According to Lori Flansburg, Director of Weatherford Food & Resource Center, were stressed to the max when they had to cancel two fundraisers in the spring due to COVID-19. received from community donors. Last week Graft & Walraven and The Bank of The West stopped by for a tour and to present their \$20,000 gift. Over 160,000 meals have been provided through this fundraising campaign!

### Warning issued for packages containing seeds from China

Reports, regarding the unsolicited seed packages, have been confirmed in all 50 states. An official warning has been issued to every state, urging recipients of the seeds to take precaution and not to plant them. Preliminary studies believe the seeds, to be harmless, and the Department of Agriculture has successfully identified some of the seeds according to Deputy Administrator El-Lissy of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service. Some of the identified plants include mint, sage, mustard, lavender, roses, and hibiscus. Officials have stressed that while they believe the seeds are innocuous, you should avoid planting non-native seeds as they may still pose a threat to local varieties and wildlife.

Business experts believe the seed deliveries may be part of a "brushing" scam by an online retailer. A "brushing" scam is when stores send out cheap items to a list of people, whose information most commonly comes from certain online profiles. After sending the items out, the company will hire a middleman group to post raving reviews using the "buyer's" information. Sites like Amazon filter their sellers by reviews and ratings, and they police their reviews by verifying the reviewer's name to the one who received a shipment. So, by having hundreds of satisfied "real" customers, the seller's reputation as a legitimate business goes up.

This tactic was more popular a few years ago, and one

of the first booming markets hit by brushing scams was the Alibaba e-commerce company in China. Recently, reports from potential brushing scams have popped up in places like New Zealand, Switzerland, Canada, Taiwan, and the US. Currently, the official consensus is that the deliveries are harmless and gloves should be worn when handling them as a precaution. People who have received seeds are encouraged to save the seeds and mailing label in a plastic container and to contact the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture Plant Regulatory Official for information on where to send them. In September 1857, the Steam Ship (SS) Central American was sailing north from Panama. It carried a vast fortune of gold from California. It also held hundreds of bags of silver coins and gold dust. On September 12, 1857 SS Central America sank during a hurricane approximately 200 miles from the Carolina coast.

On September 13, 2020, 163 years (to the day) after it sank gold dust and silver coins will be offered at public auction for the first time in Los Angeles, California. Online bids will be accepted as well.

One of the stars of the auction will be a quarter dated 1856-S/S which means a larger "S" was punched into the die over a small "S". It is certified by the Professional Coin Grading Service (PCGS) as Extremely Fine 45. It rested inside a sealed iron box 7,000 feet down in the Atlantic Ocean.

CADDO COUNTY FATALITY, HINTON - a Califronia man is dead, following an early morning accident on interstate 40, about 2.5 miles west of Hinton in Caddo County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says 56 year old Michael K. Gressman died after the pick up truck he was driving left the roadway, struck a cable barrier and rolled three times, ejecting Gressman. The cause of the crash remains under instigation.

OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF **TRANSPORTATION SPEED LIMIT CHANGES -**The Oklahoma State Department of Transportation says, in the coming months, nearly 400 miles of rural interstate will have a maximum speed limit of 75 miles per hour. Locally, those areas include I-40 from the Oklahoma/Texas state line, east 32 miles to near State Highway 34 junction west of Elk City. Interstate 40 from just east of the Washita/Beckham county line, east 22 miles to two miles west of the U.S. 183 junction in Clinton and I-40 from just west of the Custer/ Caddo County Line, east 50 miles near Yukon.

**CUSTER COUNTY COMMISSIONERS** COVID-19 - Custer County Commissioners decided to make no changes to its Covid 19 procedures in the county courthouse. The current procedures include mandated masks for employees and visitors, and disinfecting offices and public spaces every other day.

WEATHERFORD/ GARBAGE PICKUP-Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown says the city recently decided to no longer pick up garbage from outside the city limits. Brown says the decision not to pick up out

of town garbage went into effect August 1.

**ODOTROADSAND BRIDGESIMPROVEMENT** PLAN - The Oklahoma transport commission Monday approved a nearly \$800 million county improvements plan for roads and bridges that has been updated for state fiscal years 2021 through 2025. The plan, managed by the Oklahoma Department of Transportation, is set to replace or rehabilitate 313 bridges on the county system and improve 585 miles of county roads in the next five years. In the plan is a near \$4.5 milion project to reconstruct Stafford road that serves as a collector for I-40 traffic. Custer county commissioner Lyle Miller says the project iscurrently scheduled for 2024.

#### WINGS OVER WEATHERFORD CANCELED

- The annual Wings Over Weatherford event planned for September has been canceled for this year. Stafford Air & Space Museum Director of Operations Teresa Schoonmaker says expansion of the museum and Covid concerns promoted cancellation of the event for this year. Schoonmaker says a 90th birthday celebration for General Stafford that was also planned for September has been postponed due to Covid 19.

### WEATHERFORD PARK RIBBON CUTTING

- Weatherford Economics Development Director Yolanda Creswell says a ribbon cutting is planned for the newly completed dog park at Heritage Park next month. Creswell says the event will be held September 19th.

When asked about the rising popularity of soccer, Mikylin attributes it to the success of the National Team and the '99 World Cup role models. "For a long time, when you were growing up and playing soccer, you didn't really have those types of role models. But for us, we've got to grow up in this new generation of soccer, and I really think it's had a huge impact on the growth of [the sport]. It's incredible." # **Oklahoma History - Hennessey rural route**

According to the Oklahoma Historical Society, the U.S. Postal Service established a free delivery system for rural areas in 1896. Oklahoma's first rural route began on August 15th, 1900, in Hennessey. Albert Darrow became the first Oklahoma rural carrier. His route covered a 31-square-mile area and was believed to be 24-miles long. The population of the area was 700, and he had to use his own horse and wagon for transportation. He delivered mail six days a week and was paid \$500 annually for the work.

In modern day Hennessey's post office, there is a map from 1908 that shows two rural routes that carriers used. However, it doesn't delineate which route came first and where it went exactly. When the map was produced, a postcard only cost a penny to send.



# **Governor Signs Cost of Living Adjustment for State Pensioners**

State Rep. Avery Frix, R-Muskogee, attended the ceremonial bill signing for House Bill 3350, which granted cost-of-living adjustments (COLAs) for retirees in Oklahoma pension plans, including teachers, firefighters, police, public employees and justices and judges.

The bill was formally signed into law in May and took effect July 1. Ceremonial bill signings allow lawmakers and some of their constituents most affected by legislation to attend.

HB 3350 bases COLAs on the number of years individuals have received retirement benefits from the state. Those retired for five years or more as of July 1 received a 4% increase in monthly pension payments. Those retired at least two years but not five got a 2%

### increase.

Frix, the principal author of the bill said he's fought for COLA legislation since being elected in 2016.

"After talking to so many state retirees who have waited so long for an increase in their benefit," Frix said, "it was gratifying today to see pen put to paper to symbolize the relief this legislation brings for these dedicated public servants."

Frix pointed out that it has been 12 years since these former state employees received a COLA, even as they've seen the cost of health insurance premiums and other living expenses rise.

Frix held an interim study on the COLA last year asking each of the state pension plan managers to respond to whether a COLA would affect the upward

trajectory of their plans funded status. Their responses combined with positive actuarial analyses convinced other lawmakers to support the legislation. The measure passed unanimously in the House with vote of 99-0 and in the Senate by a vote of 41-5.

Frix said the COLA represents a fiscally responsible agreement that keeps the state's pension plans on healthy financial footing. He thanked his fellow lawmakers, including Senate author Roger Thompson, for support and the governor for signing the bill. He also thanked the Fraternal Order of Police, the Oklahoma Firefighters Association, the Oklahoma Public Employees Association, the Oklahoma Retired Educators Association and the Oklahoma Education Association for their input on the bill.

### SWOSU's Wiggen Honored with ALE Rising Star Award

Dr. Todd Wiggen, assistant professor in the Southwestern Oklahoma State University Everett Dobson School of Business & Technology in Weatherford, has won the Rising Star Award from the Association of Leadership Educators (ALE).

The national award recognizes an early career ALE member whose leadership and service upholds and embodies the

association's mission to strengthen and sustain the expertise of professional leadership educators.

Wiggen has served the association as a conference mentor, reviewer for the Journal of Leadership Education, conference reviewer, and as a member of the conference planning committee (serving as chair of the Speaks Subcommittee). He was recently elected to a two-year term as secretary on the association's Board of Directors.

Wiggen serves as coordinator of SWOSU's Reach Higher FlexFinish program and served as the four-year council chair for the state of Oklahoma this past year. Reach Higher is a program designed for working adults that have already completed an Associate's degree or have at least 60 hours of previous college credit with hopes of earning a Bachelor's degree. SWOSU's program allows the student to complete all their coursework online and provides courses in a mixture of 8- and 16-week formats.

The ALE Rising Star Award applicants must have achieved less than five years of professional service in their respective field.
