SWOSU Men's Hoops picked up a solid 75-70 road victory over Henderson State on Saturday to conclude

their Arkansas road trip. The Bulldogs led nearly the entire game, besting the Reddies on the scoreboard for nearly 37 of the game's 40 minutes. SWOSU did not trail in the game's final 20 minutes and led by as many as 16 points nearing the midway mark of the second half.

Henderson State made a late push to make things interesting when they turned a 14-point SWOSU lead into just three over the course of the final three minutes

of the game. The Dawgs knocked down just enough free throws down the stretch to ward off the Reddies and got back in the win column in the process.

Ben Smith continued his role as the top scoring threat in conference games. He finished with a team best 16 points which included a 4-for-8 day from beyond the three-point line. Entering Saturday, he had made just eight three pointers all season.

Smith led the way, but the offense got contributions from nearly everyone. Five Bulldogs scored between 8-9 points, including Mason Hart whose nine points are a season high for him. DeAngelo Adkins also turned

They only shot 59% at the free throw line. Henderson State dominated the glass, ending the game with a 47-28 advantage on the boards. Morgan Smith had a team high 16 points. Shamica Smith added 11 points and five rebounds. Layni Zinn also scored 11 points and grabbed seven rebounds.

This loss makes SWOSU 3-10 on the season and 3-5 in GAC play. Their next time on the court will be Thursday when league leading Oklahoma Baptist hosts the Lady Dawgs.

He took great interest in building his coin collection and learning as much as he could.

He assembled many type-sets of gold coins (a type-set collector chooses

to buy all the mintmarks and dates of a certain series of coins).

He collected sets of the 1915-\$50 gold Panama Pacific coins minted to celebrate the 1914 completion of the Panama Canal. One was round the other an octagonal (8 sided). The San Francisco mint produced 25,000 pieces. Just 483 of the round design and 645 of the octagonal sold. Each type sold for \$100 each. The remaining mintage was melted.

Each \$50 gold coin routinely sells for \$200,000+ at auction.

Et Cetera Shop Pauses Donations Until February

The Et Cetera Shop, located at 121 N. State Street in Weatherford, has paused all community donations until February 1st in order to process what can best be described as an avalanche of generosity.

The thrift store, which usually accepts clothing and other miscellaneous donations Monday through Saturday, has run out of storage space, including two mobile storage containers and their back room, where staff members process all donations.

"We're blown away by the generosity of the community and surrounding communities," said Krisha Shantz, manager at The Et Cetera Shop, "but we physically don't have the space."

Winter weather during December and January usually slows the pace of donations, but that has not been the case this year. This pause in contributions will give the store's staff ample time to sort out "the organized chaos" the massive amount of donations has created.

"We never thought we'd see this day," said Shantz, who noted that the only time they have paused donations before now was during the COVID-19 pandemic. "It's not that we don't want stuff. We would just like you to hold your donations for two weeks and come see us on February 1st."

While donations have been paused until February, the store will remain open for shoppers. "We'll still be processing donations and putting out new stuff every night for shoppers," said Shantz.

Et Cetera on Main, located at 121 E. Main Street in Weatherford, which sells furniture, bedding, baby items, books, movies, and holiday items, will continue accepting donations, but they can't take any items that the State Street store accepts.

Donations from the Et Cetera Shop help support several other community organizations around Western Oklahoma, such as Food For Kids, The Agape Clinic, Step Up, and CASA, as well as local schools.

Construction begins February 6th and will take 90 days (about three months) to build. The \$1.4 million structure will be just over 3700 square feet and have an occupancy of 89 people.

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HIGHER GROUND The Joy of Learning



It is probably true that no football player ever had more people praying for him this last week than Damar Hamlin. After his collapse on the playing field the news quickly spread as the two teams gathered together to pray for this young man. Even the ESPN football analyst, Dan Orlovsky, verbalized a heartfelt prayer that was heard by millions

across the land. Orlovsky, who wears a bracelet with Proverbs 3:5, 6 printed on it, was obviously at home with prayer. He is a bold Christian who tries to live out his faith on his job as well in his family life.

Another bold statement of faith was expressed by Stetson Bennet IV, quarterback of the Georgia Bulldogs as they repeated as National Champions. The family legacy of faith was passed down by the Stetson Bennett Sr., the great-grandfather of the Georgia quarterback who was a farmer and part time bootlegger of moonshine before he was converted. He later became a preacher, riding his mule to preaching assignments.

When Stetson 1V was preparing for his first career start, his dad was asked if he was nervous, he replied with Ephesians 2: 4, 5. Because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, made us alive with Christ when we were dead in our transgressions, it is by grace that we have been saved."

In spite of, and in the midst of academic liberalism on the elite, Ivy League schools there has emerged a new movement which is making an effort to bring Spiritual Revival across our land. Since 2002, Christian Union has worked to bring spiritual change in America. That was 40 years ago. That was before the internet. What would the study show today? Parents need to lead the way with their children. Parents need to read to and with their children. Pastors need to challenge their congregation, not only to read the Bible but also the works of men and women who have walked with God and gained insights from their victories and defeats. Charles Spurgeon once said, "It is strange that we think so highly of what God says to us through the Bible but so little of what He says to others in their reading of His Word." One of the most serious readers in our church is a lady who has 7 children under the age of 10, homeschooling those of school age. Don't tell me you don't have time to spend 15 minutes a day in reading.

We like to be spoon-fed because it doesn't cost us any effort, it's convenient and free. Proverbs 18:15 says "The heart of the discerning acquires knowledge; the ears of the wise seek it out." Dr. Donald Whitney in his book, Spiritual Disciplines for the Christian Life, said "To follow Christ and to become more like Him, we must engage in the spiritual discipline of learning."
