### **SWOSU Fall Graduation Ceremony Cancelled**

Commencement is always a special time at Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford.

The university had originally planned to celebrate May 2020 graduates at a fall ceremony; however, the COVID-19 pandemic continues to make it unsafe to have large gatherings. Thus, SWOSU must make changes to its calendar. SWOSU has decided to cancel the fall graduation ceremony originally scheduled for November 21. Instead, the university plans to provide several alternative methods of celebrating its graduates who planned to participate in the ceremony.

Graduates will have an opportunity to take a professional photo with their gown and diploma cover during a two-day period in November at the Pioneer Cellular Event Center. The Alma Mater Merc has caps/gowns provided by the university for graduates who have not already picked them up. A graduation program will be printed, and each

graduate will receive four copies.

Even though there will not be a live ceremony in November, SWOSU invite graduates to participate in the May 2021 ceremony.

More details will be provided soon on the SWOSU website, but university officials wanted to get word to the graduates and their families. The university is deeply sorry that a November ceremony cannot be held, but it is in the best interest of everyone at this time.

During his years as president, Dr. Hays completed the SWOSU Wellness Center, started and developed the University's Athletic Complex and had several major buildings renovated on the Weatherford and Sayre campuses.

#### CLINTON CITY COUNCIL STREET RE-

**NAME** - Clinton City Council recently took no action on a request to change a street name. Former Interim City Manager Gene McCullough says officials with Mars want to change the name of the street from Mars Road to Pet Way. The council kicked around the idea of a ceremonial renaming and will consider that option at its next meeting.

**STATE HIGHWAY 73 CLOSURE** - East and westbound State Highway 73 will be closed over the Washita River between I-40 Business and State Highway 44, west of Clinton, in Custer County through the summer of 2021 for a bridge

rehabilitation project. The signed detour is U.S. 183 to I-40 to State Highway 44. The \$2 million bridge rehabilitation contract was awarded to Sewell Brothers Inc., of Oklahoma City.

**BECKHAM COUNTY FATALITY IN ELK** 

**CITY -** One pedestrian is dead and another was treated at a local hospital after being struck by a pickup truck on Route 66, about 1 mile east of Elk City in Beckham County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says 33 year old Landon Musick of Elk City was driving west on Business 40 and struck 2 of 3 pedestrians who were walking westbound. Troopers say 18 year old Joshua Rogers of Dale died at the scene. Eighteen year old Jack Parker of Marshall, Arkansas, was treated and released from Great Plains Regional Medical Center in Elk City.

THE KLOSET, IN WEATHERFORD, IS CLOSING - The owner of a long time downtown Weatherford business says she has plans to close and retire. Martha Sauer of The Kloset says she recently made the decision to retire. Sauer says she does not have a specific closing date as she still has merchandise coming in to the store. The Kloset has been in business for the past 47 years.

WEATHERFORD ARMED ROBBERY -Weatherford Police Detective Matt Bartel says detectives are working an armed robbery from last week. Bartel says two people set up a business deal in the 300 block of East Arapaho to sell a firearm and pointed the firearm at an individual who gave them money for the firearm and that's when police were called. #### HIGHER GROUND Equipping an Army



"Building a crowd or equipping an army?" I don't remember where I first read that statement, but I feel it represents a good picture of how we approach church in the 21st century. Of course you can do both which is the desired end. But, often the temptation is to short change the equipping stage if it isn't resulting in growing attendance at the rate that we would like. Human nature being

what it is, we are more likely to respond to something that doesn't challenge us to think deeply, work harder, or make sacrifices. We are tempted to play to the culture which is mesmerized by the "what do I get out of it," mentality.

I recently heard a pastor say, "You can't escape the New Testament concept that we are called to be disciples and in turn to make disciples." As one writer described it we can be either a "fan" or a "follower" of Jesus. A fan is content to set on the sideline and cheer. He gets excited when his team gives him the thrills of winning. But there is really nothing he does to make that happen. A fan of Jesus might be one who enjoys going to concerts or mega church settings; he loves to be involved in the ecstasy of praise and worship settings, but rarely gets involved in the messy stuff of the human dilemma, like visiting in a nursing home or investing his life in someone WHO has nothing to offer in return. A true follower of Jesus says, "Yes Lord, I'll follow you into the inner-city when my flesh longs for the suburbs. I'll invest my time in that trailer park, even if their lifestyle makes me sad. I'll become informed so that I might serve more effectively even though I'd rather watch NCIS, the Red Sox, or go hunting." It is not that God calls his disciples to a dry, humdrum lifestyle without any fun or joy. It is that He knows where lasting satisfaction and deep security resides; in the joy of obedience, in investing in things that last for eternity.

Disciple-making is the next and often the most neglected sphere of the Christ-life. But the last time I checked it was still included in Matt. 28:19. Too often we think in terms of conversions, baptisms, members, or attenders. Disciple making is a bit abstract and it not easily described or defined. But essentially it means being transformed to become like Jesus--to see people as he does, to learn to love sacrificially like he did, and to join him on the cross in dying to our own selfish desires and ambitions. It is seeking to know Him more intimately and finding the treasure that would call a man to sell all he has to purchase it. Then how do we as disciples learn how to be real disciple-makers, that is helping new believers see the big picture of the Kingdom? It is more than setting in a pew on Sunday Morning, as important as that is. Most researchers say that greater growth comes in small group settings of interaction, doing servant related projects with other believers, one-on-one mentoring sessions, and learning how to feed yourself in study and solitude. Likely, it boils down to developing a hunger a thirst for the knowledge of God that leads to a life of service. Can we sincerely pray, "God give me a heart that longs to know you more deeply and love you more completely." Then ask God to lead you to someone in whose life the Spirit has demonstrated a hunger and thirst. The doors will open and the Spirit will lead. To comment: jhm82@outlook. com 580-772-2311

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# **Theodore Roosevelt - part 1**

I have a hankerin' for history, not just Western or Oklahoma history but history in all things. You may see this headline and ask "What does Teddy Roosevelt have to do with Western Oklahoma?"

First off, Roosevelt didn't care much for being called Teddy. He preferred Theodore or simply TR. Secondly, Theodore Roosevelt is one of my greatest heroes, not for his presidency or his military service but

because of how he dealt with life's hardships. He was never a quitter.

Born the 27th of October, 1858, in New York, New York. His father was Theodore Roosevelt, Sr. and his mother was Martha Stewart Bulloch.

Martha, "Mittie," as she was often called, was born and raised in Hartford, Connecticut. Although it is well rumored (you know how rumors are) that she was the inspiration for Scarlet O'Hara from "Gone With the Wind," TR describes his mother as "a gracious, sweet Southern woman." Mittie was sympathetic to the Southern cause to her dying day.

TR's father, Theodore Roosevelt, Sr., also known as "Thee," was a businessman and philanthropist. He was one of the founders of The American Museum of Natural History as well as the Metropolitan Museum of Art and The Children's Aid Society. Unlike his wife, Thee was a staunch supporter of the North during the American Civil War.

Theodore was a sickly child, as he suffered with

severe bouts of asthma. It was not an uncommon sight on dreary nights to see the Senior Roosevelt crying out "Faster! Faster!" to the family carriage driver as the carriage moved as quickly as it could down the brickpaved streets. At the same time, senior Roosevelt would tell young TR to hold his mouth open wide in hopes to force as much air into his lungs as possible to stop the strangling attacks.

Young Theodore was spindly in form but gifted with a strong inner determination. His father tried all manner of remedy to combat the boy's asthma. After hearing a lecture on the subject, Senior Roosevelt told his son, "Theodore you have the mind but not the body and without the body, the mind cannot go as far as it should." TR took these words to heart. He took up boxing and built his own workout space at the family's residence. His sisters watched as he struggled to swing between the parallel bars, forever determined to succeed.

When illness drove him indoors, young Theodore plowed through books. He was filled with a desire to learn. It wasn't strange to see him bring in small dead animals that he used for his hobby of taxidermy. The natural world amazed him for his entire life.

Through hard work and tremendous effort, young TR built his body up. Just as he built his body, he built his mind, too. He did well in his studies and, once adulthood came, it wasn't long before he became an Alderman for Albany, New York. It was while at work that TR received wonderful and horrible news all at once.

Roosevelt rushed home on a steam-powered streetcar. He clutched two telegram papers between his fist. The first telegram said simply, "You have a wonderful new baby girl." The second one was much different as it read, "Come at once, wife and mother gravely ill."

Alice Hathaway Lee had caught the eve and later the heart of the young Theodore who, at the time, wore thick glasses and chomped off every word he spoke. It was a wonderful courtship, and now she lay dying. Alice had Bright's Disease, an illness that affects the kidneys resulting in fevers, vomiting, horrific back pain

and bloody urine. After childbirth, she lacked the strength to fight her illness. Calling to her husband Teddy (Alice was one of the few to call him this without disturbing him), he held her hand and was helpless to watch as her life seeped away.

It was TR's brother Elliott who called to him just down the hallway. Mittie Roosevelt was succumbing to Typhoid Fever. Only 48 years old, Mittie passed away at around 3am. Theodore had taken a devastating blow. His beloved mother was gone, and now he sat with the love of his life, waiting for her time to end. Alice Roosevelt slipped from his world at 2pm the next afternoon. He would later say that the light of his life had grown dark. It would then take a journey to the American West to heal mind, body and soul. (to be continued next week)



"The Coin Guy" Small-size note sets record at \$384,000 in Heritage auction

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The title of "the United States' most valuable small-size note" went to a new holder on Sept. 18, when Heritage Auctions sold a \$10,000 Series 1934 Federal Reserve note for \$384,000, including buyer's fee, at its currency auction in Dallas. It was estimated to go for \$200,000 to \$300,000.

All \$10,000 notes are rare today. The Treasury Department stopped delivering Series 1934 notes in 1945, and the issuance of them, along with all denomination of \$500 and above, was discontinued in 1969. Of the more than 60,000 \$10,000 Federal Reserve notes of all series printed in total, not more than a couple

of hundred are accounted for today. The overwhelming majority of the known notes bear the "B" designation of the New York Federal Reserve district.

None were ever meant to publicly circulate; they were intended to facilitate cash transactions between banks.

The new record holder is special on two counts. One is that it is in remarkable condition in a grade of Gem Uncirculated 66 with Exceptional Paper Quality assigned by Paper Money Guaranty. This is the highest grade ever assigned by the service to such a note. Dustin Johnston, Heritage director of U.S. Currency, said: "This is easily the best of its kind I have ever seen. This is the finest example ever offered of a perennial trophy note."

The second factor is that it is not from the New York bank, but rather Kansas City (Friedberg catalog number 2231-J). Just 1,200 of them were printed, tied with the Richmond and Dallas issues for the fewest made. Only seven others are known from Kansas City, and all pale in comparison in grade. Five of them were also graded by PMG in a range from Very Fine 25 to Extremely Fine 40. The two without third-party grades are listed as Very Fine 30 and About Uncirculated 50.

The example just sold, according to Track & Price, was off the public market since Jan. 10, 2004, when it was called Gem Uncirculated 67 by Currency Grading and Authentication Inc. At that sale, Heritage Auctions sold it for \$120,750.

Another Series 1934 \$10,000 note in the same Sept. 18 auction was issued for the New York bank (F-2231-B) and was a part of the famed Binion Horseshoe Casino display of 100 of them. It realized \$144,000 with a PMG grade of Choice Uncirculated 63.

# U.S. Department of Commerce Invests \$2.8 Million to Establish Business and Technology North Park in Weatherford, Oklahoma

"This project is critical to addressing the lack of developed industrial land available for purchase and private investment in Weatherford," said Dana Gartzke, Performing the Delegated Duties of the Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Economic Development. "The new Weatherford Business and Technology North Park will improve economic resilience and support long-term recovery efforts from natural disasters by providing opportunities for more business to invest and locate in the region."

"The \$2.8 million grant awarded to Weatherford, Okla., by the EDA will help immensely as the city develops the Weatherford Business and Technology North Park," said Senator Jim Inhofe. "Not only this, but with the Trump Administration's funding also comes significant local funding for the project. I look forward to seeing the economic growth and jobs that will come to the Weatherford community with the completion of this important development project."

"I'm thrilled the City of Weatherford is receiving this \$2.8 million grant to fund the creation of the Weatherford Business and Technology North Park," said Congressman Frank Lucas (OK-03). "At a time when job creation and economic growth are vital to our district's local communities, the Commerce Department's announcement is expected to create 300 jobs, substantially benefit our communities businesses, and further fuel the economic engine of Weatherford and Custer County.
