announce a transfer of ownership from Harold Wright to his son Heston Wright. With the transfer, Heston will become a 5th generation Wright businessman in Weatherford. Heston shares his father's passion for service and radio stating, "I'm excited to be able to continue the Wright family business. To continue the tradition my dad, Harold, started in 1991 and to blend my goals with his goals as we continue to grow as a company".

Before the Wright Broadcasting Systems family truly began, Harold worked as a Disc Jockey at the Weatherford station, established in 1970 by Dick Johnson and Paul Buenning. During his time there, he saw firsthand the impact news and coverage could have on the lives of listeners, and purchasing the station became his dream. So, when his friend and mentor Dick Johnson called him in 1991 with an opportunity to buy the station, Harold seized the moment and accepted. Harold explains, "Our family has a strong heritage here, in Weatherford, to begin with, and we wanted the opportunity to give back".

Shortly after purchasing the station, Harold was able to grow the Wright Wradio family with the addition of several other radio stations in Clinton, Cordell, and Elk City. Before long, they began to offer live video coverage of area sports and special events and news distributions through the weekly newspaper, The WestOK Weekly. Today, Wright Media covers all of western Oklahoma, from the Texas panhandle to El Reno and from Snyder to Seiling. With over 100,000 people living in their immediate service area, Harold and Heston are completely committed to their mission: "To serve our communities with live, local information and entertainment while creating a valuable advertising medium". But they couldn't do it alone. When the station was purchased in 1991, there were 8 full-time employees. Now, there are 21 full-time employees and 17 working part-time. Everyone at WBS lives and breathes broadcasting, and with some of the most talented people in the industry, the Wright Media family has won more awards than any other radio in the small market. In 2008, the Oklahoma Association of Broadcasters named KWEY as Station of the Year. In 2012, they were named as the Non-Metro Station of the Year. 3 of their members have been inducted into the Oklahoma Broadcaster Hall of Fame - Dick Johnson, Chuck Edwards, and Harold Wright (the only radio station to have 3 inductees). Harold and Heston have both been president of the Oklahoma Broadcaster Association and they were the only Father & Son duo to do so. Some other Wright Wradio notable members are Todd Brunner, Mike Smith, Ray Bagby, and Vanessa Valli. These are just a few of the special people who make Wright Media the

best it can be.

Moving forward, Heston plans to take WBS to the next level while staying true to its founding principles stating, "we want Wright Broadcasting to be around for another 50 years; a company that I can pass on to my children one day". And there's no one better to take the helm than Heston. When his father purchased the station, Heston worked as a DJ and a board operator before moving into sales as an account executive. There, he learned the inner workings of the business and what it takes to drive success. He worked his way up to sales manager, then to General Manager, and to part owner – taking on more responsibilities when Harold was elected to legislature in 2010. Heston lives and breathes broadcasting and is proud to continue to build on the foundations set before him.

The future is bright for WBS as Heston officially takes ownership. And if you've been listening to 95.5 The Coyote at night, you may have already caught a glimpse of the next generation of Wright business owners as his daughter, Abby, is already exploring the intricacies of broadcasting as a DJ. "She's been on for a few months now and has really been enjoying it", Heston explains proudly. Ida Slagell

Ida Fern Hartzler was born Nov 5, 1921, at the home of Joseph Garfield Hartzler and Martha Heatwole Hartzler of rural Windom, Kansas, to a family of two older brothers and two older sisters and later a younger sister Leona. Ida



passed away Sunday, November 6, 2022, in Hydro.

In her preschool years, her father ran a steamengine powered thrashing machine with a crew for which Ida did laundry. She also helped make 3 meals a day and a morning and afternoon snack, all prepared without electricity or running water.

She accepted Christ around the age of 9 years and was baptized and joined the West Liberty Mennonite Church. That same year her father was called into the ministry and became the pastor of the same church.

Ida began first grade at the age of 8 in a country school, located 1 and 3/4 miles from home, which required walking or riding a horse to school. Ida graduated from the 8th grade at the age of 16 years. Due to caring for her mother, Ida was unable to start high school until she was 19; therefore, graduating at the age of 22. After graduation, she worked at St Luke's Children Hospital in Kansas City. She later went to work at the Oxley cookie and cracker factory, and then as a domestic housekeeper in Wichita, Kansas.

Walter and Ida were married May 2, 1948, in the West Liberty Mennonite Church in Inman, Kansas. Their first home was a 7 x 16 ft travel trailer purchased to take a crew of Walter's two brothers and three of Walter's cousins along with harvest equipment, starting in Hydro and ending in Montana. Ida fixed 3 meals a day for the crew of 6 without electricity while keeping all the laundry done. In 1950, they purchased 80 acres in rural Hydro that included an old house that became their home, raising their family on this farm where she lived until her death.

In 1951, Ida's mother became terminally ill and moved in with Ida to be cared for until her death, later that year. Joseph, or "Grandpa Hartzler" as he liked to be called, remarried several years later. In 1963, Walter and Ida's brother Willard built a house for Grandpa Hartzler and his second wife, Laura (Lane) Hartzler. Ida helped care for Laura until her death in 1965. Her father continued to live in the house until 1978 when he passed away.

Ida enjoyed having chickens, ducks, peacocks, and a big garden, all the while taking meals to the field. Entertaining guests for meals was normal even without much prior notice. She also helped her father-in-law in the peach orchid, selling peaches to area customers, and was a regular janitor at the Pleasant View Mennonite Church to supplement their income. In Weatherford, Ida served on various committees at her church, volunteered at the Etc. Shop, and was active in the Bible Memory Program. She enjoyed traveling with Walter and visiting her brothers and sisters in Canada and Oregon. Ida was proceeded in death by her parents and stepmother, two brothers: Willard and Clifford Hartzler; three sisters: Mildred Myers, Ethel Lind, and Leona Sayer; and two stepbrothers: Paul Robert Lane JR and John Lane. 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National Family Caregivers Month (SWODA)

Many caregivers struggle to provide care for their

loved ones on their own. The South Western Oklahoma Development Authority (SWODA) Area Agency on Aging (AAA) believes it's important caregivers know they are not alone in their struggle to help their loved ones.

SWODA/AAA provides for respite services for eligible caregivers in partnership with the Department of Human Services, Aging Services Division.

Studies have shown caregivers will give better care, maintain their own health, and have reduced levels of stress if they can get away from the responsibilities of providing care even if it's for only a few hours. Respite does just that. It provides a way for a caregiver to get out of the everyday routine of caring for their loved one.



For example, a caregiver has the option of using respite services to go to a doctor's appointment, to get their hair done, to visit friends at a coffee shop, or even go to a movie.

Caregivers are defined as "people of any age caring for someone 60 years of age or older with two Activities of Daily Living Impairments (dressing, bathing, eating, transferring, toileting, or walking) and/or requiring substantial assistance because of a cognitive or other mental impairment."

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HIGHER GROUND

Fearfully and Wonderfully Made



"You created my inmost being, you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made." Psalm 139:13-14. This well known quote from David expresses in human terms the amazing formation of the human body from a single egg; fertilized

by a tiny sperm cell, much smaller than the egg that it races to invade, sets in motion the human cell that results in conception.

Dr Paul Brand and Phillip Yancey co-authored a book about the human body, using David's word's as the title, Fearfully and Wonderfully Made. I had read the book many years ago, but the recent birth of our second great-granddaughter, triggered my memory. So off the shelf it came to reacquaint myself with the amazing mystery of human reproduction; and a mystery it is.

It was Augustine who said, "Men go abroad to wonder at the height of mountains, at the huge waters of the sea, at the long courses of the rivers, at the vast compass of the oceans, at the circular motion of the stars, and they pass by themselves without wondering."

To put that in today's words we might say, "we marvel at the Grand Canyon, stand amazed at the giant Sequoia trees, and gasp at the achievements of modern technology; yet reckon that the human body came together by random chance.

Dr. Brand marveled when he first saw a single cell, an amoeba, through a telescope. The amoeba is one cell. Yet as Brand observed, "inside my human eye, peering at him are 107,000.000 cells. Seven million are cones each loaded to fire off a message to the brain when a few photons of light cross them. Cones give me the full band of color awareness, and because of them I can easily distinguish a thousand shades of color. The other hundred million cells are rods, backup cells for use in low light." Dr. Brand goes on, "The human brain receives millions of simultaneous reports from eye cells...the brain then absorbs a composite set of yes or no messages from the rods and cones. It sorts and organizes them all and gives me an image."

Dr. Brand goes on the describe the intricate

cooperation between all the body parts, the enzymes, hormones, etc to produce and give shape and reality to what we call life. Rick Warren has said, "Man was made by God and for God--and until you understand that life will never make sense."Jesus said in John 10:10, "The thief (the devil) comes to steal, rob, and destroy, but I am come that you may have life and life more abundantly." Can you imagine a life without any presence of God or His common grace bestowed on us? At its most basic form, hell is separation from anything that speaks of God-no beauty, no joy, no restrains of evil, surrounded only by the forces of darkness alone.

Over 2000 years ago God put forth a plan wrought from the foundation of the earth, the truth that Man needed a Savior; someone who could take on flesh, living in human form as one who could in His perfect being absorb all the sins of man, thus becoming the perfect sacrifice that the Old Testament sacrificial system could never do. In a few weeks we will celebrate the coming into the world of that Sacrificial Lamb. The First Time America Appeared on a Coin





A copper struck at the Mint in Paris, France, in 1670 shows the first time "America" appeared on a coin. It is known as a French Colonies Double. It was among the first coins to circulate in the New World.

Its provenance, the history of ownership of a valued object or work of art or literature (from Getty News),

was published in the American Journal of Numismatics in 1870. It is certified by the Professional Coin Grading Service (PCGS) as a Very Fine 35. It sold at auction for \$504,000.

ELK CITY / SPIEKER MAYOR - The new Mayor for the City of Elk City, Cory Spieker, was sworn in at the most recent city commission meeting. Spieker succeeds former mayor Nick Archer who will represent District 55 in the Oklahoma Legislature. Spieker joined the city commission, representing Ward 1, in 2019. The commission is expected to appoint someone to fill the now-vacant Ward 1 commission seat at the next meeting later this month.

WEATHERFORD / SALES TAX - The city of Weatherford snapped a 22-month string of increased sales tax, with the latest numbers showing a less than 1% decline collecting \$1.014 million. The City of Clinton was up 4.6% at just under \$512,000. Elk City was up 2.9% at more than \$1.1 million. Meanwhile, the city of Cordell was up 8.6% at just over \$102,000.

THOMAS / FOOD DRIVE - The Thomas Area Chamber of commerce recently held their thanks for giving food drive for Connections Food and Resource Center. The Thomas community collected just over 2000 pounds of food during the food drive.

WEATHERFORD / **ROADS** - Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown provides updates on two upcoming road projects. Brown said construction on the Lyle Road project is expected to begin December 1st. He says the airport road bridge widening project is expected to begin in early 2023. **ODOT** / **WRONG WAY DETECTION** - The Oklahoma Transportation Commission approved a contract to install wrong way detection systems at 10 key interchanges along interstate 40 between the Texas state line and Oklahoma City. A total of 49 interchanges will receive additional safety upgrades along the western I-40 corridor. Division 5 engineer Brent Almquist said it is a \$4.1 million project.

ELECTION RESULTS - It was a big night for Republican candidates in Oklahoma. Governor Kevin Stitt won re-election, Ryan Walters won the seat for State Superintendent of Public Instruction. Term limited State Representative Todd Russ of Cordell won the race for state treasurer. Frank Lucas has won another term in the U.S. House. In Cordell, voters rejected three propositions where the city clerk, treasurer and marshal would be appointed by the mayor at the approval of city council. Each of those proposals had more than 65% opposition.

DEWEY CO DIST COURT / SECHRIST - An Apache man is due back in Dewey County District Court for a status hearing after the first of the year in an effort to resolve a capital case without going to trial. Thirty-five year old Tye Sechrist is charged with two counts of first degree murder in connection with the shooting deaths of a Leedey EMT and her sister-in-law. Sechrist appeared in court for a status update on will return to court on January 9th.

The win snaps a five-game losing streak the Dawgs

brought into the contest. Three of those losses were within a single possession. It was time to get on the other side of that.

Saturday's 41-28 final score wasn't as close if the Bulldogs managed to eliminate a pair of special teams breakdowns and a costly fumble. Northwestern took a pair of kickoffs for scores in the first half and fell on a fumbled ball at the 1-yard line for a defensive score. Outside of those, they managed just two offensive touchdowns, one in each half, on the night.

The lack of Ranger scoring was courtesy of the Dawg defense. They forced three turnovers in the game. Richard Silva came away with his first interception of the year,



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a red zone interception in the first quarter, to halt a Northwestern drive. Ashton Hamby added to that in the third quarter with an INT of his own, and then sealed the game with a fumble recovery on Northwestern's final drive.

SWOSU won the turnover battle 3-1 and added another turnover on downs in the red zone.

They also got a special teams score for the second week in a row. Logan Engle blocked a punt in the first quarter, and it bounced straight into Elijah Reed's hands for the 30-yard scoop n' score.

Meanwhile, the Bulldogs clicked on offense out of the gate and tallied 34 of their 41 points in the first half. They led 34-21 at the break. Out of the halftime locker room both sides scored just one touchdown each in the fourth quarter after a scoreless third. SWOSU outgained the Rangers 386-320 (yards) on the night.

Dexter Brown got work all game. He had 27 touches at running back for 71 yards and three scores.

Isreal Watson, playing his last game, caught six balls for 124 yards and a score. His touchdown came in the second quarter on a 61-yard catch. Tylan Morton extended the play and found him open waiting by the sideline 30 yards downfield. A Ranger defender overran the thrown ball and Watson had only green turf in front of him from there.

Jacob Karsak caught the other Morton touchdown pass in the contest, a 25-yard pitch and catch that came in the second quarter.

Senior Tylan Morton finished 19-26 for 264 yards and two passing touchdowns.

The Bulldogs finish the season 4-7. It's the most wins the program has seen since 2016.
