Heartland Cruise Car Show Returns for Route 66 Centennial June 19th

The Heartland Cruise Car Show is revving up for its 36th iteration, which will be held on Father's Day Weekend on Friday, June 19 - Saturday, June 20. Along with the normal features of this annual event—cool vehicles, giveaways, and over 75 different food trucks and vendors—this year's show is also proudly celebrating the Route 66 Centennial. The Heartland Cruise Car show promises fun for everyone, as well as a way to give back to the community.

The festivities will begin on Friday night at 6pm in downtown Weatherford with a Welcome Party on Main Street. There, visitors will be able to take in the sights and sounds of a bevy of classic and modern vehicles.

Following the Welcome Party, from 7:30pm to 9pm, the vehicles will take to streets. The cruise route will incorporate Weatherford's Main Street on Route 66. Only the first 300. Friday night will be capped off with over \$1,000 up for grabs via giveaways.

Beginning at 9am on Saturday, the Heartland Cruise Car Show will take the party to Rader Park. Saturday's car contests will offer cash prizes encompassing a variety of makes and models. This includes specialized events like a burnout contest and a loud exhaust contest. A full list of events, alongside a description for each, is available to the right side of the page, all of which are sure to satiate the appetite of any gearhead.

The fun isn't just reserved for the car-nuts in the crowd; there will be children's activities, food trucks, giveaways, vendors, and even a cornhole competition for people to enjoy.

General admission for Friday and Saturday is free to the public, but to participate in some events at the car show will require registration. You can pre-register your vehicles online in advance by visiting www.heartlandcruiseandcarshow.com/reg. The cost to register for one or all of the vehicle activities is \$30. If you pre-register before June 1st, you'll receive a free t-shirt. Online registrations will run until Thursday, June 18th at 5pm. Afterwards, interested participants will be able to register in person at the event on the corner of Main and Broadway.

The Heartland Car Cruise Show first took place in Means Park. The popularity of the event forced a move to Rader Park in 2002. In 2016, the event was transferred to the stewardship of the Weatherford Rotary Club.

Initially started as a way to help generate more revenue for the Weatherford Chamber of Commerce, it soon became a means to regularly fund Weatherford's D.A.R.E. Program. Proceeds from the event help fund Weatherford's D.A.R.E. Program but ambitions for the Car Show are still growing and support from the local community and businesses has never been greater.

SWOSU Rodeo Team Headed to College National Rodeo Finals in June

Every year in June, the best college rodeo athletes across the nation gather in Casper, Wyoming to test their mettle at the College National Finals Rodeo (CNFR).

This year, the SWOSU Women's rodeo team, as well as one of the SWOSU Men's rodeo team members, will represent the Central Plains Region at the event. The Rodeo Finals are scheduled to take place across nearly two weeks, from June 7th to June 20th.

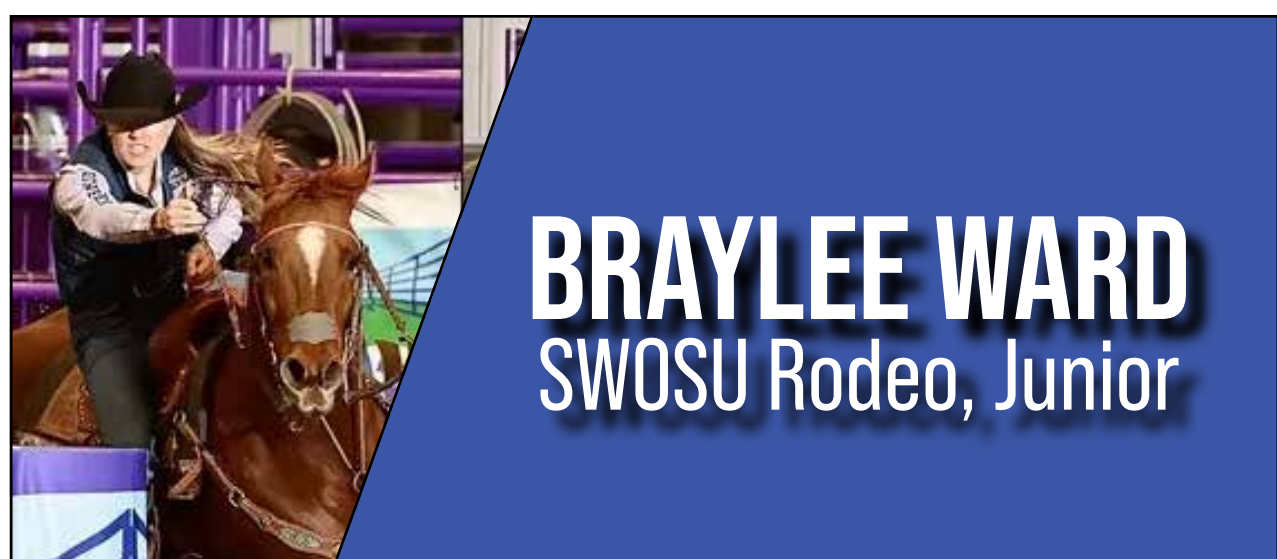
The SWOSU Women's Rodeo dominated their Central Plains Region rivals this season collecting 2,922.50 points over the course of 10 rodeos which was nearly 1,000 points more than the second place finisher.

According to CNFR qualification rules for teams the SWOSU Women's Rodeo will be able to select 4 team members to compete for points in the team competition.

Based off end of season results in the region, the SWOSU Women's Rodeo Team has selected Cheyenne VandeStouwe, Reagan McEntyre, Braylee Ward and Greeley Dade to represent SWOSU in the team portion of the competition. Among the team's standouts; VandeStouwe topped the region's standings in breakaway roping while McEntyre led the region in goat tying points at the conclusion of the NIRA regular season.

Two SWOSU Rodeo team members have also qualified to enter into the All-Around portion of the CNFR based off point totals in the region. Cheyenne VandeStouwe finished first in points in the Central Plains Region for the Women's All-Around and is qualified to compete in breakaway roping as well as goat tying.

On the men's side, Heston Harrison finished second in points in the Central Plains Region. Harrison is qualified to compete in the saddle bronc and team roping events.

CLINTON / HOSPITAL SENIOR MEALS The Clinton Regional Hospital Authority recently discussed the potential addition of senior meals to be coordinated with the hospital cafeteria. "Looking at the cafeteria, there's been some discussion whether we can keep it open or not. There have been discussions about doing some things for senior meals," Chairman Ken Baker shared on the potential meal program. "And, of course, the hospital auxiliary [would] like to keep it open, but we need to look for ways to fund it. Roughly, it probably costs, with food costs and labor, probably around, if we serve 30 or 40 meals a day, it's probably anticipated cost to be about \$10,000 a month to run that." No action was taken by the authority, but further information was requested regarding firm cost estimates if the program is implemented.

CLINTON / GRANT - A grant has been approved for the city of Clinton to refurbish the old Fire House. "[The Fire House] was built in about 1930. It's an outstanding building, huge building. Now, through this grant process, it's going to be a Welcome Center," shared Mayor David Berrong. "It'll be a food source right on Route 66. It's going to be, I think, beautiful outside and certainly inside." The city has secured nearly \$2 million in grant monies from the Route 66 Committee for projects in the city of Clinton.

WEST OK / DRUMMOND CAMPAIGN Oklahoma Attorney General Gentner Drummond recently spoke about his campaign for Governor in an interview with Wright Wradio. In the coming weeks, Chief Lowry will be meeting with community members, local organizations and department staff to listen, learn, and share his vision for the future of public safety in the city of Watonga.

MOORE / SCREENTIME BILL - State Representative Anthony Moore of Clinton recently spoke about House Bill 4358, which he authored. "I've heard from a ton of people around the state and a lot of people locally about screen time in schools. That bill passed overwhelmingly in the House [but] couldn't even get out of the Senate with some amendments that I agreed to that would have lightened the restrictions, so I'm really frustrated about that," shared Moore. "That's something that there are a ton of studies on that are overwhelming. The evidence is all in support of limiting screen time before 5th grade. We've got to do a better job of that." Moore says he plans to bring the bill back in the future.

Faculty, staff, friends, and colleagues gathered to celebrate the contributions each retiree made to SWOSU and the Weatherford community.

Retirees recognized during the event included Laura Endicott, instructor of history and government; Dr. Christy Cox, assistant professor in the Pharmacy Experiential Program; Dr. Kevin Collins, professor in the Department of Language and Literature; Dr. Terry Goforth, professor of physics; and Kathleen O'Neal, instructor of mathematics.

Laura Endicott served SWOSU for more than 30 years, including 23 years as a full-time faculty member in history and government. During her time at the university, she taught more than 12,000 students and served as a longtime sponsor of both the SWOSU History Club and the SWOSU Catholic Student Association. She also volunteered with the St. Vincent DePaul Food Pantry in Weatherford, participated as a judge for the SWOSU History Day regional contest, and co-authored "The History of Weatherford" with John Hayden.

Endicott received the Brandy Award and earned multiple nominations for the honor throughout her career.

Dr. Christy Cox served SWOSU for more than 31 years in the Pharmacy Experiential Program. She began her career at SWOSU in 1994 as experiential education coordinator and later became director of experiential education.

Throughout her time at the university, Cox helped oversee experiential learning opportunities for pharmacy students and contributed to accreditation efforts, curriculum committees, and the continued development of the experiential education program. Her work and leadership helped shape the experiential education program for more than three decades.

Dr. Kevin Collins taught at SWOSU for 21 years as a faculty member in language and literature. During his time at the university, he taught generations of students and contributed to scholarship, faculty leadership, and literacy efforts across western Oklahoma. He received the Bernhardt Award in 2016 and served as Faculty Senate president from 2011 to 2012.

Collins also served in leadership roles with the Westcentral Oklahoma Literacy Coalition and the Weatherford Arts Council. His academic work included presentations, publications, and editorial work on critical editions of William Gilmore Simms' writing.

Dr. Terry Goforth served SWOSU for more than 35 years as a faculty member in physics and engineering physics after earning degrees in physics and chemistry from SWOSU in 1981.

Throughout her career, she taught physics, astronomy, and chemistry labs while also supporting summer programs for Upward Bound students. She later worked as physics coordinator and engineering physics coordinator within the Department of Chemistry and Physics.

A longtime member of the SWOSU faculty and alumni community, Goforth remained closely connected with former students and alumni throughout her career.

Reflecting on her retirement, she said SWOSU and Weatherford will "always" feel like home and added, "I have been, and always shall be, a Bulldog."

Kathy O'Neal served SWOSU for more than 20 years in the Department of Mathematics after first joining the university as an adjunct and temporary instructor in 2000 before becoming a full-time instructor in 2004. During her time at SWOSU, she taught a wide range of mathematics courses and was a Faculty Senator for eight years.

In addition to her work in the classroom, O'Neal supported STEM education opportunities for students through programs such as KESAM, Tech Trek, and SAGE STEAM. Her work with those programs helped encourage interest in science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics among middle school students across Oklahoma.

The SWOSU Faculty Senate is made up of faculty representatives from departments across campus and serves as a voice for faculty participation in university matters. Meyer Earns NCBWA/D2CCA First Team Nods

Senior third baseman Landon Meyer was named a First Team All-Central Region selection by the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA) on Friday.

Meyer becomes the seventh Bulldog in the NCAA era to earn NCBWA All-Region honors and just the third to receive First Team recognition.

Meyer was also named a First Team All-Central Region selection by the Division II Conference Commissioners Association (D2CCA) on Monday.

Meyer becomes the 10th SWOSU baseball player to earn D2CCA All-Region honors and has now collected all-region recognition from two organizations this postseason after earning First Team honors from the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association (NCBWA) last Friday.

A First Team All-GAC selection and SWOSU's team MVP, Meyer turned in one of the top offensive seasons in the Great American Conference in 2026. He started all 48 games for the Bulldogs while batting .349 with 61 runs scored, 10 home runs, 45 RBI, and nine doubles. His 61 runs scored led the GAC.

Meyer also recorded 18 multi-hit games and drove in runs in 25 contests during the season. His team-leading 10 home runs were tied for the 10th-most in the conference, and he earned GAC Player of the Week honors during the second week of the season.

The Central Region consists of 39 baseball teams from the Northern Sun (14 teams), Mid-America (13 teams) and Great American (12 teams) conferences. In all, 16 teams were represented with eight teams gaining multiple selections. Institutions in the transition to Division II are not considered for D2CCA honors.

Division II and All-Region Baseball Teams are sponsored by the D2CCA. The teams are voted on by the members of D2SIDA, NCAA Division II Sports Information Directors Association. The Division II Conference Commissioners Association encourages and promotes Division II athletics and high standards of sportsmanship as important elements of higher education. The CCA is a key communications link among the conferences as they discuss views, policies, and regulations that impact Division II intercollegiate athletics and works closely with the NCAA as a communications channel to NCAA Division II member colleges and universities.
