Need an Appraisal?

By definition, an Appraisal is an opinion of value. Opinions can vary and it has often been said that no two appraisers will agree. While this can be true, by following accepted procedures, called methodology, these differences between appraiser's opinions can be minimized. The needs for an appraisal can be varied and many.

I. The most common appraisal need is for the purpose of borrowing money to purchase a home or any other piece of property. It may be for a business. Most lenders require an appraisal of the property being purchased or used as collateral to secure the loan. In some cases, by Federal Regulations, this appraisal must be performed by a State Certified Licensed Appraiser. In other cases, usually depending on the amount of value, a license is not required. In most cases, the lender must be the one to order the appraisal.

2. Another reason for needing an appraisal, could be pricing your property for sale, Many times, if you are listing the property with a Realtor, they will provide what is called a market analysis, which can be a form of an appraisal. Keep in mind, not all real estate personnel are qualified to appraise real estate. Their training is mostly dedicated toward the ethical handling of sales.

 Other appraisal uses include; legal disputes, such as a divorce or a land division, such as a partition suit. The settlement and basis computation for an estate may require an appraisal. Most of these types of appraisals do not require a licensed individual.

The cost of an appraisal will vary with its use, size and time to secure the needed data. You can always ask for an estimate of cost before engaging an appraiser. Remember, experience in appraisals can be critical to good methodology.

Whatever you do: PUT ALL REAL ESTATE CONTRACTS IN WRITING. Verbal Real Estate Contracts are not admissible in a court of law.

SWOSU Football was within one touchdown at halftime against Henderson State and had the game within three points midway through the third quarter following a Bulldog field goal, but ran out of juice as the Reddies scored 14 unanswered points to close out the game.

Henderson State entered Thursday's matchup receiving votes in the AFCA preseason poll. The Bulldogs went toe to toe with them for three quarters, before HSU finally took control of the game for good.

Special Teams kept the Dawgs in the game in the first half while the offense settled in. Trailing 6-0 after Henderson State missed an extra point on their first score, Jalen Lampley took a punt return 65 yards to the house to give SWOSU a 7-6 lead with 8:48 remaining in the first quarter.

Henderson State slowly added another field goal in the first quarter and another touchdown early in the second quarter and extended the lead back out to two scores.

With the first half winding down and trailing 16-7, SWOSU orchestrated an 11-play drive that spanned nearly the entire length of the field. The Dawgs were knocking at the door in the redzone and threatening for more than just a field goal but were unable to cross the goal line and settled for three points instead off the foot the score.

At halftime, SWOSU trailed 16-10.

After a defensive stop out of the locker room, the offense clicked with a productive drive but had nothing to show for it following a turnover on downs on the Reddie 26-yard line.

Zack Roberts kept the momentum on the Bulldog's side right afterwards when he intercepted an overthrown ball that had SWOSU right back in business. It was the second turnover the defense came up with on the night, with Logan Engle also recovering a fumble previously the first quarter.

They couldn't cash a touchdown in but managed another field goal to chip away at the margin further now trailing 16-13.

The Reddies scored touchdowns on their next two possessions and pushed the lead out to 30-13 early in

on a 53-yard third-down pass to Lampley that jumpstarted the fourth quarter where it remained the rest of the way.

Henderson State finished with 444 yards of total offense, but that did not quite tell the story of SWOSU's defense. The Bulldogs won the turnover battle 2-0 and came away with three sacks on the night and five tackles for loss. With the offense sputtering at times, the defense kept the Dawgs in the game with timely stops. Mason Daugherty led the way with a team best seven tackles.

SWOSU totaled 288 total yards in the game: 222 yards through the air and 66 on the ground.

Morton finished 18-for-39 passing and rushed for eight yards if you account for the sacks that affected his final yardage. He had the longest run of the night for 17 yards.

Running backs Dexter Brown and Carlin Fils-Aime toted the rock 26 times combined for just 57 yards combined.

Deshon Moreaux led all receivers with six catches for 44 yards.

We all struggle with the pull of the world. David prayed in Psalm 86:11 "Teach me your way, O Lord, and I will walk in your truth; give me an undivided heart that I may fear your name." It is easy, in this pleasure mad world to let the things that pull our emotions hold us captive over the things that are eternal. A personal example: This evening the OSU Cowboys begin their season. It is televised. At that same hour, the Red Sox and Rangers are on another channel. It is the third option

The Apostle Paul, writing from a prison cell in Rome shares how his prison time is really serving to "advance the Gospel." The advancing of the gospel was his primary concern. None of us has the gifts or direct call that Paul had from God. But we, as believers are called to advance the gospel. It will take different forms for each of us. But as Bonhoffer said, when God calls a man "he bids him come and die." Death to self is one of our daily struggles as we plod life's journey. It is a life-long battle but victories in every area will give strength for the next battle and bring the joy of obedience.
