SWOSU Receives \$450,000 Grant for High-Quality Afterschool and Summer Learning Programs Initiative

Southwestern Oklahoma State University has been the kids excited about building a awarded \$150,000 per year over three years from the Oklahoma State Department of Education (OSDE) under OSDE'S High-Quality Afterschool and Summer Learning Programs initiative for the LEG-UP Program.

LEG-UP is "Learning and Engagement for Growth: United Partners" and the goal of the program is to ensure that students and families are supported in out-of-school time learning with programming that is partnershipdriven, widely available, and student success-focused.

SWOSU LEG-UP project directors are Dr. Bo Pagliasotti and Marla Pankratz. This program will be a partnership with Weatherford Public Schools.

"This generous grant will enable the SWOSU Kinesiology Department to implement an incredible learning environment for a group of Weatherford elementary students," Pagliasotti said. "The afterschool portion of our program will concentrate on nutrition, physical education, and wellness. It will be based on components from the Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child (WSCC) Model developed by the Center for Disease Control Healthy Schools. Our goal is to combine learning and lots of movement to get

healthy, active life."

Pankratz said the grant is an opportunity for the SWOSU Department of Education to partner with Weatherford Public Schools to provide a multilayered approach to support the specific needs of Weatherford students through a summer program.

"The WSCC model is studentcentered and emphasizes the role of the community, the

connections between health and academic achievement, and the importance of evidence-based practices," Pankratz said. "The goal of the summer program is to support student growth in reading and math through evidence-based learning activities, enrichment activities, movement, and community building."

The afterschool team consists of Pagliasotti, Dr. Amber Sturgeon, Vanessa Nix and Wayne Anderson from the SWOSU Department of Kinesiology, and



the summer school team consists of faculty from the SWOSU Department of Education, including Pankratz, Dr. Amy Barnett, Robyn Randol and Dawn Keller.

SWOSU will also receive technical assistance and professional learning opportunities, data collection, and support for program evaluation.

Grants will be funded through June 30, 2024, and are a component of Ready Together Oklahoma: An Action Plan for Supporting Students Through the Pandemic and Beyond.

I have to admit that more often than not, I don't have a clue as to what I am to write about in the next Higher Ground article. This is one of those times. So I feel impressed to just share a little of a difficult spring break week and the way God blessed me this week. The previous week (spring

break for the youngin's.) was not one of the most joyful. At midnight on Sunday, I found myself calling 911. Mary, my wife, was experiencing heavy chest pains and I felt we needed help. After several hours and many tests in the ER it was determined that she should be taken to the Heart hospital in Oklahoma City. I felt I needed at least a couple of hours of sleep before driving to the City so I went home for a quick nap and prepare for at least an overnight stay in the hospital. The cardiologist decided to do an angiogram on

Tuesday, so Monday was a day of more tests and waiting. Already groggy from sleep deprivation, the narrow bed (bench) in the room didn't provide much comfort to catch up on that loss. But by this time Mary was feeling much better and the nurses were very kind. The angiogram did not show any major problems and with more pills and a future review and checkup planned, we were free to go home.

After a couple of nights of sleep I woke up early Friday morning with waves of nausea sweeping over me. I had succumbed to a stomach bug that made my day miserable. I missed church that Sunday but I recovered well enough to make to the county jail for the Sunday evening service. That is where the blessing came in.

We have been going through the DVD series that accompanies Rick Warren's book, Purpose Driven Life. That evening Rick shared the concept that we were shaped to serve. One of the groups is made up of Northern Cheyenne Native Americans, mostly from Montana. I shared a handout that I had found on the internet that described a ministry of service by a Native American Pastor and ministry leader in the region where some of the men had lived. In fact, one of the men had met the minister. In was an opportunity to challenge them to go back to the reservation and become a servant, providing a

platform from which to share the love of Jesus. One man proudly shared that he had fully read the book, PDL. I asked if there was one thing that stood out for him. He replied, "The Great Commission." Another inmate showed me his notebook. I had challenged them that as they read to pick out key verses, and write out a prayer relating to that verse. His notebook revealed page after page of verses and prayers he had written as he read through N.T. books. Another young man held up a book he had read. He said it was the first book he had ever read from start to finish. I almost forgot to share that on Saturday I was able to help two 20 year old women with their utility bills. (This from the Ministerial Alliance) One was a single mom with three children and another living as a caregiver for her 15 year old brother. They both indicated that they needed and wanted to get started back in church. I was able to share this with some friends who planned to make a follow up visit. So I was blessed and all the glory goes to God who

Makyra Tramble has been named a Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) All-American, announced on Wednesday afternoon by the organization. It is now the second media outlet to recognize Tramble as an All-American this season.

Tramble (Shawnee, Okla.) adds the latest accolade to a long list of 2022 accomplishments that include being named both the D2CCA's National and Central Region Player of the Year as well as the GAC's Player of the Year. She was a Third Team D2CCA All-American selection last season and is now a WBCA Honorable Mention All-American this season.

This is now the third SWOSU player in program history to be named a WBCAAll-American. Hailey Tucker (first team) and Hayden Priddy (honorable mention) each earned the honor following the 2018-19 season.

Tramble was the only women's player in NCAA Division II this year to average 20.0 points, 5.0 rebounds, and 5.0 assists. She is also just one of three players across all three divisions (I, II, III) to do so.

Around the NCAA, Tramble ranked top-25 nationally in minutes played (1st), field goals made (2nd), field goals attempted (3rd), steals (3rd) assists (5th), assists/game (14th) and points per game (17th) when her season ended.
