From Renegade to Rainman KWEY celebrates 35 years of employment

Quiet, dependable, loyal, always the professional, reserved, always willing to help, and a terrific team player – an exemplary employee – Ray Michaels “Renegade Ray” Bagby. He’s the one person at KWEY who’s been here the longest, now. “When we bought the station in 1991, Ray had already been on the staff as an On-Air Talent,” says Co-owner Harold Wright. After the military and during college, Ray was in radio at KWOE in Clinton. Since 1984, though, he was on the air at KWEY from 6:00 – 12:00 midnight.

Ray and his family have lived in Weatherford since he was three years old. Remembering one specific incident just after the station had been on the air a few months, he remembers listening to KWEY from the beginning. A tornado was spotted southwest of town. Listening to Paul Bunning and Dick Johnson describe where the tornado was, he was in the basement of his home on Huber. Fortunately, Ray reports that the tornado dissipated before it reached town. At this time, the station was only licensed for daytime operations and also in case of emergencies. It was definitely a case for this station to exercise the FCC emergency clause to be on the air.

When Ray was hired as part time, the FCC would not allow the station to be unattended. Some of Ray’s responsibilities was to take the readings on the transmitter and make sure everything was going all right. Ray adds that, “fortunately, KWEY could be on the air until sundown on the AM” so he got to spin the records from 6:00 until dark. The FM was on the air until midnight. Ray would watch the automated system, and at midnight he would sign off and turn off the transmitter. Back in the day, the station had lots of automated tape machines and reel-to-reel to watch in case he needed to “kick” it if needed.

Todd Brunner, Harold and Ray all worked at KWOE for a time before joining KWEY in Weatherford.

Ray admits he’s always wanted to be in radio from the time he was a small boy of about 10 years old. He says he would “spin my 45’s on my record player and do the jock thing” into the next record. Listening to KOMA and WGN led Ray to his interest in radio. His first on-air handle was Ray Michaels. Rod Henry from KWOE taught him the first part of being an air talent, to pick an easy name to remember. Since Ray’s middle name is Michael, he thought it’d be easy to remember, and it seemed to roll easily off the tongue. When Bill Jeffries worked at the station, he told Ray that “he had to have a name, a nickname” so Bill was the one who started calling him Renegade Ray.

A lot of the staff, now-a-days, calls him Rainman because of Ray’s innate ability to find a problem and correct it. This started his next step in radio – becoming a licensed professional broadcast engineer. He had begun to do a little afternoon work, but the station was having problems with its new fully solid state AM transmitter working into the antenna system. With Ray’s natural curiosity, he looked the new equipment over and found out the problem. The owner, at the time, asked him if he’d want to work on the engineering side.

Broadcast Hall of Famer Chuck Edwards has these words about Ray. “Renegade Ray, aka Ray Bagby, aka Ray Michaels. In the beginning Ray-Man wore bib overalls and a baseball cap with protruding ponytail. He even did a jazz show that was called, I think, “rubber biscuit.” As Rainman morphed into the station engineer and IT, frequently I had to call on him for help with equipment at ball game broadcasts and for my ineptness with computers while trying to put together a sportscast.

“Years ago, Weatherford had to travel all the way to Glenpool over by Tulsa for a playoff football game. Because the visiting radio press box was not pre-wired with phone lines, Ray drove all the way to Glenpool to engineer our broadcast. He set up a portable transmitter that allowed us to transmit our broadcast to a residence in Glenpool. Ray was then able to patch our broadcast into the telephone and send it to Weatherford. Heck of a way to spend a Friday night, and he didn’t even get to see the game. Long live the Renegade, Wright Wradio’s senior employee!! Chuck Edwards, chasing the Rain Man with 34-years.”

Some of Ray’s training in the military was in Radar repair so the change to engineering was a natural fit. Harold asked him how he could have the patience to read all the schematics, but Ray says, “it’s not a matter of patience to him, it’s interesting. I find it fascinating how the theories

turned into practice. It’s enjoyment, not a chore.”

After adding other stations in the 1990’s, the management asked Ray to serve full-time as the engineer for the now 5 radio stations in Wright Broadcasting Systems, Inc. Ray says he feels “blessed with ownership that is concerned with quality, so I don’t worry about sketchy equipment.” He’s able to get the equipment configured correctly and installed fairly easily. Ray remembers one specific FM transmitter not staying on the air. Trying to find the problem, he had gone back and forth. After speaking to Engineer Dave Chenowit from Texas, Dave suggested one of the components in the transmitter might have shorted through to the structure of the transmitter. A simple piece of cardboard between it fixed the problem. A new piece was ordered to replace it. Ray had solved the problem.

The funniest thing Ray remembers is of “Dick Johnson, a marvelous soul and Seabee during World War II, who came out of the war with a complete distaste of ANY kind of rodent, was starting the live Ag Report. You could hear his chair wheel across the floor,” says Ray, “away from the microphone and shout something about a mouse running across the console.”

“When I first started out at KWEY as a DJ,” says Heston Wright, Co-owner and General Manager, “I can remember having lots of questions, and Ray was always willing to provide good, sound advice so I could improve my on-air skills. Then, as I began learning more about the radio business, I quickly learned he was the “go to” guy for all questions related to mechanical, technical, computer or engineering. If he didn’t know the answer, he’d either find someone that did or do the research to find the answer we needed. His willingness to go the extra mile, helping employees find solutions to their technical issues, is one of the characteristics that set him apart from others.

“Additionally, Ray is an ultimate team player. Whether it’s dressing up at Halloween (the “cereal” killer was my favorite), cheering on his sales partner during sports, participating in the dirty Santa gift exchange, or just hanging out with co-workers at the annual staff picnic, he cares about the stations, customers, co-workers and listeners. He’s truly dedicated to making Wright Broadcasting Systems, Inc. the best that it can be.”

Ray is quick to give his wife Janice and three children Crystal, Richard and Stephen total credit for his job and understanding Ray’s role when he had to totally change family plans due to work situations or leave family gatherings. Their support has meant everything to Ray.

Harold and the Wright Family are more than thankful of Ray’s loyalty and expertise he’s displayed to KWEY and Wright Broadcasting Systems, Inc. for 35 years, almost 36.

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



Skiles said the city is putting together a budget that will reflect a 20% decrease in sales tax for the next fiscal year, that starts in July. The council will have to adopt the next budget for the city by June 30th.

WEATHERFORD ARREST IN VANDALISM- Weatherford police say charges have been turned over to the office of the District Attorney against a juvenile male in connection with vandalism at Weatherford Middle School. Additionally, Detective Matt Bartel said authorities are investigating graffiti on concrete next to the Thunder court in Weatherford.

WASHITA COUNTY EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR- Washita County has a new emergency management director. County Commissioner Leo Georing said Kenneth Trent will succeed Sandy Settles as emergency management director. Trent began his new duties May 1st.

CUSTER COUNTY ACCIDENT- Three people are hospitalized, four others were treated and released following a one vehicle accident Saturday on eastbound interstate 40 at the 83-mile marker near Weatherford. The Oklahoma High Patrol said 29-year-old Tetra Billie of Yukon and a 2-year-old child were last listed in serious condition at OU Medical Center. An 8-year-old boy was last listed in stable condition after the vehicle Billie was driving had unsafe tires on the driver's side. Troopers say the rear tire threw the tread surface layer off, the vehicle then departed the road and rolled, ejecting the driver and two passengers.

Higher Ground Scripture Memory

MEMORIZE GOD'S WORD WITH IRANIAN CHRISTIANS

Did you know that many are coming to Christ in Iran? Even under the control of a Moslem dominated culture in which imprisonment and torture are common place, many are risking their lives to follow Jesus. The Voice of the Martyrs recently received a list of 125 Bible verses that house church members and their leaders in Iran are memorizing. "They are recalling these verses when they are in jail or other places and unable to access a Bible." (I will send you a copy upon request—Jim)

You may find it difficult to memorize verses, and I am not saying it is easy. I have struggled with it most of my adult life. But nothing of real value comes easy. We do memorize those things that are important to us... our social security number, lyrics to songs that we love, the serial number of your rifle if you are in the military, etc. Memorization is obviously easier for some than others, but all Christ-followers will benefit from being able to recall certain verses on special occasions. It does involve work and some sacrifice. I will share some tips that have been helpful to me.

To begin, choose a fairly short verse that has a special meaning to you. Repeat it aloud several times, emphasizing key words. Then break it down into separate phrases and write the phrase down that you are concentrating on, ten times. Example: Psalm 27:1 "The Lord is my light and my salvation..." Don't just say the words, think about the meaning and meditate on areas in your life that you need His light and His deliverance. Always connect the reference to the verse lest you get the verse down and the next day can't remember where it is found. After you have mastered the first phrase, move to the phrase "...of whom shall I fear?" Do the same thing as you did with the first phrase. Then connect the two phrases to complete the sentence. Follow the same procedure with the second sentence in the verse.

Next, write it down on a small card that you can carry with you. At times during the day, when there is a pause, simply take the verse out and say it out loud several times. Or you might write in on a 2 x 4 index card, paste on your bathroom mirror or the dash of your car, then at a stop light, or while you are shaving (some people still shave) or putting your make-up on, say the verse out loud several times. Do this for three days and you will think you have it memorized. But you wake up in the middle of the night and you can't remember how it starts. The answer is constant review. That is really the secret to planting it in your mind and heart. On the 4th day choose another verse and complete the same process, BUT, you also need to review the verse you just completed. Just say it out loud several times to keep it fresh. The key to memorization is constant review. That may not take a lot of time. Just use a box or something handy to keep the verses in. You may have a little verse pack that you can keep them in. I hope this is helpful. More could be said but I'm trying to keep it short. To comment: jhm82@outlook.com

Tyra Aska and Alex Bedard Named SWOSU Athletes of the Year

The SWOSU Athletic Department handed out their top honors on Wednesday night with a Virtual All-Sports Banquet to conclude the 2019-20 athletic season.

Claiming the top honors for the year were Lady Bulldog Basketball standout Tyra Aska and SWOSU Baseball's Alex Bedard, who were named the Athletes of the Year, while Kaitlyn Dillon of SWOSU Volleyball and Academic All-American Football player Braden Sweet were chosen as the Scholar-Athletes of the Year.



Kaitlyn Dillon

Kaitlyn Dillon (Edmond, Okla.) helped the Bulldog Volleyball team to a second-place finish in the Great American Conference for the second straight year and earned honors as the GAC Defensive Player of the Year and a First Team All-GAC

selection. She graduates as the program's all-time leader in digs and service aces and she's one of four players in conference history to record more than 2,000 career digs. Earlier this year, she was one of two SWOSU Volleyball players selected to the GAC's All-Decade Team and she was also chosen to represent the conference at the NCAA Student-Athlete Leadership Forum. Dillon has been a four-year starter for the Bulldogs and she becomes the third member of SWOSU Volleyball to be chosen as SWOSU's Female Scholar Athlete of the Year. She will graduate from SWOSU next month with a degree in Business Marketing and a grade point average of 3.97.



Braden Sweet

Braden Sweet (Perry, Okla.) ranked fifth in the Great American Conference with 98 tackles during his senior season while also recording one interception, one fumble recovery and three pass breakups. He played his final

season as a graduate student at SWOSU, having already claimed a bachelor's degree with a 3.98 undergraduate grade point average in Accounting and he's currently working towards a Master's of Business Administration postgraduate degree with a 4.00 GPA. Sweet started 30 games over the past three seasons and he graduates with 192 career tackles. In December, he earned his second CoSIDA Academic All-American honor and became the second player in program history to be named a First Team Academic All-American. This is the seventh time in nine seasons that the SWOSU Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year award is claimed by a Bulldog Football player, with Sweet joining previous Academic All-Americans Cameron Nix and Brandon Roe to extend their streak to five straight years.



Tyra Aska (Meridian, Okla.) has been a four-year starter for the Lady Bulldogs and gives the Female Athlete of the Year award to a basketball player for the third consecutive season. As a senior, she guided her team to their third consecutive Great American Conference regular season championship and the Lady Dawgs were selected to participate in the NCAA Division II Central Regional Tournament for the third straight season. She is the second

four-time All-GAC Selection in program history and she was named First Team All-GAC for the second straight year. Aska also earned a spot on the D2CCA All-Central Region team and she was named to the GAC's All-Decade Team in January with her career still in progress. Aska graduates from SWOSU ranked fifth on the all-time scoring list with more than 1,500 career points and she finishes second in school history in career steals and assists.



Alex Bedard (Levis, Quebec) opened the 2020 season with the first home run in all of NCAA Baseball and never looked back. Although his senior season was limited to 18 games, he had at least one hit in 14 games with two five-hit games to his credit. He led the Great American Conference in batting average, hits per game, runs per game and stolen bases while anchoring one of the top

hitting team in the conference from his leadoff position. Bedard and his team were in contention for a spot in the postseason and on pace for their third consecutive 20-win season when play was halted due to COVID-19. He becomes the sixth SWOSU Baseball player to be named SWOSU's Male Athlete of the Year and second in the past three seasons.

The Washington quarter was first minted in 1932 and the same design continues today. The above pictured quarter is in a high state of preservation. Plus, its appearance is marked by different colors of salmon pink, lilac, sea green and olive-gold.

It sold at an online-auction in March 2020 for \$4,800.

McDugle, Boggs Warn Employers to Be Wary of Fraudulent Unemployment Claims



State Rep. Kevin McDugle, R-Broken Arrow, and State Sen. Larry Boggs, R-Wilburton, issued a reminder to employers across the state to watch out for fraudulent unemployment claims.

"Our unemployment laws have been relaxed to aid Oklahomans in need so they can be approved for claims faster, but many people are attempting to take advantage of a system designed to help people during this time," McDugle said. "Employers are receiving fraudulent unemployment claims from all across the state, including farmers. Some of these fraudulent claims may be from someone falsely filing as an employee, but some of them are people who may have never worked for your business."

"Employers need to be aware that if they don't deny a claim, the fraudster can receive the benefits," McDugle continued. "Please carefully examine every letter you

receive from the OESC to help prevent fraudulent claims and ensure unemployment benefits are reserved for Oklahomans who are truly in need."

"As soon as reports started coming in of scams on these hard-working Oklahomans, I knew we needed to address this quickly," Boggs said. "I am thankful that the Attorney General and OESC, who are already doing yeoman's work to stay on top of protecting Oklahomans, are taking measures to help address this issue. We must all be on guard and report any occurrence of this to authorities so we can shut this down. I will continue to assist our district and state in standing watch."

Attorney General Mike Hunter has set up a page allowing individuals or businesses that receive bogus claims to fill out a form reporting the claim. The claim will then be directed to law enforcement to be addressed.
