the Razorback squad next year, the future for Ashlyn and the Hogs looks bright.




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



Lawmakers Request Investigation of Education Department in Wake of Auditor's Findings

A group of lawmakers commented on the recent report from State Auditor and Inspector Cindy Byrd regarding the investigative audit of EPIC Charter Schools performed at the request of Governor Stitt and called for further action as a result of the findings.

"As lawmakers who have advocated for increased accountability, we take the allegations against EPIC Charter Schools (EPIC) very seriously. If the allegations against EPIC are proven to be accurate, they should be held accountable. While there may be disagreements as to the facts of this case, there can be no debate as to the seriousness of the issues raised by the state auditor.

"One of the most serious issues contained in the auditor's report, however, does not deal with EPIC specifically. Throughout the report, the auditor notes the failure of the State Department of Education (SDE) to properly monitor the Oklahoma Cost Accounting System (OCAS) for compliance. Specifically, the state auditor states that SDE has 'no process in place to evaluate actual compliance with the written policies

and procedures, or with applicable laws, statutes, or Administrative Rules.' The auditor goes on to state that 'there is virtually no follow-up or on-site review conducted by SDE as it relates to the actual records underlying the data reported.'

"If the state auditor is correct in her assessment that the State Department of Education repeatedly neglected its responsibility to ensure compliance with OCAS and other required reports, one must ask if this dereliction of duty was confined solely to EPIC Charter Schools or if it permeates throughout our public education system. If SDE did in fact routinely fail to perform its regulatory duties, this could result in the discovery of hundreds of millions of dollars of misused funds.

"It is the duty of the Legislature to protect taxpayer

dollars, and as such we are respectfully requesting that Governor Stitt task the State Auditor and Inspector's office to conduct an investigative audit of the State Department of Education to determine the full extent and impact of its potential failure to ensure compliance."

CLINTON/FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS - The President of the Clinton Chamber of Commerce Julie Caldwell says it's unclear as to what the festival of lights will look like this year due to COVID 19. However, she says there will not be a parade this year. The festival of lights is held the Tuesday after Thanksgiving.

CADDO COUNTY FATALITY - The east-bound lanes of interstate 40 near Hydro were closed for several hours due to a fatality accident last week. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says 59 year old Martin Hoselton of El Reno died at the scene of the accident. Fifty-four year old Otis Baker of Hinton was treated and released from Weatherford Regional Hospital. Troopers say a collision in the outside lane diverted traffic to the inside lane. OHP says Hoselton was driving in the inside lane with his flashers on and rear-ended a semi that was driven by baker.

CLINTON SCHOOLS/ FACE MASK REQUIREMENT - Clinton School officials implemented a policy that requires staff and students in grades Pre-K through 12 to wear face coverings while at school. Superintendent Tyler Bridges says the district is trying to be pro-active and avoid the risk of having to go virtual. Bridg-

es says the district has recently seen a larger uptick in staff positive and quarantine cases. District officials urge the washing of hands, wearing of masks and watching your distance as ways to prevent the spread of COVID 19.

WEATHERFORD SCHOOL BOARD AUDIT - The Weatherford School Board of Education approved the fiscal year 2020 audit report. James Kuykendall of Britton, Kuykendall & Miller CPA's say the district had an ending fund balance of just over \$3 million. Kuykendall says the audit revealed no material weaknesses and no significant deficiencies.

WEATHERFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT COMMENDATION - Two Weatherford police officers were given letters of commendation recently. Patrolmen Kyle Ellerbeck and Chaz Hickman were recognized for their actions during an armed robbery on East Univesity last month. Detective Matt Bartel says their immediate actions and calm control of the situation prevented further threat to the safety of citizens.

ucator Zack Henderson is wanting to see how much interest there is to start a new community/teaching garden in the spring of 2021. Henderson has applied for a community improvement grant to help get started. Truth ignored is no better foundation for our lives then no truth at all.

The truth is that the only things we can really know

about God are the things he has chosen to reveal to us in one way or another.

God. . . decided long ago that he would restore his relationship with his children in a costly way, by himself taking the punishment for their rebellion because he could not bear for them to be punished so harshly. Great American Conference Announces Return to Play Dates

On Monday, the Great American Conference announced second-semester start dates for the conference sports of Men's & Women's Basketball, Volleyball, and Women's Soccer.

GAC Basketball will feature a 20-game divisional schedule, beginning on Thursday, January 7, with SWOSU in Ada to face East Central before hosting Southeastern Oklahoma State on Saturday, January 9 inside the Pioneer Cellular Event Center. Full SWOSU Basketball schedules can be found at the links: Men's | Women's.

GAC Volleyball will implore a 10-week, 10-match divisional schedule that opens on Tuesday, January 26 and runs through Tuesday, March 30. SWOSU Volleyball opens the season at Southern Nazarene on January 26 and they'll play their first match inside the Pioneer Cellular Event Center on February 2 against East Central. GAC Women's Soccer will feature a seven-week schedule in which each team will play six conference contests and SWOSU opens the season on Saturday, February 27 by hosting Northwestern Oklahoma State at the Athletic Complex in Weatherford. See the current SWOSU Soccer schedule at the link.

"I can't say enough about the work done by our presidents and administrators to place the GAC in a position to safely resume competition," GAC Commissioner Will Prewitt said. There's a lot of work to be done, and we are keeping our fingers crossed regarding public health conditions across Arkansas and Oklahoma, but we are hopeful to see the lights go back on for games on January 7."

In addition, it was announced the SWOSU will host the 2021 spring GAC Cross Country Championships on

Saturday, February 27. Formats and dates for the men's soccer regular season as well as the championships for basketball, volleyball, and soccer will be determined at a later date.

"Our student-athletes have been working diligently this fall while patiently awaiting their return to competition and we are looking forward to them getting that opportunity beginning in January," SWOSU Athletic Director Todd Helton said. "I would like to commend our coaches for approaching the fall semester with a positive outlook and making the best of the situation they were in. We can't wait to see our teams back in action this spring. Go Dawgs!"

Members will play spring sports schedules as previously approved by the conference's Council of Athletic Administrators and Council of Presidents.

SWOSU Baseball opens their 33-game conference schedule on February 19-20 against Arkansas-Monticello while SWOSU Softball is also moving to a 33-game conference schedule, with play beginning on February 26-27 against Southern Arkansas. Each team can open their regular season with non-conference competition beginning at the start of February.

The conference office also released a fall 2021 football schedule that kicks off a full 11-game round-robin slate on Thursday, September 2, with SWOSU hosting Henderson State.

The Great American Conference will continue to evaluate NCAA, federal, state, and local developments and provide updated revisions as further information becomes available.

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The Debt

We owe our soldiers a debt of gratitude, especially those of 'The Greatest Generation,' those who served in World War II. In my opinion, they truly are the greatest generation. The sense of patriotic duty could be found in everyday citizens throughout the country. A generation of men and women who "anted up" and did their duty, no matter how menial or overwhelming the task may have

been. They had the strength to dig in and do what was required of them. Even the children did their part by collecting scrap iron, paper, and working in the victory gardens. One didn't have to serve in a military branch to be a patriot. Patriotism was, and still is, born of ones love of country.

After WWII, those who returned to life, as they once knew it, did their best to put the war behind them. Many could close that chapter and put it away on a shelf, but not all. There is no shame in how one handles the horrors of war. No one is capable of walking in their shoes, therefore incapable of judging them. That is how it should be. Even 70-plus years later, they deserve our gratitude.

My father was called to duty in 1943. He received a one-year deferment. In 1944, he reported back and was told he was no longer needed. I often wonder if my brothers and sister would be here today if he had served in '43. It haunts me to think that someone out there took my father's place. I often wonder if he lost his life and how I might live to honor the sacrifice he made for my

family. My Dad did serve his country in the Korean War. The stories of our Mom following him from base to base and his stories of his fellow soldiers are some of my most precious memories. Many call The Korean War the "Forgotten War." I am sure South Korea and those who served, along with their families, have not forgotten it.

Vietnam was a different kind of war. In the eyes of a nation growing increasingly dysfunctional, many Americans could not separate the politics from the soldier. Sadly, many were treated disgracefully when they returned stateside. For those who committed such horrible acts against our veterans, they will answer for those actions in the hereafter. Only recently has our nation made efforts to right those wrongs. It is clear that war is war, and no matter how you view the politics of it, you MUST stand behind your military men and women and support them.

Since the times of Vietnam, we have learned to respect our service members again. We would like to think the soldier fights for us, you and me, and to a point that is true, but on the battle field, they fight for the soldier to their left and to their right. That bond of brotherhood is strong, still the same no matter the war, and it is lifelong. I will respect them to my dying breath.

Honor, duty, sacrifice and a sense of service is not reserved for the military, it is appointed to each citizen. As citizens, the best we can do to show honor and respect for their sacrifice is to pledge ourselves to our country

Miniature California Gold Coins

During the California gold rush small coins were scarce. To remedy this situation private assayers in California began striking small-denomination gold coins. Their small sizes made it difficult to handle. When compared to their face value they were frequently under-weight in gold content.

On October 15, 2020, an auction in Dallas, Texas featured one of the biggest collections of small California gold pieces. The designs consisted of Native Americans and President George Washington in round and hexagonal shapes.

The above pictured coin is a gold round Washington quarter-dollar dated 1872. It was certified by the Numismatic Guaranty Corporation as a Mint State 65. It realized \$1,500.
