



In 2006, he met Alta McGinnis, and they soon became companions and lived together for 16 happy years.


Roy enjoyed riding four wheelers and riding on the river: he liked working on cars, watching television and playing video games.

HIGHER GROUND

Prayers that Prevail

Paul's letter to the Ephesians contains two prayers: 1:15-20 and 3:14-19. If you want to sense the heart of Paul for those churches you would do well to meditate on those prayers—perhaps even memorizing them. He prays in their behalf that their knowledge of God would grow through wisdom and the revelation that comes through the Holy Spirit. He prays that the eyes of their heart will be enlightened to know the hope we have in Christ, how rich we are in the inheritance he has stored up for us, and the power we possess, which he describes as the same power that raised Christ from the dead.

Compare those requests with our prayers. I'm

afraid my prayers are often more self seeking; more often concerned with my well-being, or for physical things that concern comfort or convenience.

In his second prayer, found in 3:14 ff, he prays that they would be strengthened with power through the Holy Spirit in their inner being. We often think of power in a negative context; power to rule with an iron hand or power to destroy or coerce. But in no way should the Christian life be seen as a wimpy, weak, ineffective lifestyle. The early apostles were powerful enough to change the world. Their power had its source in their obedient submission to the Holy Spirit which Jesus promised would be unleashed on the Day of Pentecost. Their passion was not for comfort or convenience, it was for the advancement of the kingdom and of bringing men and women to repentance and deliverance from sins captivity.

In Paul's second prayer he also asked that they would be established in love, therefore, being able to grasp the depth of Christ' love for them. In fact, Paul says that having come to an understanding of the depth of God's love for us, (though he adds that we can never plumb its depths) we can be "filled

to the measure of all the fullness of God." We can only try to grasp what that completely involves. We have seen at least something of that power demonstrated in the great men and women of the past and to some degree in present godly men and women.

So my challenge for you and myself is to meditate on these prayers and others found in Colossians and Philippians. Our prayers will become more Biblical and powerful as we slow down and pray more thoughtfully. Some people pray so fast it is as if they have to get done with praying so as to get to what is more important. In this day of confusion and misguided information, we desperately need the wisdom that comes from above instead of the reasoning of secular, humanistic voices.

"God help us to be men and women, powerful in prayer, earnestly seeking to hear from You. Free us from being held captive to the mundane and fleshly concerns. Enlarge our hearts to seek you in the secret places of our hearts that we would be effective and powerful people of prayer. Amen.

"The Coin Guy"

Anything Man-Made is Less Than Perfect

On December 21, 2022, Heritage Auctions in Dallas, Texas conducted an online sale of U.S. error coins. There were 253 lots which brought \$840,591.

The above pictured coin is a 1923 Peace dollar which seemed to be a showstopper. It was struck twice while in the coin press with the second strike off-center.

When a silver dollar planchet enters the collar which holds the planchet in place so it can be struck by the hammer die and the anvil die simultaneously. Normally, once struck, feeders eject the struck coin out of the press into a chute which falls into a bin. Sometimes a malfunction occurs when the feeders are unable to eject the struck coin and it receives multiple strikes from both dies.

The above 1923 Peace dollar was certified by the Numismatic Guaranty Company (NGC) as a Mint State 64. It sold for \$18,000.

MUNICIPAL FILINGS - Candidates for municipal office in Arapaho, Butler, Custer City and Thomas can begin filing declarations of candidacy, beginning at 8 am on Feb. 6, at the Custer County election board office in Clinton. Municipal races for three board of trustee seats, town clerk and town treasurer are up for election in Arapaho. A board of trustee seat and town clerk-treasurer in Butler. Three board of trustee seats and town clerk-treasurer in Custer City and council seats 1 and 3 and Mayor in the city of Thomas. The three-day filing period will end Wednesday, Feb. 8 at 5pm.

WEATHERFORD / WHATABURGER - Officials with the city of Weatherford said a building permit has been issued for the construction of Whataburger on Eagle Road. Construction could begin as early as next month on the more than 3700 square foot structure that will cost \$1.4 million.

FED COURT / WILSON - A Clinton man has been sentenced to serve one year in federal prison for knowingly engaging in sexual contact without her permission while onboard a flight. Fifty-three-year-old Antonio Maurice Wilson plead guilty last October to a one count information for knowingly engaging in sexual contact with a 13-year-old person without her permission. Wilson will be on five years of supervised release once he is released from prison. He was also ordered to pay a special assessment of \$5100. Wilson will be required to register as a sex offender upon his release from prison.

WEATHERFORD / PRE-K - Weatherford public schools will move its pre-k program to the former West Elementary site, beginning with the 2023-24 school year. Superintendent Jill Henderson said the campus enrollment for the pre-k center will be approximately 140-180 students with approximately 30 staff members.

CLINTON / MISSING CHILD - Authorities in Clinton say a 2-year-old child that went missing was found safe. Authorities said Clinton Police and Fire Departments got assistance from a thermal drone from Elk City Fire & EMS and were able to locate the child by thermal imaging within an hour after receiving the call of the child missing. The child was transported to an emergency room by Sinorr EMS for evaluation and is expected to be okay.

WEATHERFORD FD / PERSONNEL - Weatherford fire Chief Mike Karlin said with an increase of calls for service each year, the department has additional personnel on duty. Karlin said he does think the city will have a second fire station in the future. However, it's unknown as to when that station would be established. He said much of that depends on response times to calls and budgeting for a new station.

CLINTON / HOSPITAL - Officials provided an update to the Clinton regional hospital governing board regarding a licensure update. It was reported that the building needs inspected to make sure it's up to code. But that may not occur for 30 to 45 days. It was said the ICU does not meet code, currently. The timeline to receive a new license could be an estimated 3 to 4 months. In the meantime, urgent care is expected to open 12 hours a day, 7 days a week and could be up and running within two weeks.

SWOSU / HODGE CENTER - SWOSU President Dr. Diana Lovell said the University continues to make progress on building the new Hodge Center for pharmacy & rural health on the Weatherford campus. Jerry and Margaret Hodge donated \$5 million in private support for the center. An additional \$7 million in support of the center is being provided by the YES Weatherford Economic Development sales tax extension approved by voters in 2020. The center also received \$10 million in American Rescue plan act funding authorized by the Oklahoma legislature.

CLINTON / LEVITT AMP - The executive director of Scissortail Productions was in Clinton last week to discuss the upcoming Levitt concert series this summer. Susan Adams-Johnson said the concert series will begin June 2nd-August 4th 2023.

WEATHERFORD / FLOWERS - A celebration was held at the Stafford Air & Space museum in Weatherford, surrounding the retirement of police chief Louis Flowers. Flowers served 30 years with the Weatherford police department, 9 as police chief.

Men's Hoops Handles Harding, Wins Third Straight

SWOSU Men's Basketball collected its third win of the week following a 96-87 victory over Harding. This marks their third consecutive win in the 2022-2023 GAC season, with this game representing the highest score the Bulldogs have achieved this season. Entering the week, the Bulldogs had yet to string together consecutive conference victories this season.

That changed quickly though, as SWOSU earned wins over Northwestern on Monday, Arkansas Tech on Thursday, and now Harding this afternoon to wrap up the busy week.

Ben Smith made it back-to-back games a Bulldog scored a career high in points. He poured in 28 this afternoon on an efficient 12-for-20 (60%) from the field, two days after Chris Braggs, Jr. had 30 against

Tech.

Braggs had himself another solid game against the Bisons. He added 21 points with 19 of those coming in the second half. He averaged 23.0 points this week – 10 points greater than his season average.

Kamden Gipson was right behind Braggs with 20 today. It's his fourth game this season getting to the 20-point mark, and the first time to do so in the new year.

SWOSU had control of the game for much of the duration. The Bulldogs opened up leads of 11 points in both halves, but credit to Harding for not going away.

The Bisons cut the first half deficit to four points by halftime, and were within five with under five to play in the game.

The Dawgs played too well on both sides of the floor to concede the lead though. 96 points represents the highest scoring total SWOSU has had while playing a conference opponent.

SWOSU shot nearly 45% from the field overall and nearly 50% in the second half. On defense, they forced Harding into 17 turnovers while committing just eight themselves.

At the foul line, after missing 19 free throws on Thursday, SWOSU finished a solid 24-for-31 (77%) to give them a boost.

The win moves SWOSU to 10-9 and 6-7 in the GAC heading into road games with Southern Arkansas and Arkansas-Monticello next week in the typical Thursday/Saturday slate.

SWOSU falls to 6-12 on the year and 6-7 in the GAC. They will hit the road next for another Arkansas road trip. On Thursday they will be at Southern Arkansas in Magnolia at 5:30 pm. Then, they will travel to

Monticello for a 1:00 pm game against Arkansas-Monticello.

Averi Zinn led the way with 14 points and five steals for SWOSU. Morgan Smith scored 11 points. Macy Gore had eight points, four rebounds, and three steals.

The Lady Bisons were the better team on both sides of the court today. SWOSU could not get anything consistent going offensively. They had as many made field goals in the first quarter as the Lady Bulldogs had

in the first three quarters.

In the second quarter, SWOSU was outscored 24-8, putting Harding up 25 points at halftime. The second half was more competitive, but Harding's early lead was insurmountable.
