City of Clinton considered for arts grant

Scissortail Productions Inc. (SPI) was formed in 2010 as a non-profit to give Oklahoma professional and emerging professional artists a place to perform. We have 3 performing series that include the Scissortail classical music series, The Rose Rock series of American Music, and the Firewheel Readers Theater for children. As a rule, we only hire Oklahoma or Oklahoma connected artists.

Recently, we received the notice that SPI in partnership with the city of Clinton are 1 of 36 partnerships across the United States to advance to the next round of consideration for the Levitt Foundation LevittAMP grants. These grants will provide free outdoor concerts that are family friendly in an outdoor venue. To receive this grant, we must receive significant public support by voting for this project. The Levitt Foundation will choose 10 of the 20 finalists. If we receive the grant, then the city of Clinton with SPI will be the first partnership within the State of Oklahoma to have this national opportunity.

This is good for Oklahoma because we plan to hire as many Oklahomans as possible (within the requirements of the LevittAMP grant) and will publicize it across the state. This is good for Clinton, Weatherford, Elk City, and other communities as they are seeking ways to revitalize and engage tourism within this part of our state. Additionally, part of the grant will allow SPI and the professional artists to work with students in the local school districts. And lastly, it is good for Oklahoma artists to have exposure within the state and to the Levitt Foundation. The Oklahoma Arts Council will be aiding us in marketing as well. Federal grant awards SWODA 1.5 million dollars to develop regional long-range transportation plan for 16 counties



The South Western Oklahoma Development Authority (SWODA) located in Burns Flat will receive 1.5 million dollars through one of six RAISE grants awarded in Oklahoma. RAISE stands for Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) program.

SWODA will be developing a regional long-range transportation plan for counties that encompass the Southwest Oklahoma Regional Transportation Planning organization (SORTPO) region. The region includes the following 16 counties: Beckham, Caddo, Comanche, Cotton, Custer, Grady, Greer, Harmon, Jackson, Jefferson, Kiowa, McClain, Roger Mills, Stephens, Tillman, and Washita.

This grant program is to help urban and rural communities move forward on projects that modernize roads, bridges, transit, rail, ports, and intermodal transportation and make our transportation systems safer, more accessible, more affordable, and more sustainable.

According to U.S. Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg more than \$2.2 billion RAISE program has been awarded for 2022. You can see all the grant awardees at transportation.gov/RAISEgrants.

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Need an Appraisal?

By definition, an Appraisal is an opinion of value. Opinions can vary and it has often been said that no two appraisers will agree. While this can be true, by following accepted procedures, called methodology, these differences between appraiser's opinions can be minimized. The needs for an appraisal can be varied and many.

I. The most common appraisal need is for the purpose of borrowing money to purchase a home or any other piece of property. It may be for a business. Most lenders require an appraisal of the property being purchased or used as collateral to secure the loan. In some cases, by Federal Regulations, this appraisal must be performed by a State Certified Licensed Appraiser. In other cases, usually depending on the amount of value, a license is not required. In most cases, the lender must be the one to order the appraisal.

2. Another reason for needing an appraisal, could be pricing your property for sale, Many times, if you are listing the property with a Realtor, they will provide what is called a market analysis, which can be a form of an appraisal. Keep in mind, not all real estate personnel are qualified to appraise real estate. Their training is mostly dedicated toward the ethical handling of sales.
3. Other appraisal uses include; legal disputes, such as a divorce or a land division, such as a partition suit. The settlement and basis computation for an estate may require an appraisal. Most of these types of appraisals do not require a licensed individual.
The cost of an appraisal will vary with its use, size and time to secure the needed data. You can always ask for an estimate of cost before engaging an appraiser. Remember, experience in appraisals can be critical to good methodology.

SWOSU soccer faced Oklahoma Christian today at the SWOSU Athletic Complex, where the game ended in neither a win or loss for the Dawgs, but a tie.

These two teams were locked in defensively for the entire 90 minutes it seemed like. SWOSU had a bend but don't break defensive mentality on the field today. OCU found its way into SWOSU's box numerous times, yet could not capitalize on those opportunities. The Dawgs also benefited from a few shots that would hit off of the crossbar of the goal.

SWOSU only got five shots up and only three of those on goal. OCU shot at a fast pace, with 17 shots for the game, but were not very accurate with these. Their shots on goal count was five for the contest.

SWOSU's goal came from Launa Torrez in the 19th minute of the game. Torrez has a hot start to her season, making it three straight games where she has scored a goal.

The Dawgs move to 0-3-2 on the season. Their next time on the pitch will be on Friday, September 16 at the Athletic Complex against rival Northwestern Oklahoma State.

Presented by: Pioneer Football Firsts: SWOSU Wins First Game of Season, Kirkland First as Coach

SWOSU Football led by one point at halftime, scored the final 10 points of the game in the fourth quarter, and surrendered just one score in the second half on defense that culminated in a 24-20 victory over Southern Arkansas on Saturday in the Flex-Chem Football Classic.

The win signifies a few things. It marks head coach Josh Kirkland's first win as a Bulldog and erases a unique streak of winless days for the program following an 0-11 campaign in 2021 and the cancellation of the 2020 season due to COVID-19.

SWOSU Football's last win came back on November 2, 2019. Until tonight.

The Bulldogs once again played bend-but-don't-break defense, but paired defense with timely offensive scores and a strong air attack from quarterback Tylan Morton to get the job done.

Morton finished 26-for-39 through the air for 281 yards and three touchdowns. He also led the team in rushing.

Following last week's game where SWOSU did not score an offensive touchdown, the scoring lid was finally taken off tonight with a 29-yard touchdown pass to Deshon Moreaux on the first drive of the game. The touchdown came following back-to-back stops by the defense after a muffed punt by the Dawgs forced them to play an additional series to start the game.

SAU scored the next 13 points - with two field goals and a touchdown. Trailing 13-7 and with one possession left before halftime, SWOSU went 80 yards on nine plays to regain the lead with just seconds on the clock. A oneyard touchdown pass to Jacob Karsak put the Bulldogs on top and with all of the momentum headed into the locker room.

The Muleriders managed to regain the lead on their first possession of the third quarter with a seven-play drive that made the score 20-14 with 10:53 on the clock. They would be held scoreless the final 25-plus minutes of action. Meanwhile, the Dawgs continued to stay in it. Israel



Watson put SWOSU ahead by one point almost exactly one quarter later with a 21-yard touchdown reception.

Watson was the go-to man for Morton on Saturday. He finished with a team high 10 catches for 93 yards and that score.

On the following possession, Jaren Van Winkle added insurance when he knocked home a 28-yard field goal. Though that was big for the Dawgs, it would not be Van Winkle's biggest contribution.

With around a minute and a half left to play, with a 24-20 lead, SWOSU was going to be giving the ball back to the Muleriders for what was going to be the final drive of the game. Van Winkle setup to punt and delivered a 79-yard bomb of a boot that was downed at the SAU one yard line. It all but sealed the deal for the Bulldogs.

in its NCAA Division II era, surpassing a 1998 record of 77 yards.

The Muleriders attempted to drive the length of the field, but only made it 28 yards in nine plays as the defense held firm and the clock hit zeros.

Final offensive numbers showed SAU with 402 total yards of offense compared to 368 yards from SWOSU.

On defense, a pair of players finished with 14 tackles apiece in Keldric Martin and Christian Toeleiu. Interceptions came from Treymon Fullwood in the endzone that deterred a threatening SAU team in the first half and Derrius Franklin who sealed it with his pick on the final play of the game.

SWOSU (1-1) will hope to keep playing well at home next weekend when they host Southeastern. Kickoff for The 79-yard punt also marks SWOSU's longest punt that game is set for 6pm.
