Connections' 2026 Grand Can Sculpture Contest Features Rt. 66 Theme

Connections Food & Resource Center in Weatherford has opened entries to their 2026 Grand Can Sculpture Competition which is scheduled to take place March 24-26. This annual competition showcases local organizations' and businesses' creativity while also providing critical donations of various foodstuffs to support Western Oklahomans in need.

For a \$50 entry fee, anyone can register their group for the competition. Entries are limited to 12 teams total, so make sure to apply before the March 7th deadline. Once registered, groups are tasked with designing a sculpture completely built with canned goods and other shelf stable food.

For the Route 66 Centennial Anniversary, the sculptors this year have been given a prompt: their builds must depict a landmark featured on the historic Route 66 Highway. Elizabeth Amen, Director for the Connections Food & Resource Center, expressed her excitement on how this prompt can be interpreted in a number of ways to make the competition accessible to new and veteran builders alike.

"We know that for a lot of first time builders, there's a concern about money or needing to get a ton of cans," Amen expressed. "But sometimes, a simple build, like recreating signs on the side of the road can go a long way. You don't have to build a recreation of a [Cadillac Ranch] painted car or the spaceman."

From 9am - 9pm on Tuesday, March 24th and Wednesday, March 25th, teams will build their sculptures at the Connections Food & Resource Center's warehouse (122 S. 8th Street, Weatherford).

On Thursday, March 26th, from 11am to 5:15pm, any interested spectator will be allowed to view and vote on the year's best sculptures. Voting will take place through monetary donations given to participating organizations at the event as well as through liking photos of the teams' sculptures on social media. After voting has concluded, at 6pm, several awards will be given to participants of the event.

The world is a bit dimmer today, but the heavens have brightened with the passing of Kim Ellen Short. Many spend years trying to find a life purpose or meaning. Kim was born to Ralph Leroy Young and Lynne Maxine (Reeder) Young-Studier on March 13, 1962 in Wichita, KS, with every part of her being ready to become a Nurse/Caregiver/Mom like her mother.



Kim's early life was spent in Texas and Oklahoma with even a brief time in Weatherford where she attended kindergarten. Upon the passing of her father, Kim moved to Weatherford with her mother and sisters. Within a year or two of attending Weatherford High School, Kim's certainty of her future led her to find the clueless boy she would build her life with. He, however, took a bit longer to realize this destiny. When he finally called to make a date to see the movie Grease at the Vesta Theater, the adventure called life began for her and Jeff Short.

Kim graduated with the uniquely talented Weatherford Eagle Class of 1980 having already started concurrent enrollment at SWOSU with a Nursing Degree in mind. Kim married her high-school sweetheart at the beginning of her Senior year of Nursing School on August 6, 1983 letting Jeff believe it was his idea they should wed. She graduated with her Bachelor Degree of Nursing in 1984 as a proud SWOSU Bulldog. Shortly after graduation she passed her Board Exams to become a Registered Nurse.

Kim took her nursing career ever-so seriously, quoting the Nurse Practice Act, ethics and responsibilities as if words from the Most High, however, she connected with patients on a deeply personal level.

After a short tenure at the Weatherford Memorial Hospital, Kim took a job with the OK Department of Health as a Public Health Nurse.

In the late 1980's Kim was selected to be one of several nurses for the Department to begin a new program to bring advanced health services to underserved areas of the state through Pediatric Nurse Practitioners. With her cohorts, she attended courses daily at the University of Colorado at Denver for many months and finished a clinical practicum the following year leading her to the position of Advanced Registered Nurse Practitioner-Pediatric Nurse Practitioner.

Although still the ultimate professional nurse in every sense, Kim reveled in caring for and loving thousands of children she saw in her clinics throughout western Oklahoma.

Many images, pictures, and memories are of Kim in the clinic floor playing and entertaining a toddler or child while she assessed and rendered care. She could comfort an ailing child so quickly by searching for piggies in the ear or showing them her fun otoscope.

Kim started her family in 1990 with a baby girl and then another. She was as talented a mother as she was a career nurse. A baby boy and then another girl in 1997 completed the family. She was a staunch advocate of natural childbirth without aid of anesthetics having taught childbirth courses at SWOSU and being a voice for breastfeeding moms as a lactation consultant through the Health Department, believing in Nature's plan as the best way to raise children.

After finding her niche as a Mother and PNP, Kim had always desired a Master of Nursing degree. While being Mom to the young kids, career nurse, and heavily involved in the Weatherford Soccer Boosters, Kim completed her Master's degree at night sleeping little and giving her all. She was humble, unassuming, with Super Woman's vitality and power.

After four decades of Nursing, Kim retired from the OK State Department of Health. She enjoyed children, the outdoors, OKC Philharmonic concerts, children, dinner dates with Jeff, children, and most of all her children.

Kim is survived by her high school love, Jeff; her daughter Kelley Short of Weatherford with grandchildren Lynne and Kade Yoder; her daughter Tiffany Dyson, husband Matt, and grandtwins Lynne and Louis of OKC; son Stephen Short of Web City, MO; and daughter Sarah Burchett, husband Eric, and grandson Carson of Hinton. All her daughters work in the medical field with two being nurses like their Mom. She is also survived by her mother, Lynne Young-Studier of Weatherford; sister Kristi Murphy with husband, Richard; and sister Keri Jackson with husband Robert.

Kim was preceded in death by her father, Ralph, and her stepfather, John Studier.

On January 14th of 2026 all the children, babies, and infants of heaven received our most precious gift of Nurse Kim. Toddler teddy bear dances and silly song marathons with maybe even a rendition or two of the Star-Spangled Banner have begun.

Robert Sidney Heinrichs was born May 8, 1968, and entered his eternal home on January 14, 2026, at the age of 57 years and 8 months.


b never knew a stranger. In his younger years, our mom would tell the story of taking


Rob was also a cowboy working on a ranch. His pastime was raising bucking bulls and team roping competition.





Stafford Air and Space Museum Announces 2026 "State of the Stafford" for January 31st

The Stafford Air & Space Museum in Weatherford will host their "State of the Stafford" event for 2026. The event will be open to the public via RSVP on Saturday January 31, from 6 PM – 8 PM. Hors d'oeuvres and drinks will be provided.

"The evening is going to be a fantastic evening where we are celebrating a lot of our achievements and successes that we've had over 2025," expressed Stafford Museum Executive Director Julie Lenius. "2025 was a record year for us here at the Stafford Air and Space Museum, So we want to share a lot of that information with our members and guests."

The event will cover accomplishments the museum made in 2025 as well as a behind-the-scenes look at the events planned for 2026. Subjects of discussion include the STEM Engagement Center & Event Center's recent expansions and the new Shooting Star Park. The event will also cover Stafford Scholar opportunities, member benefits,

and some upcoming events planned for 2026, as well as the construction of a new event center where the event will be held, located to the right of the main entrance.

"It's going to be the first event that we host in our new event center, so that in itself is a good reason to come out and check out our new space," explained Lenius. "It's going to be one of the premier event spaces in western Oklahoma. We're really excited to kind of break that in and have everyone come and explore that."

CLINTON / SIDEWALK GRANT PROJECT

Clinton city officials are adjusting expectations on a previously approved transportation grant application tied to a sidewalk project at Clinton Public Schools. During the most recent city council meeting, City Manager Robert Johnston said there is a delay with the funding. "We all passed a resolution, and we finalized our grant application for the TAP grant," explained Roberts. "We got word today that they've somewhat delayed that funding project, so it's not going to happen quite as soon as we thought." City officials say they will provide updates on the funding and sidewalk project as more information becomes available.

CLINTON / SCHOOL THREAT

School officials and local law enforcement sprang into action after an anonymous threat was made on Clinton Middle School. District Superintendent Nathan Meget says fortunately it was a false threat. I don't want to talk about the investigation because it's still ongoing, but I believe the [phone] number was from out of state," Meget recounted. "A lot of us are having incidents where people call in [with] some of these hoax phone calls and I guess today was our day to be on that call list. I'm grateful that it was a hoax, and I'm grateful that our Clinton Police Department and OHP take these things very seriously." Meget added that, as a precaution, all school sites were placed on lockdown while the situation was under investigation.

CUSTER CO / ABSENTEE DEADLINE

The deadline for requesting an absentee ballot for the February 10 special election for the Weatherford school district is Monday, February 2, at 5pm. Early voting for the election will begin Thursday, February 5 and conclude Friday, February 6. Early voting will be held from 8 AM - 6 PM both days at the Custer County election board office in Clinton. Early voting will not be held on Monday, February 9, prior to the election. Regular polling sites will be open on election day from 7am-7pm.

CLINTON / CRH LAWSUIT

Clinton's lawsuit over the previous closure of Clinton Regional Hospital remains active as the city continues legal action against Alliance Health. Mayor David Berrong says the case is currently awaiting action at the federal level. "It's on the desk of a federal judge, [but] civil suits are handled in a different way than criminal actions. It's not justice delayed, is justice denied," Berrong lamented. "We still have a lawsuit that is sitting there that needs to be picked up by the federal judge and moved forward." The city will continue to keep residents updated as soon as there is movement in the case.

CUSTER CO / FLOODPLAIN INSPECTIONS

Custer County Emergency Management Director Hardey Sperle says his department has been busy conducting floodplain inspections across the county. "I had some floodplain inspections last week," explained Sperle. "Those have been coming in more so than they did the last couple months." Much of the work has focused on inspections tied to pipeline construction projects.

ELK CITY / NEW PARK

A new park has been designed for Elk City and is expected to go out for bid soon. "We've got some green space. We'll have an event space with two pavilions, a couple of food truck courts," said City Manager Tom Ivester. "[We're] excited to have that for events right next to Main Street on downtown." The project is currently priced at \$1 million.




OTC Discusses State Infrastructure Projects During Custer County Meeting in January

Two major Custer County transportation infrastructure projects were discussed earlier this month at the Oklahoma Transportation Commission's meeting for January 2026. OTC officials approved appropriating funds for engineering services for state highway 33 between Custer City and Thomas, and Oklahoma Department of Transportation's Executive Director Tim Gatz reminded the public to be aware of the impending interchange project that will soon begin construction at mile marker 65 and 65a on I-40 in Clinton.

OTC members approved \$2,078,500 to be appropriated to civil engineering firm Freese and Nichols for engineering services on State Highway 33 that seek to add shoulders, resurface the roadway, and evaluate skewed intersections in order to rehabilitate infrastructure in the corridor between Custer City and Thomas. Bids for construction on the project are expected to be open in the 2031 fiscal year.


ODOT's executive Director Tim Gatz also spoke about the upcoming I-40 interchange project in Clinton at mile markers 65 and 65a near Redwheat Drive and Gary Boulevard. The interchange project seeks to rehabilitate and reconstruct existing interchanges while providing better growth opportunities for the City of Clinton.

Gatz lauded Clinton City officials as well as ODOT District Five Engineer Will Snipes for their work in formulating a phasing plan that will turn what was seen as a 4 year project into something closer to a 2 year project, stating that officials recognized "that the best way to reduce the impact of a workzone is to get done with it."

Gatz also noted that construction of detours to begin the road work will take 2 to 3 months and "It will be a little disruptive on the main line of I-40 and certainly to the community and [we] want to give everybody a reminder that that's about to get started in earnest."

Early Lead Slips Away in Road Loss to No. 25

SWOSU Women's Basketball came up short Thursday night, falling 69-56 to No. 25 Northwestern Oklahoma State.

The Lady Bulldogs struggled to find consistency offensively, shooting 33% for the game, and were unable to fully capitalize on late opportunities despite trimming a double-digit deficit in the final quarter.

SWOSU trailed by as many as 16 in the first half before cutting the margin to six with 2:01 remaining, but could not complete the comeback.

SWOSU got off to a strong start, leading 16-11 with 3:01 left in the first quarter. Northwestern responded with a decisive 9-0 run to close the period, regaining the lead for good. That momentum carried into the second quarter, as the Lady Rangers scored the first 10 points to extend the advantage to 30-16. SWOSU trailed 39-28 at halftime.

The Lady Bulldogs made their push coming out of the break, turning in their best shooting quarter of the night in the third

SWOSU narrowly outscored Northwestern 17-16 in the period, but could not gain significant ground.

Despite Northwestern committing eight turnovers in the fourth quarter and scoring just once in the first five minutes, SWOSU went cold offensively, shooting just 4-of-16 in the final 10 minutes to halt the rally. Northwestern finished the night shooting 41% from the field, going 5-of-18 from beyond the arc and 16-of-20 at the free-throw line. SWOSU shot 11-of-35 from three-point range and attempted just six free throws in the game — all taken by Landry Allen, who converted five.

Allen led all scorers with 21 points and added six rebounds, six blocks, and four assists. Elle Papahronis chipped in 11 points on a perfect 3-of-3 shooting effort from deep and grabbed a team-high seven rebounds.

SWOSU was outrebounded 36-25 and committed five more turnovers than Northwestern, 18-13.

SWOSU (6-10, 4-7 GAC) will return to action Thursday night, January 29, to face off against Arkansas Tech at 7:30 PM.

SWOSU Bulldogs Fall to Rangers on the Road

SWOSU Men's Basketball trailed for the entirety of the second half but cut the deficit to one possession late before coming up short in an 80-73 loss to Northwestern Oklahoma State on Thursday night inside Percefull Fieldhouse.

The Bulldogs struggled offensively in the opening half, scoring just 26 points, but turned up the tempo after halftime and stayed within striking distance throughout the final 20 minutes. Northwestern ultimately did just enough to hold off the rally, edging SWOSU by a single point in second-half scoring while shooting 55% after the break compared to SWOSU's 47%.

Despite the loss, SWOSU took care of the basketball, committing just seven turnovers on the night — tying a season low.

SWOSU briefly held a 13-12 lead midway through the first half before Northwestern used an 11-1 run to seize control. The Rangers pushed the margin to as many as 12 before halftime, but the Bulldogs battled to stay close and trailed just 32-26 at the break.

Northwestern extended its lead to double digits multiple times in the second half, but each push was met with an answer from SWOSU. The Bulldogs consistently cut the deficit back to manageable margins and pulled within one possession with just under three minutes remaining. However, SWOSU was unable to string together the stops and scores needed to complete the comeback down the stretch.

SWOSU shot 42% from the field for the game and finished 5-of-25 from three-point range. The Bulldogs went 16-of-23 at the free-throw line. Northwestern shot an even 50% overall, went 5-of-16 from beyond the arc, and finished 15-of-18 at the stripe. The Rangers held a 37-25 rebounding advantage, while SWOSU forced six more turnovers than it committed.

Kayden Carter led the Bulldogs with 18 points, eight rebounds, and four assists. Ty Frierson added 17 points despite a 1-of-8 effort from three-point range, and Kray Rogers chipped in 14.

SWOSU (6-11, 3-8 GAC) will return to action Thursday night, January 29, to face off against Arkansas Tech at 7:30 PM.
