Dr. Howard Kurtz, professor of sociology and criminal justice at Southwestern Oklahoma State University in Weatherford, is the winner of the Bernhardt Academic Excellence Award for 2021 at SWOSU.

Kurtz was presented the

prestigious award at the annual Bernhardt Award ceremony held virtually this year. He received a \$5,000 cash award, clock, pen and medallion.

SWOSU alumni Dr. William and Theta Juan Bernhardt of Midwest City are sponsors of the annual award that goes to an outstanding faculty member who exhibits exceptional achievement in teaching, scholarship and service.

Kurtz, a third-generation European immigrant, was born in Pennsylvania and worked his way through college as a musician. He received his doctorate in sociology and psychology from the University of North Texas and completed two post-doctoral studies at Rice University.

He came to SWOSU six years ago after being at Oklahoma City University, where he was chair of graduate and undergraduate programs in sociology and criminal justice for 20 years.

In addition to his university duties at SWOSU, he is asked by the Justice Department, Office of Justice Programs, Office of Homeland Security and the National Institute of Justice to consult on national evaluation projects and to serve as an expert evaluator for federal grants. He also does consulting work for the American Council on Education, National Social Sciences Association, National Science Foundation, U.S. Department of Education and numerous government agencies.

Kurtz developed one of the country's first university courses on victimology, which he still teaches. His dissertation research was published as a book on the effects of violence titled "The Beaten Victim" and in the Journal of Victimology. He has developed graduate and undergraduate course materials on crime for national and international learning companies that are used by countless colleges here and abroad.

Kurtz has received funding from the State of Oklahoma to study electronic monitoring, criminal justice flowcharting, prison escapes and victims' services. He has been actively involved in research and scholarly activity throughout his career and continues to do so at SWOSU.

He was one of the founders of the state's Oklahoma Criminal Justice Research Consortium. The consortium funded statewide program evaluations and research projects in criminal justice. The John F Kennedy School

for Government at Harvard University chose this program as a national finalist in the Innovations in Government competition.

"Throughout my career, two things have guided mecompassion for others and the pursuit of excellence," Kurtz said. "I try to instill both of those qualities in all of my students through teaching and mentoring."

At SWOSU, he has rewritten the criminal justice curriculum, authored annual and five-year reviews, and developed educational materials online and in the classroom. He reestablished the criminal justice student organization and has taken students to academic conferences to present their original research for the first time in 10 years.

He and his wife are longtime residents of Yukon. They have seven children.

SWOSU Group Provides Teachers with Special Activity at Women in Science Conference



Southwestern Oklahoma State University (SWOSU) and the Southwest Alliance for Girls' Enrichment in Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts / Humanities, and Mathematics (SAGE STEAM) Camp in Weatherford recently participated in the 2021 Women in Science Conference.

The event provides hands-on activities and information about STEAM opportunities to Oklahoma teachers and students ranging from 6th to 12th grades. In response to the pandemic, this formerly in-person conference was conducted virtually this year by the OK NSF EPSCoR through a partnership with the Oklahoma Museum Network and Science Museum of Oklahoma.

The SWOSU group hosted one of eight, virtual hands-on Science and Recruitment Fair booths. A multidisciplinary team from SWOSU's departments of Biological Sciences, Language and Literature, Mathematics and College of Pharmacy worked together on an activity featuring yeast in food production. They

created instructions for teachers, record sheets for students, and a script for the demonstration. While the activity directly featured science and math, the group incorporated the arts & humanities by including yeast's roles in health, history and art.

The demonstration was recorded by the Science Museum of Oklahoma. Each part was recorded individually to follow safety precautions while allowing masks to be removed. In addition, thanks to its supporters, the SAGE STEAM Camp supplied bags for 50 teachers. These contained the materials needed by 1,500 total students to conduct the activity as well as provided information about SWOSU and the camp.

Oklahoma History: Will Rogers & Wiley Post



Two great American heroes, and world-renowned Oklahomans, Will Rogers and Wiley Post, passed away during a flight in northern Alaska on August 15, 1935. Rogers and Post, both, had lustrous careers and heavily influenced their fields.

Will Rogers was a stage and film actor, performer, humorist, world-traveler, newspaper columnist, and commentator. During his time as a vaudeville act, his skills gained him enough notoriety to transition into Hollywood. He quickly rose among the Hollywood elite, thanks to his comedic wit and ability to poke fun at controversial topics in a way that ensured both sides had a laugh. At the time of his death, Rogers had made 71 films, wrote over 4,000 nationally syndicated newspaper columns, traveled around the world 3 times, was the highest paid Hollywood film star, had published several books, began a radio podcast that ranked among the top radio programs in the country, gave lectures and speeches around the world, and gave to victims of natural disasters of floods, droughts, or earthquakes.

Wiley Post was a world-renowned aviator during the Golden Age of Aviation (between WWI and WWII). He flew around the world in record time - twice - and was the first pilot to fly solo around the world. He was instrumental in the development of pressure suits and is often credited as one of the original discoverers of the jet stream, a discovery he described encountering during his solo flight around the world. Thanks to his record setting flights, Post received parades and receptions on par with Charles Lindbergh, arguably the most famous pilot of that generation. After his world flights, Post and his navigator Harold Gatty published an account about their journey titled, "Around the World in Eight Days." The book included an introduction by Will Rogers, who Post had met when flying Rogers to one of his rodeo shows.

In 1935, Post began working on an air route from the West Coast to Russia. While working on custom fittings for the plane, Rogers asked Post to fly him through Alaska for new material for his newspaper column. So, the pair left in early August and made several stops in Alaska. Between Fairbanks and Point Barrow, the pair had difficulty with their position due to bad weather and had to land for directions. On takeoff, the engine failed while at low altitude, and they plunged into the lagoon and became inverted. The pair died instantly, and experts still debate whether the malfunction was related to misfit parts or another cause.

The pair received a multitude of honors and tributes from parts around the world. Post was enshrined in the National Aviation Hall of Fame and in the Oklahoma Hall of Fame. He received multiple awards, including the Distinguished Flying Cross, The International Harmon Trophy, and the Gold Medal of Belgium. A memorial of the two men was erected at the site of their crash and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Rogers received a statue, commissioned by the state of Oklahoma in the National Statuary Hall Collection. The collection is located in the United States Capitol and features people, nominated by states that had a historic impact on their state. Rogers' is one of the 2 statues Oklahoma has, and he is the only statue facing the Chamber entrance, potentially, because Rogers agreed to the sculpture if he could "keep an eye on Congress." Each U.S. president supposedly rubs the left shoe of his statue for good luck before their State of the Union address. Memorials for Rogers were set up in multiple states, and landmarks/buildings were named in his honor. Rogers received a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame
