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Michael Vargas Recognized as Veteran of the Week

Senior Master Sgt. Michael Vargas (retired), from the Weatherford area, was recognized by House Speaker Pro Tempore Harold Wright (R-Weatherford) in the Oklahoma House of Representatives at the State Capitol.

“Senior Master Sergeant Michael Vargas served our country well through a near lifetime of dedication to preserving our freedoms and providing protection for our citizens,” Wright said. “He also has served our community, including many young people that he’s coached and mentored. It was an honor to be able to recognize him before the members of the House last week and to thank him for his service.”

Vargas was presented with a citation and a United States flag that had been flown over the state Capitol in his honor.

Vargas attended the Vehicle Operator and Dispatcher School at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, and was assigned to the 77th Air Base Wing at McClellan Air Force Base, California. In 1998, he was reassigned to Andersen Air Force Base, Guam. During his tenure there, he voluntarily deployed on 24-hours notice to Diego Garcia in support of Operation Desert Thunder II. He later was selected as Anderson Air Force Base’s Transportation Airman of the Year for 1999.

Vargas then was reassigned to Ramstein Air Base, Germany, where he continued his career as the Vehicle Operations Flight non-commissioned officer in charge. In August 2002, he became an Air Force Recruiter and was assigned to the 362nd Recruiting Squadron, Upland California, as an Enlisted Accessions Recruiter where he earned numerous recruiting production and quality awards from civilian organizations, his squadron, group and Headquarters, Air Force Recruiting Service. After 14 years of active duty service, Sgt. Vargas applied and was selected for the recruiting office supervisor for the 129th Rescue Wing, enlisting in the California Air National Guard in January 2009. He was recognized by the California Air National Guard and by the Recruiting and Retention Superintendents of Region 1 as their Recruiting Office Supervisor of the Year during his second year assigned.

Sgt. Vargas graduated from the Air Force Leadership School and the Air Force Non-Commissioned Officer Academy and the Senior NCOA. He earned a degree from the Community College of the Air Force in Human Resource Management and a bachelor’s degree in business administration while on active duty. He spent time and resources helping a variety of youth sports programs where he coached and mentored kids in his community.

Sgt. Vargas is married to Master Sgt. Alicia Vargas, Retired from the U.S. Air Force. They have three children Briana, Marissa and Aiden

The Sales Tax Election, originally scheduled for April 7th, has been postponed until June 30th. The sales tax “Vote YES” Campaign is a request to file an extension of the Weatherford Sales Tax. The request maintains the current sales tax rate and seeks to allocate additional funds to key areas of the Weatherford community to stimulate growth.

The propositions, outlined in the new ballot, consist of four propositions: City Services, SWOSU, Weatherford Regional Hospital, and Weatherford Public Schools, respectively.

Proposition 1: City Services - deals with a variety of issues. These include a new 9-1-1 Center and police station, a Vietnam Memorial Wall, a new terminal at the Stafford Airport, updates to the city pool/ ag and rodeo arena, and a new indoor soccer complex (with updated field work/ stadium seating for existing fields).

Proposition 2: SWOSU - will provide funding for rural healthcare facilities while also increasing the Nursing/ Pharmacy/Health programs ability to accept additional students at the campus.

Proposition 3: Weatherford Regional Hospital - cover the purchasing of replacements and updates to diagnostic and treatment medical equipment, as well as the maintenance of said equipment.

Proposition 4: WPS - Focus on updating the football field to artificial turf and replacing the track surrounding the field. Remaining funds will go towards the installation of a new HVAC system.



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LOCAL AND AREA NEWS



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WEATHERFORD NEW ELECTION DATE- Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown said the April 7th election date for the sales tax continuation in the city of Weatherford has been moved to June 30th. The continuation of the one penny sales tax will help benefit capital improvement projects in the city. Fifty-two percent of the one penny will go toward the city of Weatherford, 28% to SWOSU, 15% to Weatherford Regional Hospital, and 5% to Weatherford public Schools.

WASHITA COUNTY ACCIDENT BURNS FLAT- An Elk City man was last listed in stable condition at OU Medical Center after suffering injuries in a vehicle/semi accident in Washita County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol said 26-year-old Dustin Moss was transported to Alliance Health Clinton and then transported to OU Medical Center. Moss was driving south on State Highway 44, 2 miles north of Burns Flat when he struck a semi from behind that had slowed to make a left turn.

CUSTER COUNTY JURY TERM MOVED- During a meeting with Custer County Commissioners and the Oklahoma State Health Department, Custer County District Court Judge Jill Weedon said the jury term that was scheduled to begin in March has been moved to June. She said prospective jurors will receive additional information by mail soon.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION SCHOOL CLOSURES- The State Board of Education held an emergency meeting and decided to close all Oklahoma Public Schools until April 6th as a result of the coronavirus. Clinton Superintendent Kevin Hime said the action wasn't unexpected and the District will work to make sure everyone gets paid on time. He said districts will not have to make up the missed days.

CLINTON EMERGENCY RESOLUTION- Custer County now has its first confirmed case of the coronavirus. The State Health Department confirmed the result. Clinton City Council met in special session and approved a resolution, calling for a state of emergency, pending review of legal counsel. In addition to encouraging the private sector to be CDC compliant, the council approved the closure of indoor facilities at ACME Brick Park said City Manager Mark Skiles.

The Council also chose, for the time being, to take no additional reservations at the Frisco Center, Senior citizens Center and Southwest Playhouse. A review of the State of Emergency is planned for April 7th.

BECKHAM COUNTY JAIL VIRUS PROTOCOL- Beckham County Sheriff Derek Manning said his office has taken steps for all aspects of their operation to help mitigate the effects of the Covid-19 Virus in their jail and field operations. Manning said the Oklahoma Department of Health has sent out a set of guidelines for jail administrators. On the field side, Manning said the public won't notice much difference when interacting with a deputy. The main thing is that the Deputy will try to keep a little more distance.

CUSTER COUNTY DISTRICT COURT- A trial that had been planned in Custer County District Court April 1st for a California man, accused in the death of another, has been rescheduled as a bench trial for May 4th. NCAA Membership-led #UnitedAsOne Campaign Launches

The #UnitedAsOne campaign, created and led by NCAA member schools, started to form less than 24 hours after the remaining NCAA winter and spring championships were canceled due to the evolving global health threat surrounding COVID-19.

Unity, at an unprecedented time, became a rallying cry among the membership of more than 1,100 schools and nearly 500,000 student-athletes across three divisions. It started small. A group of about 50 digital and social media creatives within different athletics departments began direct messaging each other on Twitter on Friday.

"What's next?"
 "What can we do?"
 "What should we do?"

Quickly, the consensus became to find a way to come together, to show unity and support within college athletics during a trying time for everyone in the country. That evolved into the #UnitedAsOne campaign, which officially launched at 4:16 p.m. Eastern time Thursday, exactly a week after the announcement of the NCAA canceling the remaining 2019-20 winter and spring championships.

"Moments like this, I feel like we should be bringing our teams together," said Brian Wagner, Michigan's digital strategy and creative lead, who was part of the initial group that came up with the campaign. "All of our programs, all of our student-athletes, our coaching staffs, we're all in the same boat here. This is certainly something to show that we're all in this together."

To show this, the social media accounts of schools across the country started posting a unified graphic Thursday. The graphic reads "United As One" on one side — the "O" being the NCAA's logo — and is personalized with the school's logo on the other side.

Sam LaBelle, creative content producer at Texas, designed the graphic. Marc Jordan, assistant director of social and digital strategy at Texas, was part of the original group on Twitter. Jordan helped finalize the messaging and then circulate the graphic template to conferences and athletics departments across the country.

"We just stuck with #UnitedAsOne to sort of showcase that each school has a different fan base, each school has a



different background and different traditions, but, ultimately, we're all going to miss sports, and we all need to kind of band together to get through this," Jordan said, "and know that there are brighter days ahead."

"I think that showcasing the NCAA and all of its member institutions in a unified front will really help with that and show we're together in this."

In a social media role often driven by quantitative numbers, like engagements and impressions, Wagner said he hopes this #UnitedAsOne campaign's impact is more qualitative.

"I really just hope it provides positive engagement and lifts some spirits and lets people know and be in comfort that we're working together, all of us schools, conferences, to get through this in a safe, responsible manner," he said, "and we'll be back stronger than ever."

This past week, Wagner added, has been a sobering reminder of what's truly important. And it's not always

sports. Lately, his mind has frequently returned to Michigan men's basketball head coach Juwan Howard's statement on Twitter after the Big Ten Tournament, set to be held in Indianapolis, was canceled last week. Howard's Tweet led with, "Some things are bigger than basketball."

The next day, Wagner launched a #BiggerThan campaign for Michigan's social media accounts. Soon after, the #UnitedAsOne campaign began forming. A similar underlying theme carried over between the two: that unity, in the face of adversity, is what's important right now.

"I'm just happy that everyone is united around this cause and around this opportunity to show that we are arm in arm, ready to see what happens next," Jordan said. "Everyone's united and supporting each other and putting rivalries aside, putting their feelings for lost seasons aside and really thinking about the big picture and how we can all support each other."

48th Annual SWOSU Rodeo Cancelled

Due to COVID-19 and the Center for Disease Control (CDC) recommendation on large gatherings, the 48th Annual SWOSU Rodeo, slated for April 9-11, has now been officially cancelled.

With this tragic pandemic, the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA) has finalized the spring rodeo

season.

"Our overriding concern is the health and safety of our student-athletes, campus and community in taking this action," SWOSU President Randy Beutler said previously. "We appreciate the support we annually receive from the area for this important event. However, we must seriously consider the recommendation of the CDC. Many rodeos and large events across the nation are being cancelled or postponed due to these challenging times."

With the NIRA's ruling, five SWOSU Rodeo Team members finished in the Top 3 of their events and will qualify for the College National Finals Rodeo (CNFR),

which is planned for June 14-20 in Casper, Wyoming. Winter Williams (Breakaway) and Sadie Wolaver (Barrel Racing) finish as Regional Champions while Timothy Troyer (Bronc Riding) and Cody Keathley (Bull Riding) are Regional Runner-ups. Taylor Bothwell also earns a trip to Casper after finishing third in Barrel Racing.

NIRA Officials will be working with the State of Wyoming, the Casper Events Center, and the recommendations from the CDC to continue with this plan. Should any changes to that schedule occur, an announcement will be made immediately.

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

The Mormons claimed their gold coins were "pure gold" but, they were not as each contained 80% gold. Most of the gold coins were melted. Any survivors are desirable in any grade.

This \$2.50 gold quarter eagle was certified by the Professional Coin Grading Company (PCGS) as About Uncirculated 53+. It sold at auction in February 2020 for \$72,000.



Updates regarding policy plans for Coronavirus

SARS-CoV-2 the virus that causes the disease COVID-19. Regardless of what you call it, we are all aware of the seemingly non-stop coverage, regarding the Coronavirus. But with the constant flow of information, many are lost as to what it means for them, or even what the Coronavirus is. The virus' history and global impact/response, at this time, is too complex for a short draft. So instead, we'll try to explain the newest set of information, released on March 20th, 2020.

The first and foremost bit of information that needs to be addressed is: the virus a concern for me? Short answer - yes. While an overwhelming majority of people who contract the virus will get through it with mild symptoms, the virus has had an alarming impact on older persons and especially those with certain medical conditions.

Data is pouring out of China, the WHO, Worldometers, the CDC, private institutions, and more at an astounding rate. Most of what we originally heard (the virus mortality rate goes down significantly by age bracket, the transmission rate is high, etc.) is continually being confirmed.

That's the good news. The bad news is that because of the virus's high infectious nature and it's proclivity for mild (no hospitalization) symptoms for the majority of people, containing it, or convincing people to stay home when they need to work, becomes difficult.

In recent weeks, many of the world's leaders have shut down big events of 500 people to minimize spread, closed schools, and reduced public contact. Within the last week, more events of even 25 people or more have been postponed or cancelled, businesses have shifted to online work; and restaurants have closed lobbies. While understandably frustrating, these efforts might just be the tip of the iceberg in terms of preventative measures.

The following information is not a way to scare anyone but rather to prepare us all for what could unfold over the coming months.

The Imperial College COVID-19 Response Team ran simulations, using the numbers from China/Italy/Korea, to predict what could happen, based on the level of response that has been done and over the levels that could be done in the future. With these numbers they simulated what would happen in the UK and in the US, following strategies taken to reduce the virus with non-pharmaceutical interventions (NPIs).

With this data, they've come to two solutions - mitigation and suppression.

Mitigation focuses on slowing the epidemic spread - thereby reducing medical demand and protecting those with severe risk of the disease.

Suppression aims at reversing epidemic spread, lowering case numbers, and maintaining this level indefinitely until

a vaccine is made.

The numbers show that a full mitigation style of response (home isolation and social distancing of those at risk) might reduce healthcare demand by 2/3 and deaths by half. However, the result would still be hundreds of thousands of deaths and healthcare (especially intensive care units) being overwhelmed multiple times its capacity.

This result leaves Suppression as the optimal solution, but one that may be unachievable. For a suppression response (like those seen in China and Korea), it will require a social distancing of the entire population, home isolation of cases, and quarantines of affected families. This will need to be supplemented with school and university closures, even though these closures, will result in parents who work in the medical field to be absent from work or from home.

This level of suppression has already been seen in policies, enacted by the US and in the UK, but it would need to be increased, and it could not be alleviated. Prediction data of cases in China and in Italy have shown that the virus has a high rebound rate; so responses of this magnitude would need to be kept until a vaccine is out - 18 months or more (14 to confirm the vaccine is not deadly to the recent human testing injections, and additional months for large-scale output).

Suppression, while successful in both China and Korea and showing reversal data of the spread, may be potential in the short-term, but we have no predictions

of the economic hit a year-long suppression may instill.

World Leaders are weighing the complications that arise from both styles of prevention and are coming up with policies that will be of the greatest benefit to their respective locales.

Our responsibility, during this time, is to ourselves and our loved ones. Be safe, be informed, and wash your hands thoroughly with soap. Soap is so effective because its ingredients allow it to pry open the virus' exterior and cause it to degrade.

Much has been written and said about what we should do to safeguard ourselves from the virus and I don't pretend to have any word of wisdom that you don't already know. It has been made a little more personal since I am now self-quarantined for seven more days. I attended a funeral last week. Later it was found that someone there has tested positive; so all of us (250-300) are dealing with it. I don't have any symptoms and I feel fine.

But for many it continues to be a time of frustration and hardship. We all know this did not catch God by surprise so we might ask ourselves a question; what does God want to teach me from this situation? As someone said about incarceration; "You can do your time or you can let your time do you;" meaning that it all depends on your attitude. Definitely I will have more time to focus on things that will enlarge my knowledge of God. It has deepened my prayer life. It has reminded me that I am not in control. When I get up in the morning I won't be interested in the baseball scores. I will be free from hours setting in front of a TV or computer screen, watching or listening to a game.

The Apostle Paul in writing to the church in Colosse said, "Set your hearts on things above where Christ is setting at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things above not on earthly things, for you have died and your life is now hidden with Christ in God" Too often other things have occupied my mind rather than things of an eternal nature. Paul was not saying that we should never have any thoughts of a secular or physical nature. But when we crowd God out of the picture, He finds it hard to get our attention. Here are some suggestions:

Why not decide to do a personal study of one of Paul's letters or one of the gospels. I don't mean just reading it through one time; I mean really studying it as if you were going to be tested on it. For one of the gospels or the book of Acts, you might choose to use the READ method. This is an acronym as follows: read it slowly one chapter at a time. Read it several times, not reading for quantity, but for quality. Next, explore the text, asking questions like, "who are the people involved? What is their mission or objective. Then, ask if there is an application that you need to apply to your life. Finally, determine that you are going to obey the commands or teachings involved.

If you are studying one of the letters of Paul, Peter, or James, that contain more teachings, or instruction, you might use the acronym TAPES. Look for teachings, application, a prayer to pray or promise to claim, an example to follow or error to avoid, and finally see if there is a sin to deal with. Write these down. There is nothing magical about this; it simply makes you think more deeply and prayerfully about the passage, instead of just skimming.

For those who claim they don't have time to read, now, God has provided that time. Find a good book at the Et Cetera shop for a dollar or less. If the store is closed, come by my house, (after I am out of quarantine) and I will loan you one of mine. Above all, don't waste this time. Ask God to show you how you can train your mind and set your heart on things that matter for eternity.
