Weatherford Public School bond updates

Updates for the Weatherford school bond progress are courtesy of Superintendent Chad Wilson. According to Wilson, progress on the new East and West buildings are moving forward on schedule and without hiccups. During mandatory closures, construction crews were able to continue groundwork on the sites which is good news for up-and-coming students who will be able to attend the new

schools. East and West Elementary footings have been poured and various progress has been made regarding structural walls, underground plumbing and electricity, and shelter erection.

These new schools are a part of a school bond issue that included updates and new installations for other Weatherford schools. The middle school received an HVAC system with an HVAC system planned for the

high school in the near future. The high school is also slated to receive a new track in 2021, after the turf is installed. Work on the new field house on the high school campus will be done within the month. Updates and checklists for the school projects can be found on the Weatherford Public Schools website along with detailed information on specific work approved through the school bond issue.

Dr. Kenneth Gene Rose

Dr. Kenneth Gene Rose of Weatherford, devoted husband, loving father, and dedicated educator, passed away Wednesday, September 2, 2020, at Mercy Hospital, Oklahoma City. Dr. Rose was born March 15, 1944, in Clinton, Oklahoma, to Eugene Wesley Rose and Mary Pauline Fleming Rose. From an early age, he was surrounded by a family of educators, including his mother, aunts, and uncles. He graduated from Clinton High School in 1962, earned a B.S.Ed from Southwestern Oklahoma State University in 1967, an M.Ed. from SWOSU in 1970, and an Ed.D. from the University of Oklahoma in 1980.



Devoting his life to education from 1968 to 1974, Dr. Rose taught, coached, and became a principal at Washita Heights Public Schools in Corn, Oklahoma. In 1974, he joined SWOSU as an instructor in physical education, later advancing to professor, Department Chair for Health, Physical Education and Recreation, Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences, and Dean of the College of Professional and Graduate Studies.

While teaching SCUBA at SWOSU, Ken met and fell in love with Susan Renee Smalley of Eakly, Oklahoma. He proposed to her underwater in the diving tank in the Living Seas exhibit at Epcot in Orlando, Florida. They married on the 26th of November in 1988 in the Eakly First United Methodist Church and loved going on adventures from Clinton to Cancún.

Dr. Rose was a member of the Weatherford Rotary Club, serving a term as its president. He also served a term as president of the Oklahoma Health, Physical Education and Recreation Association, and served two decades on the Hospital Advisory Board for the Oklahoma Department of Health. He was a member of the Weatherford Masonic Lodge and became a 32nd degree Mason of the Guthrie Masonic Temple.

An expert in SCUBA diving, Dr. Rose wrote a number of scholarly papers pertaining to the effects of hyperbaric pressure on SCUBA divers and the psychological factors impacting diver performance. He also served as the Mid-American Region National YMCA SCUBA Regional Field Representative and Commissioner over a seven-state region for 20 years.

As a part of his work in developing programs for

SWOSU’s Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, Dr. Rose was instrumental in the creation of park and recreational facilities at Crowder Lake and Foss Lake. While at SWOSU, he became Crowder Lake State and University Park Supervisor and Foss Lake Adventure Program Project Director.

Ken was a loving husband, father, brother, cousin, uncle, and friend. He loved spending time with his family on the ranch, as well as leading in activities such as snow skiing, nature hikes, and days on the lake, and instilled a love of outdoor activities in his entire family. He never missed an extracurricular activity for any of his children, and he could always be seen cheering in the stands of any event, even if that meant driving hundreds of hours and catching dozens of flights. Ken loved unconditionally and was constantly showing his unwavering and overflowing support. He practiced his faith at the First United Methodist Church in Weatherford, Oklahoma.

USDA FREE MEALS - The USDA has announced an extension, allowing summer meal program operators to continue serving free meals to all children into the Fall months. All students attending Weatherford Public Schools can receive a free breakfast and lunch. Free Grab & Go meals for all virtual students and students 18 and under are available for pickup from 10:30am to 11am at the east side of Weatherford Middle School. Parents are asked to email grabngo@wpsok.org before 9am with the number of children requesting Grab & Go meals for the day. It has not been determined how long the free meals will last. While it may extend through the end of the calendar year, it may also end without prior notice.

WASHITA COUNTY HIGHWAY CLOSING East and west bound State Highway 55 will be closed between U.S. 183 and Elm Street in Rocky in Washita County on September 16th, from 7am -5:30pm. Repairs to the railroad crossing by Grainbelt Road will be in progress during that time. Drivers will need to locate an alternate route or plan extra travel time. Traffic will be detoured on local streets during the closure.

WEATHERFORD SALES TAX - Weatherford Economic Development Director Yolanda Creswell, says that sales tax receipts for the month of July were down 12.3%. Creswell says the city is down by about \$700,000 for the year. She says the city is receiving about a million dollars in Cares Act Funding to reimburse police and fire salaries since March.

WEATHERFORD FOOD & RESOURCE CENTER - The Weatherford Food & Resource Center had a successful drive-thru birthday party, collecting both food and monetary donations. Executive Director Lori Flansburg says \$8500 in monetary donations and more than 2100 pounds of food were collected. The goal was to raise \$4000 and 4000 pounds of food.

SWOSU ENROLLMENT - Enrollment for the Fall 2020 semester at Southwestern Oklahoma State University is better than expected. SWOSU President Radny Beutler says the official number is 4,878 for both the Weatherford and Sayre campuses. SWOSU had a decrease of 1.6% from the 2019 Fall semester but, because of the pandemic,

the university was expecting a larger decrease - possibly anywhere from 5-10%.

SWOSU HOMECOMING FAMILY DAY Southwestern Oklahoma State University will host its 2020-2021 academic year Family Day and Homecoming during the Spring 2021 semester due to ongoing restrictions in place. More details will be announced once SWOSU is able to clearly assess Spring athletic scheduling and planning.

ELK CITY MANAGER SEARCH - The search for the next full-time city manager in Elk City may be coming to an end. Officials are entering into negotiations with Tom Ivester to be the next full-time city manager. Mayor Nick Artcher says Ivester was named Interim City Manager after former City Manager Lee Littrell was terminated by the City Commissioner earlier this year.

1. Take a verse of Scripture and slowly think it through, word for word, phrase by phrase. Turn it over in your mind and think of its different applications. Then, say the verse, emphasizing a different word each time.

Example: *My God shall meet every need of yours according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus. Phil. 4:19*

Personalize: *"The God that I serve will meet my emotional needs, my physical needs, and my spiritual needs. He will do this because of all the riches he has given me in Christ Jesus. Prayer: Lord, I claim this promise that you both know my needs and you are powerful to provide. I rest in that promise. I give up anxiety, fear, and worry and trust you to provide.*

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The Story of Antelope Hills (part 2)

The Rangers quickly formed plans. Colonel Ross had the Indian Allies tie strips of white cloth about their heads to prevent friendly fire. Captain Ford's father had come along and he was to stay with the camp in a rear guard position, along with a handful of men.

Soon the Texans were in the saddle and moving northward. It was late afternoon. Riding cautiously through the night, it was not yet dawn when they swung out of their saddles. They would proceed on foot, each man tightly holding the reins of his horse. Any man left afoot knew he would be quickly dispatched if he were to be overwhelmed. The first to see the enemy camp were the Tonkawa scouts. The Tonkawa Chief, Old Plicardo, had spotted five teepees on the river's south side. Asking

for permission to attack, the Tonkawas (who were on foot) were the first into the small camp. Next came mounted Indian Allies, followed by the now marching Rangers. The sun had just begun to break against the Antelope Hills.

When the word was given, the Tonkawas poured into the camp. They killed aged women and small children, remember they were mortal enemies of the Comanches. Two Comanche warriors escaped on horseback with the Rangers mounting up and giving chase. After a three-mile pursuit, the hunter and the hunted came to a spot on the Canadian River known as Little Robe Crossing. Before the Rangers' very eyes loomed the entire Comanche village with some 70 lodges.

Later, the Rangers would state, "it seemed so picturesque. The hide-covered lodge teepees appeared as white as canvas in the early morning light, and there was a thin veil of pale blue smoke which hung lazily in the still morning air." Close by were several hundred horses and mules, many hobbled (think hand-cuffs for horses) and grazing quietly. The serene scene

soon faded as the Rangers had come for frontier war. Many of these men had seen atrocities fall on their fellow Texans committed by the Comanche. Women were raped and tortured while men were tortured slowly and in a cruel fashion before succumbing to their wounds. But let us not forget the Comanches viewed these whites as intruders into 'their' country. The Comanche way of fighting was not the white man's way. What was viewed as horrendous to the Anglos was common practice to the American Indian.

The Rangers followed the two Comanches on horseback in order to find the clear path across the river and avoid the quicksands. Once across, they found a long, narrow, flat plain stretched out before the village. Now mounted, the Rangers descended upon the camp. Meanwhile, the two Comanche horsemen called out their warnings to the village. A hasty defense was made by those not on the buffalo hunt.

At the center of the skirmish line was Captain John RIP Ford with Lt. Pitts nearby. To the left of the line were Pitts' fellow lieutenants: Preston,

Tankersley & Nelson. As the company advanced across the flat ground, a single Comanche warrior astride a fine iron grey horse appeared. This warrior was the epitome of the Plains Indian Warrior. This was Comanche Chief and Medicine Man Iron Jacket, so called for the Spanish armor he wore. The hundred-plus-year-old armor was made of heavy cloth covered in leather and thick metal scales, also known as mail.

His "power" was said to be strong medicine, so strong that bullets could not touch him. In truth, it was most likely the Spanish armor. As he neared the Rangers, it could clearly be seen that he held a patch of white cloth before him. The Rangers thought no "savage of the plains" could understand the significance of a white cloth. It will never be known for sure if Iron Jacket wanted to parley or if this was some type of challenge because the Rangers opened fire on him. Bullets struck all about horse and rider to no avail. Iron Jacket rode first, before the Tonkawas, in full view. More shots rang out, but again he was unscathed. Next, the great warrior rode left, the full length of the line, whirling

about as he crossed back. It seemed he could not be struck by the white man's bullets.

The fact he could ride the entire length of the skirmish line, under a constant fire, caused many to believe the superstition that Iron Jacket really was bulletproof. As he rode to the far west side of the line and wheeled his horse about again to the east with his back in view, a single

fighter (legend has it to be an Anadarko Indian called Pockmark Jim) kneeled down with a Mississippi Yager rifle in hand. His shot struck underneath the metal scales and hit true. Iron Jacket tumbled from his horse just as the iron grey mount was mortally wounded itself. Both horse and rider lay dying. A single Comanche warrior ran to him but was cut down.

Heather volunteers with Humane Societies all over the country, and she takes some of the animals that she has from Oklahoma to areas where they'll be adopted. "Last year, we were able to save over a thousand animals by transporting them," Heather explains. And this year, she wants to rescue even more. But she'll need some help.

Luckily, First Fidelity Bank has donated \$400 to Heather as a "Thank You" for all of her hard work. The

bank became aware of her actions, thanks to Martha Barber, from Clinton, who nominated Heather. Martha told News 4 about how Heather works all on her own and takes care of so many animals.

The team at News 4 went with Martha as she surprised Heather with the \$400. Upon receiving the money, Heather was thankful and immediately knew how she would spend it - she's going to keep expanding. Heather plans to use the money to build additional kennels, cover the current kennels from the sun, and cover transportation costs so she can continue to find homes for these animals.

Heather is a woman with a mission, and she won't stop as long as there's work to be done. She knew she had to

take on some responsibilities after she first walked into the pound in Clinton in November of 2015. After seeing the animals in need, she took action. Heather started taking in some of the strays to reduce the pound's kennel numbers. "They just didn't have anywhere to go," she said. Heather is proud of the progress she's made with the pound, and she greatly appreciates the support. However, she doesn't expect a thank you. Her actions are her own, and she just does what she knows she needs to do to take care of these stray cats and dogs.

Heather has changed the lives of so many animals and adopting families, and we'd like to issue a big thank you to her for her selfless work. She is truly deserving of the title Hometown Hero.

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
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
