The school year is winding down all around

western Oklahoma and schools across the area are getting ready to celebrate the class of 2025 with graduations happening throughout the month of May. Here is a breakdown of some of the graduations in the area, so you can congratulate your loved ones across the region.

On Friday, May 2, SWOSU will officially kick off graduation season in Western Oklahoma with the College of Pharmacy's commencement ceremony. It will begin at 7pm at the Fine Arts Center on the SWOSU campus.

SWOSU will celebrate all other graduates at the Pioneer Event Center on May 9 at 6pm, followed by two more ceremonies on May 10, with a morning ceremony beginning at 9am and an afternoon ceremony beginning at 12pm.

Corn Bible Academy will host their high school graduation on Thursday, May 8, beginning at 7:30pm on their campus in Clinton.

Arapaho-Butler will host their high school graduation on Sunday, May 11, beginning at 4pm in their high school gymnasium.

On Thursday, May 15, Lookeba-Sickles and Mangum will host their high school graduations. Lookeba-Sickles's will take place at the Ethel McClain Gymnasium and Mangum's will be hosted in the MHS Auditorium. Both ceremonies will begin at 7pm.

Sherri is preceded in death by her parents, Don Harold Jones and DeVon Jane (Smith) Fagan.





















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BancFirst Weatherford Celebrates Conclusion of Inaugural Student Board for 2024-25 School Year

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The Resurrection



There are many events in history that are difficult to determine with accuracy or truthfulness. Was there a conspiracy behind the assassination of John F. Kennedy? Did Hitler really commit suicide in that bunker in Berlin? Is the grave that is marked as the burial place of Jesse James really containing the body of that outlaw?

While the answers to these questions may be interesting or important to some people, to the vast majority of us it will make little difference whether the facts are right or not. It will not change the way we conduct our lives.

In fact, in the minds of many, truthfulness is not a very big deal. We live in a day in which the idea of the existence of absolute truth is questioned on every hand. Are there things that are absolutely true all the time and everywhere whether people know it or like it. It takes real guts for a student to make a statement in class that premarital sex is wrong-wrong for everybody not just for those who think it's wrong. If we carry this to its logical conclusion then we will end up with anarchy, with everyone doing what is right in his own eyes.

Sheldon Vanauken and his wife were students in Oxford University. Their passion was literature. They were not believers. They were admirers of C.S. Lewis, the great literary figure and Christian apologist. They became friends with Lewis and, through that friendship, they were forced to consider the claims of Christ. Was there anything to the Christian faith or was it for weak people who needed a crutch? In their search for truth they finally came to a conclusion that it was important. Quoting him in his book, A Severe Mercy, he wrote "by now we knew it was important. If true and we admitted to each other the possibility that it was---it was, very simply, the only really important truth in the world. And if untrue, it was false. No halfway house. First of nothing."

That is the basis on which we look at the resurrection of Christ. If true it overshadows every other truth of the world. If false we are wasting our time. There are liberal theologians today who don't like the idea of the literal bodily resurrection of Jesus. They will call him a good man, a great teacher and that his spiritual influence is that which lives on.

The stories of his resurrection are simply symbols pointing to the triumph of the human spirit, or so they would say. They would argue that it is not necessary to believe that his body came forth from the grave. The Apostle Paul made it quite clear. "And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile; you are still in your sins."(I Cor. 15:17) If Christ is not raised, then living for him, doing what he says, following his will is a great delusion. We should be pitied. Like insane people who live by hallucinations.

But because he has been raised from the dead and is alive forever, all our obedience, all our love, all our self-denial counts for something. Our lives have meaning, they have significance and usefulness. We don't come to the end of our days and say; it was all in vain, empty, pointless, and insignificant. That is why Paul ends this chapter with Vs. 57. "Be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord, your labor is not in vain."

The greatest evidence of the resurrection is the changed lives of the disciples and millions since that time. People don't die a martyrs' death or suffer unbelievable torture for something they know is a lie. The disciples had seen the risen Jesus and were forever changed and they changed the world.

The 2025 4A Basketball State Champion Weatherford Eagles were invited to the Oklahoma State Capitol by State Representative Anthony Moore (R-Clinton). There, the Eagles were recognized for bringing home Weatherford's first-ever basketball state title.

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NEW OKLAHOMA JUSTICE - A Woodward attorney is the newest member of the Oklahoma Supreme Court. Travis Jett was appointed by Governor Kevin Stitt and announced during a recent press conference. District 2 District Judge Donna Dirickson of Weatherford was one of the three finalists for the position. The seat became vacant when voters failed to retain Justice Yvonne Kauger during the November general election last year.

CLINTON / NEW SUPERINTENDENT - The Clinton School Board of Education will soon be searching for the next superintendent of the district with the naming of Tyler Bridges as Superintendent of Stillwater Public Schools. "This opportunity gets us back close to where home is for both my wife and I; we're both from Chandler, [which is] 30 minutes south of Stillwater, and it's where our parents and extended family live." Bridges explained. "This is a good opportunity for us to get back close to home. It was a tough decision to make but it felt like it was the right one at [this] time." Bridges will officially step into his new position in Stillwater on July 1st.

WEATHERFORD / GRAND CAN - Another Grand Can Sculpture Competition is in the books for Connections Food & Resource Center in Weatherford. Assistant Executive Director Eddie Bennett revealed this year's event brought in 19,260 pounds of food, nearly 4,000 pounds more than last year. Bennett also said that, through six grand can events, a combined 87,000 pounds of food have been donated to help feed needy western Oklahomans. New Life Church was this year's Grand Can Sculpture Champion with their dinosaur hatchling sculpture.

CUSTER CO / GALLOWAY - Custer County Emergency Management Director Mike Galloway has officially announced his retirement. His last day will be June 30. "I'm going to try to get my wife back to South Africa and I may stay for a couple months with her. She wants to see her family one last time," Galloway said. Custer County District 3 Commissioner Lyle Miller showed his appreciation to Galloway for his service to county residents in attendance at the announcement as commissioners begin the process of finding a successor for Galloway. "We're not replacing Mike. I don't think that's possible. But we will put somebody in his seat," Miller expressed.

HYDRO EAKLY / PRINCIPAL - The Hydro-Eakly school district has a new Middle School/High School Principal. Hydro-Eakly's District Board of Education approved Teri Kimble for the job. Kimble, who has taught in the district for 17 years, will begin her new duties on July 1.

Hardaway officially began her role on April 21 and will report directly to SWOSU President Dr. Diana Lovell. Hardaway previously served as the Executive Director of Human Resources for Wichita Falls's Independent School District, where she leads recruitment, retention, employee relations and educator support systems in partnership with Midwestern State University and other community partners.

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
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Carli Stuva and Chenoa VandeStouwe are Latest Bulldogs of the Week

Three SWOSU Golf members earned All-Great

American Conference honors, announced by the league office on Sunday night. Jack Phillips and Freya Sala were both First Team selections, while Drew Dodgion was placed on the Second Team. Sala was one of five unanimous women's golfer selections.

Aside from all-conference nods for play on the course, nine in total from the men's and women's programs earned academic honors including men's golfer Lukas Hendricks who was named an Men's Elite Scholar Athlete for a second straight year for having the highest GPA of any male competitor in the championship field. Dodgion, Ashlyn Acosta, Lucia Rivas, Ryan Carlisle, Caspar Graf, Otto Heden, Sutton McMillan, and Mariano Racca were all named GAC Distinguished Scholar Athletes. The

participating in the championship field with at least a 3.70 GPA and 70 hours of completed classwork.

Phillips (Sydney, Australia) earns first team status in his first season competing collegiately. He's finished 12th place or better in three tournaments this season, highlighted by a two-stroke win at the Tulsa Cup last fall when he shot two-under par (72-74-70) in the three-round tournament. Phillips is currently ranked 16th in the Central Region with a 72.4 scoring average.

Sala (Mexico City, Mexico) improves upon her second team selection from a year ago with unanimous first team honors in 2024-25. She has four top-three finishes to her credit this season including a win at the MSU Women's Invitational last fall and has finished no worse than 12th in nine of 10 tournaments this regular season. Sala was SWOSU's top finisher (fifth place) at the Ford/

Lincoln Diffee Invitational in March – helping lead the Lady Bulldogs to a team victory in their only team win of the season. She is currently the No. 2-ranked women's golfer in the Central Region with an average stroke count of 73.6.

Dodgion (Guthrie, Okla.) is now a two-time All-GAC selection as a member of the second team in her senior season. She's finished 12th or better four times this year including a pair of top eight placings in back-to-back tournaments last fall. Dodgion sits 12th in the Central Region individual women's

The Bulldogs will close out the regular season next week with a home midweek matchup against East Central before traveling to face Northwestern next weekend. The Dawgs now sit 10th in the conference standings, two games behind Southeastern for the eighth and final postseason spot. The current GAC standings can be found here.

Game One - HSU 4, SWOSU 2

Two walks and three Reddie hits in the fourth inning let the home team plate three runs, as they went on to beat the Dawgs in a low scoring series opener.

SWOSU scored solo runs in the top of the fourth on an RBI single from Reece Burke, to lead briefly, and in the seventh after a throwing error allowed Connor Jeffers to score after stealing second base. The Bulldogs managed just one hit from the sixth inning on, hindering their comeback efforts.

Game One - SWOSU 9, HSU 4 The Bulldogs had back-to-back three-run innings in the second and third to build a lead and extended it with another three runs spread across the fifth and sixth.

Henderson State displayed shaky defense throughout, finishing with six errors as a team. SWOSU cashed in on those, plating five runs directly from the miscues by applying pressure to the HSU defense.

Riley Lusk doubled in the game and led the lineup with a 2-for-4 game. She also started in the circle, pitching two innings before Jaycee McKee provided effective long relief from the third inning on to earn the win. Both teams finished with eight hits apiece.

Game Two - SWOSU 3, HSU 2

SWOSU found itself without a hit through four innings until Katie Boline broke the trend with a triple that led off the fifth inning.

Drew Fifer had a no decision in his 3.2 inning outing. Greg Ross suffered the loss. Justin Schrader threw 1.1 innings of scoreless relief as SWOSU's final arm to see action.

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SWOSU again jumped out to a lead in Saturday's finale. In the third inning, Hunter Smith hit his first home run of the season and Ty Eastwood singled in another run to put SWOSU up 2-0.

A Connor Jeffers RBI double in the fourth had the Dawgs leading 3-1.


HSU plated runs in every inning from the third to the sixth, capped off by a four-run sixth that gave them the lead for good.
