HIGHER GROUND One Life to Live



She was only 4'3" but every inch spoke volumes. She was so unselfish that she gave away the little food she had so that Chinese children could be fed. This led to her death while on board ship in the harbor of Kobe, Japan. This is the season of giving and many churches also give special offerings to mission causes around the world. This is the story of how

one woman changed the course of history. After forty years of mission work in China, Lottie was sent home to rest. But she went to her eternal rest while on board ship in the harbor of Kobe, Japan. One testified that she weighed fifty pounds at death.

Lottie D Moon was born into a well-to-do Southern home in 1843. She had unique educational opportunities for the times. At an early age she was tutored in French, music and the Classics. But as a youngster she had little interest in spiritual matters. During one year at Hollins Institute, she skipped required chapel 26 times in the last two quarters. Once she climbed up the bell tower to silence the bell that called students to church. When asked what the middle initial "D" stood for, she replied, "Devil." She gained the reputation as a brain and a heretic. No one would imagine that she would selflessly give forty years of her life serving the poor in China.

The dramatic change came during a revival meeting led by James Broadus. She came to the meeting to scoff but came away changed forever. Not knowing what God was calling her to do, but willing to obey, she poured herself into her studies. She was proficient in Greek, Spanish, Italian, and French. Lottie became the first Southern woman to receive the Master of Arts degree. She was labeled as the "most educated woman in the South."

On July 17, 1873 she sailed to China to be obedient to God's call on her life. She was determined to give her life away to share the good news of Christ to those who had never heard. She soon saw that the fields were white unto harvest but there were far too few laborers. She wrote strong letters to mission boards and churches urging them to give sacrificially.

She challenged the Chinese culture by attacking the practice of binding the feet of children, which caused the little feet to be deformed. She was called a "foreign devil" at first but the smell of cookies baking soon drew children to her kitchen. She began schools and rescued many young girls from a lifetime of slavery and prostitution. She would go from house-to-house to tell about a Savior to those who never heard. She was a controversial figure for her time, challenging other missionaries and her own denomination. But she never backed down, knowing that her cause was just. She noted that the Methodists called for a time of prayer and giving for Foreign Missions during the week before Christmas. She thought this was a great idea and urged her own Southern Baptist churches to do the same. So to this day almost every Southern Baptist Church has a Lottie Moon Christmas offering for International missions.

She suffered terribly during the Boxer rebellion. In seeing Chinese Christians eating bark off trees and sweet potato vines, she reduced her own salary to buy food for them. Finally, facing malnutrition she was placed aboard the ship, Manchurian, to return home to rest. Her frail body gave out and she was cremated and the ashes sent to the headquarters of the Southern Baptist Mission Board. The Chinese wept, "How she loved us!" Clinton and Thomas football teams advance to semifinals

The Clinton Red Tornadoes had a tough battle in Poteau last Friday night when they played the defending Class 4A champion Pirates in the quarterfinal round of the high school football playoffs. The Red Tornadoes overcame a four-plus hour bus ride and beat Poteau, 17-10 to advance to the semifinal round this Friday night.

Clinton and Poteau were tied 10-10 at the end of the third quarter when quarterback Caden Powell scored on a 2-yard keeper in the fourth to put the visiting Red Tornadoes up 17-10 for the final margin of victory. Defensive back Nathan Jones solidified the win with an interception of a Poteau pass at the goal line. Clinton out-gained Poteau 306 yards to 226 yards.

Clinton will now go to Blanchard this Friday night and play the Blanchard Lions in one of two semi-final games. Blanchard got by the Bristow Purple Pirates last Friday, 21-18. The Lions won the District 4A-2 championship and are 10-2 and on a nine game winning streak. The Red Tornadoes are at 7-3 and are 3-1 in their last four games.

The Thomas Terriers are on a roll themselves. They manhandled the Tonkawa Buccaneers last Friday night at Ross Field by the final score of 44-8. The Terriers advance

after a punt was blocked by the Thomas punt-return unit. Hamberlin finished with 191 yards on nine carries – a 21 yard average per carry – and the two scores.

Senior quarterback Jaxon Ward threw two touchdown passes – one for 25 yards to senior wideout Jaxen Mannering and a 20-yard TD reception to senior receiver Noah Rainwater. Ward was 8-12 for 117 yards passing and has only two interceptions this season. The Terriers piled up 444 yards of total offense in the game.

The Terriers' defense continues to take away the ball from the opponent at an impressive rate. They now have 18 interceptions and 14 fumble recoveries. Combined, they are averaging nearly three defensive turnovers per game.

Thomas will host one of four Class A quarterfinal round games this Friday night when the Pawnee Black Bears visit Ross Field. Pawnee is 9-1 and finished second in District A-6. They have scored, on average, 54 points over the last five games.

The Mountain View – Gotebo Tigers continue to win. They beat Medford last Friday, 76-28. The Tigers will next play Tyrone (9-2) in one of two semi-final games in Class C. The winner of the game will play the winner of the Timberlake at Buffalo semi-final game for the championship at Northwestern Oklahoma State in Alva at 2:00 next Saturday afternoon, December 12.

notes have become the unofficial money used in daily transactions. Except the above pictured notes are cleaned periodically to be re-used. In the recent past bank notes from Zimbabwe had denominations of 100 trillion dollars. Federal Reserve notes therefore are more stable. In 2009 inflation reached 5 billion percent and Zimbabwe abandoned its own currency. New versions of its own currency were issued by Zimbabwe and banned the

use of dollars. In March of 2020, the ban was lifted. Yet it is still illegal to use foreign currencies and authorities often raid currency dealers, seize their foreign currency and give out fines.

In Zimbabwe, Africa money laundering has taken on a new meaning. U.S. \$1

The need for dollars is so desperate causing traders to repair old dollar bills by using glue, thread or tape. The serial numbers must be seen in order to use the dollars.

Zimbabweans have no faith in their own currency as it takes a very large amount of their notes just to buy a loaf of bread.
