hinton have great admiration and gratitude for the men and women who have selflessly served their country and this community in the Armed Forces; and

Whereas, the Purple Heart is the oldest military decoration in present use and was initially created

as the Badge of Military Merit by George Washington in 1782; and

Whereas, the Purple Heart was the first American service award or decoration made available to the common soldier and is specifically awarded to the members of the United States Armed Forces who have been wounded or paid the ultimate sacrifice in combat; and

Whereas, the Town of Hinton appreciates the sacrifices our Purple Heart recipients made in defending our freedoms and acknowledges those men and women for their courage by showing our support and honor; and Now, Therefore, be it resolved, that We, the Hinton Town Trustees and all its Citizens, do hereby proclaim Hinton, to be a "Purple Heart Town"

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the City be affixed this 18th day of November, 2025

#### Wanda Schneider



A beloved wife, mother, and grandmother, Wanda Fay (Motley) Schneider was born in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma on February 12, 1937.

She grew up in southern Oklahoma and graduated from Bradley High School. During high

school, she played on the basketball team. Shortly after graduating high school, Wanda and Calvin Dwaine started dating. And on August 18, 1956, in Chickasha, they married.

Wanda's cup overflowed with love and optimism. Following one of her many cancer treatments, she displayed her hallmark fighting spirit and sense of humor when she greeted her grandchildren at the front door, sporting a biker bandana featuring orange flames.

In addition to being a dedicated homemaker and mom, she was a true creative. She enjoyed making porcelain dolls, crafting Christmas ornaments, and quilting. After her children left home for college and to build their own lives, she became a small businesswoman when she launched Grandma's Love. Through this venture, she sold the dolls and ornaments.

Wanda devoted much of her time to Gideons International, the Oklahoma Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, and the Thomas Methodist Church. She spent many Thanksgivings at church cooking for others, and she routinely helped prepare food for grieving families after funerals. She liked contributing behind the scenes. While she appreciated a thank you, her service was never conditional on recognition.

Wanda also enjoyed cooking and baking for her family and others. Her peach cobbler and poppyseed bread were two of her "famous" recipes.

This is not to say that she particularly shared her recipes willingly or in their entirety.

Occasionally, she "forgot" an ingredient or amount when sharing them. Ultimately, she wanted you to keep coming back to visit and eat.

Most of all, Wanda served her family as a pillar of quiet strength and protection. She was a great listener, too. This was most likely out of necessity, considering whom she married. But nothing made her light up more or made the twinkle in her eyes brighter than when her grandchildren or greatgrandchildren entered the room.

Much of her family time was spent watching sports. She enjoyed cheering on the Thomas Terrier, SWOSU, and OU athletic teams. Most of all, she treasured every opportunity to watch her grandchildren compete.

Wanda was preceded in death by her parents, Jack and Essie Motley; her sisters, Janice, Wilma, and Doris; her husband of 64 years at the time of his passing, Calvin Dwaine (whom she affectionately called her "Fat Little German"); her eldest daughter, Vickie Ann (Schneider) Chapman; and her grandson, Tyler Don Schneider.

#### Gary Kautz

Garland "Gary" Chester Kautz was born in Watonga Hospital on November 5, 1950, to Benjamin Franklin Kautz and Lorene (Van Gilder) Kautz of Geary. He passed away at his home in Yukon, Oklahoma, on November



21, 2025, at the age of 75 years and 16 days.

Gary attended first and second grade in Geary before the family moved to Watonga. In his youth he worked as a carhop at Sonic and later became one of Love's very first employees at Store #1. In high school, Gary enjoyed weightlifting, track, and baseball, but he truly excelled in football. He received numerous awards and accolades, including "Fightingest Eagle" in 1967 and 1968, All-District in 1968, and was selected by fans for "The Team of the Decade." In 2008, he was inducted into the Watonga Football Hall of Fame.

After graduating in 1968, Gary briefly attended SWOSU. He married Janet Sisson on February 7, 1969. They made their home in Watonga, later moved to Yukon, and eventually settled in Fay in 1976, where they raised their own two girls and also helped raise some who weren't theirs.

Over the years, Gary worked at Honeywell, Wills Welding, and Slawson Oil before founding his own company, Kautz's Pumping, in 1986. He remained close with his employees throughout the nearly forty years that followed, especially his longtime friend Don L.; he made a whole new "lake family" at Eufaula, and he never lost touch with his high school pals.

Gary was an avid pilot. He earned his student pilot certificate on October 5, 1968, and his private pilot's license on January 6, 1975. He loved traveling, spending time at the lake, and playing golf with his buddies. He attended his grandchildren's activities as often as he could, cheering them on with pride. He loved hanging out with the IU Crew and watching sports and westerns. Most of all, Gary enjoyed swapping stories, sharing a good laugh, and making memories with his family and dear friends that will be treasured forever.

Gary will be remembered for his dry humor, his grunts and grit, his loyalty, and the deep love he had for his family and friends. His presence will be profoundly missed, but his legacy lives on in all who knew and loved him.

Gary was preceded in death by his parents. He is survived by his daughters, Julie Moore and her husband Rusty of Thomas, and Elly Nossaman and her husband Travis of Yukon. Farrell says a clearer timeline should be available after the first of the year.


**WEATHERFORD / TOURISM GRANT - The** Weatherford City Commission has approved a Route 66 promotion grant that will feature the popular astronaut statue as part of the city's efforts to attract travelers along the historic highway. "We decided to let our Weatherford Public Schools come up with names, and then Route 66 Committee decided which one we were going to go with," explained Councilman Garrett Smith. "And Weatherford High School came up with Major Tom, and we thought that was a good, easy name recognition for the statue." The grant totals \$10,371.00 and will support Weatherford's route 66 promotion campaign as preparations continue for the upcoming tourism season.

WASHITA CO / ACCIDENT - The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says a Canute man was injured in a one vehicle accident in Washita County. OHP says 48-year-old Rhett Beutler was driving around State Highway 152 and County Road 2430 when his vehicle ran off the road, rolled and struck a barbed wire fence.

CORDELL / CORDELL LAKE - Cordell officials have revealed that progress is being made toward reopening Cordell Lake. Mayor Phil Kliewer recently updated city council members on new coordination efforts and where the project stands. "[We have] some tentative agreements with various entities, including the county, about potentially rebuilding the bridge at Cordell Lake," explained Kliewer. "We've got Davy Sewell providing the culverts, and there would be a connecting culvert with banding somewhere around 8 foot around culverts, about 90 foot long, 30 yards." Kliewer added that fencing also needs to be placed around the water treatment area, along with a gate at the entrance with a possible QR code system for residents to access the property.

**CLINTON / CHAMBER AWARD - The Clinton** Chamber of Commerce has been awarded the Digital Media Communications award at the Oklahoma Chamber of Commerce Executives Awards Ceremony. The chamber earned this recognition for its extraordinarily successful Monday Member Pop-In Series, a weekly digital featurette that shines the spotlight on chamber members through fun, engaging, behind-the-scenes videos shared across social media.

WEATHERFORD / LAWSUIT - Four victims of the recent Weatherford ammonia leak are now suing the companies it believes contributed to their suffering. The suit, which was filed in Custer County District Court, has named Airgas, the company that owns the tanker truck as a defendant. It also names IHG Hotels and champion hotels as defendants for their role in the location of the incident, the Weatherford Holiday Inn Express and Suites. Attorney Clay Bruner says the hotel is responsible for allowing a toxic tanker to park in the parking lot. The plaintiffs are seeking \$75,000 each for damages.



### **Deer Creek Conservation District Announces Open House Regarding Cedar Tree Eradication**

The Deer Creek Conservation District will host an Open House on December 9, 2025, from 10:00 AM to 1:00 PM, with a special focus on cedar tree eradication and wildfire mitigation efforts.

The event is open to all agricultural producers, as well as community members interested in conservation and the programs available through the district office. Representatives—including the Board of Directors, District Manager, Conservation Planner, and the district's newly hired Land Management Technician—will be available to answer questions and provide information.

The district recently welcomed a Land Management Technician through the Oklahoma Conservation Commission to support brush management and reduce wildfire risks. This position plays a critical role in protecting life and property within local communities and in maintaining rural infrastructure throughout the North Canadian Watershed.

A major focus of the program is addressing the rapid spread of Eastern Red Cedar.

Eastern Red Cedars can consume up to 30 gallons of water per tree daily in the summer, diminishing groundwater resources that are vital to producers and rural communities. Despite their high water usage, the trees are highly flammable and capable of sending thousands of embers downwind, significantly increasing wildfire risk.




Jackson led all scorers in that game with a careerhigh 23 points, as well as eight rebounds.







### **Balanced Effort Lifts Dawgs in Home Opener**



SWOSU Men's Basketball snapped its three-game skid

in emphatic fashion Monday night, rolling past USAO 89-60 in the home opener inside the Pioneer Event Center. The 29-point margin marks the Bulldogs' largest victory since a 122-81 win over Randall in 2022. SWOSU now heads into Thanksgiving break before closing out non-conference play on December 1, when they host Southwestern Christian at 5:30 p.m. in the PEC.

The Dawgs built a double-digit lead just eight minutes into the game, going up 17-7 thanks to a Spencer Musgrove three—one of his four made threes on perfect shooting in the first half. SWOSU led by as many as 15, and while the Drovers brought an electric offense to Weatherford, averaging nearly 100 points through their opening six games, the Dawgs' defense held strong, allowing only 29 points in the first 20 minutes—the lowest total in any half this season for USAO.

The Dawgs' defense continued its strong showing after not allowing a made shot for the opening eight minutes, forcing 14 straight misses to start the second half and allowing the Bulldogs' lead to balloon to 22 points. The SWOSU advantage never faltered below 15 points for the remainder of the game and was put out of reach by multiple threes from Walker Kennedy and two massive dunks by Tucker Shepherd, which erupted the crowd and sealed the win.

The Bulldogs shot a season-high 54.8% from the field while holding USAO to just 30%—a season low both against the Dawgs and for the Drovers. SWOSU knocked down 13 threes at a 46.4% clip, while USAO managed only six makes on 22.2% shooting from deep. The Drovers attempted 25 free throws, compared to just 11 for SWOSU.

Musgrove led the way with a career-high 16 points on 6-7 shooting, with all of his scoring coming in the first half. Kray Rogers and Walker Kennedy each added 11, with Kennedy setting a new season high. Rogers also posted 10 rebounds, five assists, and four steals. Ty Frierson finished with 10 points, becoming the Dawgs' fourth double-digit scorer.

### An Upset Bid of No. 7 Spoiled at the Buzzer

SWOSU Women's Basketball took No.

7-ranked Lubbock Christian to the very last possession, but a Lady Chap three-pointer at the buzzer spoiled the upset bid as the Lady Bulldogs fell 62-61 inside the Pioneer Event Center.

SWOSU held a 61-59 lead with eight seconds remaining following a pair of free throws and needed one final defensive stop. After LCU advanced the ball with a timeout, the Lady Chaps buried the deciding three-pointer as time expired.

The game-winner stayed on theme with Lubbock Christian's attack. The Lady Chaps knocked down 12 three-pointers on the night at a 44% clip — 12 of their 19 made field goals came from beyond the arc.

SWOSU entered the fourth quarter trailing 42-36 after a strong third period from LCU, who outscored the Lady Dawgs 21-14. But the deficit vanished quickly. Elle Papahronis delivered an and-one layup and a three-pointer on back-to-back possessions to tie the game in the opening minute of the final frame.

From there, neither team led by more than two possessions. With under two minutes remaining, Payten Conde traded threes with LCU on consecutive

trips to keep SWOSU within striking distance, and a Sincere Jackson layup put the Dawgs ahead with 39 seconds left. SWOSU followed with a defensive stop and split a pair at the free-throw line to set up the final sequence.

Offense was hard to come by early. SWOSU cashed in 11 first-half LCU turnovers for eight points and held a 22-21 advantage at the break despite another buzzer-beating three-pointer from the Lady Chaps to close the half.

The Dawgs shot 37.7% for the game but finished just 3-of-18 from deep, with all three makes coming in the fourth quarter. LCU was limited to 32% shooting in the first half and 33% in the third, but went 10-for-17 (59%) in the final 10 minutes.

SWOSU won the turnover battle 18-9 and outrebounded the Lady Chaps 35-33. Jackson led all scorers with a career-high 23 points and added eight rebounds. Papahronis followed with 16 points and nine boards. Landry Allen posted 12 points along with four blocks, four rebounds, and three steals.

SWOSU (2-2) will break for Thanksgiving before returning to action on Monday, December 1 on the road against Eastern New Mexico. Tipoff is scheduled for 7:00 p.m.
