


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Janelle Pennington





ELK CITY / STREET SCAPE - A street scape project in Downtown Elk City is scheduled to begin in late August says City Manager Tom Ivester. The construction will completely replace roads and sidewalks with concrete in Elk City. Affected roads will reach across the downtown retail area, reaching from 3rd Street to Main Street to 7th Street. The cost of the project is \$11.5 million with the city's portion only \$1.7 million.

CLINTON / ROUTE 66 PROJECT - Clinton City Council took no action last night on a presentation on a proposed Route 66 Centennial Grant Project, according to City Manager Robert Johnston. The proposed project would have included signage, preserved the original pavement of Route 66, and developed fixed assets that enhance the Exit 69 experience and stimulate local economic growth. "We have an opportunity to apply for this [after the] next round of funding on July 19," explained Johnston in a recent interview. "[This association]'s got a credible project that the city would be the most likely applicant for its funding."

OKLAHOMA CO / FATALITY - A Canute man was recently killed when he became pinned when a jack fell while he was changing a tire on his pickup truck along Interstate 40 near Choctaw in Oklahoma County. The Oklahoma Highway Patrol says 54-year-old Clayton Barton died at the scene from injuries sustained during the incident.

WEATHERFORD / FIRE - Fire crews from the surrounding area including Weatherford, Hydro, Thomas, and Custer City worked a large fire east of 2440 Road and 970, northeast of Weatherford. Fire Chief Mike Karlin says the fire was initially reported as a grass fire. However, the fire managed to spread to six acres before fire crews could arrive. This included three structures, 10-15 cars, 30-50 hay bales, and various trees caught in the carnage. A few firefighters and residents were treated on scene for minor heat exhaustion.

WEATHERFORD / ODOT COMMISSION -Daniel Nguyen, an official with the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT), made an announcement at the State Transportation Commission meeting that Brandon Dudgeon will serve as the Director of Project Management. Additionally, Jason Giebler will serve as Bridge Engineer says spokesperson

WEATHERFORD/AIRPORT ROAD - Weatherford Mayor Mike Brown says the Airport Road Bridge Construction is running behind schedule, estimating the project being finished in August. Businesses on Airport Road are seeing their driveways be reopened before construction moves on to the bridge. Additionally, Mayor Brown says Lyle Road has been open to traffic for about a month and crews there are in the finishing stages of the project.

Synonymous with the pioneering spirit of ballooning, played a crucial role in the history of aviation. His journey from a curious enthusiast to a record-breaking adventurer is remarkable and high soaring.

Max Leroy Anderson was born on September 10, 1934, in Sayre, Oklahoma. Growing up in a rural environment, he developed a fascination with flight from an early age. This passion was fueled by the stories of aviation pioneers like the Wright brothers and Charles Lindbergh. Anderson's family later moved to Albuquerque, New Mexico, where the expansive skies and the annual Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta would become integral to his life.

Before becoming a full-time balloonist and before the successful transatlantic flight of the Double Eagle II, Anderson, worked as an oil company executive that helped him fund his balloon ventures. His first significant attempt took place in 1977 with his friend Ben Abruzzo.

They set out to cross the Atlantic, from Marshfield, Massachusetts, to Europe. Unfortunately, after 66 hours and 1,075 miles, their journey ended prematurely when they were forced to ditch the balloon into rough seas off Iceland due to fuel exhaustion and severe weather.

Despite the setback, this attempt provided invaluable experience and data, laying the groundwork for future success.

Undeterred by the challenges faced during their initial attempt, Anderson and Abruzzo were joined by Larry Newman and embarked on a second attempt with their new gondola, the Double Eagle II.

This helium-filled balloon launched from Presque Isle, Maine, on August 11, 1978. After a grueling flight that lasted 137 hours and 6 minutes, they landed in a barley field near Miserey, France, on August 17, 1978. The journey covered approximately 3,120 miles and set numerous records, capturing the imagination of the world.

The Double Eagle II's successful transatlantic flight was a significant cultural event in the late 1970s. It was celebrated with parades, and the team's accomplishment was covered extensively by the media.

The trio received a hero's welcome upon their return and were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal. Besides the Congressional Gold Medal, Anderson received numerous awards, including the Fédération Aéronautique Internationale's Montgolfier Diploma, one of the highest honors in ballooning.

His son Kristian (Kris) inherited his ballooning spirit and would regularly go on flights with his dad. Together, they made the first non-stop trans-North American flight in 1980 in their balloon Kitty Hawk. His son continued to live on with his father's legacy after Anderson's life was tragically cut short on June 27, 1983, during an attempt to cross the Alps in a balloon.

The ill-fated flight ended when his balloon crashed near Bad Hindelang, West Germany, due to adverse weather conditions. Despite the tragedy, Anderson's legacy continued to inspire and propel the sport of ballooning forward.


Maxie Anderson was not just an adventurer; he was an innovator in ballooning technology. He was instrumental in developing safer and more efficient balloon designs, contributing to the sport's growth and popularity. Specifically, he experimented with different types of balloons, including hot air and gas balloons. From his foray into the unknown, he left the sport with new standards and thriving balloonists as they each pursue excellence in ballooning.

The Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta, the world's most photographed event and the very same event that inspired Anderson as a young lad, owes much to Anderson's influence. His involvement and actions helped elevate the event to international prominence.

Anderson's participation and victories in various competitions at the Fiesta showcased his skill and dedication, inspiring future generations. His family partnered with Abruzzo's family and the City of Alburquerque to construct the Anderson-Abruzzo Alburquerque International Balloon Museum next to the Fiesta's launch field.

Maxie Anderson was always in pursuit of the horizon, chasing the sun across the sky. Today, he rests in Sunset Memorial Park in Alburquerque, NM, having fulfilled some of his biggest dreams.


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WGCA Awards Four Lady Bulldogs All-American Scholar Status
